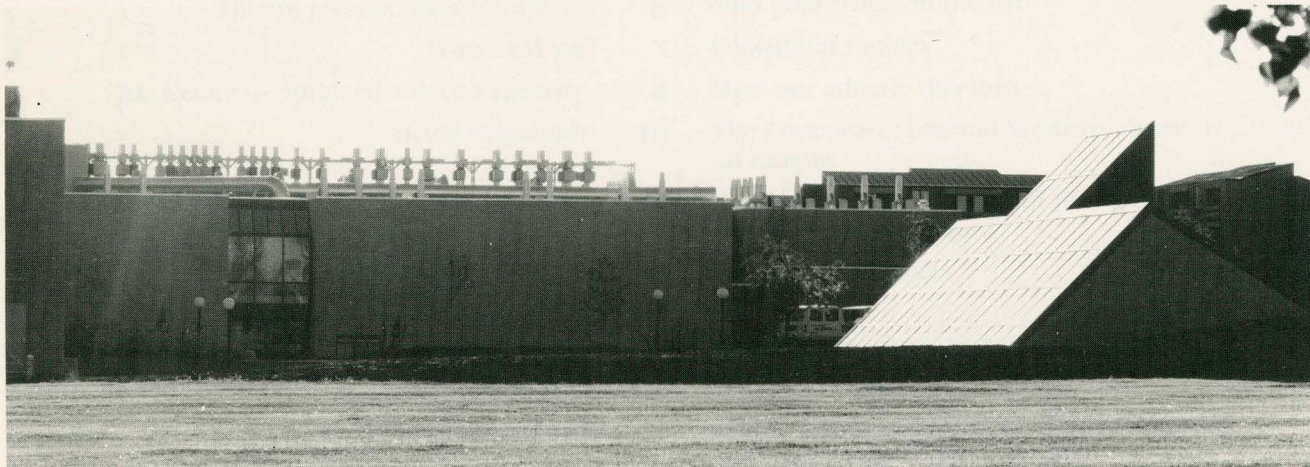

This is the greenhouse the Alumni built . . .

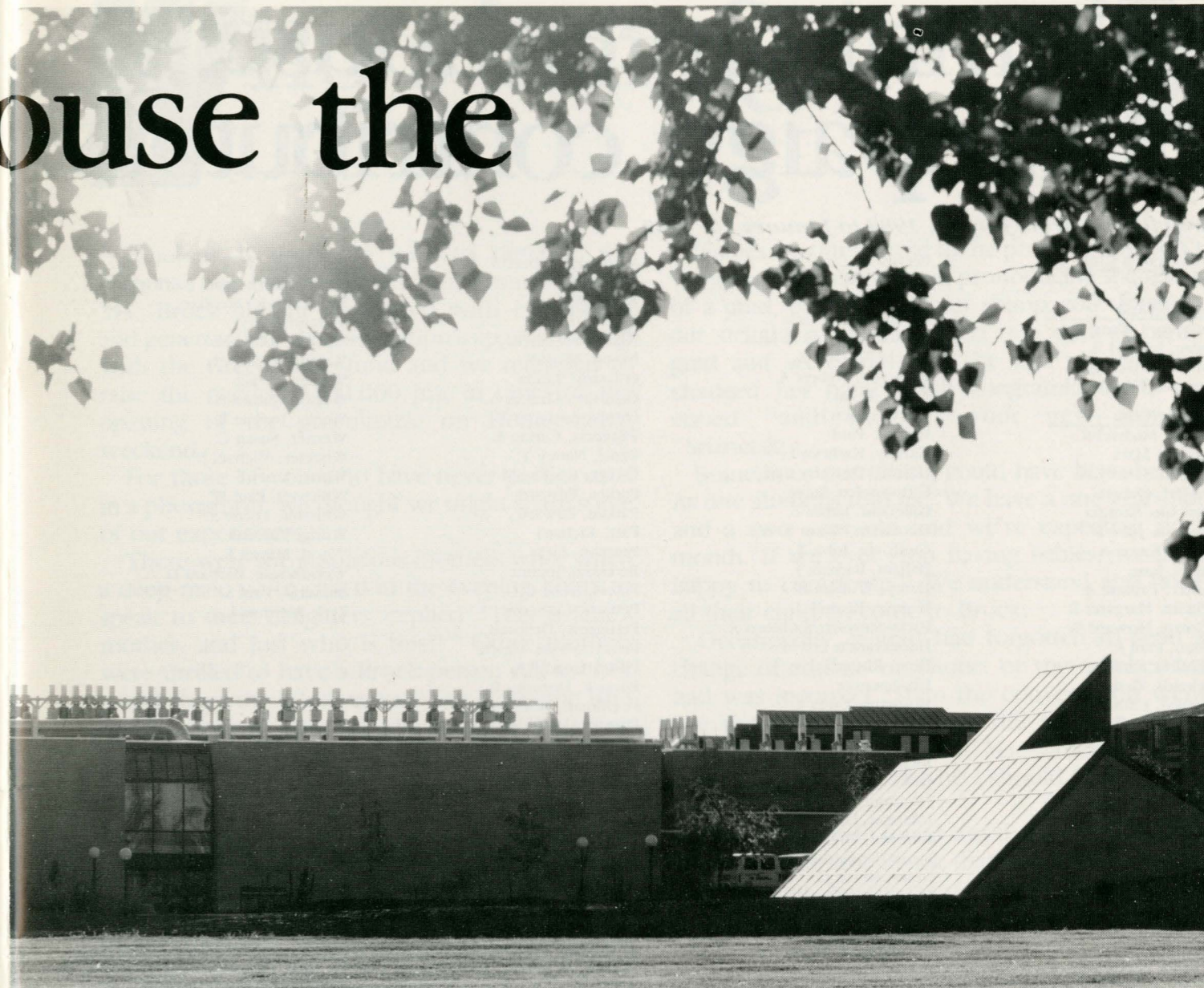
Mike Little, building and services engineer and Charles Simon, architect of our new greenhouse, join in the opening celebrations.



