New Chancellor to be installed in October

Ned Goodman, one of the country's most significant investment industry leaders and Canadian business builders, is the new Chancellor of Brock University.

The announcement was made April 12 following Goodman's election by the University Senate, acting on the advice of the select Advisory Committee and with the full support of the Board

Goodman succeeds Dr. Raymond Moriyama who completed his term at Brock on March 31, 2007. Moriyama served as Chancellor since 2001.

Goodman will serve as Chancellor-Elect until his formal installation as Brock University's sixth Chancellor during Fall Convocation ceremonies to be held Oct. 12, 2007. The appointment is for a three-year term.

As Chancellor, Goodman will assume a leadership role in advancing the University, and will play a vital role in the educational welfare of Brock students. The Chancellor confers all degrees and diplomas.

"In welcoming Ned Goodman as Chancellor of Brock University, the institution will be continuing its legacy of growth by inviting an individual with incredible professional achievement and community involvement to help lead it into the future," says Brock University President Jack Lightstone. "Mr. Goodman brings experience, knowledge and an established presence that will assist Brock in providing a studentcentred environment that focuses on exceptional teaching, research and scholarly activities."

Attending Brock a family tradition



Alec Yarascavitch: the last of his immediate family to graduate from Brock

Alec Yarascavitch has followed what has become a family tradition—in June, he became the sixth person in his immediate family to graduate from Brock University.

Yarascavitch, who earned his Bachelor of Science in general studies with a concentration in biology and community health science, completed his three-year academic career at Brock with a grade point average of four and was the recipient of the Dean's Medal in the Faculty of Mathematics and Science.

He will continue his studies in the threeyear medical program at McMaster University, which granted early admission based on his stellar grades and results from a variety of wide-ranging interviews.

Yarascavitch, the youngest sibling at age 21, joins Eric (BA, poli sci, '98), Carilynne (BSc, biol, '00), Marc (BSc, hlsc, '04) and Blake (BSc, chsc/biol, '05). His mother, Paula Stewart, graduated from St. Catharines Teachers College in 1970 and then went on to teach in Niagara as a special education teacher.

How did he carve out his own identity after so many of his siblings had passed through the University?

"I often was confused with my brothers," he said, "but I never considered that a bad thing, because they're good guys. I was just myself, I guess, and instructors at Brock respected my individuality."

Courses such as pharmacology, endocrinology and human physiology, he said, have laid valuable groundwork for his medical studies. His brother Blake, who has just completed his second year in McMaster's medical program, agrees that the quality of education provided by Brock has been a distinct advantage in medical school.

In addition to his studies, he was also a member of the varsity fencing team, a Brock Student Ambassador, a member of the Community Health Sciences Student Council, a member of the Dean's Council for Community Health Science, and an enthusiast of juggling. At his family's home in St. Davids, an area rich in history, he also planted a 30-by-40 foot vegetable garden and has learned how to preserve the extra produce using old-fashioned techniques and heritage recipes. Part of this interest stems from his United Empire Loyalist roots.

With generations of my mum's family having lived in St. Davids," he said, "it's fun to think that perhaps my ancestors crossed paths with General Brock himself."

Yarascavitch reported that his convocation was an important family occasion, as it marked the last of his immediate family to complete undergraduate studies. Is this the last that Brock will see of the Yarascavitch family?

'We're all proud to be Brock alumni', said Yarascavitch, "and definitely plan to be of future service to our university."

In Memoriam

Bluma Appel

Bluma Appel, a well-known philanthropist, arts patron, and former trustee on Brock's Board of Trustees (1988 to 1984), passed away in July after a brief battle with lung cancer.

She received an honorary Doctor of Law degree from Brock University during the Spring Convocation in June 2007 in recognition for her dedication and distinguished contribution to the arts in Canada through the development of the cultural sector as a volunteer, board member, fundraiser and philanthropist.

