Brock grads lead province in employment rate

For the second year in a row, graduates from Brock University boast the highest employment rate among Ontario universities.

The latest provincial performance indicators show that 98.3 per cent of Brock graduates are employed two years after graduation. Employment rates six months after graduation are also high for Brock graduates, at 95.5 per cent.

"These outstanding employment rates reinforce the success of our graduates in the workforce and emphasize the fact that students are making the right choice when they choose Brock as their university," said Brock President David Atkinson. "The figures reflect the quality of our academic programs and the greater emphasis Brock is placing on preparing students for life and work."

The Ministry of Training, Colleges and Universities and the Council of Ontario Universities co-sponsored the survey, which was conducted by the Ontario Universities' Application Centre (OUAC). The survey examined the employment experiences of 1999 graduates of undergraduate degree programs in Ontario, six months and two years after graduation.

New facilities opened for students

More than 300 people, including Dianne Cunningham, Minister of Training, Colleges and Universities, local politicians, donors, and Brock faculty, staff, students and graduates, celebrated the official opening and dedication of the University's \$26-million academic complex on September 6.

The new facilities will help to accommodate Brock's growing enrolment. The University boasts a record enrolment for the third year in a row with a total of 13,659 students, making the 2002-2003 academic year the University's highest enrolment in its 38-year history.

The University has invested \$90 million to expand the campus over the last few years with the construction of two new academic buildings, the \$12-million Walker Complex, Niagara's largest recreational facility, that opened in April 2002, and the Alan Earp Residence, opened in September 2001.

This fall, the University began construction of a \$16-million, 310-bed student residence on the campus to be

completed for the 2003-04 academic year. As well, the University signed a 10-year lease with a private developer to manage a new residence complex under construction across the street from Brock which will open for September 2003.

The new Academic South Building and the Academic North Building provide about 80,000 square feet of space that will allow for 1,700 new student spaces as Brock prepares for the double cohort in 2003. Located at the west end of the campus, the facilities include the new Computer Commons, several multimedia

lecture halls, office space, a food court, general student meeting space and state-of-

"These impressive new facilities will advance teaching and research at the University for years to come," said Brock President David Atkinson during the opening ceremonies held in the Walker Complex Courtyard. "This project would never have been possible without the support of the SuperBuild program as well as the many donors who believe in Brock's plans for the future."

The Province of Ontario contributed \$15.57 million in capital funding for the academic expansion as part of the SuperBuild investment program. The academic complex also received financial support from Brock faculty, staff and retirees through the "Invest in Quality" campaign, while many Brock graduates and private donors have supported the new facilities through "Good, Better, Brock! The Campaign for Brock University." The final segment of the \$29.62-million campaign is now under way to complete financing for the capital expansion.

Champion Badgers

New national and provincial banners are hanging in the Brock gym.

The Brock Badgers men's soccer team was crowned the Canadian Interuniversity Sports 2002 National Champions and the men's rowing team earned their second national title in four years.

The men's rowing team also won their second straight OUA Championship - their fourth OUA men's rowing title in the past five years.

Brock had two other provincial titles this year as the men's lacrosse team was crowned 2002 OUFLA Champions – their 12th OUFLA title – and the men's baseball team won the 2002 OUA Championship.

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

Brock launches MBA program

In October, Brock's Faculty of Business launched the new MBA program, designed to give an opportunity for talented individuals to obtain the advanced professional business education that will help achieve their career goals. A Brock MBA will provide a strong foundation in management education and an opportunity to develop in-depth, functional business knowledge – carried out in the context of a global business environment.

The MBA program has been designed as a two year, four-term program if completed on a full-time basis. Part-time students are expected to complete the program in six years. The countdown is on. The long-awaited double cohort, when the final year of the five-year high school program and the first class of the new four-year curriculum graduate at the same time in Ontario, will arrive in September.

Brock University has been planning for this significant increase in enrolment since 1998. It is committed to taking an additional 1,700 students beyond its 1998-1999 first-year intake level of 2,068 by September 2003, and plans to increase the number of first-year spaces from 2,315 in fall 2001 to 3,725 in fall 2003.

"Brock is well prepared for the double cohort," says Dr. Terry Boak, Vice-President Academic and Provost. "A lot of thought and consideration has gone into our plans on how to manage this kind of increase in student enrolment. There will be challenges and we will address them as they arrive. We are confident that we will provide double cohort students with a solid educational and student life experience."

Here is a Q and A with Boak.

Q: How is Brock addressing the need to create more space for the double cohort students?

A: We are addressing the need for new space in a number of ways. Most evident is our investment of \$90 million in campus expansion over the last few years. This expansion includes two new academic buildings which were opened last September to enhance teaching and research at Brock. These new facilities provide about 80,000 square feet of space and feature a Computer Commons, several multimedia lecture halls, office space, a food court, general student meeting space and state-of-the-art labs.

