
Brock community raises record amount for United Way

Brock University surpassed its 2001 United Way campaign goal by raising a record \$65,176 to meet a

significant need in the community. This is just an outstanding achievement," said Lorne Adams,

Director of Athletics at Brock. "The Brock community was called upon to come together and raise money for the United Way, and we responded with a generosity that answers an important need in our community."

This year's fundraising goal -Brock's highest ever - was \$62,000. Adams co-chaired the Brock campaign for the second year in a row with Debbie Slade, Managing Director at the Centre for the Arts.


Students, staff, faculty and retirees donated individually as well as through bake sales, a noonhour concert and a variety of other fundraising events held across campus in October and November.

Money raised by the Brock community will be invested by the United Way of St. Catharines & District in more than 70 social service programs provided by 41 local agencies in the Niagara community. Additionally, it will also channel donations to many other charities as directed by individual Brock employees.

Student applications lead Ontario

Brock University leads all 17 universities in Ontario in the percentage increase of total applications for full-time students from

Figures recently released by the Ontario Universities' Application Centre show that total applications to Brock for first-year, full-time studies jumped by 70 per cent over the fiveyear period. That's 56 per cent higher than the average for all 17 universities in Ontario.

"These figures are yet another indication of Brock's growing popularity and reputation as Brock continues to attract many of the best students," said Brock President David Atkinson. "This momentum reflects the growing demand for a Brock education as the University evolves into a comprehensive institution with greater emphasis on research and graduate

Brock is also boasting a record enrolment for the second year in a row, with 12,025 full- and part-time students enrolled for the 2001-2002 academic year. That's an increase of 609 students, or almost 5.3 per cent over the same time last year, when 11,416 students were enrolled at the University.

Application figures for the 2001-2002 academic year showed a 12.9 per cent increasé in students making Brock their first choice. This was the highest percentage increase for universities in Ontario and was almost

six times higher than the system average. In total, 2,739 high school students made Brock their first choice, while 10,564 students applied to Brock, for an increase of 15.8 per cent over last year, which was also the highest percentage increase in Ontario.

In addition, recent provincial performance indicators show that Brock graduates boast the highest employment rates among Ontario universities. Two years after graduation, 98.3 per cent of Brock graduates are employed, tied with Nipissing University in North Bay. Brock is also ranked among the top five in the province for employment rates six months after graduation, at 95.2

Brock's Bachelor of Accounting program has more than 450 students and about 85 graduates each year. Its Accounting Co-op program is the second largest in Ontario. The program is fully accredited by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Ontario.

To write the CA examination, graduates must be employed in public accounting. Completion of the examination is the final step in a unique and demanding program of education, experience and examination requirements for becoming a Chartered Accountant.

The requirements for a CMA designation include a university degree, CMĂ Entrance Examinations, two years of work experience and completion of the two-year CMA Professional Program.

Through the Faculty of Business, Brock offers the following programs: Bachelor of Accounting (including a co-op option), Bachelor of Business Administration (including a co-op option) and Master of Accountancy.

Siegel named Dean of Social Sciences

Brock University President David Atkinson is pleased to announce the appointment of Dr. David Siegel as the Dean of the Faculty of Social Sciences for a five-year term,

effective July 1, 2002. Dr. Siegel currently holds a position as

Professor in the Department of Political Science. He has an impressive list of academic and administrative achievements at Brock, including a term as Associate Vice-President (Academic). Siegel will fill the position that was held by Dr. William Webster for the past 10 years.

"Dr. Siegel will provide excellent leadership for the Faculty during the coming five years," said Brock President David Atkinson. "I look forward to working closely with him in his new role.

Siegel has a PhD in Political Science from the University of Toronto and a Master's Degree in Public Administration from Carleton University in Ottawa. Siegel, who joined Brock 23 years ago as a lecturer, is also a Certified General Accountant. His success as an academic is also reflected by the substantial research funding he has received as well as the many books and articles he has written on local government and public administration.

"The Faculty of Social Sciences at Brock has a strong reputation for its commitment to teaching and research," said Dr. Siegel. "I look forward to building on the groundwork laid over the years by faculty members as we continue to move ahead to meet the new challenges of post-secondary

education." As Dean of the Faculty of Social Sciences, Dr. Siegel will provide strong academic leadership based on an appreciation of all social sciences. He will also be expected to provide strong administrative leadership, work effectively with faculty, students and staff, and develop further linkages with the external community.

Brock receives almost \$1 million for icewine research

Brock University's Cool Climate Oenology and Viticulture Institute (CCOVI) is conducting a four-year, nearly \$1-million study designed to ultimately ensure the authenticity of Canadian icewines.

The Natural Sciences and Engineering Research Council of Canada (NSERC) is contributing \$744,400 of the \$870,000 total project cost. Grape grower Garphil Farms Inc. and Hillebrand Estates Winery, both of Niagara, are also funding the study in

conjunction with Brock.

The purpose of the project is to identify key compounds specific to genuine icewines. By developing a diagnostic test to distinguish genuine Canadian icewines from faux counterparts, the University will contribute to the protection of a major Canadian export and ensure that authentic icewines meet stringent European import regulations and requirements. The project will also enumerate the impacts of both crop

level and yeast strain on the production of unique aroma compounds specific to icewines.

The Brock research team consists of Dr. Andrew Reynolds, Dr. Gary Pickering and Dr. Debra Inglis, all of CCOVI, and Professor Ian Brindle, Acting Dean of the Faculty of Mathematics and Science and Chair of the Department of Chemistry. The researchers bring together scientific expertise in the fields of viticulture, sensory perception, biotechnology and analytical chemistry.

Bernard Harrison donates \$300,000 to 'Good, Better, Brock!' campaign

Former trade official and long-time Brock University donor Bernard Harrison has given \$300,000 to the "Good, Better, Brock!" campaign. The Atrium and the Dean's Suite in the University's new

academic complex will be named for Harrison and his late wife, Bertha Thompson.

The \$29.62 million campaign, the largest in the University's 38-year history, has raised more than \$23 million. The final phase of the "Good, Better, Brock!" campaign will complete financing for the \$51 million in construction under way on the campus.

"Bernard Harrison has been a very good and generous friend of Brock University for a very long time," said Brock President David Atkinson, noting that Harrison had also been a demonstrator in the University's Physics Department. "I am very pleased that Bernard's generosity will be recognized permanently through the naming of these important new facilities."

Employee Feedback update

The University has taken several steps in the last few months to respond

to input gathered through the Employee Feedback System (EFS) survey.

The EFS survey was conducted independently by the Brock Wellness Institute in November 2000. The results from the survey were shared with the Brock community last year.

Harold Leece, Associate Vice-President, Administration, says that one of the major developments to quickly come out of the survey is the recent introduction of the Employee Family Assistance Program (EFAP). In August, Baylis and Associates, of St. Catharines, was selected by the University to provide EFAP services that include counselling for employees and their families in areas such as marital and family difficulties, work related issues, self-esteem and personal issues, financial concerns, emotional/mental health concems, and addictions. They also offer other services such as three hours of legal consultation with a lawyer and/or financial consultation with a financial advisor.

"The University has provided a completely confidential avenue of support to employees and their families to help them cope with the pressures they are under in today's fast-paced society," explains Leece.

Here are some other actions in response to the EFS survey:

• the June Wellness conference

included seminars that addressed several survey issues, such as the importance of humour to wellbeing, and balancing the demands of work and family;

 more opportunities are being created for employees to participate on steering committees to address workplace issues;

 an orientation package has been developed for new employees which provides a practical source of information about the University;

 the position of Sexual Harassment Advisor has been combined with a new role of Employee Ombudsperson so that employees have a third-party they can approach to deal with workplace issues.

"The survey will continue to be a valuable tool for the University as we move forward in making Brock a better place for those who work here," says Leece. "Overall, the survey has opened discussions, at all levels of the University, about workplace issues with a focus first and foremost on employee wellness."

Researchers share \$2 million in funding

Fourteen faculty members at Brock University received grants totalling more than \$2 million from the Canada Foundation for Innovation (CFI), the Ontario Innovation Trust (OIT), industry partners and the University.

Two of the CFI grants total \$313,288, which will be matched by the OIT. Brock will contribute another \$22,077, with industry partners contributing \$115,000, bringing the total value of these type. bringing the total value of those two research projects - New Opportunities Fund and Innovation Fund - to \$763,653.

A third joint research project funded in collaboration with McMaster University in Hamilton has a total value of \$5.6 million. Brock's grant portion of that project is approximately \$1.36 million.

"Brock faculty continue to attract the funding needed to pursue unique areas of research that can lead to important breakthroughs," said Dr. Jack Miller, Associate Vice-President of Research and Dean of Graduate Studies at Brock. "The federal government's continued commitment to fund important research goes hand in hand with Brock's initiatives to intensify its research activities

and to attract the best students."

The funding will support projects in the areas of psychology, neuroscience, chemistry, biological sciences, physical education and kinesiology.

Former NDP leader to speak at Brock

The Hon. Edward Broadbent will be the guest speaker for the D.G. Willmot Distinguished Lecture Series sponsored by the Faculty of Business at Brock University, Thursday, March 7, at 7:30 p.m., in the

David S. Howes Theatre. A reception will follow the presentation.

The title of the lecture is "Canadian Citizenship - What's Gone Wrong? Broadbent will address the notion that until recently, Canada seemed to be

evolving into the model democratic society. For most of the post Second World War period, the demands of ordinary Canadians for strong social programs and the particular struggles of the poor, women and visible minorities, were not seen as merely special claims. Rather, they were elements in a much larger political cause: the building of a nation of equal citizens, a nation favouring both individual and community values. Then things began to fall apart. Why did this happen? Does it matter that inequality is now increasing? What can be done about it?

The Hon. Edward

Broadbent

Broadbent was a Member of the Canadian Parliament for 21 years, and Leader of the New Democratic Party from 1975 to 1989. Throughout his period of leadership of the New Democratic Party, he was known for his work for an equitable tax system, and the equality for women, and the constitutional entrenchment of

aboriginal rights.
From 1990 to 1996, Broadbent was the first President of the International Centre for Human Rights and Democratic Development, Montreal.

He was a member of the Privy Council in 1982, and he was made an Officer of the Order of Canada in 1993 and a Companion of the Order of Canada

in January 2002.

Currently, Broadbent is a Visiting
Fellow in the Arthur Kroeger College of
Public Affairs at Carleton University,
Ottawa, and is co-chair of the Canadian Democracy and Corporate Accountability Commission. He is a member of the boards of the Canadian Civil Liberties' Association, the North-South Institute and the Institute for

Media, Policy and Civil Society.
D.G. "Bud" Willmot served on the committee which established Brock University in 1964, as well as on the University's Board of Trustees. He received an Honorary Doctor of Laws degree from Brock University in 1989. Willmot, who died in 1994, established the lecture series with a generous gift in 1989.

