How much do we use the library?

According to the lastest set of library use statistics provided by James Hogan, University Librarian, the Brock community is making great use of its library facilities. Some examples based on a comparison of the periods Sept.-Nov. 1984 and Sept.-Nov. 1983 : turnstile use increased 29 percent, circulation of stack books increased 8 percent and reserves 5 percent, Interlibrary books borrowed increased by 37 percent and we lent 12 percent more of our books. The most enormous increase was in the area of computer searches where the increase in use was a whopping 217 percent. A final note for the trivia buffs a total of 458,596 photocopies were made in the period Sept.-Nov.1984. No wonder those machines are always busy.

OCUFA teaching awards

Each year OCUFA recognizes outstanding teachers in Ontario universities through awards based on activities in the preceding calendar year. Senate Synopsis

At its 290th Meeting, held on Wednesday, December 5, Senate:

1. HEARD a report from the President which included:

a) the announcement of the formation of two advisory committees, one on the Deanship of the College of Education and one on the Directorship of the School of Physical Education and Recreation; and

b) an announcement that space consultants would be reviewing alternative sites for the relocation of the Language Laboratory.

2. APPROVED, on the recommendation of the Committee on Academic Policy, an amendment to Section III: 4.2.2.B of the Faculty Handbook such that: "Full-year Fall/Winter Session courses may be changed during the two weeks following the registration period without penalty. Course changes will be permitted during a further one-week period with the permission of the instructor. No course changes will be permitted after this period. Departments must be informed of drops by the Registrar's Office.

Senate also APPROVED a recommendation from CAP that the Theory of Art Therapy offerings be terminated as of the end of the 1984-84 academic session. 3. APPROVED changes, recommended by APC, to the following programs:

- a) the CHEM/UEST combined Major;
- b) the Communication Studies Program;
- c) the Department of Psychology;
- d) the Institute of Urban and Environmental Studies:
- e) the Biochemistry program;
- f) the Department of Biological Sciences;
- g) the Department of Mathematics;
- h) the Department of Classics;
- i) the Liberal Studies Program;

j) the School of Physical Education and Recreation, including Recreation and Leisure Studies;

k) the Department of Romance Studies;

Senate also APPROVED the deletion of the Theory of Art Therapy courses and DE-FEATED a motion which would have, in effect, frozen the list of Core and Context courses until the completion of a review by the Committee on Academic Policy.

4. APPROVED an amendment to Section III: 5.5.3 (f) such that an evaluation of a Challenge for Credit must be completed, by the department concerned, "within 60 days of the acceptance of the Challenge".

5. COMMENCED consideration of changes to circulation policies recommended by the Library Committee, but adjourned (at 6pm) before approving any changes.

SENATE SYNOPSIS

At its 291st Meeting, held on Wednesday, December 19th, Senate:

- 1. APPROVED, on the recommendation of the Committee on Standing, Examinations and Promotions, amendments to FHB II: 9.9.1 and 9.9.3. These affected the terms of reference of SEP and the Sub-Committee on Academic Standing.
- 2. APPROVED, on the recommendation of the Budget Advisory Committee, the following motions:
 - (a) that Senate regards the Budget for 1984-85 as consistent with Academic Policy; and
 - (b) that Senate recommend to the Board of Trustees that the Library Acquisitions Budget be increased to \$700,000.
- 3. APPROVED, on the recommendation of the Admissions Committee, amendments to FHB III: 1.4 ("Categories of Admission") as follows:
 - (a) Special Students

A special student is one whose course load has been restricted because of the student's academic standing or who is currently registered in a Grade 13 Program and who has met the provisions as outlined under the Admission to Part-Time Studies for Grade 13 students.

Such students will be permitted to register in the equivalent of one full course per academic session and must obtain a minimum of 65% or better on the equivalent of two full courses to be considered for further studies.

(b) Non-Degree Students

A non-degree student is one who is not proceeding towards a Brock University degree. Non-degree students are:

- i) Persons already holding a degree who wish to take courses for interest or upgrading purposes.
- ii) Students from another university taking courses on a Letter of Permission or student exchange program.

Proposed amendments to FHB III: 1.4.7. were DEFEATED.

- 4. APPROVED changes, recommended by APC, to the following programs:
 - (a) College of Education;
 - (b) Department of Fine Arts;
 - (c) Teaching English as a Second Language Program;
 - (d) School of Administrative Studies;
 - (e) Department of Philosophy;
 - (f) Pre-professional Studies for the Health Sciences.
- 5. RESUMED consideration of changes to circulation policies recommended by the Library Committee (carried over from the previous meeting), but adjourned (due to lack of a quorum) before completing that consideration.



Trespassing trial

January 18 saw the resumption of the trial of three students charged with trespassing in the Schmon Tower lobby last spring. At the outset of the trial, the council for the prosecution suggested that the charges against two of the students, Mr.M.Wilking and Ms.B.Blashill be dropped as neither had been arraigned. Despite Mr.Wilking's passionate objections, the charges were dropped and Lucy Hodgson alone stood trial. The defense presented on behalf of Ms. Hodgson by Mr.C.McNair, a member of the local Marxist Leninist party, proved so lengthy that the trial will have to be continued on February 8.

Employment outlook brighter

According to a survey undertaken recently by the Ottawa-based Pay Research Bureau of the Staff Relations Board of the Public Service of Canada, 1985 university and college graduates face brighter employment prospects than their predecessors. The 89 industrial organizations surveyed - including major companies, banks and utilities, plan to recruit 3,303 graduates in 1985, an increase of 59 percent over 1984.





What do they think of us?

The Council of Ontario Universities has released summary data from a Gallup poll on public attitudes towards university-related matters in Ontario. They discovered that: 41 percent of the respondents wanted government expenditures for the next budget year to at least match inflation, while 44 percent wanted an increase in university funding. Less than 3 percent called for a decrease in funding. When asked about the possibility of reducing the number of Ontario universities. 89 percent stated that they prefer to maintain the present number, or even create more, while only 7 percent were in favor of a decrease. Of those polled, 69 percent felt that students from all occupational backgrounds have an equal chance of getting a higher education in Ontario at this time.

Did you know?



Bette makes her choice

Colleges and Universities Minister Dr. Bette Stephenson recently announced the appointment of a six-member selection committee to recommend to the Minister the award of grants under the University Research Incentive Fund. This committee is composed of senior representatives from industry, the universities and government.

The three-year program which was initially announced in last year's budget, provides \$30 million to be used to support research projects which have potential economic benefit for Ontario and which strengthen the partnership between industry and the universities.

The committee will meet immediately to select projects from those that have been submitted to the Ministry. Announcement of the first awards from the fund is expected before the end of March.

They do it with lasers

Until recently, laser beams were only used in printers manufactured by Xerox corporation, and they cost \$400,000. While their printing qualities were admired, their cost made them inaccessible.

Apple Computing has just announced a laser printer for office use that will cost \$11,000. The machine offers high speed, typeset quality printing.

Library donations

In the current climate of financial restraint, donations to the University Library assume an extra significance.

Financial support from the Harold G. Fox Education Fund has been of long standing. The Library has just received a cheque for \$4,000 from the Fund, its 14th annual donation. The amount received from the Fund since 1971, for purchases for the music collection, totals \$30,000. This sum has enabled the Library to purchase 972 volumes including a copy of the New Grove Dictionary of Music and Musicians, various music series such as the Musica Britannica and the Denkmaler der Tonkunst in Osterreich, and collected editions of the works of Bach, Beethoven, Brahms, Buxtehude, Dufay, Handel, Haydn, Lassus, Mozart, Schubert, Schutz and Sweelinck. In addition, the University Library received last year from the estate of his widow, Mr. Fox's personal library of some 2,700 volumes consisting mainly of history, biography and literature.





