The Pacific agenda

uring the past few years, Canada has been undergoing an increasing orientation toward the countries of Asia Pacific.

The volume of our foreign trade across the Pacific out-stripped the volume shipped across the Atlantic during the last five years; the inflow of immigrants and refugees from Asia to Canada is greater than from Continental Europe, and is rapidly changing the ethnic composition of our country; there is a significant capital and investment inflow from Asia Pacific into Canada's economy with grave implications for our resources base and ownership structure; and finally there is the impact of high technology from that part of the world upon our manufacturing sector. In this sense, while Canada is maintaining its traditional ties-although diminished-with the ancestral homes of its early immigrants across the Atlantic, identification with the opportunities and problems across the Pacific is at hand. Canada has arrived as a Pacific country.


While undoubtedly great trade and business opportunities await Canada in the Asia Pacific region, it must be recognized that there lies ahead a concomitant competition for markets and technological know-how, as well as a large degree of interdependence between Canada and the countries of that region.

The Government of Canada perceives this prospect as inevitable during the coming years, and in anticipation of this development has prepared an agenda to meet the contingencies of the next decade and beyond, which is embodied in a new public policy appropriately titled Pacific 2000.

The most important aspect of this new agenda is a realization that the efficiency of some of the more modern economic and social systems in Asia Pacific—our partners and competitors—is to a great extent culture-bound and rooted in traditional values, attitudes and work ethic. For Canada to meet the opportunities and challenges in that region, our universities must train a new generation of scientists, researchers, teachers, businessmen and other professionals who understand this new environment and speak indigenous languages. Asia Pacific must be met on its own terms.

There's where Brock University comes in.

Many members of the staff in various departdividual, joint or co-operative projects, and



ments of the University, as well as the administration, would like to contribute to this national agenda by educating a new generation of students to meet the calls of Asia Pacific. Thus, to make our University even more relevant to the needs of the day and open new job opportunities for our graduates, the Centre For Canada And Asia Pacific Studies was set up in 1990.

both of us from the Department of Politics. When, in 1991, Professor Burton was seconded to the Canadian Embassy in Beijing as Attache for Cultural Affairs for two years, Professor Alfred Chan took over his position.

The Centre promotes teaching, research and academic exchanges in various disciplines and the subdisciplines of humanities, social sciences, natural sciences and business studies. Research can be undertaken as individual, joint or co-operative projects, and can employ various methodological approaches.

The Centre's activities are directed towards Canada's relations with various countries of Asia Pacific, as well as individual countries of the area. These include China, Japan, Korea, Russia's Siberia and Far East, Hong Kong, Taiwan, Philippines, Vietnam, Cambodia, Laos, Burma, Thailand, Malaysia, Singapore, Indonesia, Australia and New Zealand.


So far, the Centre a) has assisted the Department of Applied Languages in introducing basic courses in Mandarin and Japanese, with Korean to follow in 1993; b) co-operates with the Department of Management to secure a Visiting Professor from Japan to teach the Toyota, or other, system of management and other courses; c) encourages other relevant departments of Brock to modernize their offerings by introducing courses, or at least components, on some aspects of Asia Pacific; d) concluded or is negotiating student and faculty exchange agreements with Yonsei University in Seoul, Korea; Nanjing University and Yangzhou University, China; and Otaru University of Commerce, Otaru, Hokkaido, Japan; e) organized two academic conferences at Brock University; f) sponsored two research projects entitled A Dynamic Equilibrium Model of Trade Relations in Southeast Asia, and Socialization of Children in Chinese Immigrant Families in Ontario; and g) provided an academic home for visiting scholars from several countries from Asia.

Although the Centre is only in its second year of operations, these modest results seem to augur well for the future. Brock graduates interested in the Centre, are invited to call. There is a lot of work to be done. Help us to develop these new opportunities for our students.

Dr. Victor M. Fic taught Comparative Politics and Asian Studies in India, Burma and Singapore before coming to Brock in 1971. Although officially retired, Prof. Fic is busier than ever. On top of his duties as the Director of the Centre for Asia Pacific Studies at Brock, he continues to teach part-time.

A REAL HOMEBOY

D☆J☆JOE THE FIRST HIP☆HOP COMIC BOOK itus Ruddock ought to know. At one time — beginning in Grade 10, when the whole Rap thing started — this Brock University graduate (Class of '91) was a self-confessed "bigtime B-Boy." A classic B-Boy, Titus explains, listens to a lot of Rap music, wears a big-name athletic jacket and shoes and has a tall, column-shaped hairdo with a zig-zag running through it.

