APPOINTMENTS MADE IN DEPARTMENT OF BIOLOGICAL SCIENCES

Dr. B. M. Millman, Chairman of the Department of Biological Sciences, announced the arrival of Dr. Thomas W. McIntyre, who joined the department on July 1 as a research fellow.

Dr. McIntyre has been awarded a two-year post-doctoral fellowship by the Muscular Dystrophy Association of Canada and will conduct X-ray diffraction research on living muscle in collaboration with Prof. Millman. Dr. McIntyre will assist also with the first year biology laboratory.

Dr. McIntyre received his Ph.D. in 1965 from the University of California in Los Angeles, and has been an assistant professor there in the departments of physiology and biophysics until his coming to Brock.

THE PRESIDENT AND MRS. GIBSON RECEIVE LIEUTENANT BAILIFF OF GUERNSEY

On Saturday, August 26, Mr. B. G. Blampied, M.B.E., Lieutenant Bailiff of Guernsey, visited the Brock Tower where he was received at tea in the presidential suite by Dr. and Mrs. Gibson.

Mr. Blampied, who is a Jurat in the Royal Court on the Isle of Guernsey, visited Canada to meet with the Guernsey Cattle World Conference. In the course of conversation Mr. Blampied explained that a jurat is, among other things, a member of the court's permanent, elected twelve-man jury. "Guernsey has" he said, "too small a population to give ease to finding enough disinterested persons for innumerable new juries as is done by law and custom in Canada and elsewhere in the British tradition."

Mr. Blampied is lieutenant to Sir William Arnold, Bailiff and President of the States of Deliberation, who in these offices is justice of the Royal Court and presiding officer of the Guernsey parliamentary body. It is Sir William Arnold who earlier arranged the gift to Brock University of a block of

granite taken from General Sir Isaac Brock's home in Guernsey. The stone will be placed at the entrance to the Brock Tower.

Mr. Blampied said that there is much interest in Brock University on Guernsey. "General Brock was from one of the oldest leading families of Guernsey," he said, "going back to the 11th century or so, and his lateral descendents still live on the Island. We conquered the English back in 1066, you know."

Coming from an English Channel island only nine miles long and five wide, Mr. Blampied admitted to bewilderment at the distances he travelled in Canada. "Canadians," he said, "are most hospitable. When two hours have passed since my last meal, they assume that I am fainting away and feed me again. Canadians seem to eat a lot."

During his visit Mr. Blampied was escorted through the Tower by the President and Mrs. Gibson. Later in the day he was taken to see the monument at Queenston Heights.

HADASSAH TO PRESENT RARE BOOKS TO BROCK UNIVERSITY

On September 27 at 8 p.m. the Peninsula chapters of the Hadassah Wizo of Canada will present to Brock University an 18 volume special edition of the Soncino Talmud. The presentation is a part of the Hadassah centennial celebration and the books are like those given at Expo '67 last May 24 to the University of Montreal, McGill and Sir George Williams Universities.

Mrs. Sheila Newman of the St. Catharines Henrietta Szold Chapter of Hadassah Wizo has extended a cordial invitation to Brock University faculty to attend the presentation, which will be held in the St. Catharines Jewish Community Centre at Church and Calvin Streets. NEW LIBRARY RESERVE BOOK SYSTEM

John Burtiak, Assistant to the Chief Librarian, has announced that a new Reserve Book System will be in operation in the Library for the coming fall term.

An attempt is being made to establish an undergraduate collection, located on the main floor. The books in this collection - the "open stack reserve" - will circulate for home use as follows:

Books charged out on:	are due in on:
Monday	Thursday
Tuesday	Friday
Wednesday Thursday Friday Saturday	Monday

The books will be due any time on the due day and will be renewable for a further period if there are no other requests for them.

The second category of reserve books is the "2 hour/overnight reserve". The books in this collection, located at the circulation desk, are to circulate within the Library for two-hour periods between 9:00 am and 5:00 pm (renewable if not requested by other readers), and for home use after 5:00 pm. They will be due back the following morning by 10:00 am. On special request from evening division instructors, books in this category may be placed on a limited reserve; these will not circulate outside the Library until 15 minutes before closing time, and then overnight to day students only if an evening division student does not first claim the book. Books on this limited reserve, if borrowed by evening students would be due back according to the table above for "open stack reserve."