Research profiled during Olympic coverage

Brock receives \$100,000 for health research

Brock University has been awarded a \$100,000 grant from the Canadian Institute for Health Research (CIHR) to develop research programs in nursing, community health sciences and wellness, neuroscience, and children and youth.

The development grant will be used primarily to provide new faculty members with the opportunity to build up their research portfolios as well as collaborate with researchers in other disciplines at Brock and outside the University. Areas of research could involve workplace health, exercise and osteoporosis/ bone density, smoking, gambling, aging, and various other health issues involving youth and seniors.

"The primary purpose of the grant is to assist institutions like Brock to build and mobilize their health research capacity," said Dr. Michael Owen, Director, Office of Research Services at Brock. "This initiative is consistent with the University's master plan to heighten its role as a leader in research and development."

All Brock faculty members who conduct health-related research will be able to compete for CIHR funding. The grant will be administered by an internal committee and will be

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distributed over the next two years. Overall, research and research infrastructure funding received by Brock faculty has increased to more than \$5 million for the 2001-2002 academic year. The University also established Chancellor's Chairs for Research Excellence last year to recognize the distinguished contributions of faculty members and to give them the opportunity to pursue a specific program of research for a period of three years. CIHR is Canada's premier federal

agency for health research. Its objective is to excel, according to internationally accepted standards of scientific excellence, in the creation of new knowledge and its translation into improved health for Canadians, more effective health services and products and a strengthened healthcare system.

Number of high school students applying to Brock grows

Initial application figures show a 14.3 per cent overall increase in secondary school students applying to Brock for the 2002-03 academic year. A total of 11,540 high school students applied to Brock, up from last year's provincial high of 15.1 per cent (10,095 applications).

"Brock University is keeping pace with five consecutive years of very significant increases in applications from secondary school students," says Robert Tiffin, Registrar at the University. "These figures continue to reflect Brock's ongoing success and growing reputation for its commitment to students and to the highest standards of academic excellence."

Total applications to Brock for firstyear, full-time studies jumped by 70 per cent over the five-year period 1997 to 2001. That's 56 per cent higher than the average for all 17 universities in Ontario. For 2002-03, the University's Sport Management, Neuroscience Coop and Sociology programs are among those areas of study seeing the most interest from prospective students.

The Ontario University Application Centre, located in Guelph, receives all applications for University admissions in the province. Application figures for the 2002-2003 academic year were released February 9.

reception will follow the presentation. The title of the lecture is "Canadian Citizenship - What's Gone Wrong?" Broadbent will address the notion that until recently, Canada seemed to be evolving into the model democratic society. For most of the post Second World War period, the demands of ordinary Canadians for strong social programs and the particular struggles of the poor, women and visible minorities, were not seen as merely special claims. Rather, they were elements in a much larger political cause: the building of a nation of equal citizens, a nation favouring both individual and community values. Then things began to fall apart. Why did this happen! Does it matter that inequality is now increasing? What can be done about it?

Broadbent was a Member of the Canadian Parliament for 21 years, and Leader of the New Democratic Party from 1975 to 1989.

From 1990 to 1996, Broadbent was the first President of the International Centre for Human Rights and Democratic Development, Montreal.

He was a member of the Privy Council in 1982, and he was made an Officer of the Order of Canada in 1993 and a Companion of the Order of Canada in January 2002.

Currently, Broadbent is a Visiting Fellow in the Arthur Kroeger College of Public Affairs at Carleton University, Ottawa, and is co-chair of the Canadian Democracy and Corporate Accountability Commission.



Brock to receive \$702,095 in performance-based funding

Brock University will receive \$702,095 from the Government of Ontario for boasting the highest employment rates among the province's universities.

This is the second year additional funding has been allocated to universities based on each institution's performance in three key performance indicators. The performance-based funding is measured against achievement in:

 the six-month employment rate of graduates of undergraduate programs;

• the two-year employment rate of graduates of undergraduate programs; the graduation rate of students.

The latest figures show that two years after graduation, 98.3 per cent of Brock graduates are employed. Brock is also ranked among the top five in the province for employment rates six months after graduation, at 95.2 per cent. As well, the graduation rate for students at Brock was 77.7 per cent four per cent above the Ontario average.

"I am very pleased that Brock graduates are finding meaningful employment," said Brock President David Atkinson. "The Ontario government's performance-based funding encourages universities like Brock to keep pace with the changing needs of students and the community by providing relevant, high-quality programs.

Student-led smoking prevention program gets financial support from federal government

Tony Tirabassi, MP for Niagara Centre, visited Brock University on March 4, to present a certificate representing the first instalment of a Health Canada grant to the highly successful Leave The Pack Behind smoking prevention program. This federal grant, totalling \$329,882 over three years, is the program's first. The funding is provided under Health Canada's Prevention, Cessation and Education Component of the Federal

Tobacco Control Strategy.
The Leave The Pack Behind program was initiated by Brock University and

the Regional Niagara Public Health Department, and now serves 10 university and college campuses in Ontario. Organizers have received three grants totalling \$770,000 from the Ministry of Health and Long Term Care, Ontario Tobacco Strategy

This unique program, which first began in March 2000, offers services to help students quit or reduce their smoking as well as encourage others not to start. Leave The Pack Behind also provides researchers with valuable data about young adults' smoking behaviours.

Sociology textbook named Book of the Year

An introductory sociology textbook written by two Brock University professors was named Book of the Year for 2001 by Pearson Education Canada due to its overwhelming popularity at universities and colleges across the country.

Sociology: A Down-to-Earth Approach is a Canadian adaptation of a U.S. textbook. Professor Dan Glenday and Professor Ann Duffy from Brock, ás well as Professor Norene Pupo from York University, wrote the Canadian edition over a one-and-a-half year period. It is so popular with both professors and students that a second run of thousands of textbooks was printed less than six months after the book's first release in December 2000.

The 514-page text uses the latest Canadian data, real stories, studies, issues and current perspectives to show how sociology can help people understand, and even change, society. The material covers issues that aren't always covered in sociology textbooks and enhances other topics, such as inequalities of race and ethnicity, aging, feminist theories, health care and the relationship of Quebec with the rest of Canada.

This spring, a media companion CD ROM will include an electronic version of Sociology: A Down-to-Earth Approach, hot links to the Internet for material relevant to chapters in the textbook, as well as study materials for students.

Interim Report of the President's Long-Range Planning Committee released

The Interim Report of the President's Long-Range Planning Committee (subtitled "A Consultation with the Community") has been released.

The report, plus three background papers, is available at: www.brocku.ca/ instanalysis/longrange/

The Planning and Priorities exercise of several years ago laid out general directions for the institution. The President's Long-Range Planning Committee was created with the intention of keeping current the University's planning horizon. The Committee accepted as its major task the examination and refinement of recommendations originally set out in the Planning and Priorities Report (P&P). The Committee also accepts that the broad directions outlined in the 1999 P&P Report remain in place as priorities for the University.

As a means of engaging the larger University community in the planning process, the Long-Range Planning Committee has formulated a number of consideration points relating to possible future directions for the University. These constitute a series of specific issues which the Long-Range Planning Committee feels are important for the institution to consider. They are put forward with the understanding that each constitutes a possible direction for the University and that there should be full opportunity for engagement by the University community on each one.

A critical issue underpinning the work of the Committee was Brock's competitive position relative to other universities. While a number of comparative studies do exist, Brock must remain committed to the collection and analysis of data that will assist the University in establishing benchmarks for institutional growth and change.



Broadbent critical of new generation of politicians

A new generation of politicians has turned back history on Canada's achievements in democratic citizenship by treating Canadians as "consumers and taxpayers" rather than "citizens" says the Honourable Edward Broadbent.

Speaking at the D.G. Willmot Distinguished Lecture Series at Brock on March 7, Broadbent pointed to federal and provincial politicians of the last decade and blamed them for eroding Canada's proud history of social programs dating back to the late 1950s.

More than 450 people gathered in the David S. Howes Theatre to listen to the address, "Canadian Citizenship — What's Gone Wrong?" by the former Member of the Canadian Parliament for 21 years, and Leader of the New Democratic Party from 1975 to 1989.

And the winner is

The outcome of this weekend's Academy Awards holds some special interest for Brock Professor Emeritus John Mayberry

Up for eight Oscars is the box-office hit "A Beautiful Mind," the story of Nobel-winning mathematician John Forbes Nash Jr. and his struggle with schizophrenia.

Mayberry, who taught mathematics at Brock for 24 years, was familiar with the early part of the Nash story — he was a graduate student at Princeton from 1951 to 1955 when many mathematicians, including Nash, were fascinated by the mathematical aspects of Game Theory. More significantly, when Nash's second major contribution to Game Theory (now called the NCS, or Nash Co-operative Solution) was published in 1953 in the journal *Econometrica,* Mayberry contributed to a companion paper

which applied the new concept to a practical economic example.

"Nash wanted to show economists how his new solution could be applied," explains Mayberry, "so he had asked Martin Shubik, a friend and economist, to construct an illustrative example, and they asked me to help with the calculations. The calculations were so complicated that they accepted me as a co-author of "A Comparison of Treatments of a Duopoly Situation."

Nash received the Nobel Prize in Economics in 1994.

When the 1994 Nobel Prize in Economics was announced, I was pleased that I had published joint work with each of the three winners — John F. Nash, John Harsanyi and Reinhard Selten — but even more pleased that the Prize Committee had formally endorsed the importance of Game Theory to economics," adds Mayberry.

Rock and the two Niagara MPs visited Brock's Cool Climate Oenology and Viticulture Institute on March 27, to announce the funding, which delivers on a commitment made recently in Canada's Innovation Strategy.

In his presentation, Rock highlighted Brock's leadership in first-choice applications by students from across Ontario and Canada. He congratulated President David Atkinson and "his terrific team" for their hard work, noting the remarkably diverse course selection Brock offers in a variety of fields, and the University's growing reputation in Canada and internationally.

'Brock is well positioned to enter the top tier of universities," said Rock, who also credited Lastewka's leadership in

identifying the need for the federal government to fund indirect costs of

Canada's Innovation Strategy outlines specific actions to ensure that Canada will become globally competitive in the knowledge economy, particularly by supporting a vibrant research and development community and ensuring that Canadian research is

brought to market more quickly.
"We very much appreciate this important recognition," Atkinson said at the news conference. Such financial support, he said, would be used to defray Brock's substantial indirect costs as well as fulfil Brock's own program

The funding is part of a one-time \$200-million investment in Canada's universities and research hospitals that will help defray costs that stem from research activities.

Such costs include operation and maintenance expenses, library and research archiving expenses, and technology transfer and commercialization services.

Brock investing \$70 million for double cohort

Brock University is investing \$70 million in capital expansion to prepare for the double cohort, President David Atkinson announced at a recent news briefing on campus.

"We are committed to maintaining the quality of the educational experience of our students and have invested millions of dollars to ensure we are ready for the double cohort," said Atkinson. "Our planning discussions have focused on the hiring of bright new faculty members, introducing new programs, the use of technology, the importance of our small class seminar system and our award-winning residence program."