More money

(an excerpt from the Feb.18 COU media release) The federal department of finance has announced fiscal transfers to the provinces for post-secondary education averaging 7.37 percent for 1985-86. These are substantially above the levels during the 685 period of constraint. For Ontario, these feceral funds, comprising tax credits and cash transfers, will go up by 7.47 percent. This return to the previous escalator factor represents recognition by the federal government that higher education requires an increase greater thant that necessary to cover inflation. In the view of Ontario universities, the augmented transfers, which are explicitly in support of post-secondary education, provide the Ontario government with considerably more financial flexibility than it has had in recent years.



Any person found in the buildings after midnight (other than those attending scheduled activities and events) may be challenged and asked to produce a Brock ID card and pass. Students without such a pass will be escorted from the building. Persons unable to produce satisfactory identification and authorization may be arrested as trespassers. Any persons who force entrance dorrs and gain entry after official closing will be liable to a more serious charge. We hope that with the full co-operation of all concerned it will not be necessary to lay such charges.

SENATE SYNOPSIS

At its 293rd Meeting, held on Wednesday, February 20th, Senate:

- 1. WELCOMED Ms. Catharine Demczuk as a new Student Senator.
- 2. APPROVED a recommendation of the Secretary of Senate that the election of faculty representatives to Senate take place on Wednesday, March 27th.
- 3. HEARD a report from the President which included the following items:
 - (a) the results of a 1984 survey of Year I students, and
 - (b) the fact that a second report from the space consultants had recommended that the Language Lab be relocated in the Southeast part of Thistle (from the entrance to the link) at an estimated cost of \$277,000.
- 4. APPROVED, on the recommendation of the Committee on Policies and Procedures for Faculty Appointments, the following motions:
 - (a) that Senate recommend to the Board of Trustees that the Faculty Handbook be amended to include the following:

Overload Teaching

In recognition of the possible interference which excessive overload teaching may have on the research or other scholarly obligations of individual instructors and the teaching program, the following principles should apply to the allocation of overload teaching:

- In the course of any one academic year (May 1 to April 30) a full-time faculty member shall normally not teach more than the equivalent of two full courses over and above his/her normal teaching load;
- A full-time faculty member shall normally not teach overload in three successive sessions (i.e., Spring Evening, Summer Day, Fall-Winter); and
- 3. A Dean or Director may further limit, or permit an increase in, the overload teaching accepted by a full-time faculty member. This discretion is exercised subject to normal appeal or grievance procedure.

(b) that Senate request, of both the Board and BUFA, the presence of a Senate-appointed observer at the negotiations between the Domestic Committee and the BUFA Negotiating Committee (recognizing that the observer would be subject to the confidentiality requirements prevailing in the bargaining process), and that this observer report to Senate when deemed appropriate by both parties to the negotiations and at such times as the BUFA negotiating team reports to the BUFA membership.

[Senate subsequently appointed Professor J. A. Moore as Senate Observer-Designate, in the event the request was accepted.]

5. APPROVED, on the recommendation of the Library Committee, the following motion:

> that Senate approve the adoption of the revised Library circulation policies (as appended to Agd. 293-7) for a trial period of one year from the implementation of the online system with the understanding that the Library Committee will review and report back to Senate on the effectiveness of these policies by the end of the trial period.


6. COMMENCED consideration of a motion (presented by two Student Senators) concerning a pass requirement for students who use University facilities after 12:00 midnight, but adjourned (due to a lack of a quorum) at 6:20 p.m. without completing that consideration.


- 1. RECEIVED, for information, the response of the Council of Ontario Universities (COU) to the Report of the Bovey Commission.

- APPOINTED its 1985 Nominating Committee: Mr. R. A. McLeod (Chairman), Dr. A. J. Earp, Professor V. M. Fic, Mrs. C. McMillan, Mr. A. V. Orr, Mr. W. K. Voss.
- 6. APPROVED a request from Senate for the presence of a Senate-appointed observer at the negotiations between the Domestic Committee and the BUFA Negotiating Committee with regard to a Special Plan agreement.
- 7. CHANGED the date of its 1985 Annual Meeting from June 25th to June 18th.

Some important changes

The President has announced a regrouping and realignment of various administrative offices. Information and Liaison and Development and Alumni Affairs are to be incorporated into a new Office of External Relations, of which Mr. Douglas Geddie will be the Director. Mr. John Bird becomes Director of Development and Alumni Affairs and as such will report to Mr.Geddie. Ginny Gilbert, Alumni Officer, will report to Mr.Bird. In announcing the realignment, President Earp expressed the hope that this would allow for a broader range of talents to be brought to bear on the increasingly important areas of Development and Alumni Affairs.

The President also announced that the Office of Part-Time Programs, whose primary responsibilities are the non-credit and extra-sessional programs, will now be associated with the Office of the Registrar. Mr.Roger Reynolds, as Part-Time Programs Officer, will report to the Registrar, Mr.Ron McGraw. These changes take effect immediately.

1985/86 Funding

The University was advised on March 8th of the funding level for the new fiscal year, which begins on May 1. The global increase in government funding will be five percent and tuition fees will go up by a similar amount. The distribution formula will be the same as that in effect in 1984/85. Although recent emrolment growth is heavily discounted, Brock's increase in the grant portion of its revenue is likely to be in excess of eight percent.

Commenting on the announcement, the President said that by comparison with some of the other provinces, this appeared to be quite good news. The increase of 7.4 percent in federal transfers for post-secondary education gave the province some latitude and he hopes that the balance might provide the basis for a more generous capital provision than in recent years. "At Brock, we can look to increases in operating budgets of about five percent, but the amount will not support all of the 23 faculty replacements and additions which have been requested, and are recognized as desirable, so there will have to be some reduction in this total." He noted that since the enrolment growth of recent years has now been assimilated, this would appear to be the last year in which Brock can expect funding significantly in excess of the provincial average.

Good for us!

For the second successive year, Brock University faculty and staff members were honored at the United Way's Recognition and Awards night on Wednesday, February 13. Bob Anderson, Director, Personnel Services accepted the bronze award, presented to organizations in which the average contribution exceeds \$25 and more than 50 percent of the employees contribute. The total contribution by Brock University faculty and staff was \$22,627.20, which comes to an average of \$35 per employee - an increase of 25 percent over

1983 and a record for Brock. The University and Ridley College were the only organizations within the educational division to be so recognized.

Dean Yakowar, host

Dean Maurice Yakowar is the host of the Film International series currently being shown by TV Ontario. Six award-winning films from around the world are being broadcast on Monday evenings at 9pm during March and April.

Board membership

The nominating committee of the Board of Trustees is charged with bringing forward to the Annual Meeting of the Board of Trustees in June 1985, a slate of nominations for (a) vacancies on the Board existing at that date and (b) replacements for trustees retiring from the Board on June 30, 1985. This slate is restricted to lay memberships on the Board since faculty and student memberships are filled through Senate and student elections respectively. It is expected that there will be four or five new lay trustees elected in June 1985.

The Nominating Committee invites the names and addresses of persons considered appropriate for membership on the Board. The Committee will be pleased to give full consideration to all nominations for pre-sentation to the Board in June. Note that the Committee is asking only for suggestions. Please do not approach individuals on this matter nor make any promises with respect to possible election. The Nominating Committee normally has an extensive list of suggestions and only a few vacancies. Suggested names and addresses should be forwarded in writing, no later than March 29, to the Chairman, Nominating Committee, Board of Trustees, c/o Secretary to the University, ST 1303.

