

## Brock graduate blazes a trail

Since graduating from Brock's Faculty of Education in 1977, Ron Lancaster has applied a creative touch to teaching mathematics

hen Ron Lancaster decided to pursue a teaching degree at Brock University, it was on the advice of a friend.

As he looks back over 17 years of teaching, he can't help but wonder what might have happened had his friend suggested he pursue another career.

"I had an undergraduate degree from Mc-Master and I was studying for my Masters at Carleton," says Ron, a math teacher at St. Mildred's-Lightbourn School, an all-girls school in Oakville. "I wasn't sure if I wanted to stay in the program but I didn't know what to do. So, I asked a friend and he said go into teaching."

It's all worked out very nicely for Ron since graduating from Brock University's Faculty of Education in 1977.

"I had some very special moments at Brock. I came into contact with people who had a powerful influence on me. They were people who showed me this would be a very good profession to be involved in."

Ron is a three-time recipient of Hilroy Foundation awards, which recognize innovative and creative teaching.

His most recent award came this spring in recognition of his work in developing Math Trails, which he describes as "an integrated learning experience."

Math Trails, including two developed for downtown Toronto, are guided walks during which students answer mathematical questions related to architecture, public art and other things they encounter along their way.

He thought of the idea while working on a series of mathematics programs for TVOntario.

"I had some very special moments at Brock. I came into contact with people who had a powerful influence on me."

"We were shooting outside the studios and I was looking into the camera and started thinking, I should be out here with my students," said Ron.

"It's a wonderful experience to watch kids learn math from a different environment and away from a textbook.

"Kids like the creative touch and applying math to the world around us. They like the fact that I'm not at the front of the class, putting things on a chalkboard."


As a professor for 29 years and an administrator for almost as long, Bill Matheson has watched Brock University mature into a self-confident and respected undergraduate university.

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

## Brock's success provides momentum for an exciting future

t would not be wrong to say that every new President initiates some sort of planning process. That he or she does so really has little to do with the individual involved; rather, it is what the appointment of a new President represents. It is a watershed — an opportunity to reflect on what the University has accomplished, and to determine where it should go in the future.

Any reflection on the last 35 years of Brock's history reveals that Brock is an institution ideally positioned for the future.

While firmly rooted in the Niagara region, Brock currently attracts 69 per cent of its students from outside Niagara, suggesting that its commitment to students has a broad appeal in Ontario. Brock has achieved a solid reputation for its research, and for its role as an educational, recreational, and artistic centre for the entire Niagara region. Despite a decade of underfunding, it has exercised sound fiscal management that has allowed the institution to remain debt free. This enviable financial position, which few Ontario universities enjoy, will allow us needed flexibility in meeting the challenges of the future. Brock's greatest strength remains, however, its people. The very real sense of community at Brock, which includes faculty, staff, and students, engenders commitment to improving on the excellence that already characterizes the University.

No university can stand still, especially in the current very competitive environment, where we must compete for students, funding, and research support. It is critical that Brock articulate a unique identity that positions it in relation to other Ontario and Canadian universities.

The University must use its resources in a way consistent with a clearly defined set of institutional priorities into which the entire University community has input. At the same time, we must be cautious in calling for change, and recognize Brock's already established traditions and values.

While the role of universities is changing rapidly, we must not embrace change without giving careful thought to what we are giving up. We must avoid change that is

merely fashionable, and that has no longterm significance for the University.

With these concerns in mind, I called for the establishment of a President's Task Force on Planning and Priorities to develop an institutional plan for the next five years.

The Task Force was charged with examining and making recommendations on a wide range of issues crucially important to the University; these included: Brock's Student Focus, Curriculum and Programming, Research and Graduate Studies, Extension and Continuing Education, Revenue Generation, Staff and Faculty Development.

The Task Force, which was widely representative of the Brock community, began its work in October, 1997, by establishing a series of subcommittees to examine each of the above issues. We elicited input both from the University community, and from the community at large. It has been clear, from the very beginning, that the University took the exercise seriously.

