

Brock launches largest construction project in its history


he Minister of Training, Colleges and Universities, the Honourable Dianne Cunningham, joined Brock University, on June 9, for the launch of the largest construction project in its history. More than 400 people including Brock University President David Atkinson and representatives from the City of St. Catharines, the City of Thorold, the Regional Municipality of Niagara, the Brock University Students' Union, faculty and staff were present for the groundbreaking.

"This is an extraordinary day for the University and our community as we embark on this ambitious undertaking," said Atkinson. "This project was made possible through a unique partnership and we are grateful for their support and for their belief in the future of this University. These new facilities will transform our campus and enable us to continue Brock's fine tradition of providing quality education for our students and exceptional service to our community."

The Brock University Board of Trustees recently gave the green light to \$50 million in construction projects on the campus. The approved projects include two academic buildings (\$22.57 million), a Health and Fitness Centre (\$11.487 million), a student residence (\$12.3 million), renovations to the Faculty of Education building (\$1.32 million) and upgrades to the Central Utility Building for heating and ventilation (\$2.237 million). The new buildings are designed by internationally renowned architect Raymond Moriyama. The economic impact on Niagara of the new projects, including a new residence, is estimated to be \$82,193,000 or the equivalent of 2,055 year-long, full-time jobs.

The provincial government announced on May 18 that Brock University would receive \$15.57 million in capital funding as part of the SuperBuild investment program for the post-secondary education sector. The funding will support the construction of the academic complex. The new academic buildings will allow for 1,700 new student spaces on campus.

"SuperBuild is making possible the largest capital expansion in post-secondary education in more than 30 years," said Cunningham. "A \$1 billion investment — \$1.8 billion with partnership funding —is creating more than 73,000 student spaces at Ontario's colleges and universi-

ties to ensure that every willing and qualified student continues to have access to a high-quality education."

The SuperBuild funding will assist Brock as it prepares to seek \$14.42 million in private sector support through its "Good, Better, Brock!" campaign. Norris

University honours one of its own


Brock University honoured one of its own during the Spring Convocation ceremonies, held June 5 to 9. Brock graduate Ian Beddis was one of five distinguished Canadians to receive an honorary doctorate from the University.

The other honorary degree recipients were: Myer Horowitz, President of the University of Alberta from 1979 to 1989; Ron Lancaster, a former CFL all-star quarterback and now coach of the Hamilton Tiger-Cats; the Right Honourable Beverley McLachlin, who was sworn in as the first female chief justice of Canada in January; and Ann Medina, a veteran CBC journalist and broadcaster.

Beddis, Director and Branch Manager for Scotia McLeod in Calgary, is among a very special group of Brock graduates the Silver Badgers, Brock's first graduating class. In his convocation address, he shared his deep sense of pride at being a Brock graduate. "My name is Ian, and I AM a Brock graduate," he said eliciting a round of applause from the audience which included many of his family and friends. Beddis received an Honours Bachelor of Science degree in Mathematics as part of the University's first Honours graduating class in 1968. While at Brock, he was President of the Brock University Students' Union and a member of the Brock Senate. His academic excellence and extracurricular involvement earned him turn to page 3

Brock to purchase Hamilton school

he Brock University Board of Trustees approved the purchase of Briarwood School in Hamilton allowing the University to continue delivering its Pre-Service Bachelor of Education program and additional qualification courses at the site.

Brock now offers the Pre-Service program to 300 students, provides additional qualification courses to 750 students and educates more than 100 Masters of Education students at Briarwood. Last year, the Hamilton-Wentworth and District School Board informed the University of its intention to sell the school as a surplus asset. Applications to Brock's Faculty of Education increased by 39 per cent to 5,268 for September 2000 enrolment.

"There is a great need for teacher education in the Hamilton-Oakville area and the Faculty of Education remains committed to offering our courses at the site," said Faculty of Education Dean Michael Manley-Casimir. "We see the purchase of this school as giving us great value for the dollar, while allowing us to deliver our programs to students in the area well into the future."

The cost for the facility is \$1.8 million, with an additional \$700,000 in renovations to be completed. Brock is acquiring the facility at less than \$40 per square foot. The replacement value of the building is approximately \$9 million. The University will finance the purchase through a long-term mortgage covered by revenue generated at the school.