While still in high school, Titus and Anthony Clarke started up the business now known as Trac Grafix to produce

and market the A.L.C. Wear clothing line. Anthony did his first D.J. Joe drawing, based on the old "G.I. Joe" comic strip. Now Anthony does the artwork and Titus handles the business end of things. Anthony writes D.J. Joe, and they hire an artist to create the drawings in the D.J. Joe style.

wanted to be architects; but when Titus discovered it would take him "about 11 years" to become an architect, he began looking around for a more direct career path. "I was interested in economics," he says; then a friend suggested he go into business economics, "and I second agenda, though, for both comic book and clothing line: to

thought, why not just go into business, and get a broader perspective? I knew I wanted to learn about business, economics and politics, the three major areas that affect our society."

"Business administration and politics was my course, but all my lectures were in politics," Titus says with a grin. Prof. David Whitehead, with whom he studied organizational behavior theory, "was really impressive. He instilled professionalism in me." Bill Matheson and Nicolas Baxter-Moore are also on his list of favorite profs.

Why did Titus Ruddock choose Brock? "I went to see some friends there, and the buildings caught my architect's eye. And Brock has a university atmosphere in a high-school size: you get to know your profs." Titus knew what he wanted from a university education. At Brock his ideas were reinforced, and he became "more solid" in his business activities. Living offcampus "gave me a lesson in finance and budget." Students around him were running out of spending money, but Titus "had


> > What's the difference between Rap and Hip-Hop? "Hip-Hop is a culture," Titus explains. "Rap is a musical medium. Hammer is a Rapper, but he's not a homeboy. Ice Cube and Tin Dog are real Hip-Hop; they're homeboys. Their music is music from the streets with an important message, not just dance music. They're rapping about what's happening to them or in their own communities."

The black-and-white comic book features strong, high-contrast drawings. It isn't funny. Titus Ruddock says, "A lot of racial tension and censorship is explained in D.J. Joe. We're trying to help people outside understand

Hip-Hop culture, to be a bridge into it for them." To the outsider, these comic-book images can indeed be puzzling. To understand the Hip-Hop scene, Titus explains, you need to know about the violence stigma attached to concerts, and the U.S. organization PMRC (Parents Music Research Centre) that wants to ban Rap and other musics it doesn't want young people listening to. "They don't know enough about Rap to ban it," Titus argues. "If they succeed in banning Rap, they'll be cutting

when Rupy returns to the business. Meanwhile, they are planning young people off. Instead, they need to listen and understand, and help guide young people."

"We wanted to make the story very real," he explains, "so the

streets, the drug scene, and is trying to do something about it. D.J. Joe sees the violence being done by a new group in town led by a character called 'Malice.' He's trying to infiltrate Malice's group and help them stop being violent."

Unlike the usual comic-book hero, D.J. Joe has a real-life problem: he's become a star-a commercial Rapper - and the kids won't listen to him, because he's no longer poor like they are. D.J. Joe

is trying to show the kids "I'm down with you still," while showing them what they need to do to make a better place for themselves in society. "He's just a main character. In future issues we'll be having first bad grade and they think they're washed up; they drop out. For flashbacks to show how he got where he is."

And speaking of black heroes, you may be wondering whether Titus is related to boxer Razor Ruddock. The answer is yes, but Titus won't say much more than that about his family. "We're kind of strange," he observes. "We each do our own thing, and we respect each other. We're very spread out, but very strong." Razor was a good brother, Titus says. He didn't, however, teach Titus how to fight. "We all knew how to fight. He just capitalized on it."


These days, Titus is strictly an underground B-Boy. "It's harder to keep my identity in the corporate world," he admits. He went to Brock to learn "how to dress and all those things. I have to give a lot of credit to Brock," Titus says. "I'm usually a skeptic about things, but after four years there I felt I had learned what I went there for. It was very influential for me."

In addition to keeping Trac Grafix on track. Titus coaches gymnastics three times a week. and is a contract worker for Community and Social Services, "talking to youth, giving them life skills." Among the things he wants to impart to young people is his thirst for learning. "I wasn't an 'A' student," he admits. "I wanted to learn certain things from a course. The grade was incidental. I say this to the kids: a lot of

people put too much emphasis on grades. Kids aren't focused enough on the reason they should take the course in the first place; so the me, even if I failed the course, I got what I wanted."