The University has been planning for

the significant increase in enrolment since 1998. It is committed to taking an additional 1,700 students beyond its

1998-1999 first-year intake level of 2,068 by September 2003, and plans to increase the number of first-year spaces from 2,315 in fall 2001 to 3,770 in fall 2003. That's when the final year of the five-year high school program and the first class of the new four-year curriculum graduate at the same time in Ontario.

The Board of Trustees recently approved a new 310-bed student residence that will open for the 2003-04 academic year to accommodate the new growth. The University will also renovate the Village residence to convert 175 single beds to 350 double beds for fall 2002. As well, discussions are being held with a private developer regarding the construction of an additional townhouse residence that could accommodate 288 students. This could bring the total number of new residence beds to more than 700.

Brock has expanded its academic and physical facilities with \$54 million in construction of new academic and classroom space, new technology, a food court, and recreational facilities for students and the community.

Existing classrooms are also being refurbished. In September 2001, Brock opened its \$12.3-million Earp residence with 255 beds, bringing the total number of existing residence beds on campus to 1,638.

The \$54 million in current construction and the further addition of a \$16-million residence will create an economic impact of \$106,260,000 and the equivalent of 2,656 year-long jobs. Brock's annual economic impact on the Niagara region, currently at \$190 million, will rise to \$240 million by 2003.

Canada faced with a marketing challenge

Lecture series recognizes research excellence

Dr. Doug Bruce, Biological Sciences, will give an address titled "Daddy, why is photosystem II so much better than photosystem I?" on **Wednesday, April 10**, from 4 to 5 p.m., in Pond Inlet.

The address is part of the Chancellor's Chairs for Research Excellence Lecture Series.

Bruce, one of the first four recipients of the Brock Chancellor's Chairs for Research Excellence, is recognized for his scholarly achievements in the field of Biophysics of Photosynthesis Systems and the contributions that he has made to building a strong research

infrastructure for spectroscopy at Brock University, the mentoring of junior post-doctoral colleagues and undergraduate and graduate students. Bruce is recognized as a researcher who has produced highly original research in biophysical photosynthesis alone, and in collaboration with international colleagues.

The Brock Chancellor's Chairs for Research Excellence provides him with the opportunity to expand his research program in developing a detailed kinetic model of oxygenic photosynthesis (PSII).

Kosovar university professors tour Brock's Faculty of Education

Professors from the University of Prishtina in Kosovo visited Brock University, March 13 to 15, to pick up pointers on establishing a Faculty of Education

A new Faculty of Education at the University of Prishtina is seen as the first step in the reform of teacher education in Kosovo and will raise standards in teacher education programs to European levels of quality. This will allow Kosovo-educated teachers to work effectively in Kosovo schools as well as abroad in other European countries, a privilege that is currently denied them.

Brock's Faculty of Education is one

of three universities the Kosovar delegation visited as part of a project funded by the Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA). The federal agency works with developing countries and countries in transition to develop the tools to eventually meet their own needs. Brock was selected because of the unique integration of its on-campus course studies with teaching field experience through counselling group concepts made up of faculty members and students.

Their visit to Brock included meeting with professors from the Faculty of Education and touring the University's facilities.

Brock student entrepreneurs place second in national competition

Two Brock University students placed second at the annual Queen's Entrepreneurs Competition, held March 21 to 23, in which finalists from across Canada identified viable business opportunities and presented business plans to a panel of executives from some of Canada's most elite corporations.

Chris Leyenaar, of Winchester, in Eastern Ontario, and Adam Ives, of nearby Burlington, won the \$1,500 second prize, the Award of Entrepreneurial Achievement, for their venture business plan Trailblazing Blue Mountain.

Leyenaar and Ives are both students in the Faculty of Business and developed their plan as part of their third-year entrepreneurship class entitled New Venture Planning, taught by Professor Teresa Menzies.

"This is a remarkable achievement for Chris and Adam, given the intense competition for these prizes," said Dr. Menzies, a Professor in the Faculty of Business and faculty advisor for the project. "Making it to the finals is a great distinction alone. This national competition is also a superb opportunity for community members to share in the education and success of Brock students."

To prepare for the competition, the two Brock students presented their business plan during a practice session at the University on March 19 in front of Niagara business leaders and business faculty and graduates.

Guests asked Leyenaar and Ives dozens of questions about their business plan and offered them valuable guidance.

Leyenaar and Ives beat out the thirdplace team composed of students from Queen's, Harvard University in Boston and Dartmouth College in New Hampshire. First prize went to a team from the University of Saskatchewan.

Brock has competed at the finals five times in the last six years. In 1999, Jamie Lauzon, a Business Communications student, and Rich VanderWal, a Recreation and Leisure student, both of Thorold, won the top award, the PriceWaterhouseCoopers Gold Medal for Entrepreneurial Excellence. They won a \$3,500 prize for their business plan and presentation on Evolution Wheelchair Designs. Brock teams have also won the bronze award and the award for best presentation in the last six years.

The Queen's competition, held at Queen's University in Kingston, Ontario, is based on both academic excellence and practical application. Students must submit a written business plan for a new business venture and then make a 30-minute presentation of their business plan.

region's largest multi-use recreational facility," Brock President David Atkinson said. "The University is indebted to so many supporters who have generously contributed to this campus expansion.

"It is exactly this kind of community spirit that will enable the University to continue to provide exceptional service to Brock students and Niagara residents now and in the future," President Atkinson said.

More than 300 people, including representatives from the City of St. Catharines, the City of Thorold and the Regional Municipality of Niagara, as well as Brock faculty, students, staff and "Good, Better, Brock!" campaign donors and volunteers were present for the opening ceremonies.

A commemorative plaque, which will hang from the ceiling in the mezzanine of the new Student, Community Health and Fitness Centre and is dedicated to the support of the municipalities and the students, was unveiled. Tours of the Complex followed and included the new 23,000-square-foot gymnasium, which boasts four basketball courts and a

200-metre, three-lane elevated track. As part of the celebration, the public was invited to attend the Walker Complex Community Showcase, on April 27 and 28, and be among the first to try out the new facilities.

The expansion and development of the Walker Complex comprises the Student, Community Health and Fitness Centre, the state-of-the-art health club called The Zone, the Eleanor Misener Aquatic Centre, the Leo LeBlanc Rowing Centre and the original Physical Education facilities.

The Complex is named in recognition of a \$1-million gift to "Good, Better, Brock! The Campaign for Brock University," made by Drs. Norris and John Walker and their families. The new facilities were made possible through the support of many other private and public donors. Brock students committed \$5 million for the facility. The City of St. Catharines, the City of Thorold and the Regional Municipality of Niagara invested a total of \$2.275 million toward the construction of the Student, Community Health and Fitness Centre.

The Walker family is very proud of these facilities, which will serve our campus and our Niagara community for generations to come," said Dr. Norris Walker, who is Vice-Chair of the Brock Board of Trustees and Co-Chair of the "Good, Better, Brock!" campaign. Business Professor's children's book wins first prize at world fair

A collection of short stories written by Brock University Business Professor Alexandra Kapur-Fic won first prize in the Children's Book category at the World Book Fair held recently in New Delhi, India.

The Cosmic Zoo is an anthology of 20 illustrated stories that convey universal values of goodness, honesty, kindness and friendship. The origins of the stories are based on Eastern traditions. The stories are told through animals, the dilemmas and problems that they face, and their relationships with one another.

A total of 1,036 publishers, including 37 from foreign countries,

showcased their titles in 18 languages at the World Book Fair, which was visited by 500 foreign trade delegates and about one million people.

All proceeds from the purchase of The Cosmic Zoo go to children's charities. The book costs \$22, and 350 copies have been sold since it was published in January 2002. The book is available directly through Kapur-Fic and is also sold at various outlets in Niagara, including Zehrs Food Plus at Fairview Mall in St. Catharines, Sears Canada at the Pen Centre in St. Catharines, and the Old Niagara Bookshop in Niagaraon-the-Lake.

Study shows average age for youth to start gambling is 10 years old

Results of a comprehensive youth gambling study recently conducted in

Niagara show that 72 per cent of teens who gambled at some point in their lives first did so between the ages of eight and 12, with the average age

being 10 years old.

Of the 2,252 students aged 13 to 19 who filled out the Brock University Youth Gambling Survey, between four and eight per cent of participants could be considered to be gambling at problematic levels, while another 10 to 14 per cent of adolescents could be considered as being at risk of developing a gambling problem. Findings from the Niagara study are similar to those found in other youth gambling studies that have been conducted in Canada and the United States.

In all, 75 per cent of the students surveyed said they participated in at least one form of gambling activity in the 12 months prior to filling out the survey. Most of those students gambled with lottery and instant-win tickets, an activity teenagers don't often consider as gambling.

This survey has served as a useful tool to educate teens, teachers, school administrators and parents about gambling issues among young people," said Jennifer McPhee, Project Manager of the Brock University Youth Gambling Research Initiative.

Results of the survey were released this week by the Brock research team during the Ontario Responsible Gambling Council's annual conference in Niagara Falls.

Brock researchers began the study in October 2001. Students in 10 Niagara secondary schools were surveyed to discover how teens progress from experimental gambling to problem gambling as well as shed light on the factors influencing youth to reduce or discontinue problematic levels of gambling. The findings will aid in creating treatment interventions to help teens whose gambling habits are leading to social, personal, family, school, and financial difficulties.

The study was directed by Dr. Kellian Lawrance of the Department of Community Health Sciences at Brock, Dr. John Yardley of the Brock University Wellness Institute, and Ms. Lisa Root of Niagara Alcohol and Drug Assessment Services. The Ontario Problem Gambling Research Centre funded the study.

Transfer agreement creates new pathway to career in policing

Niagara College, Brock University and the Niagara Regional Police Service have signed an innovative three-way transfer agreement that allows students to earn concurrently a Bachelor's degree at Brock University and a Police Foundations diploma at Niagara College.

The agreement creates a new pathway to a career in policing for students who enter Brock University to study toward a Bachelor of Arts with Honours degree in either Political Science or Sociology, or a Bachelor of Arts with a Major in Psychology. Students will now have the opportunity to study at Brock for two years, then transfer to a special intensive one-year Police Foundations program at Niagara College before returning to Brock to complete their degree.

Graduates will have earned both a diploma in Police Foundations from Niagara College and a Bachelor's degree from Brock (Honours or Major), all in four years of study. In addition, they will have successfully completed the practical field placements and fitness assessments to prepare them for police service positions.

"This is a truly innovative collegeuniversity pathway for students, with the full support and assistance of our Regional Police Service," said Bonnie Rose, Vice President Academic, Niagara College. "It allows students to achieve both the technical and practical knowledge and skill for policing careers, as well as a broad liberal studies education. It's a perfect combination for both the student and the police service."

