Commission to restructure universities

A three-man commission has been appointed by the Minister of Colleges and Universities to devise a plan that would result in the restructuring of the province's universities.

Dr. Bette Stephenson made the announcement in the Legislature on Thursday Dec. 15.

Dr. Stephenson said the commission would review and report on a number of items regarding the province's 15 universities.

Included would be a method for distributing provincial grants to the institutions, spending accountability, new tuition fee policies, the need for entrance exams, the possible closure of redundant faculties and a review of the government's promise of accessibility for all qualified students.

The minister said that although earlier recommendations on changes in the university system had not been heeded, the government was committed to act on the report delivered by the three-man commission.

Chairman of the commission is Edmund C. Bovey, a businessman who sits as director of several Canadian corporations including Norcen Energy Resources Ltd., Canada Packers Inc., Abitibi-Price Inc., Hollinger Argus Ltd., and the Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce. Mr. Bovey was chairman of Norcen Energy until his retirement in 1981.

The other two members of the commission are: Dr. Fraser Mustard, president of the Canadian Institute for Advanced Research and former vice-president for health sciences at McMaster University; and Ronald Watts, principal and vice-chancellor of Queen's University, and former member of the Fisher committee on the Future Role of Universities in Ontario.

The commission is expected to hold public hearings and base a number of its findings on recommendations already outlined in previous studies.

The Minister said although the restructuring would not involve reducing the number of universities in Ontario, it could result in some fundamental changes in some institutions to give them clearly defined and different roles.

The commission is expected to submit its report this summer.

Bob Nairn retires position

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

Suspect on campus?

Unusual events on campus last week included the Hamilton-Wentworth police setting up an office on the tenth floor of the Schmon Tower in order to continue their search for the suspect in the murder of a McMaster University professor.

Prof Edith Wightman was found dead in her office on Dec. 17, 1983.

The ensuing police investigation led to St. Catharines, where someone used Prof Wightman's credit cards to shop at The Pen on the day of her murder.

The suspect, described as an "obvious male in female clothing, male, caucasian, 35-45 years old, over 6' tall", has also been spotted "several times" on the Brock campus.

Dancemakers is a Toronto-based modern dance company which is quickly gaining international recognition.

New musical series

A "New Musical Series" is being presented at the University by the Department of Fine Arts and the Brock Centre for the Arts.

The series will feature musical films on Friday evenings, beginning January 13.

Lecture: "Japan: The Samurai Swords"

David Pepper, an artist-craftsman from Toronto, gives an illustrated lecture entitled "Japan: The Samurai Swords" on Sunday January 15.

Mr. Pepper is the first speaker to the Niagara Peninsula Society of the Archaeological Institute of America for 1984.

His lecture will survey the historical and technological development of the Japanese samurai sword from the 5th century A.D. onwards. Particular emphasis will be given to the craftsmanship displayed in the making of the blades and fittings.

The lecture will be based on Mr. Pepper's research on Japanese swords and armour.

A "second-in-command" for Brock

Brock University will soon have a vicepresident, academic. A memo from President Alan Earp outlines the vice-presidential appointment:

"Following discussions with Senate, which has expressed its support for the proposal, President Alan Earp proposes to recommend to the Board the appointment of a Vice-President.

This is not envisaged as a staff appointment through which a number of areas and individuals would report. Rather the appointment will provide for the clear designation of a second-in-command and allow for the contributions of an additional experienced academic to the councils of the University and at the senior administrative level.

Physically, the Vice-President's office would be located in the area of the President, without additional secretarial support.

Duties:

Normally, the Vice-President will be a member of faculty, who will continue teaching, but with a reduced load. His/her responsibilities will include:

Acting as chief executive and academic officer in the absence of the President.

Representing the University, as may be appropriate, when the President is unable to do so.

Serving as an ex officio member of Senate and the Committee of Deans.

Being available for consultation by president, deans and members of faculty.

Special assignments as may from time to time appear appropriate.

Term:

Three to five years.