Nestled in an industrial park in Brampton, the Trac Grafix shop is full of A.L.C. Wear, its walls lined with huge, menacing D.J. Joe graphics. Titus and Anthony pose for pictures against this backdrop. Asked to smile for the camera, they explain that because their message is serious, they want to look serious. Still, they can't get through a roll of film without their positive energy breaking out in a grin. Titus says people walking into the shop are surprised to find they listen to other kinds of music besides Rap. "I believe in creativity and being open-minded," he explains. His crowd is mostly black kids; but it's also Indian, Chinese and Muslim kids - "the Immigration Squad," they call themselves. "It's good to have other people's perspectives," he says, "to get energy from all sources."

Badgers boast the best



Varsity sports have always been an important part of Brock, and the Badgers hold special memories for many graduates.

1991/92 has been a stellar season for Brock athletics; many Badger teams have become a force to be reckoned with in Canada. Ex-Varsity athletes can be proud of this new generation of Badgers.

A brief run-down:

The men's basketball team is on its way to the National Championships in Halifax. The team has been ranked in the top 10 throughout the nation since the beginning of the season. Entering the OUAA West Division playoffs the Badgers were ranked number one in Canada and easily won their quarter-final against the Windsor Lancers and their semifinal against Waterloo. Coach Ken Murray has been named OUAA coach of the year in the West Division, and Brian Bleich (Year I arts) and Gord Wood (Year III bus) were named to the All-Star team, Gord Wood was also voted MVP of the year and Dave Picton (Year I acct) rookie of the year.

In women's basketball Tammy Naughton (Year III arts) has been named a tournament all-star three times, and Heather Kurtz (Year IV phys ed) once.

The men's **cross country** team enjoyed their best showing in years, placing fifth in the OUAA finals.

The Badgers hockey team continues to mature. They won three games over teams ranked in the nation's top 10, including a 6-5 overtime win at Western, the third year in a row that the Badgers have beaten Western in London. Scott Spittel (Year I bus econ) and Darren Macoretta (Year II arts) were named tournament all-stars earlier this season.

Brock's lacrosse team captured the OUFLA championship for the third straight season and fourth time in the past six years. In the past six seasons, the team has had a most impressive record of 69 wins and six losses.

Brock's rowing crews enjoyed a fine season culminating in gold medals for the women's lightweight doubles crew, and the men's lightweight doubles crew at the OUAA and OWIAA Championships.

The men's soccer team finished with a record of 4-3-3 and 11 goals in 10 games. Goalkeeper John Csuka (Year IV phys ed) was named a CIAU First Team All-Canadian, while teammate Paul DeLuca (Year IV biol) was named to the OUAA All-Star Team. The

soccer team was ranked as high as number eight in Canada during the season.

The women's soccer team was the most improved team in the OWIAA West Division, and ended a 29-game winless streak over the past three seasons by defeating Waterloo 1-0.

Both men's and women's swimming teams were ranked in the top 10 in Canada earlier this season. Six swimmers qualified for the CIAU Finals in Montreal, March 6, 7, 8: Allison Batstone (Year IV poli) Michelle Primeau (Year III rec), Heather Skulj (Year I phys ed), Julie Campbell (Year III rec), Baldev Ahluwalia (Year IV phys) and Tyler Clair (Year II phys ed/geog).

The women's volleyball team won the Guelph Invitational earlier this year with Stephanie Auld (Year II phys ed) being named

MVP and Leann Gatto (phys ed/geog) an allstar. Tanya Stephens (Year III phys ed) was named an all-star at the Waterloo Invitational.


In waterpolo, Sue Black (Year III phys ed) finished second in scoring at the OWIAA Waterpolo Championships.

The Brock wrestling team has won the University's first national championship. Brock wrestlers outpinned defending champions, the University of Manitoba Bisons, 29-24 during the CIAU Finals on Friday, February 28 and Saturday, February 29, 1992. Mc-Master was third with 16 points, followed by Concordia with 10, Regina with eight and Western with seven. Brock was not only the tournament host, they were ranked as the team to beat.

The team qualified eight members for the tournament and seven made the final round. All seven won medals. "It's great that we won," said a delighted Richard Deschatelets, who was selected CIAU Coach of the Year. Everyone delivered 120 percent, and that's what was needed to get the gold."

Marty Calder (65 kg), Luke Collison (68 kg), Aaron Pomeroy (76 kg), John Matile (Heavyweight) won gold for Brock, while Donovan Young (61 kg), Brent Beauparlant (82 kg) and Dave Knowles (90 kg) won silver. Marty Calder was also named the Meet's Outstanding Wrestler.