The project we began in June 1983 has reached a successful end. The Alumni Greenhouse now stands next to the Mackenzie Chown Science complex and the Alumni Association's promised contribution of \$100,000 has been given to the Science Development Fund.

It was a staggering prospect when it was first suggested that the Alumni Association raise \$100,000, but the whole sum has been raised in a matter of eighteen months.

Step one in June 1983 was a mailing of information regarding the project, complete with a



decad hopefully proclaiming "I'm an alumni contributor". This met with a good response but still left us in October 1983, less than halfway to our goal. It was then that a new plan of action was adopted.

Ginny Gilbert, Alumni Officer felt that the rest of the money could best be raised in a phonathon campaign. She was right!

During the past year Brock graduates were contacted by telephone by alumni and staff members and the response was terrific. Local alumni turned out to man the phones in Toronto, Ottawa, and Hamilton, as well as in St. Catharines. By Homecoming Weekend 1984, our goal had been reached; the Alumni Greenhouse was officially opened on the morning of Saturday, November 3, with great fanfare and plants for all.

We've come a long way in a short period. "With the completion of this project, our fledgling Alumni Association has arrived in the age of fundraising. Now we must carefully consider the next project to undertake", says Ginny Gilbert.

The new greenhouse offers both space and research opportunities for budding Brock botanists. Both students and faculty are quick to point out the many advantages of the new facility over the old Glenridge campus areas.

"The light is wonderful, the plants thrive. Best of all, we're in our own area and not crowded in with the experimental animals as we used to be. This is great," enthused a greenhouse user.

We all have reason to be proud of our latest addition to the Brock Science facilities. Many thanks to all those who phoned and to those who gave so generously.

Who's calling?

Fabulous is the only way to describe the response we had to the Alumni Phonathons in '84. Brock alumni responded with enthusiasm and generosity to the Association's appeal for help with the Greenhouse fund and we managed to raise the needed \$100,000 just in time for the opening of the greenhouse on Homecoming weekend.

For those of you who have never participated in a phonathon, we thought we might share some of our experiences.