The school, situated on 6.9 acres of land at 1842 King Street East in Hamilton, contains 21 classrooms, 18 offices, two computer labs, two lounges, a gymnasium, a cafeteria and a library. It was previously used by the school board as an adult education centre. Brock has rented space to offer programs at the school since 1996.

Brock grads near top in Ontario-97.8 per cent are employed

Brock University graduates rank near the top in employment among all of Ontario's 19 universities. Within six months of graduation, 94.4 per cent of Brock graduates are employed. Two years after graduation, Brock's employment percentage increases to 97.8 per cent. The statistics, from the Ontario University Graduate Survey, give new life to Brock University's positioning line: "Careers begin here!"

"Brock graduates have one of the highest employment rates of any Ontario university," states Brock President David Atkinson. "This is exceptional news, not only for our graduates, but for current and future Brock students. These figures clearly show that a university education leads to employment and that Brock is on the right track."

The results of the survey support Brock's plan for the future with its thrust to place a greater emphasis on career development programs that prepare students for the world of work.

professional programs, while continuing its commitment to providing student-focused, broad-based undergraduate education.

Under the direction of Jack Miller, the Associate Vice-President of Research and Dean of Graduate Studies, the University is committed to expanding upon its solid foundation of high quality Master's programs across all faculties. The University launched a new PhD program in Educational Studies in partnership with Lakehead University, University of Windsor and the University of Western Ontario. The program started July 1, and marks the first time in Ontario that a consortium of this kind has been developed for doctoral study.

In September, classes begin in Brock's new Nursing Degree Completion program designed to allow nursing professionals to complete a Bachelor of Science in Nursing degree (BScN) within a 12-month period. The program permits students to continue working as they study and it also responds to the needs of the local health-care community and the increasing demand for nurses to upgrade their qualifications.

Brock is expanding an excellent selection of undergraduate programs that prepare students to meet the challenges of today's world. For example, this academic year, the University introduces a program in Workplace Health, the only undergraduate program in Canada. Our graduates will go on to meet the growing demand for health professionals who are capable of managing health issues in the workplace. Other new programs this September include: Drama and Theatre in Education, and International Political Economy.





the chair of the Niagara division of the campaign.

The new Health and Fitness Centre is being funded by a unique partnership involving municipal, regional, student, private sector and University support. Last November, Brock students voted to provide \$5 million in funding to support the capital costs of the \$11.5 million Centre. As well, the City of St. Catharines, the City of Thorold and the Regional Municipality of Niagara have approved a total of \$2.275 million in funding over five years for the Centre (\$1.5 million, \$275,000 and \$500,000 respectively).

the Vice Chancellor's Trophy in 1967 and 1968. He has continued a strong affiliation with the University. Beddis served for a number of years as President of the Brock University Alumni Association and he was the driving force in establishing Brock's Wall of Fame, in recognition of outstanding athletes. "This ceremony marks only the end of one of the learning chapters in your career," he said. "You have a whole lot of learning to do." He emphasized to the new graduates the impact that technological change is having on our lives and careers today. Keeping up with those changes, he said, is the key to personal and business success.

Beddis ended his address by listing the seven personal qualities he believes has contributed to his success in business and community service—"be appreciative, be flexible, be friendly to everyone, remember the power of positive thinking, health

Brock University conferred 1,387 undergraduate, 58 Master degrees, 36 Certificates and 533 Education Pre-Service degrees during the ceremonies, bringing the total number of Brock graduates to more than 39,000.

Faculty, staff and retirees raise \$355,000

Brock University raised \$355,000 during its recent internal fundraising campaign. Faculty, staff and retirees gave more than ever before to support the University through the "Invest in Quality" campaign. In addition, participation in the campaign increased by 85 per cent from previous efforts.

The campaign raised money for: academic scholarships and awards; new state-of-the-art academic facilities; a new Health and Fitness Centre; and new library and teaching technology.

Professor Barry Joe, Director of the Centre for Teaching and Learning, and Chris Critelli, Head Coach of the women's interuniversity basketball team, were campaign co-chairs and worked with many volunteers from across the campus.

The \$355,000 raised in the campaign was three-times more over previous campaigns.