In her Convocation address to graduates from the Faculty of Humanities and Concordia Lutheran Seminary, Appel noted: "Enter every door that is open to you. You can always walk out. And it might never open again. I spent my life looking for doors. Some I entered tentatively—others enthusiastically. A locked door particularly intrigued me so I never gave up looking for the key. Behind every door I found some kind of treasure that added up to the mosaic of my life."

In Niagara, where she maintained a home for more than 30 years, Appel supported the Shaw Festival and Niagara Symphony.

She served on more than 40 boards and councils, including the National Gallery of Canada, Canadian Opera Company, Royal Ontario Museum and Canadian Stage Company.

She was made a member of the Order of Canada in 1988 and elevated to officer in 2001.

June Callwood

In April this year, celebrated social justice advocate and journalist June Callwood passed away. She received an honorary Doctor of Letters degree from Brock during 2006 Spring Convocation in recognition or her leadership and support for the causes of the disenfranchised, the unheard, and minority youth.

Callwood's print and broadcast journalism career was marked by compassion and a strong concern for social justice, especially on issues affecting children and women, and as a social justice advocate she founded or cofounded more than 50 Canadian social action organizations. These included Digger's House, a safe haven for homeless youth in Toronto's Yorkville area; AIDS Hospice Casey House; Jessie's Centre for teenage mothers and their babies; Nellie's Hostels for Women, serving homeless women; and Feminists Against Censorship.

Callwood received the Order of Canada in 1986. She was promoted to Officer in 1985, and promoted again to Companion in 2000. In 1988, she was awarded the Order of Ontario.

CCOVI produces first PhD graduate

Lightstone gears up for another year

A synchronized meshing of gears will move Brock University and the Niagara region forward in the next year, says Jack Lightstone, Brock President

and Vice-Chancellor.

Reflecting on his first year in office he was named to the position on Nov. 16, 2005, and was officially appointed on July 1, 2006—Lightstone said a significant challenge facing the University is the development of strategies in which Brock's partners work in concert to reach shared objectives.

"I'm struck by the extent to which Brock, the Region of Niagara and Niagara College have to be understood as key to the cultural, social and economic well-being of the region," said Lightstone. "The gears have to mesh. Part of the gears belong to Brock, part to the community and part to Niagara College."

To create this 'transmission", said Lightstone, meetings have been taking place, and will continue indefinitely, with Terry Boak, Vice-President, Academic; Kim Meade, Associate Vice-President, Student Services; and their counterparts at Niagara College.

Their task, said Lightstone, is to find new ways to collaborate.

"The level of Brock's engagement in the community is now more fully understood by ourselves and our partners, and over the next year we'll see the mechanisms develop to move us forward," he said.

Looking into the future, Lightstone said a critical challenge is to address Brock's space deficit.

"We need better and more academic space, and we know this will not happen overnight," he said. "A great deal has been accomplished, though, to lay the groundwork to address the problem."

Brock, he explained, is lobbying the

provincial government "with persistence and rigour, and we are making headway."

Fundraising will be another part of the financial solution. David Petis, newly appointed Vice-President, Advancement, will play a major role in this arena, he said.

Brock's budget exercises, Lightstone continued, will be tough again this year.

"By not allowing the University to slip into debt on the operational side, Brock will be in much better shape to use future government funding to develop instead of using it to pay off debt."

Lightstone concluded that the strength of Brock lies in its people—faculty, staff and students.

Grant helps to fight infectious

diseases in Honduras

Brock receives more than \$140,000 in funds for health research

Two projects by Brock University researchers in the Department of Community Health Sciences were awarded more than \$140,000 from the Canadian Institutes of Health Research (CIHR) in May. The two projects were included in an announcement of 589 health research grants worth \$217 million for a wide range of projects across Canada.

"These awards advance Brock's capacity

to support the development of new techniques to improve the health of people around the globe and in the Niagara region," said Michael Owen, Associate Vice-President, Research and International Development. "They also provide exciting opportunities for Brock researchers and students to engage in research that will have major impactson our understanding of the health issues of migrant workers and single parent families."