Applications for COE Dean closed


SENATE SYNOPSIS

Senate's 294th meeting, held on Wednesday, March 20th, was unusually brief (35 minutes). Nevertheless, Senate:

- 1. RECEIVED communications from BUFA and the Board of Trustees regarding the Senate request for an observer at the Special Plan negotiations. Both parties have agreed and the observer (Professor J.A. Moore) has begun attending the meetings.
- 2. HEARD a report from the Vice-President (as Acting President) which included the following items:
 - a) The Province has announced a 5% increase in global funding for 1985-86 (this will provide Brock with an operating grant increase in excess of 7%); and
 - b) The latest application statistics show a relatively static situation at the system level (-0.9%) and a marginal drop for Brock (-3%).
- 3. APPROVED, on the reommendation of the Rules Committee, changes to the terms of reference of the Senate Committee on Graduate Studies and Research in the form of amendments to FHB II: 9.11.1. The changes clarified the current role and function of the Committee.
- 4. APPROVED, also on the recommendation of the Rules Committee, changes to FHB II: 3 ("Elected Faculty Representatives to Senate") in order to allow the Secretary of Senate to make a public declaration of the election results "at the earliest convenient date".
- 5. APPROVED, on the recommendation of Standing, Examinations and Promotions, an amendment to FHB III: 7 ("Academic Standing") with regard to re-admission to the Pre-Service Program of the College of Education.
- 6. APPROVED, also on the recommendation of SEP, amendments to FHB III: 6.3 ("System of Numerical Grades") such that a P1 (Pass-First Class), P2 (Pass-Second Class) and P3 (Pass) grading scheme will apply to the Pre-Service (as well as the In-Service) courses in the College of Education.

The VISA 499 students, under the supervision of Prof.Merijean Morrissey-Clayton, are working on this project as part of their honors thesis.

The \$8,000 grant from the Canada Council will bring four Ontario artists to our campus this week. Among them will be Brock alumnus, Rob Kirley. A \$1,000 grant from Wintario will be used to further the scope of this display, which will run until April 26. Many thanks to Kim, Jyoti and Prof.Morrissey-Clayton, for bringing this interesting display to our campus.

Maths and Sciences NSERC grants

The Division of Maths and Sciences has received the following grants from NSERC for 1985:

Operating grants- \$731,459 Equipment grants- \$152,368 Travel grants- \$3,581 The total of grants received by Maths and Sciences is now \$887,408.

COMPUTER POLICY COMMITTEE

PUBLIC MEETING

Since early this academic year, a special President's Committee on Computer Policy has been meeting in order to begin formulating a vision of the future role of computing here at Brock. Right from the beginning, it has been apparent to the committee that recent developments in computer technology will radically reshape the face of every university. The four dramatizations which follow illustrate our view of what the future has to offer. Further, we have actively begun to formulate a plan in order to assure that Brock can adapt to these changing times and offer the most up-to-date facilities to its students, faculty, and staff.

In order to familiarize the University community with our thinking on these matters, the President's Computer Policy Committee, in conjunction with the Academic User's Subcommittee, wishes to invite all interested faculty and staff to a meeting to be held in the Alumni Lounge on Monday, April 15, at 12:00 Noon. Coffee and donuts will be available. At that time we will present our views and announce the details of an external review of the state of computing resources at Brock as well as the creation of a group for the exploration of the future of computing at Brock. If you are interested in the future of computing at Brock, you should attend this meeting in order to find out what is happening and have an opportunity to voice your opinion. The Professor Writes a Research Paper

She sits in her office, using her microcomputer workstation to connect with the departmental computing system on which data from recent laboratory experiments are stored. The data had been collected by a laboratory computer and transmitted to a file on the departmental machine. She selects and moves some data to a file on her workstation and does some preliminary analysis using a statistical software package. Deciding that more elaborate study is required, she transfers the complete set of data from the departmental computer to the large computer in the Academic Computing Centre to complete the analysis.

Having completed the statistics, and satisfied that a report of the results can now be written, she prepares a draft using the word-processing software at her workstation, incorporating the results of the statistical analyses in tabular and graphic forms. While writing, she gains access to the library's computer-based catalogue, searches it for recent relevant papers, and reads pertinent abstracts and, in some cases, complete articles from her workstation screen.

She transmits the completed first draft, along with a message asking for comments, over the public data network to a colleague at the University of British Columbia. She receives a constructively critical reply from her colleague next day and, accordingly, rewrites the paper. After some further communication with her colleague, she completes the paper and sends it by electronic mail to an appropriate journal. A few weeks later, she receives electronic mail from the editor indicating that the paper has been accepted for publication, subject to some minor alterations suggested by the reviewers. Within an hour, she revises the manuscript and electronically sends the paper back to the journal. The completed manuscript is immediately made available to the academic community in North America via international communications networks, and is published in the journal. Some time later, the paper is modified and incorporated with others into a book, which is printed using the University's phototypesetter.

The professor was enjoying the opportunity, heretofore impossible, for immediate and intimate contact with her peers nationally and internationally; and she was relieved to be able to avoid the drudgery and unproductive delays that previously had accompanied the publication of research reports.

A Third-Year Student Does a Project

A third-year student is given the most demanding project in his university career. He has a choice of three topics, the details of which are given on an electronic "bulletin board" located on one of the University's central computers, to which he gains access through his portable microcomputer in his room in residence. The message on the bulletin board outlines the nature of the projects, suggests references, and asks that a topic be selected within a week.

Using his workstation, the student makes access to the relevant library database, obtains abstracts of the references, and decides on a project involving detailed statistical analyses of selected survey data. He has not done statistics in more than a year, so he searches the library of computerbased courses as the Computing Centre. Three seem to relevant, so he sends an electronic memo to an advisor, asking which is suitable. The advisor replies promptly, and the student loads the lessons from the Centre onto a disk in his microcomputer.

The next weekend he goes home, taking along his microcomputer, and does the refresher course in his spare time. When he returns to the University, he consults with his advisor to clarify details and get advice on appropriate software for the analysis. His advisor suggests the Statistical Package for the Social Sciences (SPSS) software on which there is a one-day seminar at the Academic Computer Centre.

The next few months' work involves much reading, and several analyses using SPSS. The student then drafts his report using the word-processing software on his workstation. He uses the spelling program to identify his spelling and typing errors; he also uses a program, which he borrowed, to search his prose for obvious grammatical errors.

Realizing that coloured graphics would enhance the report, he seeks help from an advisor in the Computing Centre who shows him how to use the graphics software and hardware to convert his tabular results into graphic form. He then moves the draft document from his workstation file to the central computing system where he incorporates the statistics and graphics and has the final document printed using the laser printer.

By electronic mail, he notifies his professor that an outline of the completed project can be read from a file on the central computing system, and that he will deliver the completed project to the professor's office that afternoon.

A Dean's Working Day

The dean arrives at his office and turns on his workstation; he has a luncheon appointment and a meeting of the Budget Committee in the afternoon. After checking his electronic mailbox, he responds immediately to most messages and acknowledges the others, passing them on to colleagues for action. A note from the Faculty's academic counsellor requires a decision on a student's eligibility for admission to an honors program. He calls up the central student record file on his screen, examines the student's academic record, and then uses the Faculty's local computing system to examine the academic counselling office's records of interviews. Requiring the exact text of a Senate regulation, he retrieves the regulation from the appropriate database on the central computing system and satisfies himself that his interpretation is correct. A few minutes later, his decision is relayed electronically to the academic counsellor and is stored in the counselling file.