CCOVI partnership receives national award

Brock University, the Wine Council of Ontario and the Ontario Grape Growers' Marketing Board were recognized as one of the best business-education partnerships in Canada. In May, they received the Conference Board of Canada's 1999-2000 Daimler-Chrysler National Partners in Education Awards for Brock's Cool Climate Oenology and Viticulture Institute (CCOVI).

CCOVI was selected from 160 entries of business-education partnerships from across the country.

"This is truly an honour for the University and its partners to be selected, from such competitive entries, for establishing a world-class program that is meeting the research and educational needs of the cool climate grape growing and wine producing regions," said Brock President David Atkinson.

Atkinson and Grant Dobson, Executive Director of Brock's Office of External Relations, accepted the award at the Business and Education Awards ceremony, on Monday, May 1, in Halifax. While in Halifax, Dobson took the opportunity to meet with Brock graduates.

The National Partners in Education Awards program offers an opportunity to showcase business-education initiatives that work across Canada and to recognize the people who are making them succeed.

"The awards recognize and honour partnerships as a model of excellence in business-education partnership—ensuring that Canada's youth are learning the right skills for today's and tomorrow's world of work," according to the Conference Board of Canada.

First grape and wine grads

he Cool Climate Oenology and Viticulture Institute (CCOVI) in conjunction with the Departments of Biological Sciences and Chemistry celebrated the Oenology and Viticulture (OEVI) Class of 2000—the first graduates since the program's inception. The class also represents the first graduates of Canada's only university program in grape growing and wine making.

"These students have undertaken research projects and have studied techniques to cope with the unique Canadian environment and will make a valuable contribution to the grape and wine industry of Canada," says CCOVI's Director Dr. Ronald Subden.

Modrobes success began at Brock

teve Debus has always had a good idea where life would take him. He just never imagined he would get there so quickly.

In five short years, the Brock graduate has built a highly successful fashion business Modrobes Saldebus Lounge Clothing Inc. The Modrobes collection, comfortable clothing designed for students who spend hours in front of computers, began with the original Exam Pants. The collection has expanded to include skirts, jackets, hip bags and, new for next spring, shoes.

Debus, who designs the entire Modrobes collection, had an initial target of selling \$1 million in merchandise by the year 2000. He more than surpassed that target, recording \$7 million in sales going into this year. To get the business off the ground, Debus used a very grassroots marketing plan in which he travelled from campus to campus selling to university and college students. Modrobes are now sold in over 350 retail stores in Canada, including Modrobe Concept stores in Toronto and Vancouver.

The secret to his success is a combination of the 29-year-old's lifelong talent and love for fashion design with endless energy and persistence.

"I lived the business for five years," said Debus over the phone from his Toronto office. "I've been doing this since I was 16. I'd do one business, see what worked, what didn't work and reinvent it for another idea."

The Modrobes concept began as a project for an entrepreneurship course Debus took at Brock. Debus credits his University experience with providing him valuable business training. He added that Brock also gave him the opportunity to learn about people, places and life in general -whether it was in the classroom or as player on five consecutive championship

He has spent the last year planning to introduce the Modrobes collection into the U.S. market. The planning started last summer with a trip to the Woodstock '99 Festival, in Rome, N.Y.

"No one had heard of us there," said Debus. "We sold a ridiculous amount of clothing—they just loved us."

This summer, he will open a store in a major U.S. market, likely in California. "We want to hit them the way we did here," he said.



This grant is to be used towards a project which will develop creative partnerships between community presenters, Ontario-based professional artists, students, teachers and local businesses through residency and workshop activities.

New appointment: Brock University is pleased to announce the appointment of Margaret Grove as University Librarian. Grove was selected as the result of a nationwide search to find a replacement for James Hogan who recently retired from the position.

Grove, a recipient of the Governor General's award upon graduation from Brock in 1970, has worked in many capacities in the University Library. She became Associate Librarian in 1996 and in September 1999, she was named University Librarian (Pro Tem).

Grove recently negotiated an agreement, in partnership with the University of Toronto, to provide students and faculty at Brock University with online access to journals published by Elsevier Science, the world's largest database of scientific, technical and Margaret Grove



medical research. The Brock Library is one of the first libraries in Ontario and the fourth library in Canada to introduce this very impressive and powerful service. Donations made through Brocks TeleGrad program have assisted developments of Brock's library technology.

