Brock's growing residence system is offering more students the opportunity to be part of its proud and awardwinning tradition of residence life.

Construction will be completed this fall on two new complexes — Arnie Lowenberger Residence and Quarry View Residence — expanding Brock's residence capacity to 2,400 beds. The new facilities are part of Brock's overall preparations for the arrival of the double cohort this fall.

"We are excited about the growth in the residence system at Brock and the opportunity for even more students to enjoy the benefits of living in residence," says Jamie Fleming, Brock's Director of Residence and Food Services.

Brock's complement of on-campus student housing includes the Alan Earp Residence, DeCew Residence, Gordon and Betty Vallee Residence and the Village Residence.

"We offer students an award-winning Residence Life program in which they will be involved in activities that create a special sense of community at Brock," adds Fleming. "For many students, living in residence is a life-changing experience. They meet new people and some establish lifelong friendships."

The Arnie Lowenberger Residence is located at the southwest corner of the Brock campus, nestled amongst the Village Residence townhouses. It will

offer accommodation for 311 students in both double and single rooms. There will be a common lounge in each hall, laundry facilities, and vending areas. Lowenberger also features a new residence dining hall that will help serve students living in the Village. The residence is named after Arnie Lowenberger, a former Brock faculty member, who retired in 1992. Lowenberger was the first Director of Physical Education and Recreation, prior to its becoming a Faculty, and he also served as Dean of Students which included responsibilities for student housing.

The incoming Head Resident of Lowenberger, Jen McGillis, is very excited about the opening of the new facility.

"I look forward to being a part of the student life experience at Lowenberger," says the third-year Kinesiology student. "The students living in Lowenberger will have a great opportunity to participate in activities that will demonstrate their pride in the residence and to contribute to campus life at



# Brock maintains its special qualities as it grows for the future

Brock graduates who return for a visit nearly all comment on how much the campus has changed. Certainly the construction of the last five years is impressive, as we began five years ago with Inniskillin Hall, and since have completed the Village 3 addition, Earp Residence, Harrison Hall, Scotiabank Hall, South Block, and the Walker Complex. As well, we currently have under way Lowenberger Residence and Quarry View Residence, to be completed by September 2003. And very soon, we shall be embarking on a significant addition to Taro Hall, which will include a new campus bookstore. All this construction is exciting, and certainly it has changed the face of the Brock campus.

It also reinforces the importance of the Campus Master Plan, recently adopted by the University as a blueprint for campus development for the next 30 years. Foremost in this plan is the recognition that Brock has a responsibility for the very special location of its campus, specifically that Brock must be environmentally sensitive to the Niagara Escarpment. As well, it reinforces the importance of maintaining a compact campus to ensure that important green space is not destroyed. Developed over 18 months, the Campus Master Plan was the result of broad consultation both inside and outside the immediate Brock community.

All this building is, of course, related to the enormous growth Brock has experienced over the last several years. In September 2003, which is the "double cohort" entry year, Brock will admit 4,100 first-year students, compared to 2,750 last year, as Brock's total student enrolment will grow to 15,000 students next year (compared to 13,129 in 2002-03). There is no question that Brock is becoming a different kind of institution. Despite this growth, however, we must remember and protect those elements of Brock that made the University special for so many of our graduates — its intimacy and connectedness, its small classes, Brock's commitment to teaching, its friendliness.

This will be a challenge, but it is a challenge we must meet. While the University has enjoyed many successes — growth in first-choice applications, new undergraduate and graduate programs, and an increased research activity — these

successes are only possible because of the firm foundation that was already established. The values and traditions that identified Brock in the past must not simply be thrown out in the interests of what is new and different. To do so would be an enormous disservice to those who have worked so hard over the last 40 years to make Brock the special university it is. This is not to say that things must remain the same; rather we need to determine what of Brock in the past is important to the Brock of the future.

We are coming to the end of a very eventful year for Brock and we anticipate next year will be even more eventful. I have been enormously gratified by the efforts of the Brock community faculty, staff, students, Trustees, and graduates — as we prepare for the unprecedented growth of next year. I believe we are ready, although there is no question that the year will bring its challenges. We have hired some excellent new faculty and staff, although we realize there are more to be appointed. It also appears our space needs are sufficient to handle all the new students. But as I keep reminding everyone, patience and forbearance are two qualities everyone will need next year, as we work together to ensure a quality experience for all our students.