Academic departments at Brock have put together a package of

existing courses to suit the focus of this particular program, with special emphasis on policing services, criminology and other related areas. The degrees earned at Brock through the three-way transfer agreement will also allow students to proceed to graduate work in Psychology, Political Science or Sociology, should they wish to continue their studies.

"Brock University is pleased to have developed, along with Niagara College and the Niagara Regional Police Service, an integrative program of study that will provide an excellent educational experience for all participants," said Terry Boak, Vice-President, Academic and Provost. "This initiative is another fine example of how Brock and its community partners continue to introduce new programs in response to the changing needs of the Niagara region."

Chief Gary E. Nicholls of the Niagara Regional Police Service commented, "Our outstanding relationship with both Niagara College and Brock University has born fruit that will benefit young people in our community and in the end public safety in Niagara. I am extremely appreciative of our College and University support."

Niagara College's Police Foundations program is regularly a two-year diploma program that provides the specific knowledge and skills for policing careers. Niagara College has also had a longstanding partnership with the Niagara Regional Police Service that has benefited students in the College's Justice Studies programs and the training and recruitment needs of the NRPS.

Brock pops the cork on international wine conference

Brock University's Cool Climate
Oenology and Viticulture Institute
(CCOVI) popped the cork on its first
international wine conference, May 23
to 25. More than 250 people from
across North America, Europe,
Australia and New Zealand attended
Bacchus to the Future, one of the most
comprehensive wine education forums
in North America.

Participating in the conference were professionals, such as wine makers and vine growers, wine agents and retailers, sommeliers, wine educators and students, as well as people who have an interest in wine.

The conference featured three full days of seminars, workshops, tastings, dialogue and a trade show. An impressive lineup of internationally renowned wine experts, including wine researchers and scientists, gave presentations that focused on the latest innovations in three major areas: Science and technology (including viticulture, wine making, sensory evaluation); Business and marketing of wine (including wine tourism); and Culture of wine (including health, education, consumption patterns, and the history of wine).

"It was an exhilarating three days of learning together," said Linda Bramble, Conference Co-chair and Industry Liaison for CCOVI.

The conference opened with a presentation by Dr. Ann Noble, University of California, Davis, developer of the Wine Aroma Wheel and the world's leading sensory oenologist. Noble discussed the sensory and non-sensory factors that have an impact on consumer behaviour. She presented data from a study conducted on inexpensive Chardonnays to illustrate how the "drivers of liking" — sensory factors such as flavour profile and non-sensory attributes such as brand, label description and price — influence consumer preference.



Dr. Carmen Cullen, of Brock's Faculty of Business, gave a presentation on marketing strategies to delegates at the Bacchus to the Future conference, held at Brock, May 23 to 25.

At Friday's luncheon, the Honourable Cam Jackson, Ontario's new Minister of Tourism and Recreation, spoke about his vision for culinary tourism in Ontario. Jackson highlighted the Ministry's commitment to attract tourists from around the world to Niagara for its outstanding wine culinary experience.

"Culinary wine tourism is a hot product, with a high demand and a high yield and we have made it a priority," he said.

Jackson outlined several new initiatives that are part of a wine culinary strategy developed in partnership with the Ministry, the Wine Council of Ontario and the tourism industry.

Among the initiatives, he highlighted a new international wine event, the Niagara Food and Wine Classic, which will be held in September. The event will coincide with the Toronto Film Festival and attract many of its guests from around the world.

Here are some other conference

 Dr. Harvey Finkel, a hematologist and oncologist at Boston University Medical Center, discussed some of the most recent research on the positive health effects of wine. Finkel says moderate drinking of wine, particularly red wine, can benefit the cardiovascular system, and new emerging research also shows that there are benefits to other organ systems and diseases.

 Dr. Larry Lockshin, University of Adelaide, Australia, who was prominent in developing the Strategy 2025 for the Winemakers' Federation of Australia, discussed the latest research on the business of wine.

 Steven Page, singer and songwriter for the Barenaked Ladies, was the host of Feast of the Senses, which took place on the closing evening of the conference and showcased some of Niagara's finest cuisine paired with Ontario wines.

CCOVI, which was established in 1996, is a partnership between Brock and the Ontario grape and wine industry. CCOVI is dedicated to meeting the research and educational needs of the cool climate grape growing and wine producing regions of the world. Its roles are to pursue the groundbreaking research and leading-edge technologies necessary to maintain and enhance the competitive position of Canada's grape growers, vintners and related professionals, and to foster partnerships between these groups and the worldwide academic community.

New initiatives promote a 'green' campus

Physical Plant wishes to announce two new initiatives as part of the University's continuing program to

have a "green" campus.

Brock has purchased a Toyota Prius hybrid car for the Campus Police. This automobile, rated as a Super Ultra Low Emission Vehicle (SULEV), combines fuel and electrical power plants to redefine standards in fuel economy and energy efficiency.

The purchase of the car is another example of energy efficiency programs at Brock, most namely the University's Co-generation plant, which uses a lean burn high temperature technology that significantly reduces emissions.

The second initiative is the implementation of an organic grounds maintenance program this spring. This means that no more chemical herbicides will be used on our campus.

Physical Plant will record the progress of the programs, both their effectiveness and cost factors, and will make the information available to the Brock community online.

This organic grounds program includes a new 100-gallon compost tea brewer which produces an organic compound that will be used as a foliar spray to treat lawns and trees.

Brindle currently holds the position as Interim Dean, Faculty of Mathematics and Science. He has an impressive list of academic and administrative achievements at Brock, including Chair of the Department of Chemistry. Brindle will fill the position that was held by the late Dr. G. Ron Brown.

"Throughout his career at Brock, Professor Brindle has made outstanding contributions to teaching and research," says Terry Boak, Vice-President, Academic. "Professor Brindle will provide dynamic leadership to faculty, staff and students in our mathematics and science programs."

"There is a very bright future for the Faculty of Mathematics and Science as it builds on its reputation for excellence with new directions in academic programming and research," says Brindle. "I look forward to continuing to work with a great group of faculty and staff who are committed to providing students with the best possible educational experience and with researchers who will continue to develop and expand the research reputation of Brock University."

Brindle came to Brock from Manchester, England, in 1968 as a graduate student in the Department of Chemistry. He was made a Fellow of the Royal Society of Chemistry (UK) in 1984. In 1987 he was appointed to the position of Assistant Professor and to Associate Professor in 1989. He was promoted to Professor in 1990 on the basis of nine publications during that year in some of the world's most prestigious refereed journals.

Brindle was recently awarded a Brock University Chancellor's Chair for Research Excellence in recognition of his research accomplishments in the development of new, more sensitive analytical chemistry methods, specifically those with social and environmental implications. The award also recognizes the fact that his work is motivated in part by a concern that his research is of benefit to society and to the environment.

As Dean of the Faculty of Mathematics and Science, Brindle will provide strong academic leadership based on an appreciation of all sciences and in a Faculty where teaching and research are equally valued. He will also be expected to provide strong administrative leadership, work effectively with faculty, students and staff, and develop further linkages with the external community.

The Faculty of Mathematics and Science has 66 full-time faculty members, 1,675 undergraduate students and 47 graduate students in the Departments of Biological Science, Chemistry, Computer Science, Earth Sciences, Mathematics and Physics. The Cool Climate Oenology and Viticulture Institute, The Centre for Biotechnology and a number of active interdisciplinary programs reflect the Faculty's commitment to research and teaching.

Researchers awarded \$1.85 million

Researchers at Brock University have won \$1.85 million in grants to study everything from biting flies at the Algonquin Park Wildlife Research Station in northern Ontario to the brain's processing of information when a person performs two tasks at once.

"These awards from one of Canada's major funding agencies are consistent with the University's master plan to heighten its role as a leader in research and development," said Jack Miller, Associate Vice-President, Research, and Dean of Graduate Studies. "Through their commitment and dedication to research, our professors make enormous contributions to the University's teaching and learning environment."

The Natural Sciences and Engineering Research Council of Canada (NSERC) recently announced grants to Brock faculty members totalling \$1,849,908 over five years, all of which are for new projects. Of that amount, NSERC awarded \$255,444 for four equipment grants and \$28,000 to cover partial operating costs at the Algonquin research station. The total value of new grants for 2002-03 is \$727,310. All of these awards are in addition to the \$587,996 in earlier NSERC research and equipment grants for projects that are ongoing in 2002-03.

Applied Health Sciences launches multimedia online courses

The Faculty of Applied Health Sciences recently inaugurated Brock's first fully online interactive multimedia courses, Fundamentals of Infectious Diseases (CHSC 3P97) and Nursing Research (NUSC 4P70)

The initial release of these two courses follows six months design and development efforts by two faculty members, Dr. Lynn Rempel, of the Department of Nursing, and Dr. Ana Sanchez, of Community Health Science. The Electronic Learning Research and Development Laboratories (ELRDL) team, including 12 Brock University students from five faculties, supported the development of the online courses in the areas of instructional design, writing, and various digital production and programming activities.

Both courses make extensive use of digital learning objects, which simply defined are the course content, learning activities and assessment instruments supporting each instructional objective.

"Students taking courses online are involved in traditional learning activities such as reading articles and textbooks," explains Mike Laurence, Director of ELRDL, "however, online learning offers other unique features available through WebCT, the course management system used by Brock. For example, course instruction is enhanced online through video, interactive problem solving and decision-making activities, and collaboration with peers through the discussion board and chat rooms."

Special online tools to complement the WebCT environment, including Online Surveys, Digital Assignment Forms, the Learner Profile, and the eLounge virtual portal were developed by the ELRDL team. "Student feedback has been very positive, and all are especially enthused by the anytime, anywhere aspect of these courses," adds Laurence.

Four additional courses, including Nursing Ethics, Leadership in Nursing and Management I, Introduction to Human Physiology, and Nutrition, are now under development, and are scheduled to be offered online in either Fall or Winter terms, 2002/2003.

Campus buzz

Seen any blue and pink bees lately?

You may come across some on campus as part of a study being supervised by Dr. Miriam Richards, of the Department of Biological Sciences.

Over the next several weeks, Richards and fourth-year student Amy Rutgers will be conducting a behavioural study of carpenter bees, the furry black and yellow bees which have nested in benches in Jubilee Courtyard, near the Mackenzie Chown Complex.

As part of the study, Rutgers is marking the bees with different colours of model paint.

Rutgers captures the bees in a hand net, cools them down so they are inactive and then paints their backs and heads so that she can release them.

Richards explains that the male bees, distinguishable by white or yellow markings on their face, can often be seen flying around aggressively defending their territories. However, she stresses that the male bees are harmless since they lack a sting. She adds that the female bees have a sting but are docile and will not sting unless provoked.



She received special permission to complete her education degree over a six-year period so she could train and compete full time for the 1972 and 1976 Olympics. The gym where she trained was so small that she had to decelerate over the third hurdle in mid air to avoid hitting a wall. Student athletes had to run 200 laps around the indoor track, made of wooden boards bolted to the gym floor, to complete a mile.