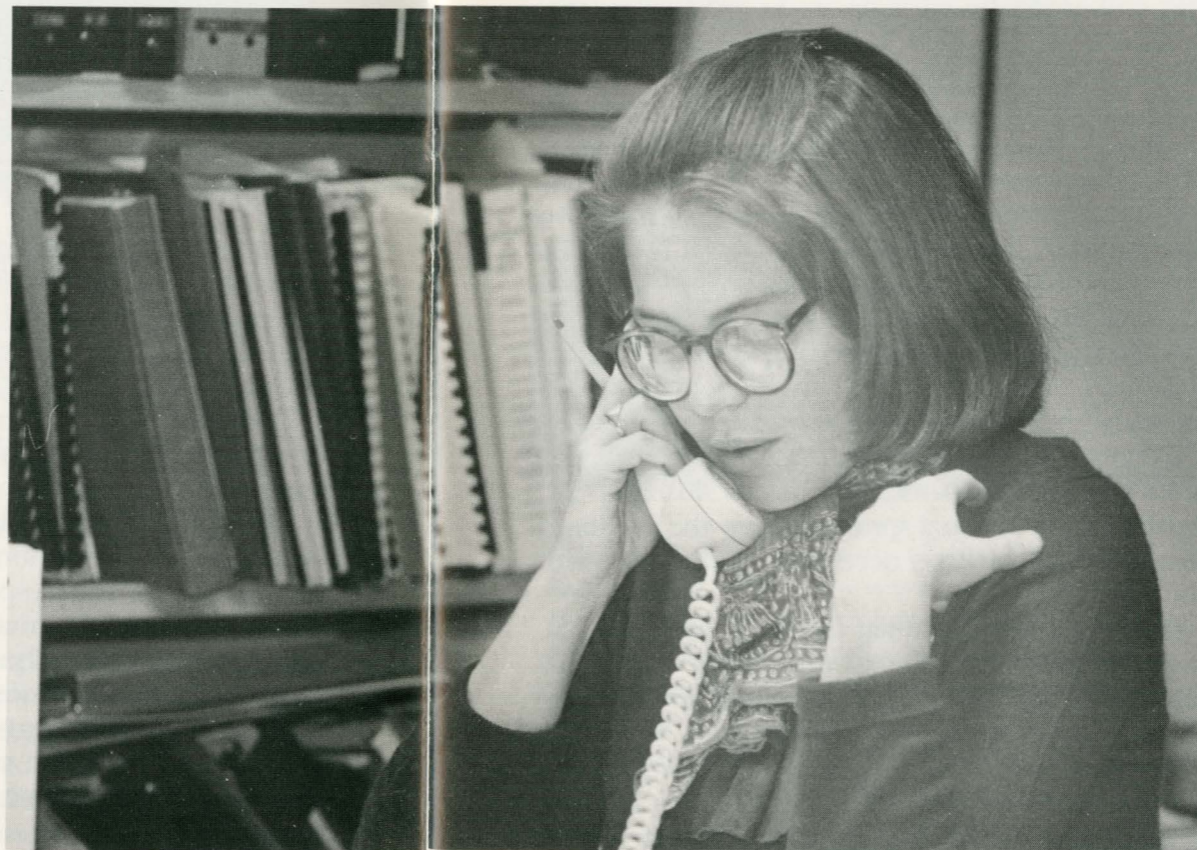
There were the suspicious mothers who, when a deep male voice called in the evening hours to speak to their daughters, replied "This is Jane's mother, and just who is this?!" Other mothers were thrilled to have a Brock person call so they could share the good news. "Oh her name isn't Smith anymore. No, no, she married the nicest boy from Brock and they have the cutest little house..."

Names are often a trial to the phoner. You don't want to make a mistake in pronouncing the name of a grad, but some names stump you. Imagine our delight when we called one difficult-name grad and were told that she had married and changed her name. "Oh congratulations", we cooed "and what is your new name?" "Sriznetski".

Sometimes our timing could have been better. As one alumnus told us "We have a one year old, and a two year old and we're expecting next month. If we ever stop having babies, we'd be happy to contribute." We understand and hope all their children come to Brock.

Occasionally, a grad had forgotten to send a change of address or phone, or the number we had was incorrect. Then the conversation went like this "Yes, my name is Bill Johnson. No, I didn't go to Brock, I went to Mac. I thought about going to Brock . . . maybe I should have. Was it fun?"

One thing we all loved was the general sense of good will towards Brock that we encountered in our phoning. Nearly everyone had a good word to give us and that was at least as important as the monetary donations.