More than \$2 million in NSERC grants awarded in funds for health research

Researchers at Brock University were awarded more than \$2 million in grants in May for 24 projects ranging in topic from aging, memory and attentional control to the algebraic structures of group rings.

The latest grants will fund research projects in the fields of biological sciences, chemistry, community health sciences, computer science, mathematics, physics, psychology, and marketing, international business and strategy.

Examples of NSERC-funded projects at Brock include:

· Professor Michael Bidochka (BSc,

biol,'81), Department of Biological Sciences, has been awarded a research grant to study natural pathogens of insects that can be used for biocontrol.

 Professor Martin Head, Department of Earth Sciences, received a research equipment grant to purchase a vitrinite reflectance and fluorescence microscope workstation association with co-applicant Professor Andrew Miall from the University of Toronto. This is the only equipment of its kind in central

The Global Health Research Initiative (GHRI) awarded a grant valued at \$1.5 million in March to Brock Professor Ana Sanchez from the Department of Community Health Sciences to help combat infectious

diseases within Honduras.

Master's student Angela Duarte and Professor Ana Sanchez

Sanchez and her co- investigator Lourdes de Madrid of the Department of Microbiology, Universidad Nacional Autonoma de Honduras (UNAH) were awarded one of 13 Teasdale-Corti Team Grants, which were selected following a stringent peer-review process among more than 250 proposals submitted in 2006 to the GHRI from across the globe.

The title of Sanchez's four-year program of research and capacity strengthening is "Increasing Capacity to Achieve Millennium Development Goal #6 in Honduras: Combating Infectious

Diseases." The Millennium Development Goals are eight objectives that 191 United Nations member states have agreed to try to achieve by the year 2015.

"Honduras has one of the highest Central American rates for AIDS, tuberculosis and malaria and it is also affected by ancient infectious diseases including zoonoses that not only affect people's health but also their livelihood," says Sanchez. "Furthermore, the potential for emerging problems such as avian influenza, bioterrorism, and bovine spongiform encephalopathy, as a result of globalization, cannot be overlooked." determinants of health, health behaviour change and community participation.

memory and attentional control, or algebraic structures of group rings, the University is positioning itself to make significant positive social, cultural and economic contributions to communities and to the lives of citizens in Niagara, Ontario and internationally.

"Brock's broad spectrum of research initiatives is recognized and funded by Canadian and international research agencies. This research funding, and the physical infrastructure it has allowed us to build, attract some of the world's best researchers," said Owen.

As one example of Brock's acquisition

of funding for innovative research, a grant-supported project by the University's highly respected Cool Climate Oenology and Viticulture Institute will focus on consumer behaviour and preference, gaining an understanding of sensory and non-sensory factors affecting Canadian consumer perception of wine quality. Funding from the Canadian Foundation for Innovation and the Ontario Ministry of Research and Innovation will establish a consumer behavioural laboratory to conduct qualitative and quantitative measurements of consumer liking, purchase intent and consumption in simulated contexts.

The investment provides state-ofthe-art infrastructure for world-class research in areas of importance to Niagara, Ontario and Canada and enhances the competitiveness of the grape and wine industry.

Brock's research also has global impacts. Honduras and Mexico, for example, benefit from collaborative research efforts in tackling aids, tuberculosis, malaria and ancient infectious diseases.

Today's society requires a much higher proportion of its citizenry than ever before to have a university-level education, with an increasing need for post-graduate level degrees, including many PhDs in a broad spectrum of areas.

The University's faculty members have knowledge, enthusiasm and specialized research equipment to guide students into the post-graduate arena. Because Brock is a community of scholars, graduate students work alongside faculty on many projects as co-creators, innovators and change agents.

'Graduate students are our apprentices," says Marilyn Rose, Dean, Faculty of Graduate Studies. "They participate fully in the production and generation of knowledge that characterizes Brock as a flourishing research institution."