The Task Force received 85 submissions. amounting to more than 1,000 pages of text. The Task Force also solicited views from its external community, and focus-group sessions were held with the various Deans' Councils, the Alumni Board, local teachers and principals, and the Board of Trustees. From this extensive input, a drafting committee has been busy writing a preliminary report, which will be circulated to the University in late May.

The University community will have two months to provide a response to this preliminary draft, which is still very much a "work in progress." This input will, in turn, contribute to the writing of a second interim report. Further response from the community will be requested, with the intention being that a final document should be sent to the Board and the Senate this September, for approval. Both bodies will need to give approval, as the final set of recommendations will have both academic and resource implications.

Brock University has never attempted an exercise of this sort previously, and while it has generated much excitement and interest. it has also produced anxiety about the future. So often one tends to associate words like "downsizing" and "restructuring" with planning exercises. While we wish to find a way of using our resources in the most effective and efficient way possible, there is no intention that we shall need fewer people to achieve our goals. Just the contrary is the

Brock's successes are the result of the efforts of everyone, both faculty and staff, and it can ill afford to lose anyone at such a crucial point in its history. One must recognize that developing a plan is only the beginning, and that it is the follow-up — actually making change happen — that is the hard part. This will require that everyone takes ownership of the process and be engaged in it. I expect the plan to be far reaching in its recommendations, as we position ourselves for the future. I have every reason to believe that Brock is up to the challenge, and I look forward to the exciting times ahead.

renewing friendships which have rusted over

In March, colleagues, friends, students and graduates celebrated his retirement at a dinner, with proceeds towards establishing the Bill Matheson Bursary. Although not all the details have been worked out, Prof. Matheson expects the award will be given annually to a student majoring or co-majoring in politics.

"The bursary is a wonderful thing," he said. "I hope it will help students over the financial rough spots so that they can continue studies without interruption."

It's a fitting and gratifying tribute to the man who, since coming to Brock in 1969, estimates he has taught as many as 15,000 students. He has received two major teaching awards at Brock. In 1980, Prof. Matheson received the first Brock Alumni Award for Excellence in Teaching, and 14 years later, he was chosen as the first recipient of a similar honour from Brock's Student Union.

"Teaching is something I do best," he said. "I don't know why. It's really something that seemed to come naturally to me," he said.

"When I came here I had never taught before, but I watched carefully. I spent a good deal of time being taught.

"You don't need students to love you, but you do need them to respect you and you can't give up on them. You have to take teaching very seriously and be prepared to deal with what comes before you, the good, the bad, the indifferent."

And sometimes even the unexpected as he recounted stories from the thousands upon thousands of hours he spent lecturing. One incident stands out, not only because it's unusual, but it's an indication of his unflappable personality.

"Years ago they allowed students to smoke in the classes," recalled Prof. Matheson. "I remember this one woman who would sit at the back and during my lectures she would smoke and read the Globe and Mail.

"One day she got careless with her cigarette and the newspaper caught on fire. I could see all this while I was lecturing and I watched her try to take control of the situation. I didn't miss a word of my lecture and somehow she managed to put the fire out."

Probably some of his greatest challenges came with his administrative responsibilities. Those began in 1976, when he was named the first Dean of Social Sciences,

while still an Assistant Professor.

Prof. Matheson was Acting President for a brief period in 1983 and went on to serve several years as Vice-President, and later Vice-President, Academic. He held that postition until leaving administration in 1990.

"I enjoyed administration. It was always stressful. We were always behind the eightball financially. To help steer a new university was an opportunity I always appreciated and tried to make the most of. I was sorry to leave in 1990.'

This year, he was involved in the Planning and Priorities Task Force established by Brock President David Atkinson.

When he leaves Brock at the end of Spring Session, he retires with the comfort of believing the University has a strong plan of action for its future course.

"My hope is that we remain basically an undergraduate university," he said. "That is what we do best. I think with the task force we have a pretty well thought out plan to follow for the next four to five years."

am very pleased to join the Brock University community as the Associate Vice-President, Student Services. The many Brock students, alumni, faculty and staff who I've met in my first few months here have a wonderful enthusiasm for our University. Our goal in Student Services is to contribute to that ongoing enthusiasm with excellent service to students.