BROCKBriefs Tour speaker: Professor Ian Brindle, of the Department of Chemistry, has been selected by the Spectroscopy Society of Canada (SSC) to be the 2000 National Tour Speaker from Canada. In this role,

Brindle will be speaking at several local sections of the U.S. Society of Applied Spectroscopy (SAS). His first presentation was to the SAS Nevada section, Las Vegas, in May. This is an honour reserved to top Canadian scientists and past selections include Drs. Ralph Sturgeon (NRC) and Gary Horlick (U. of Alberta).

Biomechanics lab: David A. Gabriel, Assistant Professor Biomechanics, received \$76,684 from the Canada Foundation for Innovation and the Ontario Research Development Challenge Fund-II (CFI Match). The money will be used to purchase infrastructure for Brock University's new Biomechanics Laboratory. Funded projects will be directed at understanding how the nervous system controls the rate of tension development during muscle contraction. The application of this work is the development of resistance exercises that will help prevent falls in the elderly.

Cystic fibrosis research: The Canadian Cystic Fibrosis Foundation has awarded \$149,943 to John Hay, of Brock University's Department of Community Health Sciences, Allan Coates and Marey Corey, of Sick Children's Hospital, and Larry Lands, of Montreal Children's Hospital, to investigate the question: "Does physical activity make a difference to lung health in cystic fibrosis?" This study will have major implications for the treatment of children with cystic fibrosis and will investigate a challenging and poorly understood aspect of the disease.

International award: Sarah Tiffin, a graduate student in Earth Sciences, was awarded the 1999 Lucy Cranwell Award by the American Association of Stratigraphic Palynologists Awards Committee. The committee received 11 applications from six nations, and rated them on the student's qualifications, the originality and imagination of the proposal, and likelihood of a valuable scientific contribution of the final results. Sarah's thesis is on the Miocene palynostratigraphy of the Atlantic Coastal Plain.


Funding support: Brock University recently received \$91,785 in funding from the Ministry of Training, Colleges and Universities under the Aboriginal Education and Training Strategy. The funding will support start-up and development projects for an Aboriginal Students Advisor/Counselor, an Aboriginal Learning Centre and the Native Teacher Education program. This funding will allow the University to make the advisor position full time and to increase its level of support to aboriginal students on campus.

Dr. Gibson participates in historical video for Parks Canada

n a recent visit to Ottawa and a return visit after nearly 50 years to Laurier House, Dr. James Gibson (President Emeritus) had the interesting experience of recording, on video for Parks Canada, a running account of what it had been like to work with the Prime Minister/ Secretary of State for External Affairs on the top floor of Mackenzie King's Ottawa residence.

Literally 20 minutes after joining External Affairs at the East Block in July, 1938, Gibson was seconded to the Prime Minister's Office for six months, intended to be on rotation. The onset of war the following year meant that he was "frozen" as a civilian (ostensibly in Intelligence, though he continued as an "accomplished generalist").

In May of 1940, he was ordered to Laurier House, with the apparently simple instruction "to be useful to the Prime Minister."

Though King didn't deal in "titles," for establishment purposes the newest recruit was described as Officer i/c War Records; subsequently enlarged to External Affairs Liaison Officer. Gibson resigned to return

to active academic pursuit in 1947. The post was left vacant as King gave up his External Affairs responsibilities.

The video recording will serve as "authentic background" with an historical emphasis for the Parks Canada staff who conduct increasing numbers of visitors tours through this historic house.

Gibson was very interested in participating in the video as he is now the sole survivor of the six staff officers who worked regularly with King at Laurier House.

Brock researchers awarded more than \$1.5 million in grants

esearchers at Brock University have ematics, physics and psychology. qualified for more than \$1.5 million in funding grants. The Natural Sciences and Engineering Research Council of Canada (NSERC) recently announced grants totalling \$1,076,062 of which \$302,200 are for new projects. NSERC also awarded three equipment grants totalling more than \$130,000. In addition, the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council of Canada (SSHRC) awarded grants totalling \$455,846 of which \$111,591 are for new studies.

"Brock's commitment to enhancing its role as a centre of research and creative activity is evident by our faculty's success in winning awards from Canada's major funding agencies," says Jack Miller, Associate Vice-President, Research and Dean of Graduate Studies. "Research projects make an important contribution to our teaching and learning environment. As well, our research success, further establishes the University as a leader in research and development for the Niagara area and beyond."