Brock partners with Japanese universities

In a demonstration of its strong commitment to international collaboration, Brock University signed an agreement of co-operation with two universities in Tokyo, Japan, in early June.

Kim Meade, Associate Vice-President, Student Services, and Glen Irons, Director, International Market Development, represented Brock on the overseas mission.

"Exciting opportunities for faculty, students and administrators present themselves with these agreements," said Meade. "They will provide a basis for promoting international and intercultural



and will enrich the educational environments of all parties."

Brock and the two Japanese institutions — J. F. Oberlin University and Hosei University —agreed to pursue and promote the following initiatives:

- Exchange of faculty and staff for teaching, research and professional development
- Student exchange for academic programs, language and cultural experience

- understanding Exchange visits of administrators
 - Exchange of teaching and research resources
 - Long-term English as a Second Language (ESL) students will receive academic credit at the home institution for each semester they study full-time ESL at Brock
 - Further avenues of co-operation, such as short-term group exchanges, student internships and other related initiatives, as agreed upon by both parties

Irons said the intake of students from Oberlin University for long-term ESL programs will begin in Fall 2007, and the second intake arrives in May 2008. September and May will be the intake months in subsequent years.

The first intake of Hosei students, said Irons, will be in September 2008, with May and September intakes of about 20 to 30 students thereafter.

Brock already has an agreement with Hokkai-Gakuen Education Consortium in Sapporo, Japan. Groups of high school and university students have been arriving in March and September for the past seven years.

DiBattista honoured with national teaching award

DiBattista, Department of Psychology, is a recipient of the 2007 3M Teaching Fellowship from 3M Canada and the Society for Teaching and Learning in Higher Education (STLHE).

The 3M Teaching Fellowship is the only national teaching award for post-secondary education in Canada. It is given to individuals who not only excel in the teaching of their own courses but also demonstrate an exceptionally high degree of leadership and commitment to the improvement of university teaching across disciplines. A maximum of 10 awards are presented nationally each year among the 35,000 professional academics across Canada who are eligible.

"David is an outstanding classroom teacher and has dedicated himself to the further development of both his own and the institution's scholarship of teaching," said Jack Lightstone, President and Vice-Chancellor of Brock.

As a past recipient of Brock University's Chancellor's Chair for Teaching Excellence, he has embarked on a program of scholarship that examines assessment issues such as the way in which multiple choice test questions can encourage critical thinking and the impact of the Immediate Feedback Assessment Technique.

Scholarship established in appreciation of professor's dedication

A Brock University graduate has shown his gratitude to one of his former professors with the establishment of a

scholarship named after him.

Roelof Makken (BA, economics/ BAdmin, '85), principal of his own firm Tern Analytics Inc. and a member of Brock's Board of Trustees, has established the Mohammed Dore Graduate Scholarship, named for Professor Mohammed Dore, Economics.

"I was surprised and almost shocked when I was informed of the scholarship at a special lunch with Dr. (Terry) Boak (Vice-President. Academic)," said Dore. "But as my Dean (David Siegel, Faculty of Social Sciences) says, it provides a capstone to my long teaching career. It is good to know that my teaching made such a difference to one bright student, who has decided to thank me in this special way. The scholarship is in perpetuity and so it will be there for students long after I am gone."

The first scholarship will be presented in 2008 to a graduate student who is actively involved in research and other activities in the fields of economics or business. If there are multiple candidates, preference will be given to a bilingual

Dore encouraged Makken to attend graduate school after he earned his undergraduate degrees instead of leaving academia to enter the workforce. Dore even picked out the graduate school -the Katholieke Universiteit Leuven in Belgium.

"My education at Brock had me well prepared for Leuven," said Makken. 'Since graduating from university, I have had a fantastic professional life. I realized if it hadn't been for Professor Dore, all this might not have happened.

The endowment to fund the scholarship is \$50,000. Makken contributed \$25,000, an amount that was matched by the Ontario government.

Book receives national award