But Dr. Jones Konihowski said those archaic conditions made her, and her fellow student athletes, that much tougher. Her memories of those years at the University of Saskatchewan are vivid and sweet, she recalled.

"It was truly a special place to come from," Dr. Jones Konihowski said. "I hope you all feel the same way about Brock. Pride and fond memories are a wonderful legacy to take with you as you move into this new phase of your life."

On June 12, a large number of Brock faculty and staff attended the ceremony to see Dr. Terry Varcoe receive an honorary degree for his distinguished service to the University.

Special platform guests included all of Brock's former Presidents, Dr. James A. Gibson, Dr. Alan J. Earp, Dr. Terry White and Dr. Susan Clark, Past Acting President. Dr. Varcoe said his career at Brock

was an opportunity that many people only dream about and acknowledged that today's graduates are unlikely to spend an entire career at one company.

"Many of you will see a number of jobs throughout your career — look at today as the great adventure that has just started for you," he said.

Dr. Varcoe passed on some advice from his experience as both an employee and an employer - work hard, get along with others, be committed to your work, always put things in perspective and remember the Golden Rule to treat others how you would like to be treated.

You are beginning your new lives with a good education and tons of opportunity. Make the most of them and make Brock proud," said Dr. Varcoe in ending his address and receiving a standing ovation.

Brock awarded Canada Research Chair

Brock University is set to receive \$625,000 from the Government of Canada to create the University's second Canada Research Chair.

Biological Sciences Professor Charles Despres, a specialist in plant and tree biology, will use the award to conduct groundbreaking research into molecular plant pathology. This knowledge will be used to create biotechnological solutions that will lead to the development of durable and environmentally friendly disease resistance in crops, and in particular, in grapevines.

The University will receive \$100,000 annually for five years in support of the Canada Research Chairs Program as well as an infrastructure grant worth \$125,000 from the Canada Foundation for Innovation (CFI). Brock has also applied for a matching \$125,000 grant from the Ontario Innovation Trust.

Despres' research is aimed at solving

Niagara grape growers' and industry problems that may be broadly applicable to the Okanagan region of British Columbia and other regions around the world. Diseases are a major cause of crop losses, and Despres' work will lead to commercially viable applications that are expected to be available in ten years.

Despres' Research Chair was one of a number announced by the Government of Canada at a news conference held June 25 at the University of British Columbia.

"The Canada Research Chairs Program plays an important role in promoting leading-edge research and innovation at Brock, and provides exciting opportunities for the University to further strengthen its position as a major research centre," said lan Brindle, Dean of the Faculty of Mathematics and Science at Brock. "This funding will ensure that Brock

faculty and students continue to achieve the highest levels of research excellence."

The CFI is an independent, not-forprofit corporation established by the Government of Canada in 1997 to address an urgent need to Canada's research community: new, state-of-theart research infrastructure. The CFI has been entrusted with \$250 million to be dedicated to the infrastructure needs identified by the Canada Research Chairs.

Despres joined Brock's Department of Biological Sciences in April. His background includes research with the Plant Biotechnology Institute in Saskatoon, Saskatchewan, where he received a number of important awards. He has also published papers in the top-ranked journal for plant science, The Plant Cell.

These tools will help companies identify human resource priorities, create targeted action plans for change, and ultimately create an organizational culture that better supports employee health and productivity.

One of the assessment tools, an Employee Feedback System, is already available on a fee-for-service basis

from the Workplace Health Unit.

"Organizations must collect and use information about the 'people-side' of their businesses more successfully," said Dr. John Yardley, Director of the Wellness Institute. "This type of information can really help an organization identify key areas of strength and key opportunities for improvement."

Academic awards total \$615,000

Forty-one Brock University students, most of them from Niagara, will receive a combined total of \$615,000 in provincial scholarships in recognition of their academic excellence.

Ontario Graduate Scholarships (OGS) are designed to encourage excellence in graduate studies at the master's and doctoral levels. Recipients of OGS awards, which are sponsored by the Ontario Ministry of Training, Colleges and Universities, receive \$15,000 for one year. To qualify, students must have maintained an overall minimum average of 80 per cent during the last two years of their studies. The Province of Ontario contributes two-thirds of each OGS award, while Brock contributes one third.

"The University's excellent academic programs continue to attract the best and brightest students," said Dr. Jack Miller, Associate Vice-President, Research, and Dean of Graduate Studies at Brock. "We are extremely proud of the outstanding achievements of these students and wish them well in their future studies."

Brock accepts a record number of first-year students

Brock University is accepting a record number of Ontario high school graduates for September 2002 and boasts the third highest percentage increase among Ontario universities for total acceptances from secondary school students.

Figures released by the Ontario Universities' Application Centre (OUAC) show that total confirmed acceptances from secondary students to Brock for the fall of 2002 jumped 34.8 per cent over the previous year. The average for all 17 universities is 16.3 per cent.

Brock is boasting a higher acceptance rate than anticipated, with 2,435 secondary students accepting admission offers into full-time, first-year studies. Confirmations from non-secondary school applicants have also increased by 54.2 per cent over the previous year. Final figures are expected to change slightly between now and September, and the University anticipates a first-year class of 2,700 will enrol this fall.

"The University's confirmed acceptances are yet another indication of the tremendous interest

students are showing in a Brock education," said the University's Registrar, Rob Tiffin. "Brock's growing popularity and reputation are attracting many of the best students, and we expect this momentum to continue as the University evolves into a comprehensive institution with greater emphasis on research and graduate studies."

Tiffin said Brock's ability to accept more students is due partly to preparations it is making for the double cohort year, when the final year of the five-year high school program and the first group of the new four-year curriculum graduate at the same time in Ontario. Brock is investing \$70 million in capital expansion to prepare for the double cohort. The University is committed to taking an additional 1,700 students beyond its 1998-1999 first-year intake level of 2,068 by September 2003, and plans to increase the number of firstyear spaces from 2,315 spaces in fall 2001 to 3,700 in fall 2003.





The occasion was the first retrospective of Arden's work organized by Oakville Galleries and Presentation House in Vancouver and the title of Knight's presentation was "Roy Arden: Peripatetic Philosopher." On June 18, he participated on a selection jury, the second of a two-step process to select a major Canadian artist for an outdoor sculpture competition at the Niagara-on-the-Lake campus of Niagara College. In 2000, Knight along with Franc Petric was one of two artists who received an inaugural commission as part of the Artat Glendale initiative. The announcement of the commission winner is forthcoming.

COMPUTER SCIENCE

Brian Ross presented a paper entitled "Hyperspectral Image Analysis Using Genetic Programming" at the Genetic and Evolutionary Computation Conference (GECCO 2002) in New York City, July 9 to 13. Honours student Adam Hewgill also attended the conference, and presented the poster "Real-Time Competitive Evolutionary Computation."

Professors, students are partners in NCEs

Brock University faculty members and graduate students are participating in two national research partnerships in areas of strategic importance to Canadian society water safety, quality, management and protection as well as language and literacy.

These strategic research initiatives, known as Networks of Centres of Excellence (NCE), are part of the federal government's commitment to stimulate and nurture a culture of innovation across the country. Each network fosters the unique teamingup of Canada's top researchers from universities, industries and government.

Funds are contributed by all three Canadian federal granting agencies - the Canadian Institutes of Health Research (CIHR), the Natural Sciences and Engineering Research Council of Canada (NSERC) and the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council of Canada (SSHRC) - and Industry Canada. Brock faculty members have so far been awarded nearly \$280,000 in support of the two NCEs.

"This new funding will allow Brock to strengthen its position as a major

research centre, retain faculty and attract the best and brightest minds to the University," said Dr. Michael Owen, Director of the Office of Research Services. "Brock researchers, their graduate students, and their network collaborators will be on the leading edge of Canada's efforts to develop new knowledge that contributes to our economic well being and improves the quality of life of our citizens."

Brock faculty members and the networks with which they are involved are as follows:

1. Canadian Water Network: Drs. Mohammed Dore and Diane **Dupont, Department of Economics**

The Canadian Water Network works to identify and address critical issues facing our nation in connection with the provision of clean water and to provide the foundation for development of a national vision for Canada's role in the effective management and use of our water resources.

Dupont has two projects funded by the network. One project involves a survey of Canadians' perceptions of the health risks associated with municipal drinking water. Ultimately,

the research will be used to establish the value of benefits to society from having cleaner drinking water. The second project evaluates the costs for municipal utilities in the Waterloo area to adopt new methods to treat water contaminated through economic activity, particularly agricultural activity. The research also evaluates the costs of provincial or federal authorities encouraging farmers in the same region to alter their agricultural practices to reduce the presence of contaminants.

Dore, one of seven research theme leaders within the Canadian Water Network, and, as such, a member of the network's management committee, is conducting two studies, one on the long-term supply and demand of water, and the other on the impact of climate change on water and water infrastructure. As theme leader, he will administer \$1.3 million over the next four years.

2. Canadian Language and Literacy Research Network (CLLRNet): Dr. Teena Willoughby, Child and Youth Studies; Dr. Linda Rose-Krasnor, Psychology.

CLLRNet seeks to improve the language and literacy skills of

Canadian children. The broad objectives of this national network are to understand the factors that support the development of good language and literacy skills and to apply this knowledge to facilitate programs and practices to strengthen the language, communication and literacy skills of young Canadians. The network covers the full spectrum of literacy and language research in five research themes.

Willoughby is a theme leader in the areas of social, economic and program influences on language and literacy. She also is funded to explore the impact of technology on children and youth. Rose-Krasnor, in conjunction with several faculty coinvestigators from Brock as well as a community partner, is researching how families make decisions about seeking help for children with communication delays.

In 2000-2001, 596 companies, 143 provincial and federal government departments and agencies, 44 hospitals, 149 universities, and more than 269 other organizations from Canada and abroad were involved in the NCE program.

Plans move ahead for two new student residence complexes

Construction will begin the week of August 19 on a \$16-million, 310-bed student residence at Brock University, while a townhouse-style complex for 290 students should be open for fall 2003 following the signing of a 10-year lease between the University and a private developer.

"Both of these initiatives are part of the University's commitment to our students and to the community to address the need for student housing in St. Catharines," said Brock President David Atkinson. "We will continue to work diligently with our community partners to develop additional residence possibilities in the city."

The lease arrangement is a first for Brock. The University will manage the 80-unit complex of two-, three- and four-bedroom furnished units as part of its award-winning residence program. However, the complex will emphasize more independent living and will be ideal for older students and those in graduate programs. Lupine Properties Limited of London will build the complex on St. David's Road, across the street from the University, and will retain ownership of it.

"President Atkinson has shown tremendous leadership with respect to this important project," said Lupine President John Lean. "He deserves a great deal of credit for working with a private source to find a creative solution that will benefit both the community and the University. St. Catharines Mayor Tim Rigby and his staff in the planning department have

also been very supportive and helpful." As for the \$16-million residence, it will also open for the 2003-04 year to accommodate new student enrolment growth. It will be located east of the Village Residence, at the southwestern corner of the campus, and will feature furnished, state-of-the-art accommodations. As well, the University is converting 175 single beds to 350 double beds at Village for fall 2002.