The University also opened the new Walker Complex, Niagara's largest recreational facility. The expansion and development of the Walker Complex comprises the Student, Community Health and Fitness Centre, the state-of-the-art health club called The Zone, the Eleanor Misener Aquatic Centre, the Leo LeBlanc Rowing Centre and the original Physical Education facilities.

The University is also in the process of finalizing a seven-year agreement to utilize new space across from the Brock campus on Glenridge Avenue that will provide for additional seminar rooms and office space.

Another way in which we will address the need for classroom space is by better utilizing program timetables in the afternoon and evenings to maximize the use of facilities such as lecture halls and seminar rooms. As well, the University is exploring how technology can further enhance the overall academic experience and the seminar system.

Q: Will there be additional student residences?

A: Yes. Currently, there are two building projects under way. On campus, Brock is building a new 310-bed student residence that will open for the 2003-04 academic year. The residence will include a new dining hall.

The University also has signed a 10-year lease agreement with Lupine Properties Limited, of London to manage Quarry View Residence, a townhouse-style complex for 290 students, located across the street from the Brock campus. Quarry View Residence is scheduled to open for fall 2003. The University will manage the 80-unit complex of two-, three- and four-bedroom furnished units as part of its award-winning residence program.

Other recent residence projects include the 255-bed Earp Residence, which opened in September 2001, and renovations to the Village residence to convert 175 single rooms to double rooms for fall 2002. Q: Will students graduating from both the new and old curricula be treated equally when applying for university?

A: Students graduating from the five-year program and the new four-year program will be treated the same for admission.

The universities and the provincial government have been working together for the past six years to plan for the double cohort. The universities participated in the validation of the Ontario Secondary School curriculum and are confident that students graduating from the new programs are as well prepared as their OAC counterparts for university studies.

Recent research indicates this is the case - we don't expect to see any significant differences in students graduating from either the four-year or five-year program.

Q: Does Brock intend to raise admission standards?

A: We have increased admission averages each year. Our admission average is currently 79.2 per cent. We don't expect a significant increase for September 2003 admissions, likely in the range of about 80 per cent. However, depending on the program, the average could fluctuate up or down.

Q: Will Brock continue to offer entrance scholarships and other means of financial aid?

A: It is very important to Brock that we continue to make scholarship and financial aid packages available to students. Students who have a demonstrated financial need are being accommodated quite well as Brock is considered to be one of the better institutions in providing students with assistance.

The availability of bursaries and scholarships at the University has been addressed over the past few years and we are in a good position.

Also, Brock has been sensitive to the financial pressures facing students and has kept residence rates reasonable and competitive. Our ancillary fees are among the lowest in the province.

Q: Will the increase in enrolment have an impact on Brock's ability to offer a quality student experience?

A: Brock has a strong tradition for providing our students with a quality experience. That will continue as double cohort students will experience the complete package – excellent academic programs, opportunities for experiential learning and co-op studies, an increasing selection of graduate programs, access to a full range of student services and student life programs.

We often talk about the value of the human quality at Brock. We are committed to this as we continue to place a great deal of importance on seminar and small-group learning with our programs.

We have dealt with the faculty staffing needs for this increase in enrolment and the Deans have told me that they have been very impressed by the quality of faculty candidates as a result of their searches.

As well, our staff departments, such as the Registrar's Office, will be able to manage the increased demand for student services.

I am encouraged by the commitment of faculty, staff and students at Brock University as the University prepares to welcome the largest intake of new students in its history.


Administration in Co-op Accounting. He has had a distinguished career in a short period of time.

Brock ranked sixth in new Globe and Mail survey

A new survey conducted by the *Globe and Mail* in partnership with Uthink and the Strategic Counsel ranked Brock University sixth among 29 Canadian universities.

The results of the University Report Card were published by the *Globe and Mail* on Wednesday, October 23. This first-time survey was conducted to gauge students' satisfaction levels.

The poll involved online surveys that were completed by current undergraduate students of Canadian universities. Some 120,000 students from the studentawards.com online community were invited to complete the 100-question survey.

To be included in the ranking, universities had to have 250 or more student responses to the survey.

Brock placed in the top five in several categories including firstplace rankings for faculty feedback, TA availability and quality, sports facilities and student residences. Brock also was second in teaching effectiveness, faculty availability, availability of financial assistance and meritbased scholarship; third in classrooms, locating part-time jobs, on-campus employment; fourth in class scheduling convenience and class sizes, and fifth in quality of teaching, university atmosphere, sense of community, and university as a training for employment.

Placing above Brock in the rankings were Queen's University, University of Western Ontario, Sherbrooke University, University of Guelph and McMaster University. Brock's score exceeded universities such as McGill, Simon Fraser and the University of Toronto.

It is anticipated that Canadian universities will meet with the *Globe and Mail* to gain a greater understanding of the survey methodology.

Maclean's ranking

In the latest *Maclean's* ranking, Brock continues to place 8th of 21 in the reputational survey.

The University is 14th of 21 in the Primarily Undergraduate category of the *Maclean's* ranking. Brock's overall ranking last year was 12th following a 2000 ranking of 15.