Joe Kenny, sprained ankles a specialty

Joe Kenny's middle initial should be 'P' . . . for prevention. As Brock's Athletic Therapist, Joe's job is not only to deal with the injuries brought to him, but also to educate the athletes he deals with so further accidents won't happen.

Says Joe "I can deal with injuries, but I'd rather prevent them. The important thing is to prepare yourself for the activity you participate in. Stretch and condition yourself, don't do too much too quickly, listen to your body. The 'no pain, no gain' school of thought is a dangerous one. Pain is the body's way of signalling that something is wrong, that the activity should be modified or stopped."

Despite warnings and the best laid plans, accidents occur and athletes suffer pain. Pain is, in large part, at the centre of much that Joe does. He analyses it, assesses it and then tries to alleviate it.

"Of course I'd like to stop all the pain I see, but it's important to remember that pain is a sign that

points to a problem. If the pain is completely removed, the problem can be forgotten and further injuries may occur. Painful symptoms can be alleviated for long periods, but it is important to be aware of the normal progress of the discomfort in order to follow the healing of the injury."

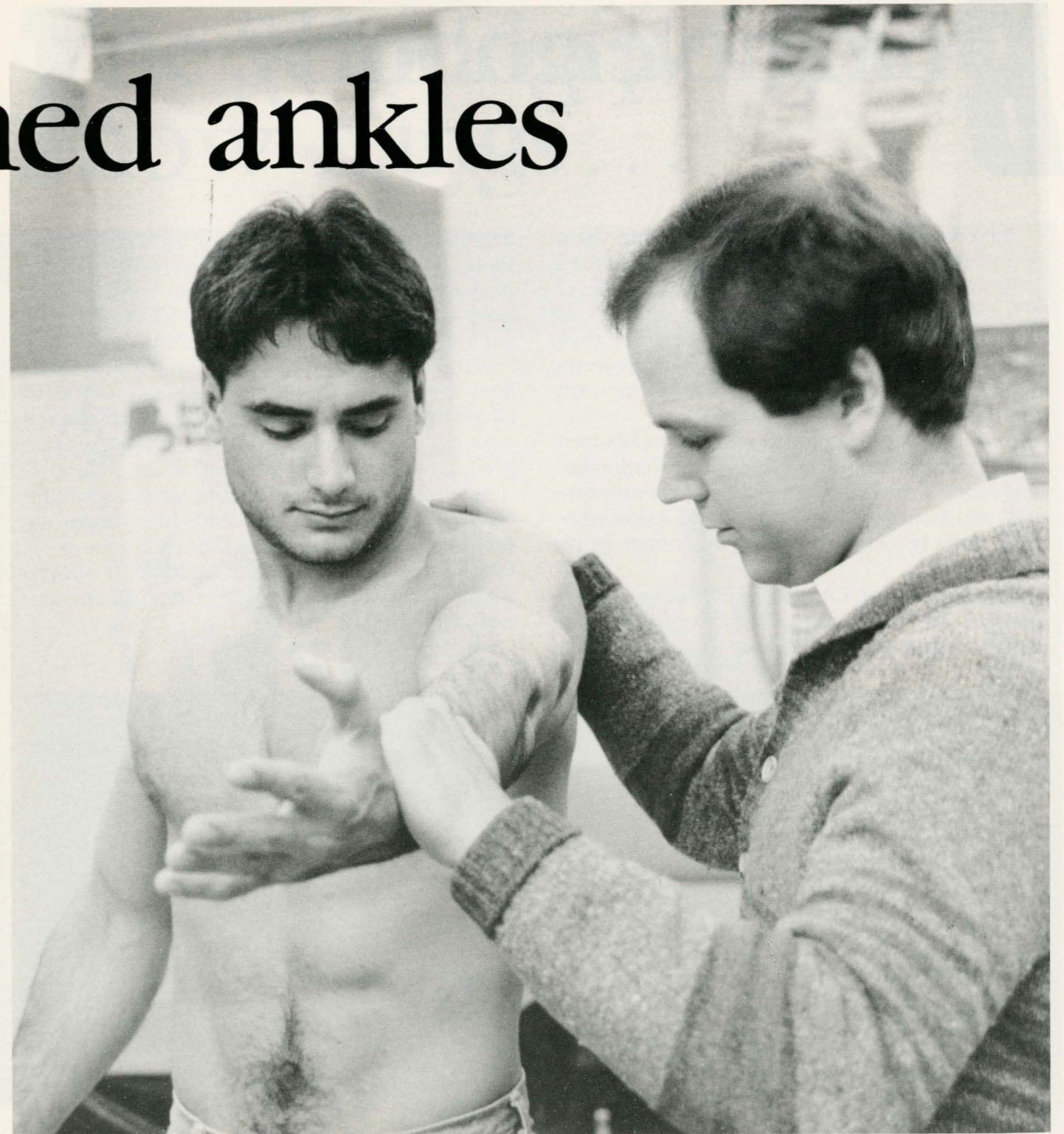
Joe has a clinic filled with therapeutic equipment — a whirlpool, two ultrasound muscle stimulators, a TENS unit (transcutaneous electrical nerve stimulator) — a trained assistant, Jeff MacDonald, and ten student assistants. Most important, Joe has time.