I encourage graduates to return to campus to see all that has gone on at Brock. I know you will be proud of what has been achieved. But I think you will be pleased to find that the University you perhaps knew — when the institution was smaller — is still there and still a part of what makes Brock special.

# Provincial SuperBuild funding will help finance \$10-million development

The \$3.82 million in SuperBuild funding that Brock University will receive from the provincial government will help to finance a \$10-million development on campus which includes classrooms, computer labs, office space and a new bookstore.

The new facilities, to be completed by January 2005, will create 780 additional student spaces to help Brock meet an increase in student demand due to the double cohort, the University's growing national reputation, its new and innovative programs, and its unprecedented number of applications.

"In the last few years, we have experienced an estimated \$100 million in development on campus, and we are still in need of space," said Brock President David Atkinson. "We are pleased with the support we have received from the Province and from our local provincial representatives. This development is an important step in the evolution of Brock University, which has made great strides over the last few years."

The provincial government recently announced that Brock would receive \$3.82 million as part of the latest SuperBuild initiative to create new student spaces at post-secondary institutions across Ontario. Brock's SuperBuild funding is allocated for the Taro Hall Academic Expansion, which includes the construction of a three-storey building joining Taro Hall and the Alumni Student Centre near the centre of campus.

Total cost of Brock's new academic facilities is estimated at \$6 million, the balance of which will be financed by the University. SuperBuild funding covers costs of constructing the second and third floors of the building, plus the renovation costs associated with converting the existing bookstore space into academic space. The first floor of the building, which is not part of the SuperBuild application, will house a new bookstore. The bookstore will cost an additional \$4.1 million, to be financed by the University and by bookstore revenues.

Much of the new academic space will allow for expansion in the Faculty of Social Sciences and will also provide dedicated space for the Faculty of Business, whose programs are among the fastest growing at the University at both the undergraduate and graduate levels. The additional computer labs will provide technology support for students across the campus.

The construction of these new facilities will raise Brock's economic impact on the community, which is now estimated at \$263 million annually.

In 2000, Brock received \$15.57 million in SuperBuild funding for its new academic buildings on the west end of the campus. Over the last several years, Brock has invested about \$100 million in new academic and classroom space, new technology, a food court, student residences and recreational facilities for students and the community.

# Brock's annual economic impact on Niagara rises to \$263 million

As the size of Brock University increases, so too does its impact on the Niagara economy. A recent study prepared by the University's Department of Economics indicates that Brock's annual economic impact on the Niagara region increased to \$263,365,940 for the 2001-2002 fiscal year.

"Apart from its role as an educational and cultural centre, Brock University has a significant and growing impact on the economy of the Niagara region," said Economics Professor Lewis Soroka, one of the authors of the study. "Annual spending by the University, its students and staff has increased over the years and is now responsible for creating 4,975 full-and part-time jobs in the region on an

annual basis."

The \$263 million in spending represents an increase of more than \$100 million over a 10-year period. A similar study of Brock's 1991-1992 fiscal year determined that the University's annual

economic impact on Niagara was \$155 million.

The latest study examines the operating budget of the University, student spending, spending by the Brock University Students' Union (BUSU) and the University's capital spending. These numbers are adjusted to account for the spending that would remain in the region if the University did not exist, leaving the net spending in Niagara that is attributable to Brock. Finally, a regional economic multiplier is applied to that figure to calculate the final total impact of the University on Niagara.

Among the report's highlights:

• A student living off campus spends, excluding tuition fees and books, approximately \$4,714 over the academic year on room and board. In addition, this average student spends approximately \$3,321 on other expenses. In all, the 2,977 non-local students living off campus spend \$23,923,172 in the local economy.

• Investment in capital assets in 2001-02 totalled \$20,420,000, and included spending on various construction projects as well as renovations and alterations. The University itself spent an estimated \$71,351,403 in the Niagara region during the 2001-02 fiscal year.

• 75.4 per cent of the University's total operating expenses were represented by salaries paid to the University's faculty and staff, including both full- and part-


time employees.

• 90.1 per cent of full-time employees and 55.2 per cent of all part-time employees live in the Niagara region. It is therefore assumed that 90.1 per cent of total full-time salaries and benefits and 55.2 per cent of total part-time salaries and benefits were spent locally. Based on these allocations, 79.3 per cent of total operating expenditures (\$71,351,403) were made within the region, while only 20.7 per cent (\$18,572,596) was spent outside the region.