When "old fashioned" mail arrives, he dictates responses to some and then turns to preparing for the afternoon's meeting at which the three-year expenditure forecast will be discussed. The Faculty's global expenditure targets and guidelines were distributed electronically last week, and the dean has already incorporated the data into a worksheet using his financial modelling software at his workstation. He now assembles several expenditure alternatives for the Faculty, department by department, attempting to meet each department's demands and balance the budget at the same time. He finally decides on three alternatives and saves them for the meeting. He also recalls the previous two years' budget information and puts those in his workstation file, and goes to lunch.

At the budget meeting, he presents the alternatives he has devised, using the conference room's large display monitor which connects with his workstation. Some members are not entirely satisfied, and want to try their own ideas. The dean complies, using the financial modelling software, but the process extends the meeting by 30 minutes. He realizes that this live, interactive computing facility is a mixed blessing.

Back at his office, he prepares the agreed-upon budget forecast using document-preparation software, and is able to include the tables from the spreadsheet file, plus some graphs of recent trends in expenditures. He sends the draft and a covering memo to the other committee members via the computer network, and then goes home carrying some reading material and his portable workstation in case he wants to make notes. Both students agree that, based on their first six months' experience, they are pleased with their decision to attend Brock, they are particularly satisfied with the range of available facilities and services in information processing.

One student, doing research on chemical structure, became very familiar with the use of computers during his undergraduate program, and realizes the importance of the technology in his field. He chose Brock not only because it has a first-class Department of Chemistry, but also because it has excellent computing facilities and services. His research requires very powerful scientific processing facilities, databases on the structure of compounds, and high-resolution graphics capabilities. All are available on the University's computing network through either his laboratory workstation or his microcomputer at home. He makes extensive use of special facilities, such as the array processor, as well as general-purpose software packages for preparing documents and for statistical analyses. He also uses the electronic mail and conferencing facilities to communicate with others in his discipline.

The other student came to Brock with little experience in computing, but had been attracted by the University's expertise in Indian philosophy. Since arriving, she has become proficient beyond her expectations in using the computer to survey computer-based catalogues both at Brock and at Universities around the world for relevant literature. She began using a friend's world-processing system after being impressed by the ease with which her peers prepared and edited papers. She soon became a disciple and sought advice from consultants in the Computing Centre about purchasing a suitable workstation. They told her what central software and hardware were available and advised that she acquire some document-handling software that could accommodate foreign languages. She attended some introductory computing classes and chose some computer-based instructional material to learn how to use the software. With this assistance, she was soon using the computing facilities competently and confidently.

She is now in the midst of a major analysis of the Philosophy of Jainism and is planning to improve her knowledge of the Hindu language using computer-based instructional facilities.

Student grants-loan budget increased

The Ontario Student Assistance Program will total \$135 million this year, an inof \$7.5 million crease over last year. This increase will offset the recently announced five percent hike in tuition fees and other costs faced by students. The Ontario Student Assistance Program provides loans and grants to students attending approved post-secondary colleges, universities and private vocational schools. It is composed of six plans, four of which are funded under the Canada Student Loans

program by the Secretary of State. It is expected that 112,000 students will receive assistance from OSAP this year.



SENATE

SENATE SYNOPSIS

At its 295th meeting, held on Wednesday, April 23rd, Senate:

- 1. HEARD a report from the President which included the following items:
 - a) The School of Physical Education and Recreation will, as of July 1, 1985, be re-organized into three departments: Physical Education; Recreation and Leisure Studies; and Athletics and Services (the latter being a non-academic department); and
 - b) A proposed new design for the University's diplomas was presented for Senate's information.
- 2. APPROVED, on the recommendation of the Committee on Policies and Procedures for Faculty Appointments, changes to FHB I: 1.9. (now to be called "Appointment/Reappointment of Senior Academic Officers") such that procedures are specified for Vice-Presidents and Directors of Schools.
- 3. APPROVED, on the recommendation of the Commitee on Academic Policy, the following changes to FHB III: 4.4.2 ["Distribution Requirement ('Core and Context')]:
 - a) An addition to sub-section A which reads: "These courses are intended to ensure breadth in a student's overall program and to acquaint the student with the critical interests, concerns and approaches of the three major discipline areas"; and
 - b) A new sub-section B which reads:


"Courses which qualify for contextual standing must meet the following criteria:

- Contextual courses in the Sciences study the principles by which the physical world operates, in order to understand the present technical basis of our civilization.
- Contextual courses in the Social Sciences study people in their social interaction, which implies some study of the content and methods of the social sciences.

- 3. Contextual courses in the Humanities study the introspective and imaginative life of mankind - which implies the study of cultural, intellectual and artistic ideas, both past and present, from the humanities perspective.
 - a) Each course offered as a Humanities context elective must provide not only an introduction to the critical thinking of a humanities discipline but also a broad introduction to basic issues and/or significant works of the human heritage.
 - b) Each course offered as a Humanities context elective must include a significant essay component and an integral seminar component (or laboratory, in the case of the language courses).
 - c) Humanities contextual offerings should be at the introductory level (i.e., numbered in the 100-199 range). However, a student who is sufficiently experienced in a language other than English may meet his/her humanities requirement with an upper-level literature course in that language, with the approval of the instructor and the Dean of the Division of Humanities. Acceptable language courses must include a significant literature component.
 - d) In all Humanities context courses a diagnostic writing test will be given within the first two weeks of classes. Departments will determine how this marking will be shared. Students who fall short of a reasonable level of literacy will be required to complete the remedial workshop with Counselling Services. Instructors may inform students that their later work will not be marked if they do not complete this workshop.
- 4. TABLED a resolution which would have deleted PHIL 191 from the list of Social Science contextual offerings.
- 5. RECEIVED a progress report from the <u>Ad Hoc</u> Committee on Gender Discrimination which did not contain any recommendations.

Our Spring 1985 honorary graduates

This year, three outstanding Canadians will be honored at the Brock University Spring convocation on June 7.

Father Sean O'Sullivan, a Brock alumnus well known for both his political career and his work with the Catholic church, will receive his Doctor of Laws, Honoris Causa at the 10:30am ceremony and will address the convocation.

Two honorary degrees will be granted at the 2:30pm ceremony. Mr. Peter Harris, Director of the Rodman Hall Arts Centre will receive the Honorary Doctor of Laws in recognition of his contributions to the cultural life of the Niagara region. A second degree will be presented to Mr. Lynn Williams, International President of the United Steel Workers of America. In addition to his work with the U.S.W., Mr. Williams was active in the founding of Brock University. Mr. Williams will address the afternoon convocation.

The end of a long story

The trial of Lucy Hodgson, the Brock student charged with failure to leave the premises on April 4, 1984, came to an end on May 3 when Justice Scott handed down his decision. In summary, it was ruled that: the University had been entitled to act as it had in regulating the use of the Schmon Tower lobby; the police had been Volume 23, number 18 16 May, 1985

entitled to arrest Ms.Hodgson for failure to leave the premises; there was no basis on which to found a charge that Ms. Hodgson's rights to freedom of expression had been infringed; there was no evidence to indicate that the content of Ms.Hodgson's paper had any bearing on her being asked to leave; the defendant was not guilty as sufficient evidence had been produced by various members of the faculty and BUSU to indicate that Ms.Hodgson was unaware that she was violating the University's rules.

Justice Scott commented that, in his opinion, the affair had swelled out of proportion.