"When you go to your doctor sporting a sprain or a strain, chances are that you'll be told that the pain will gradually wear away. In most cases, no treatment will be given, if the injury isn't deemed serious enough for physiotherapy. It isn't easy to wait out pain. At our clinic, we have the time to work with you to try to make those muscles relax, to ease the strain."

Racquetball players, squash players, runners — anyone who works and works out at Brock is welcome to see Joe about an injury, but his first responsibility is to Brock's varsity teams and to the visiting athletes who use our Physical Education facilities. Joe, or one of his student trainees, travels with each team wherever they go.

"We're there to make sure that our teams are taken care of. Sometimes that means sitting up all night to apply ice to a sprain to keep the swelling down. If that's what's necessary, that's what we do."

When you ask Joe what the most common injuries he treats would be, he laughs "Sprained ankles. I probably see more sprained ankles than all the doctors in the Niagara peninsula. Sprained ankles and strained necks. The sprains come largely from basketball, volleyball and running, but the strained necks come from aerobics. The aerobics



instructor is at the front of the room with her head down, doing the exercise correctly but all the participants are straining their necks to hold their heads up to watch what's going on."

Does Joe have any advice about preventing injuries? He sure does.

"Sports injuries fall into three categories: self-induced, (the runner who runs too far); environmental, (heat stroke); interactive, (caused by

others around you). What you have to do is look at the activity you're planning with an eye to safety.

See what could go wrong; know your limitations, look for environmental hazards and watch out for the other guy."

"To prevent an injury, just ask yourself one question 'How can I play safe?' "

Welcome to our new neighbors: the staff, faculty and students of Concordia Lutheran Seminary.

Brock watched with interest as the chapel, classrooms and library of the Seminary were constructed last winter and couldn't wait to get inside for a look around. We got our chance when the Seminary held its official opening in early September.

A special series of afternoon open houses were held for the members of the Brock community. The tours of the building given by members of the staff and faculty of Concordia, were followed by wine and cheese receptions in the lounge of the building.

Applauding Excellence

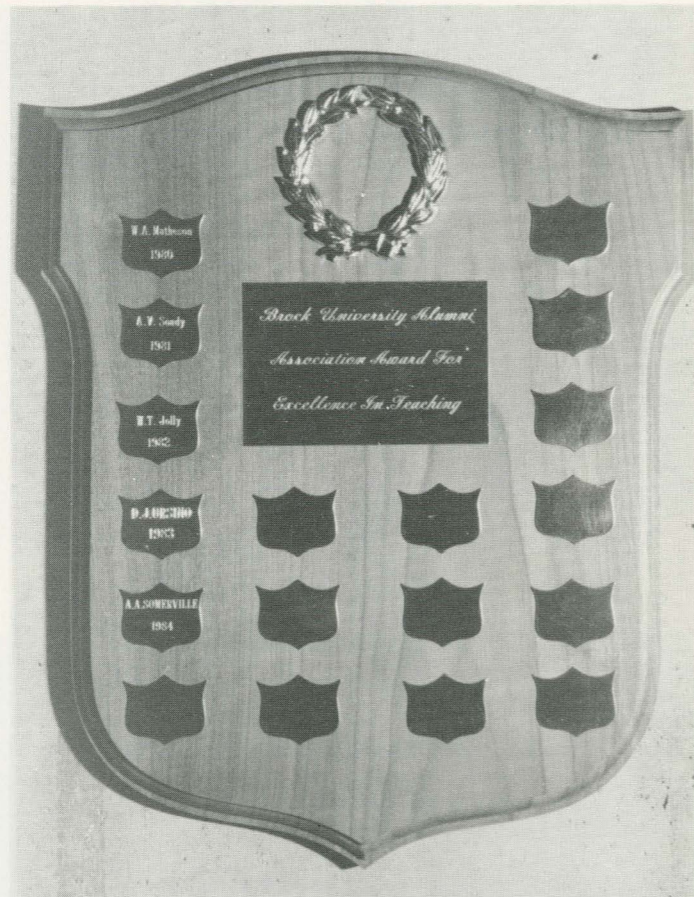
Professor Angus Somerville, a member of the Department of English Language and Literature, was the most recent recipient of the Brock University Alumni award for teaching excellence. Professor Somerville, who received his PhD from the University of Glasgow, is the fifth Brock faculty member to be presented with the prestigious award.