Appointment:

The appointment will be made by the Board, on the recommendation of the President, after consultation with Senate.

"I decided to attend Brock because..."

Ever wonder why students in increasing numbers have been choosing Brock for their university education?

The Information and Liaison office recently conducted a survey of first-year students, which indicated that most selected Brock University because it is a smaller school and offers an academic program of specific interest to them.

Of the 269 respondents to the survey, 54 were from the Niagara region; these students noted that Brock's location (within commuting distance) was also a prime consideration in the decision to attend the University.

The Brock year one viewbook and related publications were the most helpful source of information about the University for the respondents. A campus visit by the student and a school visit by a Brock liaison officer ranked second and third, respectively. Among the local students, parents' input also weighed strongly.

Eighty-six percent of the students surveyed approved of Brock's revised admission standard of 65 percent for general arts and science programs. Of the respondents, 60 percent had better than a 70 percent grade 13 average.

McMaster University appears to be Brock's major competiton for students in the school boards extending along Lake Ontario from St. Catharines to Oshawa.

The University of Western Ontario, the University of Waterloo, and Wilfrid Laurier University were indicated as Brock's chief rivals throughout the remainder of the province.

BIDS on campus this summer

There's an innovative new program scheduled to appear on campus this summer: the Brock Institute for Disabled Students.

Coordinated and directed by Prof Walt Watson, Sociology, and Part-Time programs officer, Roger Reynolds, BIDS will attempt to prepare disabled students for university life.

The program, which will be a two week workshop carried on in early summer, will focus on the life skills and study skills needed by disabled students to comfortably adapt to the university environment.

"We're currently in the developmental stage," said Prof Watson. "But the program will be open to disabled students throughout the province."

Pat Smolak, a Brock graduate, is project manager.

Pat, who is blind, said she is enthusiastic about such a program at Brock: "There's a lot of preparation involved when a disabled student decides to go to university. Everything from deciding whether or not its realistic to take a certain course to what kind of facilities are available and where can you find them."

BIDS has received a federal grant of more than \$42,000 to aid in the organizational and planning aspects of the Institute. Participants in the two week workshop will be charged a fee, to cover residence, meals, and teaching materials.

OCUFA plans to fight re-structuring

The Ontario Confederation of University Faculty Associations will mount a counterattack on Colleges and Universities Minister Bette Stephenson's plans to restructure the university system.

In a press release issued last week, OCUFA President Bill Jones said "Our task will be to convince members of the public that her (Dr. Stephenson's) plan essentially means fewer opportunities for their children to go to university".

Prof Jones said the campaign will attempt to counteract the re-shaping of the university system in Ontario, based on proposals outlined by Dr. Stephenson in the Legislature in December. A three-man commission has been set up to plan the university re-structuring.

The purpose of the OCUFA campaign said Prof Jones is "to encourage a public, political, and media climate that will make the implementation of the Minister's plans impossible".

OCUFA has met with labor groups, political party representatives, student union leaders, and university support staff in order to persuade them to join the campaign.

The first phase of the campaign will concentrate on informing the general public and specific interest groups of the changes proposed by the Minister said Prof Jones. The overall campaign will be mounted in stages.

Brock gets energy conservation grant

Brock University has been awarded more than \$17,000 by the provincial government for an energy conservation program.

In a joint announcement by Colleges and Universities Minister Dr. Bette Stephenson and Energy Minister Philip Andrewes, grants totalling \$1,042,830 were awarded 14 post secondary institutions in the province.

Brock will use its \$17,750 grant to install a salt-based energy storage unit and a heat exchanger in the new Alumni Greenhouse. The University will also do an energy study on all of its buildings.

Projects at other universities include boiler conversions to use natural gas instead of oil, systems to recover heat from waste air and water, and improvements to ventilation systems and lighting controls.

The provincial grants cover about 50 per cent of the cost of each project. The institution pays the remainder of the cost.

The awards are in line with the provincial government's energy conservation program: Energy Minister Andrewes noted his ministry has been working with universities to save energy since 1976.