Faculty members are requested, when compiling or revising their reserve lists, to bear these categories in mind and to indicate which books should be placed in which category; either in the "2 hour/overnight reserve", for selected books of prime importance to the courses and which will be in heavy demand by the students; or in the "open stack reserve", for books related to the courses as background material and books of more general interest to the undergraduate.

INITIAL REGISTRATION OF NEW STUDENTS COMPLETED

While further registrations of new students may yet be accepted, essentially the job of signing-up the "frosh" has been done.

At the close of initial registration, it appeared that 344 freshmen had entered for the new term. Among these, the men outnumber the women more than two-to-one. Of the four foreign students, only one is from the United States. One has entered from Quebec. The balance are from the Peninsula, Toronto, Hamilton and other places in Ontario. Approximately two-thirds are Peninsula residents.

Until registration has been completed, including the registration of students in second to fourth years, the total number of students enrolled for the year cannot be known.

LATIN WORKSHOPS SCHEDULED

Classics -- Prof. A. D. Kahn, department head, working in conjunction with the Niagara Peninsula Classics Association, has scheduled a series of nine workshops for Peninsula Latin teachers and their opposites on the New York Niagara Frontier.

Opening at the Sheraton-Brock Hotel with a banquet on September 29, the series will continue in monthly meetings through May 18. Workshop leaders will come from Ontario, Ohio, New York and Michigan.

SIGHTED SERPENT SEIZED SAME

Biosciences -- Miss Jean Kellock, secretary to Dr. Millman, reports that Sammy the Serpent is in good health.

Last week Dr. Mayer, Prof. Goldsmith and Spencer Williams captured a four-foot native Milk Snake by the parking lot on DeCew Campus.

Using the traditional equipment of the herpetologist - a fishing rod and a beer carton - the hunters pinned the reptile and placed the open carton upside-down over him. He promptly wriggled inside to seek refuge.

Closing the carton, they placed it in Prof. Goldsmith's car. He and Dr. Mayer drove to Mayer's home for his children to see the captive.

Sammy is now in company with a cousin, a Northern Water Snake, in the bioscience lab. The department gives assurance that the Milk Snake is harmless.

Miss Kellock says that Sammy will be fed mice when he begins to eat. "It is not unusual," she commented, "for snakes to go without eating for the first couple weeks of captivity."

LIBRARY COOPERATION WILL AID FACULTY AND GRADUATE STUDENTS UNDER NEW SCHEME

An agreement among fourteen university libraries in Ontario will give faculty and graduate students access to library resources across the Province effective October 1. The agreement has been drawn by the Ontario Council of University Librarians and approved by the Committee of Presidents of Universities of Ontario.

Under the scheme, a faculty member or graduate student may visit any of the cooperating libraries and obtain most of the services available to the faculty or graduate students of the university he visits. Graduate students will be required to show their own university identification cards and to present special visiting forms obtained from their own chief librarian. Visiting faculty members may obtain a special OCUL faculty introduction card from their own chief librarian. Access to closed book-stacks in certain libraries may also be granted upon special request to the chief librarian of the individual's own university.

The visiting privileges include use of normal library facilities, reference service photocopying, but do not include the borrowing of library materials. Interlibrary borrowing will be made easier by the visiting scheme, however, since the visitor may identify material he wishes to borrow later, and examine it to be sure the interlibrary loan will be worth the time and cost involved.

Graduate students and faculty members planning to visit other universities should

ask their own librarian, or his designated representative, for an introduction card or visiting form. Certain libraries, in agreeing to the plan, have regretted that their facilities are so crowded with their own users that unless these formalities are compiled with and in some cases advance notice is given, they may be unable to accommodate visitors.

A handbook listing hours and regulations of libraries in the cooperating group is being prepared by the Ontario Council of University Librarians. A general guide to collections and resources has already been projected by the OCUL as a result of the Downs Survey of Canadian academic libraries, carried out by the Association of Universities and Colleges of Canada and the Canadian Library Association, early in 1967.

A teletype network already links the cooperating university libraries to speed interlibrary loan requests, requests for visits, and location of needed library materials.