In September 2001, the \$12.3million Earp residence — currently the University's fourth and newest residence — opened with 255 beds, bringing the total number of existing residence beds on campus to 1,638. Renovations and new construction will bring the total number of additional residence beds to more than 700.

Brock upgrades WebCT

Effective September, 2002, Brock University will be adopting the Campus Edition of WebCT and upgrading all existing courses to version 3.8. If you are currently running a WebCT course or have one on the WebCT server, your course will automatically be uploaded into the new version: courses will essentially look and function the same but instructors will have access to some additional features including the ability to move multiple files into a content module, set the order of discussion topics in the discussion tool, upload files with spaces in the file name and use the assignment tool to return corrected assignments and feedback to students. The current version of WebCT will remain available in order to allow courses in progress to

Adoption of Campus Edition will allow ITS to automate a number of procedures previously carried out by either the instructor or the CTLET:

 Request forms for new WebCT courses will be available online. The site will ask instructors to identify the sections or seminars in the course, the designers for the course, the TAs who require access, and when courses should go "live". This allows instructors time to develop the online course before the students are added to the database. Details on how to request WebCT courses will be available at the WebCT web site, http:// www.BrockU.CA.


• The registration of students into WebCT courses will mirror the University's course registration system (DBBROCK/Genesis) with students automatically moving between sections and any labs, seminars and tutorials.

 Students can log on to WebCT using their computer identification (ie bc02af). Students are assigned a computer id when they register online for their courses. As of September 2002, students will manage their own single password for all computer activities at Brock and will be able to change their passwords by going to the Student Self Service link off the Office of the Registrar's home page and clicking on *Change Computer* Accounts Password.

The Centre for Teaching, Learning and Educational Technologies (CTLET) and Information Technology Services (ITS) are working together to provide support for all WebCT users across campus. Questions about mounting a WebCT course and the teaching tools available within WebCT can be addressed to CTLET, at ext 3933: one-onone student assistance for uploading course materials is also available.

New technology transforms library research for Brock faculty, students

As information continues to grow at an unprecedented rate, the James A. Gibson Library at Brock University must introduce new technological resources to keep pace with the many rapid changes.

keep pace with the many rapid changes.
One of the tools the Library introduced this month, called Scholarsportal, will provide faculty and students with easy and immediate access to more than two million of the best possible scholarly and research articles available worldwide. This major new collaborative project among all Ontario university libraries will ultimately transform the way research is conducted at Brock.

Scholarsportal will simplify the complex task of identifying relevant databases and will reduce the need to conduct separate searches by integrating

thousands of scholarly digital resources under one interface, thus making it easier and quicker for professors and students to find information. Additional content will be added to Scholarsportal over the next three to four years as new databases are integrated.

Brock has been fortunate to be on the leading edge of this innovation as Phyllis Wright, Head of Collections at the James A. Gibson Library, has been on the provincewide planning task group since the project began.

Scholarsportal is closely linked to the Canadian National Site Licensing Project and receives funding from the Ontario Innovation Trust.

"We are extremely pleased that Brock is playing such an important role in

developing this groundbreaking digital service for the province's academic libraries," said Brock University Librarian Margaret Grove. "Scholarsportal is a welcome and impressive addition to the James A. Gibson Library as it continues to evolve as a digital facility."

The \$50-million Canadian National Site Licensing Project (CNSLP), introduced recently at Brock, provides 24-hour desktop access to electronic versions of more than 700 scholarly journals and research databases in science, engineering, health and environmental disciplines. The material is available online to more than 650,000 university researchers, post-doctoral fellows, graduate and undergraduate students at 64 universities in 10 provinces.

Brock in the News

Biological Sciences **Professor Fiona Hunter** is playing a key role in
Canada's efforts to monitor the spread
of the West Nile Virus. Her work is also
receiving significant media attention
from across the country.

A reporter and camera crew from Health on the Line, an hour-long television talk show, visited the Brock campus this month to interview Hunter and videotape researchers in her lab. The piece will be broadcast on Sept. 17, followed by live interviews with Hunter and three other panelists at the Discovery Health studios in Toronto.

This will be Hunter's second appearance on Health on the Line. She was one of four guests for a show broadcast last winter about travelling diseases and diseases that travel. That show was Health on the Line's highest rated show of the season.

Back at Brock, Hunter's Fly Lab receives more than a thousand mosquitoes each week from public health units from across Ontario. These live mosquitoes are frozen by Brock researchers, identified to species (there are about 50 different species) to determine the most common virus carriers) and tested for the virus. Because there are so many mosquitoes, Hunter's team of researchers ships a great many of them to the National Microbiology Laboratory in Winnipeg to conduct similar testing.

Hunter is working in conjunction with the Ontario Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care as well as Health Canada and public health units across the province.

The viral testing is being conducted in **Dr. Michael Bidochka's** Microbiology Lab at the University. Bidochka is an Associate Professor of Biological Sciences at Brock.

The new state-of-the-art lecture halls and laboratories will enhance teaching and research and bring Brock University to the forefront in educational technology in Canada.

"This innovative project, which brings together Brock University, the private sector and the Ontario government, is one way we are providing students with a wider range of choices in high-quality postsecondary education," said Cunningham. "With the new academic complex, Brock can meet the needs of their growing student population as they prepare for the double cohort."

Brock President David Atkinson described the opening of the new facilities as the beginning of the next stage of Brock's growth and

"This project would never have been possible without the support of the SuperBuild program as well as the many private donors who believe in Brock's plans for the future.'

The Campaign for Brock University." The final segment of the \$29.62-million campaign is now

under way to complete financing for

the capital expansion.

The campus expansion includes the Academic South Building and the Academic North Building, and provides about 80,000 square feet of space that will allow for 1,700 new student spaces as Brock prepares for the double cohort in 2003. Located at the west end of the campus, the facilities include the new Computer Commons, several multimedia lecture halls, office space, a food court, general student meeting space and state-of-the-art labs. Among the technology featured in the labs is broadbent Internet videoconferencing equipment which enables face-toface real-time collaboration between instructors, researchers and students from locations worldwide.

Chris Critelli, Co-Chair of the "Invest in Quality" campaign with Professor Barry Joe, recognized the outstanding support from faculty, staff and retirees who lead the province for participation in university fundraising campaigns.

Brock experiences record enrolment for third straight year

Brock University is boasting a record enrolment for the third year in a row with a total of 13,137 students.

Preliminary figures show 12,487 full- and part-time undergraduate students are enrolled to date for the 2002-2003 academic year. That's an increase of 1,361 students, or 12.2 per cent over the same time last year when 11,126 undergraduate students were enrolled. More students are expected before the end of registration on September 20, making the 2002-2003 academic year the University's highest enrolment in its 38-year history

To date, full-time enrolment of undergraduate students at Brock is 9,100 compared to 7,963 at this time last year. The part-time enrolment of undergraduate students is 3,387 compared to 3,163 at this time last

year. In addition to undergraduate enrolment, full-time and part-time graduate student enrolment at the University is 650, bringing total student enrolment at Brock to 13,137.

"Brock's record enrolment is another strong indicator of the growing reputation of the University," says Robert Tiffin, Associate Vice-President, Student Services, and Registrar. "More and more students are choosing Brock because we offer an excellent experience that features outstanding professors, innovative programming and comprehensive student services."

Brock is also reporting higher retention rates as more and more

students are staying in school. Tiffin said Brock's ability to accommodate an increasé in enrolment is due partly to

preparations it is making for next year's double cohort, when the final year of the five-year high school program and the first group of the new four-year curriculum graduate at the same time in Ontario. To meet this increasing demand for a Brock education, the University is completing a \$70-million campus expansion that includes the construction of two new academic buildings which were officially opened on September 6, new student residences, the Walker Complex, Niagara's largest recreational facility and renovations to existing facilities.

The University is committed to taking an additional 1,700 students beyond its 1998-1999 first-year intake level of 2,068 by September 2003, and plans to increase the number of firstyear spaces from 2,315 spaces in fall 2001 to 3,700 in fall 2003.

Aboriginal broadcaster, businesswoman to receive honorary degree

Brock University will confer 308 undergraduate degrees, 112 graduate degrees and 38 education degrees during its Fall 2002 Convocation, to be held Saturday, October 19. Eight certificates will be awarded in various areas of study, including Public Administration and Adult Education. The convocation ceremonies will be held in the new Walker Complex Gymnasium, beginning at 10 a.m.

This year, Brock takes pride in awarding an honorary degree to Suzanne Rochon-Burnett, the President of R.B. Communications Ltd., in Welland. Rochon-Burnett will be recognized for her outstanding contribution to Canadian cultural life and, in particular, her support and encouragement of aboriginal art in Canada.

Rochon-Burnett is a Métis born in Ste. Adèle, Que. There were few women in the radio business when she became a producer in nearby St. Jerome at the age of 18. As a freelance journalist and broadcaster, Rochon-Burnett went on to work for radio stations in Canada and abroad. She created and produced Chanson à la Française, a syndicated show which aired weekly on radio stations across



Suzanne Rochon-Burnett Ontario. Rochon-Burnett became Canada's first aboriginal person licensed by the CRTC to operate a private radio station in Canada. She purchased CHOW-AM 1470, Niagara's country music station in 1994, which later became CHOW-FM - now Spirit 91.7 - in 1997.

Arts and native organizations have also played a key role in Rochon-Burnett's life. In 1988, she started a native art consulting company called Kakekalanicks, Inc. with a view to stopping the commercial exploitation of native people's art. Rochon-Burnett has served on dozens of boards and committees, including TVOntario, the Ontario Arts Council, and the Métis Nation of Ontario. She is currently a governor for the Canadian Council for Aboriginal Business and is a board member of the Canada Council for the Arts. She is the recipient of a Governor General's Medal, the Order of Ontario and the Eagle Feather, and was made a member of the Order of Canada this year.

Rochon-Burnett also shares a special relationship with Brock. In the fall of 1996, she established a scholarship for aboriginal students in communications and business at the University. She served on Brock's Board of Trustees, which handles matters pertaining to the administrative governance of the University, from 1995 to 2001. She is also a long-time member of the Faculty of Business Dean's Advisory Council.

Brock researchers measuring quality of work life for Regional Niagara employees

Brock University researchers are working with the Regional Municipality of Niagara as part of the Region's goal to create the highest quality workplace environment possible.

Under this unique partnership, the Brock University Workplace Health Research Unit is conducting a Quality of Work Life Survey with more than 2,000 employees at the Region. The survey is tailored specifically to the needs of the Region. The Region will receive the survey results in a series of reports, from which they can develop action plans for change and ultimately create an organizational culture that better supports employee health and productivity.