The result has been "a 20 per cent saving" in the university sector to date.

Flames, but no serious injury

Two separate fires on campus last week resulted in damage but no serious injury.

On Thursday Feb. 16, Campus Police and local firemen were called to put out a fire that had broken out in a parked car in the main parking lot.

Campus Police Chief Doug Roberts said vandalism is suspected in the fire: "The fire was started by a cigarette on the seat". The car's sun roof was partially open and police suspect the cigarette was dropped or thrown in.

It was 4:40 am on Friday Feb. 17 when the fire alarm in residence sounded. Students were quickly evacuated; a smoldering reading lamp in Rm 331A, Fitzgibbon House had filled the room with smoke and flames thereby setting off the alarm.

Chief Roberts said students John Sanders, Bob Martin, and Roy Hunt are to be credited with keeping the fire at bay with extinquishers and the fire hose until firemen arrived on the scene.

Winter's "best" closes Brock!

The worst snowstorm the Niagara Region has witnessed in nine years was effective enough to literally paralyze the area for 48 hours.

Businesses, schools and industry succumbed to the 59 centimetres (almost two feet) of snow that fell from late evening Monday Feb. 27 through to early Wednesday Feb. 29.

For the first time since the region's 1977 snowstorm, Brock was closed for a two day period.

The University's closing forced the cancellation of a number of events, including the Board of Governors meeting scheduled for Tuesday evening.

According to Brock President Alan Earp, the Board meeting has been tentatively rescheduled for Tuesday March 13. Agenda items for the Feb. 28 meeting will be attended to at that time.

In the meantime, Physical Plant maintenance staff at the University continue their efforts at snow removal in the parking lots and grounds of the University.

The University was expected to be fully operational, with both administrative offices and classes resuming normal schedules, by Thursday afternoon.



The official opening is March 23!

The University's new science complex gets its official opening Friday March 23.

Deputy Premier of Ontario, Robert Welch, officiates. The complex will also be formally re-named the MacKenzie Chown complex at the ceremony. Family members of the late Mac Chown are expected to attend.

Invited to the event are the building's architects (Moriyama and Teshima of Toronto), the University's Board of Trustees, area politicians and corporate donors to the science development fund.

The ceremony takes place at 3 pm, with a reception to follow in the Pond Inlet.

The science complex will then be open for public tours on the Saturday and Sunday following the Friday opening.

A truckload of deeds for the library

The Brock Library has received more than 1800 volumes of land registry copy books for the Niagara region dating from the eighteenth century through to the 1950s.

The books record ownerships and land transactions for all property located in the three counties, Lincoln, Welland, and Haldimand, in the Niagara region.

"Some ownerships go back to the late 1700s and record land given by the Crown," said John Burtniak, Head of the Technical Services Division of the Library.

Each volume weighs between 15 and 20 pounds and all volumes are piled up in two rooms of the Library.

The books were obtained from the province's archives, and will be of special interest to genealogists.

The books should be available for use by the public late this year said Mr. Burtniak.

Physical Plant employee honored

Brock Physical Plant employee John Ens was honored by Lincoln county, February 20th, for rescuing a woman from a burning trailer last summer.

Mr. Ens and 19-year old Jan Hunink were commended by the Royal Canadian Humane Society for their quick action in rescuing 58-year old Greta Robbins.

Mrs. Robbins later died from her injuries, but the action displayed by the two men "has not gone un-noticed" said Mayor Ray Konkle of Lincoln, in presenting the award.

Bill Matheson, Brock's vice-president

To the surprise of few, and general acclamation of all, the Board of Trustees, at their March 13th meeting, unanimously approved the appointment of Prof William A. Matheson as Brock University's vice-president.

Bill Matheson has been teaching at Brock since 1969. His department is Politics and his specialty is Canadian politics.

He became Dean of Social Sciences in 1975, remaining in that position until 1981.

He recently served as "acting president" while Brock President Alan Earp was on leave last spring.

Prof Matheson is also the recipient of another first in Brock history: the Alumni Award for Excellence in Teaching (first awarded in 1980).