Professor Somerville received rave reviews from his student nominators who were most anxious that he receive the proper recognition for the high standard of teaching that he brings to Brock classrooms. His sense of humor is treasured.

Although a number of worthy candidates were considered for the 1984 award, it was with great pleasure that the committee settled on Angus Somerville.

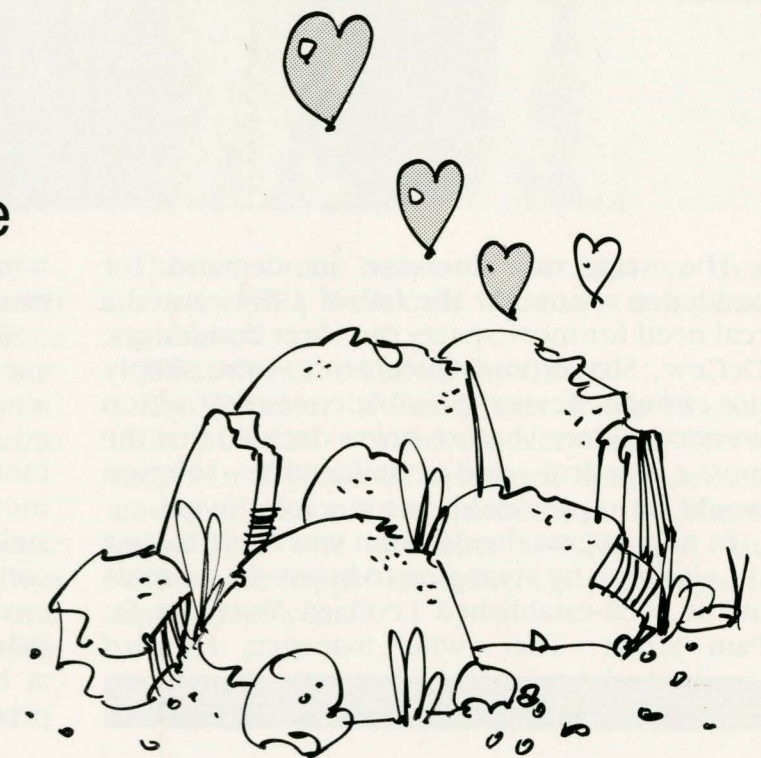
Love among the rocks

What's this I hear about the Leonard Motel?

Yes, what you've heard is true. Twenty-five rooms of the Leonard Motel in downtown St. Catharines have become a bit of Brock.

The staggering increase in demand for residence rooms for the fall of 1984 caused a real need for more space; our three residences, DeCew, Shaver and Queenston, were simply not enough. Several possible courses of action were considered before it was decided that the most practical and comfortable solution would be to provide rooms in a local motel.

In mid-August the decision was made to ease the situation by arranging to house 49 students in the well-established Leonard Motel on St. Paul Street. The owner/manager, Howard Kamin and his wife Libby were more than pleased to have the students as the fall and

winter are a traditionally slow season for motel operators.

The arrangement has proved to be a huge success for all concerned. The forty-eight students and their don are now happily housed in twenty-five rooms of the two-storey motel. Laundry facilities are available, the motel provides linen and when the courtyard swimming pool is open, the students are welcome to go for a dip. The Leonard operates two restaurants, the Coffee Pot and the Lotus Palace and the resident students get a discount at both. It is also possible for a student who prefers to go on a meal plan to do so at either

DeCew or Queenston.