"The Region and its unions are to be commended for their commitment to achieving outstanding human resources practices by involving employees in identifying key quality of work life factors," said Dr. John Yardley, Director of the Brock University Workplace Health Research Unit. "By placing such a strong priority on its employees' health and well being, the municipality is building and sustaining a healthy and productive work environment."

All of the Region's employees (excluding Niagara Regional Police) in sites across the peninsula were to complete the survey between September 18 and October 2. The survey will include questions about employee satisfaction, organizational health and other quality of work life indicators, such as satisfaction with supervisors, workplace stress, workload and worklife balance.

"We're eager to move forward through the input of staff on how we can meet our goal of being an 'employer of choice'," said John Nicol, Commissioner of Human Resources at the Regional Municipality of Niagara. "Quality of Work Life improvements result in greater employee job satisfaction, wellness, productivity and performance. Numerous studies have shown that satisfied employees are more productive and provide exceptional customer service." He added that such outcomes will complement Council's strategic goals of providing "satisfying work," "affordable service excellence" and a "healthy, safe and productive community."

Brock's Workplace Health Research Unit has conducted more than 30 employee feedback surveys with public and private organizations of varying sizes. Earlier this year, the Unit received a \$1.7-million grant from Human Resources Development Canada (HRDC) Niagara to develop employee feedback systems such as the Quality of Work Life Survey and other strategic human resource assessment tools.

in employment rates

For the second year in a row, graduates from Brock University boast the highest employment rates

among Ontario universities.

The latest provincial performance indicators show that 98.3 per cent of Brock graduates are employed two years after graduation. Employment rates six months after graduation are also high for Brock University graduates, at 95.5 per cent.

"These outstanding employment rates reinforce the success of our graduates in the workforce and emphasize the fact that students are making the right choice when they choose Brock as their university," said Brock President David Atkinson. "The figures reflect the quality of our academic programs and the greater emphasis Brock is placing on preparing students for life and work." The Ministry of Training, Colleges

and Universities and the Council of Ontario Universities co-sponsored the survey conducted by the Ontario Universities' Application Centre (OUAC). The survey examined the employment experiences of 1999 graduates of undergraduate degree programs in Ontario, six months and two years after graduation.

Across the province, graduates who have been out of university for two years are posting employment rates of 96.6 per cent, while those six months out of university are employed at a rate of 95.8 per cent.

The survey results show that average annual incomes two years after graduation are also impressive, at \$41,700, and continue to increase. Not only do university graduates get jobs, most agree that the skills required in their jobs are related to their university education.

Library introduces SciFinder Scholar

The James A. This powerful tool contains seven databases from Chemical Abstracts Service, including Chemical Abstracts (1907-current) and Medline (1958-current), with access to more than 14 million documents, including citations and abstracts from more than 8,000 journals, patents, book reviews, dissertations, conference proceedings and technical reports. The subject coverage is broad in scope covering chemistry, biochemistry biology, biotechnology, biomedicine, and environmental topics. SciFinder Scholar can be used to search for any of over 20 million chemical substances.

Brock creates Centre for Digital Humanities

Dr. Rosemary Drage Hale, Dean, Faculty of Humanities, is pleased to announce the consolidation of the former Language Learning Centre into a new unit, the Centre for Digital Humanities.

In recent years, scholars in the Humanities have increasingly used computers and the Web to create facsimiles of manuscripts, to archive and annotate literary and scholarly materials, and to link text, visual images and sound. The results are breaking down traditional boundaries for learning, teaching and research by stimulating new ways of exploring materials. It is with this mandate that the Centre for Digital Humanities

(CDH) was conceived. The CDH is intended to advance the teaching and research of the Faculty of Humanities through the use of computing technology and new media. It will be housed in the facilities currently dedicated to the language laboratory activities. The CDH will encompass the service mandate of the former LLC but will also endeavour to provide the appropriate facilities for credit courses in areas where technology and traditional humanities interests intersect. It is the goal of the CDH to collaborate with faculty in shaping digital practices as they relate to studies in the humanities. To that end, a small research lab and training room is being

equipped in the CDH facilities.

During his three-year appointment, the Centre's first Director, Professor Barry W. K. Joe, will oversee the laboratory operation, special CDH projects and training from within his home academic department, Modern Languages, Literatures and Cultures.

The Director is supported in the day to day operations by Stefan Kamendy, Clara Suba and Julia Babos, the technical and support staff of the Language Learning Centre. In addition, the CDH will have the part-time expertise of a student technology assistant through a generous partnership arrangement with the Information Technology Services and the Centre for Teaching, Learning and Educational Technologies.

The CDH intends to provide support for professional development, assisting interested faculty members with course re-development for blended course delivery. The CDH will help develop digital materials for teaching, including presentation software, WebCT course design, design and implementation of testing modules, and will advise on other instructional technologies. The CDH will also collaborate on and support special research projects with interested faculty members. One such project is a dynamic searchable image database that can be shared by faculty in History and Classics.

Rochon Burnett tells grads to let imaginations soar

This year, Brock took pride in awarding an honorary degree to Suzanne Rochon Burnett, the President of R.B.

Communications Ltd., in Welland. Dr. Rochon Burnett was

recognized for her outstanding contribution to Canadian cultural life and, in particular, her support and encouragement of aboriginal art in Canada.

In her Convocation address, Dr. Rochon Burnett urged the graduates not to be afraid of change. She told them to let their imaginations soar and to keep dreaming until their dreams become reality.

Dr. Rochon Burnett told the graduates that getting a Brock degree is an investment in themselves, an investment in their

minds, hearts and souls.

"This is the best investment you will ever make in your life," she said. "Nobody will ever be able to take that away from you."

Dr. Rochon Burnett is a Métis born in Ste. Adèle, Que. There were few women in the radio business when she became a producer in nearby St. Jerome at the age of 18. Dr. Rochon Burnett became Canada's first aboriginal person licensed by the CRTC to operate a private radio station in Canada. She purchased CHOW-AM 1470, Niagara's country music station in 1994, which later became CHOW-FM — now Spirit 91.7 — in 1997.

Dr. Rochon Burnett also shares a special relationship with Brock. In the fall of 1996, she established a scholarship for aboriginal students in communications and business at the University. She served on Brock's Board of Trustees, from 1995 to 2001 and she is also a long-time member of the Faculty of Business Dean's Advisory Council.

Fall Convocation was made extra special this year when University President David Atkinson honoured and thanked Dr. James A. Gibson, the University's founding President,

for a lifetime of dedication and commitment to Brock.

Brock professor wins national award for science promotion

A long-time Brock University Mathematics Professor with a flair for inspiring students to learn math and science in unique ways is being honoured by the federal

government for his outstanding contribution to the promotion of science in Canada.

Professor Eric Muller, who is Chair of the Department of Mathematics and Director of the Bachelor of Science/Bachelor of Education program at Brock, is one of five winners of the 2002 Michael Smith Awards. The awards are named after Canadian Michael Smith, who won a Nobel Prize in 1993 for his breakthrough contribution to genetic research. The award recipients were announced this week by the Natural Sciences and Engineering Research Council of Canada (NSERC).

"The 2002 winners of the Michael Smith Award are each contributing to making Canada a more innovative nation," said Industry Minister Alan Rock. "That will help us achieve our goal of making Canada one of the top five countries in the world for research and development."

Award-winning author will discuss the ingenuity challenge in education

Thomas Homer-Dixon, author of The Ingenuity Gap and winner of a 2001 Governor General's Literary Award, for Nonfiction will explore how educators can use ingenuity to address complex problems

facing today's rapidly changing society on Tuesday, November 12, at Brock University.

His address, titled "The Ingenuity Challenge for Education: Teaching for Complexity and Prudence," is being presented for The Faculty of Education Lectureship in Educational Controversy. The lecture will be held in the David S. Howes Theatre, at 7:30 p.m.

Homer-Dixon is the Director of the Centre for the Study of Peace and Conflict, University College, University of Toronto and is an Associate Professor in the Department of Political Science at the University of Toronto.

In his address, Homer-Dixon will share insights drawn from his powerful book The Ingenuity Gap. The book examines what is perhaps

Brock professor wins classroom technology award for creating interactive calculus CD

Brock University Mathematics Professor Bill Ralph. who created an interactive CD that is in use at universities around the world to teach calculus, is the recipient of a new provincial award for his innovative

use of technology in the classroom. Ralph is one of the first two recipients of the new Office for Partnerships of Advanced Skills (OPAS) Awards for Excellence in Teaching with Technology. The awards recognize faculty at Ontario universities who have demonstrated outstanding achievement in using technology to enhance and improve their teaching.

Ralph's CD, Journey Through Calculus, uses the dynamics of new technology to let students have fun, explore, and learn the complex world of calculus. With outstanding visual animation, the CD combines games with problem-solving activities and tutorials. It's a powerful combination for today's classrooms that are filled with a generation of computer-literate

"Dr. Ralph has distinguished himself as a leader in the use of technology in the classroom to

enhance teaching," said Norm Shulman, CEO of OPAS and a member of the 2002 awards selection committee. "The selection committee was extremely impressed with Journey Through Calculus and its use of animation and simulation to demonstrate very difficult mathematical concepts in such an understandable fashion."

Ralph was commissioned by the California-based Thomson-Brooks/Cole Publishing in 1996 to develop the CD as a companion to the world's best-selling Calculus textbook, Calculus: Early Transcendentals, by James Stewart. He took a leave of absence from Brock, moved to San Francisco and spent three years on the project. Storyboards and working programs designed by Ralph were produced by HRS Media in New York City.

The CD, released in 1999, features a powerful computer algebra system and includes seven learning modules that provide comprehensive coverage of a full range of calculus topics. Each module begins with an activity which engages students and then leads them deeper into the program's more challenging aspects of studying calculus.

"It is truly remarkable the interest students have in Journey Through Calculus," said Ralph.

Brock researchers receive grants totalling \$100,000

Brock University is welcoming an investment of \$100,000 in research infrastructure funding from the Canada Foundation for Innovation (CFI), industry partners and the University.

Four Brock researchers will receive two CFI New Opportunities grants totalling \$66,638, which are expected to be matched by the Ontario Innovation Trust (OIT). Brock and industry partners will contribute another \$35,000, bringing the current total value of the two research projects to \$101,638.

New Opportunities funding totalling \$36,434 was recently awarded to three professors in the Department of Physical Education and Kinesiology to purchase six computers which will be used for field and laboratory data collection and analysis, as well as to renovate existing space at Brock for research offices, an interview room and data collection laboratory.

It is anticipated that the research enabled by this funding will lead to new methodologies, including online research methods, enhanced retention of highly qualified and trained coaches and officials in sports, and increased enjoyment of physical activity among youth and children. Faculty members involved in this research are Dr. Susan Forbes, Dr. James Mandigo and Dr. Philip Sullivan.