Athletics and the COU

A special meeting of the Council of Ontario Universities was held recently to discuss the report of the Special Committee on Intercollegiate Athletics. Council endorsed the underlying philosophy of the report and the five principles that embody it : that academic authorities be responsible for athletic policy, that the same academic standards apply to all students, that there be equal opportunity for men and women in athletics, that there should be an institutional commitment to interuniversity antletics and that no institution should offer first party awards. The recommendations dealing with elegibility for student participation in inter-university athletics - namely that the students meet minimum admission standards and exhibit continuing satisfactory academic performance, were endorsed.

Council agreed that there should continue to be two interuniversity athletic leagues, one for men and one for women. The ladies on the switchboard would like to remind us that summer hours begin Monday, June 3 and run until Friday, August 30. The hours are: Monday - Friday: 8am - 5pm.

SENATE SYNOPSIS


At its 296th meeting (the last meeting of the 1984-85 Senate), held on Wednesday, April 23rd, Senate:

- 1. HEARD a report from the President that included the following items:
 - a) The Capital funding announcement (\$10.5 million for the system) included \$395,000 for Brock but nothing for the relocation of the Language Lab (which had thus been postponed for at least a year) while the Allocative announcement (ten days into the fiscal year) had contained "no surprises";
 - b) The Ontario Council on University Affairs (OCUA) had advised the Minister that funding should be provided for students registered at the Concordia Lutheran Theological Seminary (beginning with 1985-86 enrolment), but unless adjustments are made to the Operating Grants Formula this will represent only \$45,000 annual income (after three years); and
 - c) A special meeting of COU (Council of Ontario Universities) held on May 21st had considered the report of the Council's Special Committee on InterUniversity Athletics and Senate approval will be sought for a number of thrusts in the report.
- 2. APPROVED, on the recommendation of the Academic Program Committee, changes to the following programs:
 - (a) School of Administrative Studies;
 - (b) Canadian Studies Program;
 - (c) Department of Computer Science and Information Processing;
 - (d) Department of Economics;
 - (e) Department of Fine Arts;
 - (f) Department of Geography;
 - (g) Department of Physics; and
 - (h) Department of Romance Studies.

- APPROVED, on the joint recommendation of SEP and GS&R, the awarding of 1,104 degrees at Spring Convocation (356 BAs, 133 BScs, 312 BEds, 71 BPhEds, 65 BAdmins, 51 BBEs, 28 BRLSs, 5 MAs, 16 MScs, 63 MEds and 4 MDivs).
- 4. APPROVED, at the request of the Coordinator of the Child Studies Program, a restriction on CHST 340 such that the course will be open only to Child Studies majors.
- 5. APPROVED, after extensive discussion, a motion sponsored by Professors Sadava and Lordahl, in the following amended form:
 - a) That it is recommended strongly that the Classics program for 1985-86 be funded as approved by Senate, this funding to include the two overload stipends free of enrolment minima; and
 - b) That the Committee on Academic Policy be asked to examine the process by which changes may be made in courses or programs after approval by APC and Senate and be asked to report its findings to Senate at a Fall meeting.







Brock touched by air tragedy



And the results are in....

Two swimmers with Brock affiliations qualified for the 1985 Canada Games at the selection meet held here recently. Jennifer Smith was selected on the 400M freestyle third place finish, but was the first eligible finalist. Her time of 4:24.95 was the seventh fastest time in Canada this year. Brian Wasylowich won the 1500M freestyle 16:14.47, tying the seveth fastest 1500M time in the country this year.

Jennifer, Brian, David Shemilt and Emile Morrissette will compete at the Canadian swimming championships in Montreal, July 31-August 3 and all are eligible to be selected either to the Pan-Pacific Games team or the World University Games team. The training camp for the Canada Games Team will be held in Sudbury in August, followed later in the month by the competition in St. John, New Brunswick.

Emile Morrisette, an alternate for selection, could advance to the Canada Games should others in his event be selected for either of the two meets in Japan.



The Library's copy of Robert Bruford's Description of a View of the Falls of Niagara Now Exhibiting at the Panorama...(1833) has been lent to the Corcoran Gallery of Art, Washington D.C. for the exhibit "Niagara: Two centuries of changing attitudes 1697-1901", currently showing at the Albright-Knox Art Gallery in Buffalo until September 1. This twelve page pamphlet contains an all-embracing single view of Niagara Falls from the Canadian bank, probably the most realistic representation of the local landscape composed during the second quarter of the nineteenth century. Rhodes scholarships

Information and application form for Rhodes scholarships are now available from the Office of the Deans of Humanities and Social Sciences. Tenable at Oxford, normally for two years but a maximum of three is possible, commencing in October 1986 these scholarships are of interest to senior students born between October 1, 1961 and October 1, 1967 who have completed at least three years of university training by October 1, 1985. Students may not apply directly but must do so through a faculty member with knowledge of their capabilities and character. Faculty members wishing to nominate students should do so in the first instance to the Dean or Director of the appropriate school or division who in turn will forward suitable applications to the Vice President. Library borrowers - register!

All faculty, graduate students and staff who borrow material from the University Library are requested to register in the new automated system. Registration consists of the completion of a form and the affixing of a barcode label to your University I.D. card.

If your I.D. card is lost or damaged you should first obtain a new one from the Instructional Media Centre. All borrowers must have a valid I.D. card in order to sign out books. Occasionally, a book you want to sign out may not yet have a barcode label in it. This will require Circulation staff to create a record in the computer and attach a lable to the item before signing it out. This may initially cause the signing out of books to take a little longer than usual. However, once borrowers are registered and all books are labelled, the process will be much faster than the old manual system. In the meantime, your patience and cooperation will be much appreciated.

Chemistry

The Arctic Research Establishment of Pond Inlet, North West Territories, has been awarded a contract to study the chemical variations in sea ice. Part of this contract involved the purchase of a \$40,000 ion chromatograph which will be used to determine sodium, potassium, sulfate and chloride concentrations in the ice. Calcium and magnesium will be determined by the D.C. Plasma Optical Emission Spectrometer which was acquired through a BILD grant two years ago. The contract, from the federal department of supplies and services, totalled close to \$100,000 and included costs for collection of samples expressed in terms of skidoo-man-days. As part of the program, Ian Brindle, senior demonstrator, spent the last two weeks in May in Pond Inlet consulting on sampling methods and on chemical oceanographic measurements. Sarahme Akoomalik, a technician at the Arctic Research Establishment, spent five weeks at Brock being trained in the laboratory practice of chemical oceanography. This resulted from a \$5000 grant to Ms. Akoomalik from the Association of Canadian Universities for



The newest numbers

The Registrar's Office has announced that preliminary enrolment statistics indicate a small increase in all undergraduate categories with the exception of foreign students.

First year full time enrolment is 1321 compared to 1278 a year ago, an increase of three percent. Total full time enrolment has reached 4463, up from 4267 in 1984, an increase of four and a half percent. A total of 3197 students are registered part time, an increase of 106 over last year. Foreign student enrolment decreased to 57 in first year, a drop from last year's figure of 98. Total foreign student enrolment is down from 331 to 280. The College of Education pre-service program has 306 students enrolled, 45 of whom are from the concurrent

BA/BEd Child Studies program.