• BUSU has revenues that would not be spent in Niagara if Brock did not exist. Total expenditures for the student union in 2001-02 amounted to \$3,150,107. Of this amount, 33 per cent (\$1,049,413) was spent outside Niagara and 67 per cent (\$2,100,694) was spent within the region.

In addition, enrolment at Brock also benefits the City of St. Catharines and Niagara Region through annual revenues these municipalities receive for students enrolled at the University. Under the Municipal Act, the University is exempt from paying property taxes and instead pays to the City and to the Region a set amount for each full-time enrolled student. In 2002, Brock paid \$75 per student, or \$647,850, to the City and to the Region (\$337,076 and \$310,774 respectively) to offset costs of providing services. The University receives a provincial grant each year to cover this payment.

### In Memoriam

In April, the Brock community joined with the family and friends of the late Professor Bert Holland, FRSC (UK), MCIC, Department of Chemistry, for a public memorial service, held in Pond Inlet.

Professor Holland passed away peacefully, surrounded by his family, on April 7 after a courageous battle with cancer.

The following are excerpts from an article about Professor Holland, written by Dr. Ian Brindle, Dean of the Faculty of Mathematics and Sciences, and submitted to the *Canadian Chemical News* and the *Green Chemistry Journal* in the UK:

"Bert was always a soft-spoken colleague, whose teaching was greatly appreciated by many generations of students. Bert was born in Bolton (UK) and attended Canon Slade School. Subsequently, he took a degree in Chemistry at Cambridge, followed by an

lge, followed by an MSc at Warwick University and a PhD at Queen's University in Belfast, where he worked with the eminent Professor Henbest. He spent the years between 1972 and 1976 at McMaster as a post-doctoral fellow and later as

a teaching fellow, working with Professor Dave MacLean.

Bert was an eclectic researcher and he wholeheartedly immersed himself in the new area of biotransformations, an area in which he made major contributions to the understanding and exploitation of microbial systems and enzymes for chemical transformations. He was the author of over 120 papers and communications, more than 30 reviews and book chapters, and two books on biotransformations. Bert's interests in biotransformations led him naturally to the area of Green Chemistry where he made substantial contributions.

A colleague, Dr. Paul Anastas, from the White House Office of Science & Technology, writes: "Bert Holland brought perspective, thoughtfulness and creativity to all of his work and this was especially true of his work in green chemistry. While Bert will certainly be missed his contributions will long be appreciated and built upon."

Bert's legacy of students, who can be found across the world, will be deeply saddened by his loss. Bert leaves his wife Frances, and sons Giles and Colin."

During the accreditation process, Brock was visited and evaluated by business school deans detailed knowledge management education, applying accreditation standards that are widely in the accepted educational community.

The accreditation by AACSB International takes effect immediately and covers all aspects of the Faculty of Business at Brock, including undergraduate and graduate programming.

"I am extremely proud of the hard work and contributions by all members of the Faculty of Business in achieving this rare distinction," said Martin Kusy, Dean of the Faculty of Business at Brock. "This accreditation demonstrates our ongoing dedication to excellence in teaching and research

that prepares students to meet the challenges of today's global and information-technology driven business environment.

"AACSB accreditation will increase the value of a Brock business degree for students and graduates internationally, and will add prestigious recognition to the University overall," Kusy said. "This accreditation will also bring numerous benefits to the Niagara region. Local employers and businesses will no doubt be extremely impressed by this world-class recognition as the University continues to attract the best students and professors."

During the two-year review process, the review team found that the focus by the Faculty of Business at Brock on applied and theoretical practices is exemplified in its excellent co-op program that is the second largest in Canada. Among other findings, the review team also highlighted the emphasis Brock placed on an education environment that encourages diversity, innovation and excellence in research, teaching and service.

Brock's first MBA class begins in September 2003. The program will reinforce integration of subject matter, global aspects of the discipline, ethical consideration, development of communication skills and the use of management of information technology in such areas as e-business, Web-based research and decision support systems.

The Faculty of Business also offers a Master of Accountancy and an International Master of Accountancy. As well, a cost recovery option for international students of the MBA program is under development.