The research will focus on three major projects. Forbes and her colleague, Dr. Lori Livingston, Director of the School of Health and Human Performances at Dalhousie University in Halifax, N.S., will address issues related to officiating, rule enforcement and injury prevention. Mandigo's research studies motivation and children's physical activity and has broad connections with local, provincial, national and international organizations that provide educational and other programming to children. Sullivan's research focuses on coaching efficacy and has developed new tools to assess the ability of coaches to achieve desired outcomes in their activities and with children and youth in sport and physical activity programs.

A second New Opportunities grant in the amount of \$30,204 was awarded to Dr. David Crandles in Brock's Department of Physics. This grant will be used to purchase an ultra-high vacuum cryostat and

associated components which, combined with the University's existing unique system for optical spectroscopy measurements at low temperatures, will allow further understanding of correlated electron materials. These materials exhibit effects such as superconductivity, ferromagnetism, metal-insulator transition, heavy-fermion behaviour and charge, and spin-density waves. Technologically important materials such as ferromagnets and superconductors have applications ranging from computer memories to the high field magnets used in magnetic resonance imaging.

The infrastructure will provide unique laboratory capacity for the training of students in optical spectroscopy and cryogenics, areas of interest to the telecommunications and optoelectronics industries, and for materials research.

"This funding will allow Brock to continue to pursue unique areas of research that can lead to important breakthroughs," said Dr. Michael Owen, Director of the Office of Research Services at Brock.

Brock sixth in *Globe and Mail* survey

A new survey conducted by the Globe and Mail in partnership with Uthink and the Strategic Counsel ranked Brock University sixth among 29 Canadian universities.

The results of the University Report Card were published by the Globe and Mail on Wednesday, October 23. This first-time survey was conducted to gauge students' satisfaction levels.

The poll involved online surveys that were completed by current undergraduate students of Canadian universities. Some 120,000 students from the studentawards.com online community were invited to complete the 100-question survey.

To be included in the ranking, universities had to have 250 or more student responses to the survey.

Brock placed in the top five in several categories including firstplace rankings for faculty feedback, TA availability, TA quality, sports facilities and student residences.

Maclean's rankings released

Brock has been ranked 14th of 21 in the Primarily Undergraduate category of the 2002 Maclean's annual ranking of Canadian universities.

Brock's overall ranking last year was 12th following a 2000 ranking of 15.

In the rankings, released on November 10, Brock made significant gains in the following: the University climbed from 19th to 11th over two years in average entering grade of students; and 20th to 10th year to year in international students. Brock's most significant decline was in class size of 3rd and 4th year students, dropping from 7th to 18th year to year.

Brock continues to rank 8th through the Maclean's reputational survey.

Brock was second in teaching effectiveness, faculty availability, availability of financial assistance and merit-based scholarship; third in classrooms, locating part-time jobs, on-campus employment; fourth in class scheduling convenience and class sizes; and fifth in quality of teaching, university atmosphere, sense of community, and university as a training for employment.

Placing above Brock in the rankings were Queen's University, University of Western Ontario, Sherbrooke University, University of Guelph and McMaster University. Brock's score exceeded universities such as McGill, Simon Fraser and the University of Toronto.

It is anticipated that Canadian universities will meet with the Globe and Mail to gain a greater understanding of the survey methodology.

Complex world challenges ingenuity, says author

Are we creating a world that is too complex to manage? Do the experts really know what is going on? Are we as smart as we think we are? Can we solve the problems of the future?

Dr. Thomas Homer-Dixon, of the University of Toronto, told an audience at Brock on November 12 that these questions are central to what is perhaps the greatest challenge facing the modern age — the growing gap between the problems the world is creating for itself, and the world's capacity to solve those problems.

The author of the award-winning book "The Ingenuity Gap," delivered The Faculty of Education Lectureship in Educational Controversy. Drawing on his book, which won the 2001 Governor General's Literary Award for Nonfiction, Homer-Dixon said the ingenuity gap is creating serious global, social and everyday issues. Some examples of problems he associates with the ingenuity gap range from climate change, the crisis of financial markets, and the resistance of antibiotics to the inability to understand the

complexity of systems that we encounter as part of our daily lives.

"In certain circumstances, the requirements for ingenuity shoots up faster than we can supply it," he said during his address titled The Ingenuity Challenge for Education:

Teaching for Complexity and Prudence. "In some cases, we are creating problems that are too hard for us."

In his presentation, Homer-Dixon referred to a 1989 airplane accident involving United Airlines Flight 232.

This incident, said Homer-Dixon, is an example of the challenges being created in our world of complex systems in which people are confronted with problems of cognitive overload, inadequate information, time lags and the inadequacy of experts.

inadequacy of experts.

During the flight, the plane's rear tail engine blew up and, as a result, the plane's three hydraulic systems, necessary to steer the aircraft, were destroyed. The experts on the ground admitted to the cockpit crew that they had never experienced this kind of damage.

It was up to the crew to "generate the ingenuity themselves" to keep the plane in the air and to land the plane. The crew managed to crashland the plane, saving the lives of about 200 of the 300 people on

Homer-Dixon also stressed the critical role that educators have to play in addressing the ingenuity gap.

gap.
"We need the world to see
complex systems," he said. "We
need to reconnect with the micro
and the macro – we don't see the
small things anymore and we don't
see the big things.

He added, "As educators, we need to help people recognize the implications of our actions well into the future. We need to broaden our connection of values. A critical part of the educational requirement is to educate in order that people will broaden their concept of values."

Homer-Dixon is the Director of the Centre for the Study of Peace and Conflict, at the University of Toronto and Associate Professor in the Department of Political Science at the University of Toronto.

Professor Tony Mollica is being honoured for the second-language learning methods he developed over his 40-year teaching career. These techniques emphasize creativity and motivation in second-language learning, and have become vanguard practices for language education by teaching associations throughout North America. Mollica's expertise is held in such high regard that he is in constant demand as a speaker in countries such as Canada, the United States, Italy, Republic of San Marino and Slovenia.

"Professor Mollica is extremely deserving of this recognition and honour by the Ontario March of Dimes," said Jim Kerr, Chair of the Faculty of Education's Pre-Service Department. "He has worked very hard at the University and has provided exceptional leadership in the area of secondlanguage learning through his teaching and research."

The former teacher and Head of Modern Languages at Welland High and Vocational School joined Brock in 1984 as an Associate Professor. He became a full Professor in 1989. Born in Italy and residing in Welland, he is fluent in four languages and is actively devoted to the Italian language, culture and civilization. As well, he teaches methodology courses in French and Spanish.

Mollica has written and published numerous books and articles. He is the recipient of many awards, including the Robert Roy Award for his leadership by the Canadian Association for Second Language Teachers. He was also the first and only Canadian to receive the Florence Steiner Award for Leadership in Foreign Language Education by the American Council on Foreign Language Teachers. Recently, Mollica was presented with a distinguished service award from the American Association of Teachers of Italian.

He is a member of the Ontario Modern Language Teachers' Association, the American Council on the Teaching of Foreign Languages, the Canadian Society for Italian Studies, and the American Association of Teachers of Italian, of which he is past president. He has also served on the Welland Downtown Development Board and the Board of Governors at Niagara College.

Mollica's tribute will be held December 11, 2002, from 7 p.m. to 11 p.m., at the Casa Dante Lodge, located at 34 Lincoln St., in Welland. The fundraising benefit is the sixth such event held by the Ontario March of Dimes. Former Pelham Mayor Eric Bergenstein was the first honouree and last year Dr. Robin Williams, Medical Officer of Health for Niagara Region, was recognized for her 25 years of public service.

Brock taking next step in development of campus master plan

A new Campus Plan that will guide the physical shape of Brock University over the next 30 years is nearing completion.

The University held its second Campus Plan Open House on December 5 to present and explain the draft plan and to provide an opportunity for further feedback before the plan is finalized. More than a hundred people attended the open house, part of an extensive consultation process that has included input from the public and the many communities within Brock.

The Campus Plan is one of the most important tools Brock will have as it embraces the exciting challenges and opportunities ahead as a comprehensive, more researchintensive university. A final draft of the plan will be presented to the Board of Trustees for approval at its February 27, 2003, meeting.

The plan will play a key role in the University's efforts to maintain itself as a highly competitive institution with the full complement of programs and facilities necessary to attract the best and brightest students at both the graduate and undergraduate levels, and top faculty conducting leading-edge research in their fields.

This initiative supports Brock as an important institution in the academic community and as a key contributor to the quality of life within the Niagara Region. The plan anticipates the doubling of the floor area of the campus and provides for new gateways to the campus along Merrittville Highway as well as the addition of new, high profile academic and research buildings.

Standard of living at risk, says TD boss

Charles Baillie, Chairman and CEO, TD Bank Financial Group, discussed the critical need for Canada to improve its standard of living during a video telecast address broadcast at Brock, on November 25.

His address at Queen's University, titled "From Vision to Reality - Our Country, Your Future," was part of the 2002 Visionary Seminar presented by the Office for Partnerships for Advanced Skills (OPAS). Brock was one of 22 university campuses across Canada to participate in the event, which was sponsored by Bell Canada.

Baillie, the recipient of the OPAS

Visionary Award for 2002, cautioned his listeners to not be lulled into a false sense of security.

"You need only look at our cities' crumbling sewers, overburdened transit systems and rising homelessness levels to see how thin the veneer of quality really is," he said.

Since joining TD Bank in 1964, Baillie has held a number of positions, culminating in his appointment as President and CEO in 1967, and Chairman and CEO in 1998.

Baillie went on to say: "If we want to keep head offices in Canada, we need to have a better

educated, more productive workforce than the alternative choices." He also stressed the need for more partnership between academia and business. "The Office for Partnerships for Advanced Skills is to be congratulated for doing precisely that, but we still have a long way to go."

This was the 6th annual Visionary Seminar presented by OPAS, an affiliate of the Council of Ontario Universities. OPAS is a partnership of all Ontario universities and leading Canadian companies dedicated to advancing the competencies of organizations and individuals.

Physical activity prevents illness in children, Brock professors' research shows

Daily physical activity not only provides children with mental, physical and social health benefits, a new study by a group of Brock professors demonstrates that it is a good strategy for preventing illness as well.

The recent study, which examined a group of 61 Grade 5 students and includes results of an earlier study of 256 Grade 8 students, revealed that active students have a greater resistance to respiratory tract infections and the flu than children who are relatively inactive. The physically active children in the study were also less likely to contract colds, and sinus and ear infections.

"Our research shows that there are a number of health issues directly related to lack of physical activity in children," said Professor Nota Klentrou of the Department of Physical Education and Kinesiology. "Unfortunately, the majority of children and youth are not active enough. We are hoping that through this research, parents, teachers and other caregivers will encourage boys and girls to be more physically active. Today's children need to get out from behind their computers and get involved in physical activities."

Other Brock researchers involved in the research project are Gail Frost, a Professor of Physical Education and Kinesiology, and John Hay, a Professor and Chair of the Department of Community Health Sciences. Tom Cieslak, a graduate student in Applied Health Sciences, also worked extensively on the project.