Announcing the cooperative scheme for graduate students and faculty, the library council stated that the development of undergraduate library resources and services is a basic responsibility of each member university. This development to meet fully the needs of undergraduates was recommended by the Spinks Commission on graduate studies in Ontario, and approved by the Committee of Presidents of Universities. Undergraduates are therefore not included in the cooperative use scheme.

INTER-UNIVERSITY LIBRARY TRANSIT SYSTEM

Library resources of all 14 provincially assisted Ontario universities together with those of the National Library and the National Science Library will this year be available to any graduate student or faculty member at any of these universities as a result of major co-operative steps taken by the Ontario Council of University Librarians, an affiliate of the Committee of Presidents of Universities of Ontario.

The first of these co-operative ventures, the inter-university library transit system, will be launched this week. Headquartered at York University in Metropolitan Toronto, under the supervision of T. F. O'Connell, Director of Libraries of that University, a fleet of five station-wagons will visit 12 of the 14 universities every day, five days a week, at least 50 weeks of the year, collecting and delivering requested library materials. The two most northerly universities, Lakehead at Port Arthur and Laurentian at Sudbury, will participate via air freight. Initially, the purpose of the transit system will be to transport library materials but it is envisaged that, at a later stage, people may be transported as well.

While educational institutions have for some years made their resources available to each other, a study by OCUL indicates that the average interval between request and delivery date has been nearly eight days. Under the new system, requests will normally be filled in 24 hours or less.

Four routes have been tentatively worked out covering Toronto, London, Windsor, Peterborough, Guelph, Waterloo, Kingston, Ottawa, Hamilton and St. Catharines. Two vehicles will

probably have to be used on the Toronto-Kingston-Ottawa run.

Estimated annual operating cost of this venture in co-operation (which is being borne by the Universities) is \$75,000, or slightly over \$5,000 per university. In addition to greatly speeding up the exchange of material, the new system will save in staff time taken to process requests, wrap parcels, type labels and deliver parcels to campus postal centres. It will also save on postage, Telex messages, and so on. It is expected that the average cost of transporting books will be substantially reduced under the new system. The new system also minimizes chances of damaging valuable books or documents. Some 25,000 items yearly are exchanged by Ontario university libraries and once the new service is initiated the volume is expected to rise sharply.

The need for a daily courier service operating among the 14 universities throughout the year was noted by the Spinks report as the most effective means from the standpoint of time and wear and tear on books of sharing the total graduate resources of the Province "in the face of woeful inadequacies of present collections." Similar inter-library transit services have been in operation in Kansas and Colorado for some time, but the Ontario system will be the most extensive library transit scheme yet undertaken.

The service, which begins with the university term, would work this way: a graduate or honours student at university "A" requires a certain book or material which his university does not have. The university, via Telex, passes on the request to the National Union Catalogue in Ottawa which replies by Telex giving

the various locations of the material. The borrowing library then (also by Telex) arranges for the pick-up of the book on the next courier call from the closest source. To organize and operate the courier service, York University has added to its library staff Mr. R. G. Hitchman, former Command Ordnance Officer at Central Command. Previously, Mr. Hitchman commanded some of Canada's largest supply depots. He was the original chairman of the committee formed to establish the Canadian Forces Base, Toronto.

In keeping with a decision of the Committee of Presidents of Universities of Ontario on the recommendation of the Council of University Librarians that the development of undergraduate library resources and services is a basic responsibility of each member university, undergraduates are not included in the co-operative-use scheme.

The transportation of materials other than books and manuscripts may be arranged by contacting the librarian.

ADMINISTRATIVE NOTES

Physical Plant - The Tower elevator shaft doors (outer doors) are equipped with a positive electrical door-closing device. After these doors start to close, they should not be interfered with in any way in attempt to hold the elevator car at the floor. This action usually causes a fuse to blow, and removes the elevator from service.

The elevator car doors (inner doors) have a protective device on the inside front edge of each panel. Should one of these be touched while the doors are closing, both the shaft and car doors will return to the open position. Use of this device is the only method recommended for re-opening doors after they have begun to close.

Users of elevators are asked not to touch the "Emergency Stop" button on the operating panel during normal operation. That button is intended for emergencies.