BOARD BRIEF

The University Library's copy of The Canadian Encyclopedia arrived recently and is available for consultation in the Reference Department (REF FC 23 C36 1985). Published by Hurtig Publishers Inc., with assistance from the Government of Alberta, it is described as "the first comprehensive reference work on modern Canada and its people. Its three volumes, 2,090 pages contain over 8,000 entries from "A Marie usque ad Mare" to "Zurakowski", including topics of particular Canadian character such as ice hockey, bush flying, false face society, ice worms and birchbark biting. A number of Brock University faculty members were involved in the Encyclopedia project. Amongst its 250 consultants was *Prof. J. Jackson*, Department of Geography and the following were among the list of 2,500 contributors: *G.Dirks, K.Kernaghan, W.Matheson*, Politics; *P.Dirks*, History; *R.Knapton*, Biology; *H.Gayler* and *J.Jackson*, Geography; *M.J.Miller*, Fine Arts; *J.Terasmae*, Geology; *V.Tomovic*, Sociology.

Future plans for the Encyclopedia include a french language edition to be published in 1987 and a machinereadable version, with immediate updates, which will be available on personal computers via communications networks or on video laser discs.







Chemists hit a triple

Three NSERC strategic grants to members of the Chemistry Department were announced this week. Bert Holland has been awarded a \$42,220 operating grant and a \$18,035 equipment grant in the biotechnology competition. The grant is for an investigation of the biotransformation of prostanoid precursors, with the aim of identifying new methods of producing prostaglandin hormones economically. The equipment grant will be used to purchase an automatic digital polarimeter to characterise the structures of the prostaglandin hormones and other biologically important molecules.

Jack Miller was awarded a \$29,000 operating grant in the industrial materials and processes competition to investigate, "metal extraction and recovery via phosphine chemicals". The research will involve the development of new methods for measuring and characterising the complexes formed between metals in solution and phosphine chemicals manufactured locally by Cyanamid Canada, and their application to metal recovery for the mining and metallurgy industries for waste recovery and for pollution control.


SENATE SYNOPSIS





SENATE SYNOPSIS

At its 300th meeting, held on Wednesday, November 20th, Senate:

- 1. APPROVED, on the recommendation of Standing, Examinations and Promotions, the following motion concerning Progress Examinations:
 - a) That the Registrar no longer notify students of their compulsory Progress Examination results.
 - b) That Progress Examination grades no longer be reported to the Registrar and that it be the responsibility of the department to notify the students of their Progress Examination results no later than the end of the first week in the second half of the course.
 - c) That the Registrar is to be notified by the departments of students who have failed a Progress Examination, no later then the end of the first week in the second half of the course. The Registrar shall tabulate these data and contact those students who have failed three or more Progress Examinations and/or first-term half-courses.
- 2. APPROVED, also on the recommendation of SEP, amendments to FHB III: 5.2 and 5.3 arising from the above. These were as follows:
 - 5.2.8 Report to Faculty (New Section)

At the earliest possible opportunity after April Examinations have been written, the Registrar will provide, to Deans, Directors and Department Chairmen, the following statistical information:

- a) the distribution of Grade 13 averages for students entering Year I;
- b) for 100-level courses final grades average %; and
- c) for 100-level courses final grade distribution report by course.

5.3.4 Transmission of Grades

Departments shall notify students of their compulsory Progress Examination results no later than the end of the first week in the second half of the course. The marked Progress Examination scripts shall be returned as soon as possible, indicating the numerical grades for each answer and for the paper as a whole.

Departments shall notify the Registrar no later than the end of the first week in the second half of the course of those students who have failed a Progress Examination. The Registrar shall tabulate these data and contact those students who have failed three or more Progress Examinations and/or first-term half-courses.

If grades for Progress Examinations are posted, they shall be done by student number only.

5.3.5 Report to Faculty


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3. APPROVED, on the recommendation of Rules Committee, changes to FHB II: 3.1 and 4.1 such that the Director of Physical Education and Recreation became an <u>ex-officio</u> Senate-appointed member of Senate and the number of elected faculty members of Senate was increased to nineteen (from eighteen).

As a result of the change to 3.1, the faculty member standing next in the poll to those elected at the last regular election (Professor D.J.F. Hughes, Department of Computer Science & Information Processing) was declared elected to Senate.

- 4. APPROVED, on the recommendation of Rules Committee, changes to FHB II: 7.1 such that:
 - a) there will be a normal two-hour limit on Senate meetings (previously this was stipulated as 5:30 p.m. - a 7 1/2 hour limit on Senate meetings that began at 10:00 a.m.); and
 - b) the order of business for Senate meetings has been changed to put "Unfinished business from the last meeting" <u>before</u> reports of Standing or Special committees.

This number of COU Briefing Notes is an edited transcription of a panel discussion recorded on 23 October and broadcast by CBC TV on the evening of 26 October. On October 17, in the course of National Universities Week, the Minister of Colleges and Universities, the Hon. Gregory Sorbara, had announced the establishment of a University Excellence Fund of \$50 million for allocation in 1986-87. The fund was intended to address needs in three areas: \$10 m for faculty renewal, \$15 m for research leadership, and \$25 m for library enhancement and instructional equipment.

Susan Harrada: We're here at Ryerson Polytechnical Institute in downtown Toronto to talk about our universities. National Universities Week is just winding up and it has given us a chance to think about our universities and what they mean to us; who should go to them, who should pay for them, and how they should be run. We have to ask these questions because universities are facing a crisis after ten years of underfunding. To help us find some of those answers tonight are a panel, Gregory Sorbara, Minister of Colleges & Universities, Dr. George Connell, President of the University of Toronto, Dr. Ken Davey, Vice-President Designate of York University, Dr. Brian Segal, President of Ryerson, Dr. Bernard Shapiro, Director of the Ontario Institute for Studies in Education, and Betty Smith, Chairperson of the governing council of the Ontario College of Art.

Mr. Sorbara, the first question to you. We would like to talk first about priorities. Your government says post-secondary education is a high priority. But when the government talks to doctors it says health care is a high priority. The government also says social welfare is a high priority. So just where does education stand on your government's list of priorities?

Hon. G. Sorbara: Well, Susan, I think what is indicative of the priority that post-secondary education has in the province is that the Premier decided in forming his cabinet to have a Minister of Colleges and Universities. I think that's a signal. Our recent University Excellence Fund is another signal. Now if you want me to tell you whether post-secondary education is a higher priority than say health or social services, I don't think we are in that game. I think it's clear, the actions of our government have made it clear, and will continue to make clear that post-secondary education is a very high priority.

Susan Harrada: Dr. Connell, there are those who say universities are like the proverbial "black hole", we keep pouring money in, you keep saying you need more. You are already getting about \$1.2 billion. Why should universities get any more than that?

Dr. George Connell: I don't think the universities are a "black hole", Susan. I think it's possible to estimate fairly accurately how much money they do need to do the job that they've set out to do and that is expected of them. My understanding of the Minister and his government is that they have committed themselves to maintaining access for all students who want to attend universities. The fact is, though, that that costs money. If those students are to have an experience of high quality, which I believe is the Minister's intention, then it's clear that someone has to pay the bill.

Susan Harrada: Dr. Segal, who do you think should be paying for our universities? Should the public keep paying the bill when not every taxpayer has gone or will go to university? Or should we be looking at some sort of increase in tuition, the user paying more?

Dr. Brian Segal: I think first of all the question of taxpayers paying for university when not everybody goes to university is akin to the question of government expenditures in the area of agriculture. Not everybody is a farmer, but everybody certainly benefits indirectly from subsidies to the agricultural community. Many of us would not have enough to eat on the table that was Canadian produced if we didn't have those subsidies, so they are really indirect benefits. I would argue essentially that's the same case with universities, that there are major benefits to all areas of our society as a result of research conducted in universities and as a result of the skills and knowledge that our graduates have and that they bring with them to the private sector and the public sector upon graduation.

My view has always been that student fees can gradually go up. They are currently about 17% of operating. I think they can go up over time to 25%, *only* if the student assistance programmes go up and are reformed and are improved, so that no one who does not have the income will be denied access to any university, if they have the grades to get in.