He was cited by students for his "enthusiasm, interest and excellent communication skills".

Born in Sydney, Nova Scotia, Prof Matheson received his BA from Dalhousie University, MBA from the University of Western Ontario, and MA and PhD from Carleton University in Ottawa where he began his career as an instructor.

His publications include "The Prime Minister and the Cabinet", one of the earliest in-depth studies of the subject in Canada.

Prof Matheson is active in community affairs, serving as vice-chairman of the Niagara Symphony Association and a member of the board of the Niagara Centre for Youth Care.

"I'm delighted the very important part Prof Matheson plays at Brock will be recognized by this new designation," said Alan Earp, president of Brock.

"I'm also delighted that as one of our outstanding teachers he will be able to continue to meet with classes on a regular basis," he continued.

The Secretary to the University is...

The Board of Trustees was also informed, Tuesday night, of the appointment of Pat Beard to the position of Secretary to the University.

Mr. Beard, 36, takes on the position left vacant by Bob Nairn who retired as Secretary Jan. 1st of this year.

A Brock graduate, Mr. Beard worked at the University from 1971 through to 1980. He left to work at the Ontario Council on University Affairs in Toronto, returning to Brock in 1983 as institutional research officer.

"I'm very pleased to have in this important office a Brock graduate who is thoroughly familiar with Brock and the Ontario university system as a whole," said President Alan Earp.

Isaac cameo approved

Other matters on the agenda at the Board of Trustees meeting included a motion which approved the adopting of a cameo of Isaac Brock as the University's logo.

An earlier motion to amend the name of the University to Isaac Brock was not put before the Board.

The suggestion to rename the University as part of the adoption of the logo was probably the most controversial aspect of the original motion.

"I have felt that we needed to clean up our institutional graphic image for many years," said Doug Geddie, Director of Information and Liaison.

"We've needed a symbol or logo, and when the cameo was unveiled, many said why not consider renaming at the same time?

"All of this was meant to strengthen the image of the University, to build on our traditions, and to emphasize our recent success and popularity," he said.

"It certainly wasn't meant to divide the campus," he said. "Those who opposed the name change did it with a passion that was hard to ignore".

The new Brock University logo will be registered as an official university symbol. It will be phased in and will be used on stationery, publications, and other materials. A design manual will govern its implications.

Badger basketball wrap-up

For the Brock Badger basketball teams it's over for another season.

There weren't any championships this year, but both the men and women placed well in

provincial rankings. The men's team headed for the CIAU regional playoffs on the weekend, defeating the University of New Brunswick, but losing to Lethbridge, 80-66 in the Eastern final on Saturday.

The women Badgers finished the season with a third place ranking in the province.

"Unfortunately, we didn't make it to the CIAU finals, but we were plagued with injuries at the end," said Chris Critelli, assistant women's coach.

All-star Candi Lohr was out with an ankle injury, and the Badgers lost to the powerful team from the University of Toronto, 73-68.

"One team wins and one team loses and we were the ones to lose this time," said Ms. Critelli.

The make-up of both the men's and women's Badger teams will consist of new talent next season, as both teams lose a number of their star players this year.

The men's team will play without the superb talent of Doug Fast, whose four years with the Badgers left a number of records including most points in a season (669 in 1982/83) and all-time leader in free throws (329).

The women's team loses a number of its top talent including Candi Lohr, Diane Hilko, and the Stamp sisters.

"We're going to be a very young team," said Ms. Critelli. "But we'll be a strong team because youth often brings a lot of determination and enthusiasm.

"I'm looking forward to our next season," she said.

The College will also be responsible for outlining ways in which the system can be used to improve instructional software and recommend possible modifications in functional requirements. Profs Connelly and Crane will coordinate the research in this area.

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

Survival kits to ease the load

Brock University's Alumni office has come up with a unique idea to help students "survive" the pressures of final exams.

Called "survival kits", parents of students living in residence were invited by letter, early in the year, to purchase the kits for students prior to the start of exams.