The Leonard residence is affiliated with Queenston and takes part in their Residence Action Committee events. A shuttle bus service provides transportation from the Leonard Motel to the Queenston residence as well as to the main campus.

What do the students think?

They think it's great. The rooms are larger and somewhat more lavishly furnished than the average residence accommodations and they enjoy the convenience of downtown living.

What do the Kamins think?

The arrangement suits them just fine.

"They're a nice bunch of kids and we treat them as if they were ours. We really enjoy having them."

What does the University think?

Says Director of Residences, Jamie Fleming "The plan has worked out very well. We've seen a real sense of residence spirit develop among the Leonard residents and that's very important. The students are happy, the Kamins are happy; it's a success we'll hope to repeat next year."

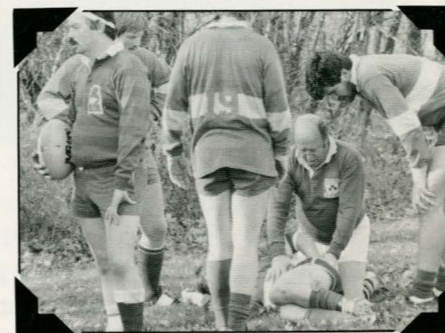

Book Review

Canadian Occupational Health and Safety Law Handbook, Michael Nash, Don Mills, Ont., C.C.H. Canadian Limited, 1983, 344 pp.

The appearance of former McGill University political science professor Stanley Gray in his new incarnation as a crusader for improved safety conditions for workers has helped draw attention to an extremely serious problem in Canada — the physical pain, emotional distress and enormous economic losses resulting from occupational accidents and disease. The statistics are startling: 12.3 million working days lost, 4 to 5% of Canadian workers involved in workplace accidents each year at a direct cost of close to \$1 billion. Yet most of this can be avoided if laws requiring serious preventive measures are in place and vigorously enforced. It seems however that not only are existing laws inadequate, they are not rigidly enforced, to the continuing disadvantage of working people who may well be unaware that the conditions under which they work are illegal.

Michael Nash has written this book in order to explain occupational health and safety law to Canadian working people but the book is of interest to employers and the general public as well. The book is divided into five parts which explain (i) what the law is; (ii) how to find out what is going on in the work place; (iii) how health and safety committees and representatives work; (iv) how the law is enforced; and (v) how injured employees are protected. Each section carefully sets out an abundance of information in clear and concise language, avoiding the cumbersome legalese one usually associates with books dealing with the law. The author goes beyond description of the existing situation and tries to anticipate the direction the law might take in the future.

This is a valuable and important book which will serve as an important reference throughout Canada in the years to come. The author has organized a complex and detailed mass of information into a thoroughly researched study. One should not be surprised at this however; that is how he wrote his essays during his student days at Brock from 1968-72.

Bill Matheson, Vice President, Academic, is well known for his wit, both on paper and at the lectern. Winner of the first Alumni Award for Excellence in Teaching, Professor Matheson has moved his office to the thirteenth floor, but is as evident in the classrooms as ever.

The year the lights came on again



We've turned the lights on again on the top floor of the Schmon Tower.

In the beginning, the highest floor of the Tower was illuminated every night, but this policy was forced to bow to the vigorous spirit of energy conservation in the 1970's. As a good corporate citizen, Brock felt obligated to reduce energy consumption by turning out ornamental lights.

For years after the official plug was pulled, the lights were used only infrequently, on special occasions. Last summer, they were turned on for the first time in many months in order that a nighttime photograph could be taken of the Tower.

When the lights went on, it became obvious

that a number of the neon bulbs needed to be replaced and so we remained illuminated while the repairs were done. People noticed our glow.

"During the few days that the lights were on, a number of people called to say how pleased they were to see the Tower lit again," said Doug Geddie, Director of External Relations. This put a new light on things, so to speak.

An investigation of the situation revealed that the lights actually cost less than a dollar a day to operate and in terms of visibility, that's pretty cheap advertising.

So, the lights are back on. Look for us when you drive past the escarpment at night; now you can't miss us.