Marty Calder (Year IV phys ed) and John Matile (Year I arts) both hope to make the Canadian Olympic team and represent their country at 1992 Barcelona Olympics.




A fond farewell



any Brock graduates have fond memories of their university years, but they're not the only ones. Brock University has several faculty members who have remained with the school for over two decades, and they have their own stories to tell! For the next few issues, Surgite! will report on the memories of several of Brock's long-time faculty members.

Politics Professor Bill Hull arrived at Brock in 1965 and remembers those first few years at Brock clearly. One of his favorite stories concerns the first graduation at Brock. It was held on the podium that still surrounds the tower, although the main access ramp has been demolished to make room for Taro Hall. "It was a time when most women wore hats," he said. "It was dreadfully windy that day so the ladies sat there throughout the ceremony with one hand firmly clamped to their heads." The collapsible chairs used that gusty day also made it hard for people to keep a straight face. "Every time we stood up the seats snapped up and it sounded like a barrage of guns going off!"

Most popular professors have been the target of some good-natured pranks from their students, and Prof. Hull is no exception. One incident that still makes him laugh is New Years' Eve, 1967—the beginning of Canada's centennial year. "My wife and I had just settled down for the night after a New Year's Eve party," he said. "Then the phone rang and it was three of my students who had gone to Ottawa to take part in the centenary celebrations. They had decided to call and wish me a Happy New Year." He even remembers the culprits, John Auld, Philip Beaudoin and Allen Wright. "I think they poured themselves off the hill to call me!" he chuckled.








His other fond memories concern being the faculty advisor for the Brock Debating Society. "One of my proudest possessions is a little gavel given to me by the students involved in the society," he said.

There are sad memories too. "The sudden death of Prof. Jeff Davies, our first dean, was a great loss to the University," he remembers. "He died from a heart attack on his 45th birthday. It was a terrible shock." A plaque to the memory of Prof. Davies was installed in the Brock library. Of his first group of students, Prof. Hull also remembers Barrie-Ann (Kanard) Bergsma. "Tragically, Barrie-Ann died at just 31," Prof. Hull said. "She was one of the more lively students and made a very


important contribution to the first few years of this University." The Brock Alumni Silver Badger Award, given each year to a Brock student who has maintained a B average while contributing to extra-curricular activities at Brock, was established in memory of Barrie-Ann.

One of the founding faculty members of Brock is Prof. Juan Fernandez of the Department of French, Italian and Spanish. His most vivid memory is just getting to Canada from Spain and finding this brand new University! In September, 1964, after a frantic and confusing journey from Barcelona, Prof. Fernandez eventually arrived in Toronto. The Canadian consul had warned him that, be-





"Fortunately, I had my briefcase with me and could show all kinds of convincing evidence," Prof. Fernandez said. "But for two long minutes I had visions of people who were being swindled. 'How could the Ambassador himself fall for something like this?' I thought to myself. The officer eventually apologized and said, 'You learn something new every day!' I remember every detail so well that I can almost touch those events with my hand."





Prof. Brindle wins research award



rock University Chemistry Professor Ian Brindle won the 1991 Ministry of the Environment Excellence in Research Award to Principle Investigators in the Area of Analytic Methods and Instrument Development.

The Ministry cited Prof. Brindle's projects on "Development of an Automated Batch Hydride Generator for the Determinations of As and Se" and "Investigations into the Analysis of Hydride-Forming Elements."

"In everyday language," Professor Brindle explains, "that means we have developed a technique that improves the reliability of determining the levels of toxic elements, such as arsenic, in water and other materials."

Dean of Mathematics and Sciences Bill Cade says, "Ian Brindle works very hard to bring home his expertise to his students and other members of the University community. This research is as difficult to perform as it is important for the chemistry community and the population at large."

The award included a cheque for \$1,000 and a citation, presented at the Ministry's "Environmental Research: Technology Transfer" Conference, November 25 and 26 in Toronto. In addition, the Brock University Chemistry Department received a plaque recognizing its support and encouragement of Professor Brindle's research.


If it's Tuesday, this must be Kuala Lumpur

rock President Terry White described his recent three-week trip to the Pacific Rim as "anything but a jaunt." His hectic schedule included visits to Beijing; Hohhot, capital of Inner Mongolia; Kunming in south China; Hong Kong; Kuala Lumpur; Singapore; Taipei, capital of Taiwan; and Taichung, also in Taiwan.