The kits, which contain such items as hot chocolate and coffee, cheese and crackers, peanuts, juice, cookies, granola bars and fresh fruit, will be delivered to students Saturday April 7th.

"This is a first for the Alumni office at Brock," said Ginny Gilbert, Alumni officer. "We thought we'd experiment with the students in residence to begin with, simply because our access to their home addresses was easily available.

"The response was encouraging. We've had a 70 per cent return. Out of 650, we had 450 enthusiastic replies," said Mrs. Gilbert.

The aim of the project was to supply the student with a special "perk" prior to exams, and also provide an outlet for the Alumni office to raise some money.

"We expect to raise in the neighborhood of \$1,000 through the project," said Mrs. Gilbert. "And we're thinking of expanding it next year, depending on the availability

of the new computer system which will allow us access to the information we need".

Students from abroad, living in residence, were also considered in this year's project: the Office of the Dean of Student Services picked up the tab for those students and they'll be getting their survival kits as well this Saturday.

Teacher of the Year: Angus Somerville

Prof Angus Somerville of the University's English department is this year's recipient of the Alumni Award For Excellence in Teaching.

A "stimulating speaker", with "well prepared presentations", that contain "a light touch and a sense of humor" in "relating the past to the present", Prof Somerville was highly recommended by those who submitted his nomination.

Courses taught by Prof Somerville include "Introduction to Literature", "History of the English Language", and "Middle English".

He is also working on the <u>Historical</u> Thesaurus of English, a notional analysis and history of the English vocabulary from Anglo-Saxon to the present.

Something for you from the Library

The University Library is now able to provide online searching of CAN/OLE.

CAN/OLE is the online information system created and maintained by the national science library, CISTI.

The system provides access to databases that contain Canadian and/or scientific information. Two Canadian, non-scientific databases are Canadian Register of Research and Researchers in the Social Sciences and Sport, the online version of Sport and Recreation Index.

Why use CAN/OLE? Computer searches of the literature are often more effective and efficient than manual searches. The Library has added CAN/OLE to its list because of its lower costs.

Depending on the database a CAN/OLE search may cost up to 40 per cent less than the same search on DIALOG, our other online system.

Sometimes it's on, sometimes it's off

Have you noticed that some evenings there are building lights that don't seem to be operating, and other nights the same lights seem to work properly?

It's the fault of an aging control panel, according to Director of Physical Plant, William Armstrong. The lights, clocks, thermostats, and many other vital campus devices are controlled by a master control. Unfortunately, the control is aging, and being mechanical, it sometimes works and sometimes doesn't. There is no rhythm to the breakdowns, and according to Mr. Armstrong, it is very hard for maintenance operators to repair the problems. "We need to make very expensive repairs and replacements to the controller and. unfortunately, this is the replacement that we just cannot afford with our tight budgets."

That explains the great variations that will sometimes occur in heating and cooling in various parts of the University (the clocks that never seem correct, the lights that do not seem to illuminate outside walkways). "The problem is underfunding," says Mr.Armstrong. "With a greater capital acquisition budget, we could have replaced the faulty controller. With our limitations, we simply do whatever we can to fix the problem areas."





Personnel Services would again like to remind faculty and staff members travelling abroad that they are covered for emergency medical care under the University's supplementary health care plan.

This plan provides coverage to full-time faculty and staff for emergency treatment

while outside of Canada. Coverage is provided for hospital and medical expenses up to levels which are customary and reasonable for the area where treatment is rendered. When claiming for such expenses follow the steps outlined below:

In most cases, you will have to pay the full amount of your bill when treatment is given. Be sure to obtain detailed receipts which clearly indicate the diagnosis, treatment rendered, dates of service and name of physician.

When you return, make copies of all receipts, as OHIP does not return any of the originals.

Send original receipts, along with a note that lists your OHIP number, your mailing address and gives a brief description of the emergency to: Out-of-province-claims, OHIP, 25 Main St. W., Hamilton, Ontario, L8P 4P9.