The NSERC grants will fund 46 research projects at the University in the field of biology, chemistry, computer science, earth sciences, geography, math-

Biology professor Doug Bruce received an equipment grant of \$84,095 toward acquiring a YAG laser. Chemistry professor Heather Gordon was awarded \$22,420 to acquire computer equipment to use in protein structure determination. Biology professor Miriam Richards received \$23,529 to purchase microscope equipment for her studies of social bees.

Richards was one of 23 researchers from across Canada selected by NSERC for the University Faculty Award program. The goal of the program is to encourage greater representation of women in faculty positions in the natural sciences and engineering by encouraging Canadian universities to appoint very promising women researchers to tenure-track or tenured positions in science and engineering. NSERC contributes \$40,000 per year for three years (possibly renewable for an additional two years) to her salary and fringe benefits. She also received \$27,300 for research costs for each of the next four years as part of the award.

The SSHRC grants will fund 13 studies at Brock in the areas of teaching, learning, children, family and sustainable agriculture.



he Honourable Jim Wilson, Minister of Energy, Science and Technology, visited the University recently for the official announcement of the Ontario Research and Development Challenge Fund Project. Also on hand was David Bogart, Executive Director of the Ontario Innovation Trust (OIT) to announce Brock's first OIT Award.

The Ontario Research and Development Challenge Fund capital grant of \$1.54 million supported the construction of Inniskillin Hall, the home of the Cool Climate Oenology and Viticulture Institute, and the purchase of research equipment for the new facility.

"Provincial investments in research at Brock will help Ontario's wine industry gain a greater share of domestic and international markets," said Wilson.

The Ontario Innovation Trust Award involves a grant of \$74,000 to purchase important equipment for Brock's electron spin resonance (ESR) spectrometer in the Department of Chemistry. The ESR spectrometer is essential in the advancement of plant research.

This investment is a tribute to the innovative spirit of Brock University and its researchers," said Bogart.


The project's lead researcher, Professor Art van der Est, is conducting cutting edge research in the field of photosynthesis, a science that seeks to determine how plants and algae use sunlight to supply their energy needs.

he University recently held its 33rd annual Athletic Awards Banquet, to celebrate this year's athletic achievements. Team achievements included national titles in men's wrestling, men's baseball and men's rowing.

Winning Brock's top athletic honours were:

- Male Athlete of the Year: Andrew Tinnish (Nepean, Ont.), a member of the Brock men's baseball team which won the 1999 national championship;
- Female Athlete of the Year: Tonya Verbeek (Beamsville, Ont.), 1999-2000 OUA and CIAU women's wrestling champion;

- Director's Award: Elisabeth Walker, a paralympic swimmer, set four world record times at the OUA swimming championships and has qualified for the 2000 paralympic swimming trials.

he Brock University Rowing Club recently christened four new rowing shells, one pair and three new singles.

The singles were christened in recognition of Brock athletes Iain Brambell, Ross Beattie and Jacqui Cook.

Iain Brambell is a graduate of the Health Studies program at Brock. He competed at four OUA championships while at Brock and won gold medals in each year. Brambell has competed for Canada in the 1997 and 1998 in the lightweight men's double and in 1999 in the lightweight men's four. He has been named to the Olympic team for 2000 and will compete in the lightweight men's four.

Ross Beattie is a graduate of the Biology program at Brock. Beattie is a five-time gold medallist at the OUA championships. He was Canadian University Champion in the Open Men's Pair in 1997 and was part of the National Champion team of 1999. Beattie was a bronze medallist in the lightweight men's eight at the 1996 World Championships. Beattie will compete for Brock University in the Visitors Cup race for university fours at the 2000 Henley Royal Regatta in England.

Jacqui Cook is a graduate of the Physical Education program at Brock. Cook won gold medals for Brock at the 1997 and 1998 OUA rowing championships. She competed in the 1999

World Rowing Champion-ships in the women's four. This year, Cook qualified for the 2000 Olympic Selection Camp.

The pair was christened Worlds '99, Brock Welcomes the World in honour of Brock's success in hosting the Athletes' Village for the 1999 World Championships, held in St. Catharines, last August.