Susan Harrada: Dr. Davey, should the private sector perhaps be paying a little more?

Dr. Ken Davey: There is clear evidence, I think, that the private sector, that industry, is willing to enter into partnerships with universities to help the universities accomplish both their ends and accomplish some things that industry is interested in.

Susan Harrada: Yet there are also questions about the effect private sector may have on campus life. People are wondering, will it turn the campus into simply a

branch plant for corporations or a training ground for the private sector?

Dr. Ken Davey: Here I presume you are referring to the initiatives which my own university has taken, and I think that has to be approached very gingerly. I'm very excited about it, because I've seen it operate to good effect on a small scale. The scheme basically visualizes carefully selected industries coming onto campus and, in effect, mixing in with our own faculty. It increases very rapidly the level of activity in a particular area, serves as a role model for the students saying "yes, industry is interesting", which is one of the difficulties we have in Canadian education.

Susan Harrada: Dr. Segal, do you believe we run the risk of turning our campuses into training grounds and perhaps leaving behind those students who are there to learn?

Dr. Brian Segal: Oh, not at all. First of all, I think it has to be understood that in our case, at least, industry doesn't come to us with a range of projects they want to do here. We go to them for projects that we have decided internally would be appropriate in terms of our educational mandate. And there are enormous safeguards, certainly in my institution and I know in all the other institutions, that guard academic freedom, that guard curriculum design. In our experience and my experience with the private sector I have never once encountered a situation where there has been any interest in determining curriculum.

Susan Harrada: Betty Smith, I want to ask you about tenure. Should we be thinking about eliminating tenure in order to save money or perhaps open up new jobs for a new generation of teachers with new ideas?

Betty Smith: Well, I think, Susan, you have hit a very crucial issue because certainly salaries represent a very high percentage of the costs of the universities. On the other hand, the studies that have been done of tenure, and those that have considered other options and other alternatives, have indicated that probably it's the best system we have at the moment. I would argue, personally, that what is missing in the tenure system is some evaluation system by peers and by students in the population, and I think that any organization that guarantees life-long employment to anybody, who in fact is not performing in an effective way in that organization, has little justification for that kind of position in this sort of an economy. I think that the universities, when they are having difficulty expanding and are curtailed in terms of revenues, need desperately to bring some new blood into the organizations, because four or five years from now, certainly we are going to be facing some very serious problems and if the organization is not renewing itself from inside, then it soon stops doing the job that society wants to have done and, I would argue, the job that the faculty in the university themselves want to do.

Susan Harrada: Minister Sorbara, one last question for you. It's really not a question. Is there anything you would like to say in response to anything any members of our panel have said?

Hon. G. Sorbara: A lot of very important issues have been raised. I think the point to be made here, particularly during National Universities Week, is that the challenges for post-secondary education over the next short and long term are very substantial indeed. We are looking at a very new world. A world of international competition, competition for intelligence and, really, our challenge in this province and in this country is to take a kind of a quantum leap, to realize that the expansion of the intellectual capacity of the province and of the country is a crucial component to our success and international success over the next decade, twenty years, thirty years and onward into the future.

Susan Harrada: We have an audience here tonight of students, faculty and members of the community and we'd like to open it up now to the floor for questions.

Member of audience: One of the things that quite disturbed me when your original commentary began was the notion that students can continue to pay almost ad infinitem. It's been quite a burden for me to pay. I wondér to what extent the various presidents here and the Minister himself have taken into account the burden that students, who are going to be graduating now as opposed to eight years ago when I graduated, are going to have to pay.

Hon. G. Sorbara: There is for our graduates, both graduates who are just completing a four year programme and those that go beyond to a post-graduate programme, a very substantial debt load for many to carry at the end of their programmes. There's no magic to it. If one had the funds and if this government can provide the funds for enhancing the Student Assistance Programme, then that burden will be less. I don't think we will ever completely eliminate it, but you know I think we have to take some steps. Our government is having a look now at the entire Student Assistance Programme to see where it can be improved and to see to what extent we can enhance both the grant and the loan portion, so that burden is slightly easier.

Dr. B. Shapiro: I think that the value or the benefits of an education are two-fold. One is to the society and of course one is to the individual involved. I think to ask that individual to therefore bear some of the burden is not asking something unreasonable and the notion of twenty or twenty-five percent didn't seem to me a bad idea, although all those figures are somewhat arbitrary. Much more important, however, is the fact that even when one goes to free tuition, one still finds that the university populations are made up of students from certain classes of society and many, many other classes are very under-represented, even when tution doesn't cost anything, even when you get a grant in addition to free tuition. So I think one of the things we might start thinking about is what kind of incentives or what kind of programmes can we develop that will encourage students to apply from a wider range of social and economic groups than we currently have represented.

Ryerson student: Thousands of students in Ontario rely heavily on the OSAP Ontario Student Assistance Programme. The incidental fees at Ryerson are fairly high, students have to pay more for their access after school hours; our photo art students have to pay more per term. Incidental fees can help or hurt us as well, because our library is closed on Sunday, has bankers' hours on the weekend and on Friday, it's not open when we need it. The incidental fees are too high; if we want the library open, for example, we have to pay more and that's not fair. We shouldn't have to pay more to get the hours we need.

Susan Harrada: Dr. Segal, do you have a response to that?

Dr. B. Segal: Well, I was certainly hoping that you might come my way on that one. I think there's no question that I share my colleague's concern about the library hours and yes, that is a very specific function of budget restrictions, there's no question about that. I think the incidental fee question is not a question simply of the institution deciding that we will charge more money. Incidental fees relate to course-felated costs, so that in film and photography for example, if a student shoots a tree a hundred times or he shoots a tree ten times, the cost of film is going to different, and so I think the insue of incidental fees is more complex. I don't want the impression to be left that there is some bogeyman that sits up nights thinking about all of these very large fees that we can inflict on the students.

Hon. G. Sorbara: It is in effect a way of allowing institutions to increase tuition fees without suffering any penalty with respect to operating grants and it differs from institution to institution. I have asked the Ontario Council on University Affairs to make it a top priority, advising me on how we ought to handle incidental fees. I expect to hear from them in the very near future and then we'll make some sort of decision about it. I understand the problem, though.

Dale Hall: I am here speaking on behalf of the Graduate Students Association of York University. We are all a little bit concerned about how far are we prepared to go with this private sector funding.

Hon. G. Sorbara: I don't think we are moving towards an era where we expect the private sector to fund our universities. I think what we are trying to do, one of the areas that we have to explore, is a closer relationship between other sectors in our community and the university community, and that's not just business. It's researchers that have operated outside of the university community; it's our cultural community; it's our artistic community, our social community. In other words we are trying to encourage universities to be expansive rather than exist behind very high walls.

Susan Harrada: Dr. Davey, perhaps you have something to add to that?

Dr. Ken Davey: Well, I simply emphasize that it's very important in these initiatives that the university remain in control of who comes onto their land and how that space is used.

Member of audience: I would like to ask Mr. Davey a question about public sector support. Don't you think that public sector support, especially in the area of research – universities are responsible for research and teaching - would constitute some form of indirect control and therefore an encroachment upon the autonomy of universities? For example, it's not too likely that the tobacco industry is going to support cancer research or that the mining industry is going to support acid rain research. Don't you think this would consitute some kind of loss of control over what kind of research is conducted?

Dr. Ken Davey: Let me repeat. The university intends to control the sorts of things that go on. With respect to atmospheric chemistry, we would welcome support from the mining industry in our current thrust in atmospheric chemistry and indeed we may be able to obtain that. I think that the mining industry may be more responsible than you imagine and will not direct that research.