When you receive your money from OHIP, compare the amount received against the amount submitted. If your costs have not been completely recovered, obtain a Confederation Life claim form and return it to Personnel along with copies of your receipts and the OHIP cheque stub.

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

Bora Laskin National Fellowship



Thorold Bus

Live in Thorold? Dreading the battle for parking spots in the main lot come September? We have good news for you. Starting September 10, the St. Catharines Transit Commission will be running a bus between Thorold and Brock. The proposed route will be from Thorold, starting at the Roadway Inn on Ormond St. to Beaverdams Rd. to Pine St. to Richmond St. to Collier Rd. to St. Davids Rd. to Brock; the return run will follow the same course. The bus will leave the Roadway Inn at 8am and 9am and students along the way will be able to flag the driver to pick them up. In the afternoon, the bus will leave Brock at 4:30pm and 5:30pm. There will be no transfers allowed to and from this Thorold route and the fare will be single rather than double as in the past. The routing may change depending on the demand from other Thorold areas, and the service will run on a trial basis for the month of September. If there is sufficient use, it will continue for the remainder of the school year, so leave your car at home and forget the parking hassles.

Finding more rooms

Residence is a popular place to be these days...so popular that the University has had to rent 22 rooms at the Leonard Motel on St.Paul St. in an attempt to house at least a part of the overflow. The rooms have been modified slightly to include a

Spectrometry facility

Brock is to be one of six Ontario universities to share a new \$692,000 high mass high resolution, mass spectrometry facility to be installed next year at McMaster. The instrument has just been ordered after an evaluation trip to England by Jack Miller, (one of the principle applicants) and Mike Quilliam of McMaster. The \$626,000 NSERC grant provides most of the funds for the new equipment which will be used to solve problems in chemistry, medicine, toxicology, pollution, geology and archaeology.

SENATE SYNOPSIS

At its 289th Meeting, held on Wednesday, November 7th, Senate:

- 1. Heard a report from the President which included:
 - (a) a summary of October Student/Faculty Ratios for the past three years, along with a ten-year comparison. The Institutional SFR has increased to 20.7 (from 20.3 in 1983-84);
 - (b) an indication that the Bovey Commission was some two weeks behind schedule (which means the Commission's Report will not likely be made public until early in 1985);
 - (c) an announcement on 1984 promotions as follows:
 - To Associate Professor A. Arthur, R. Chodzinski, D. Hughes, E. Levanoni and J. Mitterer
 - To Assistant Professor D. Siegel; and
 - (d) an evaluation of the proposed re-alignment of the OUAA and OWIAA.
- 2. Approved a series of amendments to the Faculty Handbook, proposed by the Rules Committee, such that:
 - (a) additional nominations for Faculty Representatives on the Board of Trustees must specify a term of office;
 - (b) meetings of the Committee on Petitions and Appeals shall not be open to members of the Brock community and only agendas for open meetings of Senate Committees will be posted on the Senate bulletin board;







The focal point of the service is an Advent wreath whose circle of evergreen branches and candles bear a special symbolism for the Christmas season. The University community is invited to join in the services and share the joy of the season.

When does the food stop?

CANREG is a directory of Canadian social science researchers; 35 names in this database are affiliated with Brock Univer-

sity. NRCPUBS provides information on all publications written by National Research Council of Canada staff and those written for the NRC.

Other online biographical dictionaries to which the Library has access are the Marquis Who's Who and American Men and Women of Science.

- a) the Board agreeing in principle to receiving submissions and proposals from BUFA on matters relating to terms and conditions of employment while continuing to receive advice from Senate on academic matters related to terms and conditions of employment (as per the Report of the Ad Hoc Committee on the Role of Senate);
- b) approval of revisions to FHB I: 1.8.5.E ("Decisions of the President-Promotions") and FHB I: 1:11.1 ("Sabattical Leave"), as recommended by Senate; and
- c) approval of a salary agreement with Local 1295 (Part-Time) of the Canada Union of Public Employees.

This summary constitutes an unofficial record until such time as the minutes of this meeting are approved.