In the rankings, released on November 10, Brock made significant gains in the following: the University climbed from 19th to 11th over two years in average entering grade of students; and from 20th to 10th year to year in international students. Brock's most significant decline was in class size of 3rd and 4th year students, dropping from 7th to 18th year to year.

Brock celebrates Fall Convocation

Brock University conferred 308 undergraduate degrees, 112 graduate degrees and 38 education degrees during its Fall 2002 Convocation, held October 19. Eight certificates were awarded in various areas of study, including Public Administration and Adult Education.

This year, Brock took pride in awarding an honorary degree to Suzanne Rochon Burnett, the President of R.B. Communications Ltd., in Welland. Dr. Rochon Burnett was recognized for her outstanding contribution to Canadian cultural life and, in particular, her support and encouragement of aboriginal art in Canada.

Dr. Rochon Burnett is a Métis born in Ste.Adèle, Que. She became Canada's first aboriginal person licensed by the CRTC to operate a private radio station in Canada. She purchased CHOW-AM 1470, Niagara's country music station in 1994, which later became CHOW-FM – now Spirit 91.7 – in 1997.

Dr. Rochon Burnett served on Brock's Board of Trustees from 1995 to 2001 and is also a long-time member of the Faculty of Business Dean's Advisory Council. In the fall of 1996, she established a scholarship for aboriginal students in communications and business at the University.

Brock honoured and thanked Dr. James A. Gibson, the University's founding President, for a lifetime of dedication and commitment to Brock. Dr. Gibson, who retired from Brock in 1974, will be moving to Ottawa to be closer to his family.

As part of Fall Convocation, two faculty members were recognized for contributions to research and teaching. Professor Mohammed Dore, of the Department of Economics, received the 2002 Brock University Award for Distinguished Research and Creative Activity and Professor Maureen Connolly, Chair of the Department of Sport Management and a Professor in the Department of Physical Education and Kinesiology, received the 2002 Brock University Award for Distinguished Teaching.

The University also awarded Mark Poulin, of St. Catharines, with the President's Medal. The award recognizes the student who has the highest overall average in a first undergraduate degree and who is graduating at the Fall Convocation ceremony. A former taxi driver and Young Drivers of Canada teacher, Poulin, 39, received a Bachelor of Arts degree in French.







Graduate shares inspiring story

Tricia Pokorny has a vivid memory of a day in 1988 during her second year of studying arts at Brock University.

The Brock graduate remembers sitting in the corridor of the Thistle Complex between classes. It was like any other day a busy hallway with people coming and going. But something did stand out for the Welland, Ont., native. She watched as a gentleman, accompanied by a seeing-eye dog, walked past her and continued down

"I distinctly remember seeing how this man, with so much ease, made his way along the hallway," Pokorny recalled during a recent presentation she made at the 2002 Inspiring Life Stories Luncheon, hosted by The Niagara Employment Alliance Corporate Leadership Team, and held at Château des Charmes Winery, in Niagara-on-the-Lake.

There is a twist of irony to her story.A year later, after spending months in the hospital and having several operations,

Pokorny blind as a result of complications from diabetes. One year after losing her site, she returned to Brock to pursue a degree in Applied Language Studies. At her side was her seeing-eye dog Bogey.

With support from her family, doctors and the Canadian National Institute for the Blind (CNIB), and many others, as well as her own spirit of determination, Pokorny has overcome many obstacles in her life.

"I had to realize that I was still the same person that I was before losing my sight," she said. "I had to realize that basically it was OK to be blind."

Pokorny graduated from Brock in June

1995 and for the past five years, she has been the Special Needs Coordinator at Casino Niagara.

"The resources that Brock made available to me through their special needs department were outstanding," she said. "Graduation day was a very special moment. It was a big achievement for me - I could get an education, go to school and function like any other student."

Pokorny actually approached the Casino with the idea of becoming the first gaming facility in Canada to create a Special Needs department. She made such an impression on casino executives that she was hired to be their Special Needs Coordinator. Pokorny is responsible for the recruitment of employees with special needs and also for the development of customer services for patrons with special needs.

In 1999, Pokorny was invited to the United Nations to discuss the recruitment of people with special needs in the gaming industry as well as the groundbreaking

special needs programs that have been implemented at Casino Niagara.

'One of my favourite quotes is by W.O. Mitchell who said: "It doesn't matter what happens; it's about what you do with it," said Pokorny.

New technology transforms library research

It is designed to promote scholarly innovation, to support higher productivity for faculty, students and researchers, and to create equal and reliable access to scholarly resources with the Ontario university

system. The Library has recently implemented the first phase of Scholarsportal, one of the most important pieces in the OII Project. Scholarsportal will ultimately transform the way research is conducted at Brock.

Scholarsportal is designed to simplify and streamline the research process. It reduces the need to conduct separate searches in different databases by integrating scholarly digital resources under one interface, thus making it easier and

quicker for faculty and students to find information. Much of the information accessible through Scholarsportal is currently scientific in nature, but the scope will quickly expand to include other