Dr. Brian Segal: The nature of the questions, the nature of responses, takes us back to only one solution, to the name of this programme which is "The Funding Crunch". I mean, people are asking questions, how far can we dare go with the private sector? The Minister is saying that, no, the rich shouldn't pay more. Faculty associations are blaming the administration. Therefore, clearly, the logic of this all says that the government has got to pour more and more money. There really aren't any other sources. You can't go after the students for more money. Private sector; watch it, they are going to take control. And so what's left, then, is the Honourable Minister and his colleagues. My view is that I think it's naive to suggest that there are problems in all of these areas. I think the issue is the mix and I think we have to have the guts, as a society, to address the mix. I think we have to say "yes: we can go down the private sector road" and set the limits on that that are appropriate. Yes, we can ask certain students to pay more and yes, we can ask government for more. There has to be that mix. Otherwise, we will be here five, ten and fifteen years from now debating the same issue, with a canvas vs. a brick roof.

Hon. G. Sorbara: To a certain extent I take issue with the premise that we have to look either to the university student himself through increased tuition fees, or

to the private sector, or to government. Look, we are a community. We are one community. The private industry is also a tax payer and the people who run private industry have children who go to universities and provide the tuition fees. We are all in this thing together. I think it is a foolish argument to say one sector should pay and one sector shouldn't pay.

Member of audience: I have a question, first for the presidents: what apart from studies or task forces have you done on your campuses to promote affirmative action, and that's women faculty?

Dr. B. Shapiro: I think relative to the question of women faculty members, you have to walk the very, very fine line between outright discrimination and a little bit of it, because I really do think that if we are going to make significant progress in this area, we are simply going to have to make a priority out of it and not pretend that we are always being fair because what it requires is discrimination among the applicant group. It isn't enough simply to say we are going to widen our net and recruit more actively. What it is going to require, if you really expect progress in this area, is some, however little, discrimination, in this case in favour of women, not unqualified women, perfectly qualified women, but nevertheless, discrimination in their favour in order to rectify a situation which is regarded, apparently, as socially unacceptable.

Susan Harrada: Betty Smith, do you agree with that? Do we need to discriminate to get more women on faculty?

Betty Smith: My short answer is yes. I'd like to say that the Council of the Ontario College of Art has passed a policy statement committing the college to employment equity. At this point in time we don't even know the extent of our problem or what we are facing. We realize it is something we can't do in a hurry, but we believe it is essential that we have a firm and public commitment to try to create an improvement in a situation that has gone on for years and years.

York Professor: In listening I keep trying to find the university in which I am actually working everyday. I'm going to reflect the teaching person surrounded by students. One of the things I observed within the university is that students have less and less opportunity to really talk to a faculty member, to talk to advisors. It

seems to me that much too little happens between students and the faculty, the advisors and all the rest at the university.

Dr. G. Connell: The effective underfunding in my judgment is felt most directly by undergraduate students and probably in most universities rather selectively by the students following general arts and science programmes. I think it follows, and it certainly should follow, that when the flow of operating funds is replenished that deficiency will be the first to be made up. I think your observation is well founded and I think there are students who are suffering from lack of personal contact with faculty members, lack of direction about their studies. There really isn't anything that's more important in a university experience.

Toronto Professor: My question is to the Minister. How can we as faculty, as students, as administrators, help you in your fights in Cabinet to make postsecondary education a priority and indeed how can we help your government maintain what seems to be its initial commitment to having post-secondary education a high priority?

Hon. G. Sorbara: Well, I think you just do things like we are doing here tonight. We champion the work that universities do, number one, and do your work better and teach better and spread the message to the community. I think that we all have a responsibility to create within the community the political will to give education the priority that it deserves. I can't do the job alone, so I call upon all those involved in the university sector to spread that message. It's a kind of a crusade.

Susan Harrada: Mr. Sorbara, thank you very much. That's all the time we have tonight. I'd like to thank the panel for joining us. I'd like to thank the audience. Good Night.

On 24 October, between the recording of the panel discussion and its subsequent broadcast, the Treasurer of Ontario, The Hon. Robert Nixon, presented a provincial budget in which he announced a 4% increase to university operating grants for the year 1986-87, plus an additional \$9.5 million for the previously announced University Excellence Fund. The grant under the regular capital assistance programme was \$10.5 million.

The second meeting of the Board of Trustees for 1985-86 was held on Tuesday, November 26th. At this meeting the Board:



SENATE SYNOPSIS

At its 301st meeting, held on Wednesday, December 4th, Senate:

- 1. AGREED to change the time of the Senate meeting scheduled for December 18th from 3:30 p.m. to 10:00 a.m..
- RECEIVED a report from the Committee on Petitions and Appeals which noted that the Committee had considered 193 cases during the year 1984-85 and had supported 157 (81%).
- 3. APPROVED, on the recommendation of Admissions Committee, amendments to FHB III: 1.4.6.A such that the first paragraph now reads as follows:

"Applicants wishing to transfer to Brock from degree programs at other Canadian universities must normally offer the equivalent of an overall average of 60 percent as a minimum with a higher average being required where enrolments are limited. Applicants must also be eligible to re-register at their home institution. Normally, transfer credit will be granted only for courses passed which are appropriate to the chosen program. Course attempts at the previous university will be recorded on the transfer student's record to place that student on an equal basis with one who takes his/her entire undergraduate studies at Brock."

4. APPROVED, on the recommendation of Standing, Examinations and Promotions, amendments to FHB III: 5.1.10 such that the first paragraph now reads as follows

"An instructor may require a student to take a class test or examination, as opposed to an individual test or examination, only during:

- a) the regular class periods of his/her course;
- b) the formally scheduled examination period; or
- c) a special examination period, scheduled in the academic timetable and not conflicting with regular class periods or other examinations.

No student may be required to write an examination or test in a time period which conflicts with any of her/his other classes which have been scheduled in the academic timetable."


- 5. REFERRED, to Standing, Examinations and Promotions, a motion directing that the terms of FHB III: 5.1.10 be widely publicized through publication in the Calendar and direct communication with faculty.
- 6. APPROVED, on the recommendation of Graduate Studies and Research, the following motions relating to the Masters of Education program:
 - That, in compliance with the evolving practice within the Ontario University system, the Department of Graduate Studies in Education move from an eight half-course to a ten halfcourse M.Ed. program, beginning July 1986.

- 2. That students must take Research courses EDUC 592hc (or equivalent) and EDUC 590hc.
- 3. That the graduate calendar be amended to include the following:

"A one year <u>experimental internship program</u> is being offered for special full-time M.Ed. students. The one year teaching experience admissions criterion will be waived for a maximum of nine students. The internship will involve working with a faculty advisor and will involve appropriate field-based experience combined with research assistance amounting to one extra half course. Each graduate student will be assigned opportunities for involvement in both of the areas, to compensate for those areas in which requisite skills or experience were lacking."

- REFERRED a recommendation from GS&R concerning amendments to FHB III: 9.6.2.D to GS&R for re-consideration, with an instruction that the Committee consult with departments offering graduate programs regarding its proposals.
- 8. APPROVED, on the recommendation of Academic Program Committee, a change to the 1985-86 course description for RECL 306hc to add: "Lab fee: approximately \$90.00."
- 9. APPROVED, also on the recommendation of APC, changes to the major program requirements of:
 - a) the Department of Accounting and Finance,
 - b) the Department of Management and Marketing,
 - c) the Child Studies Program,

Sociology