AACSB International is a not-forprofit organization consisting of more than 900 educational organizations and corporations. Its mission is excellence in management education in colleges and universities. Headquartered in St. Louis, Mo., AACSB International is the premier accrediting agency and service organization for business schools.

from the Brock campus. There will be 288 furnished, single rooms in a mixture of three-bedroom and four-bedroom units. Each unit will have one four-piece washroom, one two-piece washroom, a communal living/dining area and kitchen equipped with a refrigerator and stove. Quarry View also offers students an extended stay to the end of May, a month longer than the other residences. "At Quarry View, students will

experience a more independent lifestyle but at the same time they still have the supportive nature and wonderful programs and activities of the Residence program," says Quarry View Head Resident Andrea Tucker, a third-year Brock student in the concurrent Child and Youth Studies and Education program. "Residence living provides a very warm environment — for me, it has been my second home."







# Brock graduate researches non-chemical control of insect pests

Biological Sciences Professor Mike Bidochka's laboratory contains the largest collection of insect-pathogenic fungi in Canada.

An estimated 1,000 tubes containing different species of fungi are an integral part of his research to better understand these particular fungi — also known as pathogens - in order to use these existing microorganisms to control insect pests found on Ontario crops rather than using chemical pesticides, which are often harmful.

Bidochka, a Brock graduate, is using fungi from Ontario only because using "exotic" fungi from other countries or environments could pose a larger ecological or environmental threat if released into an unfamiliar environment.

The Brock professor is in the first year of a four-year project funded by the Natural Sciences and Engineering Research Council (NSERC). And, already he has significant findings to bring to the world of microbiology. Bidochka has proven unfounded the belief that many scientists have had for decades that pathogens are only associated with the insects they infected.

"Many of these pathogens are associated with habitats and not with different insects," he says. In other words, fungi are not linked to the insect they infect, but instead fungi are linked to the environment, the habitat within which they infect insects.

For Bidochka and the field of microbiology, this discovery has some


important applications.

"What we're saying now is that if you've got an insect in a certain habitat, you use that fungus because that fungus has adapted to that habitat," he said. "And then it can kill the insect as a sort of by-product of its lifestyle. That's a pretty big deal in terms of turning things around.

Bidochka, who joined Brock as an Assistant Professor in 2001, has always been interested in controlling insects. It was while reading Rachel Carson's book Silent Spring as an undergraduate honours student of Biological Sciences at Brock in the late '70s that he realized pesticides can be dangerous. In her book, Carson talked about the harmful effects of DDT (the Nobel prizewinning pesticide used to control insects in agriculture and insects that carry diseases such as malaria) on the ecosystem. DDT's harmful effects on people, wildlife and the environment resulted in the banning of the pesticide in most of the developed world within 10 years of the publishing of Carson's book.

"Very few people are actually funded to look at the mechanisms by which insects are killed by these fungi or microorganisms. It's really important because, if I go back to Rachel Carson and DDT, people thought that in the '50s DDT was the big saviour, the start of the 'green revolution' because it kills all insects. Well, obviously they didn't study the long-term consequences of DDT. The more you know about these microorganisms and how they work, the more information you have about how to use them in a safe and economically feasible manner."

After reading Silent Spring, Bidochka developed the attitude that knowledge is power and has dedicated most of his research to knowing before acting. The



Mike Bidochka.


response to his work has been encouraging. Another reason for Bidochka's success is his broad-based research approach, something he acquired as a Brock student. "Personally, I think I am a dying breed of biologists who are using a broad-based approach. So,

I feel like I'm a bit more flexible. Part

of that has to do with my education.

I thought I had a really good, broadbased education at Brock, and I feel really good about coming back."

### West Nile research team trains health workers

Biological Sciences Professor Fiona Hunter is playing a key role in ongoing research into the West Nile Virus. For the past three years, Dr. Hunter's West Nile Virus research team has been working closely with public health units across Ontario as part of a mosquito surveillance program. In May, Dr. Hunter's team held a four-day mosquito identification workshop, at Brock, for public health workers from across Canada. Identifying the different species is important in order to determine which ones carry the West Nile Virus and to determine appropriate methods of mosquito population control.

# Brock Athletics announces 2003 Hall of Fame Inductees





Here are brief bios on the athlete and builder inductees:




Michele Luke (1985-90) Women's Basketball

In the Brock record books, she holds two single game records for most free throws made in a game (15) and most free throws attempted in a game (20). She also ranks first all-time 3-pt Shooting percentage in a career (40.0). She ranks in the Top 20 all-time in four categories which includes scoring (2nd, 1569 points), free throws made (7th, 247), rebounds (16th, 382) and assists (4th, 276).