We want to keep and improve upon Brock's outstanding reputation as a truly student-centred university.

When Brock's administration reorganized and created this position, it was with a commitment toward providing leadership to the broad spectrum of student-related issues. That began with the addition of the Liaison and Recruitment Office, and the Registrar's Office, to the Student Services portfolio.

We're a large and diverse group of more than 80 dedicated staff, all sharing a common goal in our desire to provide excellent service to Brock students.

Our responsibilities include the Student Development Centre, Campus Ministries, Residences and Conference Services, Recruitment and Liaison, the Registrars Office, International Services, Health Services and Native Students Advisor.

I want to focus my attention on two main goals — quite simply, to enhance student service and student success at Brock. More specifically, that will involve new planning and review processes, developing a strategy for enrolment management, an expanded recruitment campaign and revitalizing orientation and support programs.

Graduates and community members will be pleased to know that, with the support of the campus community and great staff efforts, we've started on this path with several new initiatives this

spring. Our admissions and recruitment offices are spearheading a new communications plan to provide applicants with more frequent information about Brock.

To provide more comprehensive financial planning assistance to our students, the OSAP office and the Scholarships and Bursaries office were combined under one manager. The new Student Awards and Financial Aid Office is still located on both the 3rd and 4th floors of the Schmon Tower. But we hope, by next spring, to consolidate the staff in one accessible location for students.

On other fronts, we're excited about a number of facility changes in the works. Our International Services Office now has an expanded international lounge and information centre at their location in the Decew Residence. This

will improve our ability to provide good information about exchange programs and to give support to the international students on campus. We're going fullsteam-ahead on the design for a new building, which will house an expanded Student Health Services and Athletics Injury Clinic when students return in the fall. As well, new residences are going up in the Village Residence this summer. The Village is a very popular home for upper-year students and it will be great to have 180 more beds available this year. And there will be a brand new computer lab dedicated to student use in Room J202 this September.

## Affinity program benefits graduates

There's no question, Brock University has a strong "affinity" for its graduates. And how does the University demonstrate that?

One of the many ways is through its Affinity Program, designed to offer graduates the advantage of group services and benefits. In today's employment market, many graduates are working on contract, starting their own business or working for smaller companies that do not offer these services.

With more than 33,000 graduates, Brock was able to negotiate contracts for Home and Auto Insurance, Term Life Insurance, Long distance, Internet service and a Brock MasterCard.

"This is a service we can offer to graduates in return for choosing to come to Brock," says Candy Tonellato, Alumni Officer.

Brock asks that companies cover all costs and the financial benefits returned to the University are put toward scholarships and events, such as Homecoming and convocation

## "Small School of the Year" gets better all the time

B rock University is building upon its distinction as "Small School of the Year" with an addition to its Village Residence complex.

By the time students arrive for fall classes, the University will have increased its residence occupancy by 180.

The new residence, being built by Kenmore Construction, will help the University accommodate an increasing number of students attending Brock from outside the Niagara region.

The \$4.1 million project is being built at no cost to taxpayers. Moderate construction costs and low interest rates are enabling the University to mortgage the addition. The student residence fees will finance the project.

The addition brings the total residence occupancy provided by the University to 1,620 students.

Brock operates four separate residences for its students, three on the campus and one next to the St. Catharines General Hospital.

"I am delighted that there is such tremendous demand to live in residence that we have needed to build more and more," says Jamie Fleming, Director of Residences. "Living in residence is an experience like none other. It is a place where you can work and play; you meet lots of people; you learn about yourself and about life."

The new residence coincides with Brock's honour of being named "Small School of the Year," last November, by the Great Lakes Affiliation of College and University Residence Halls.

The Affiliation is a regional division of the National Association of College and University Residence Halls, the largest student-



n her business card you read the official title: Christine Jones, Manager, Development and Alumni Affairs. But, after spending a few minutes talking to Christine, there's really just one word to describe what she does. She's a matchmaker who puts a lot of energy into creating bonds between the University and its friends and graduates from the Niagara community, across Canada and other parts of the world.

A significant part of her role, which she assumed in January, is to develop the

University's annual giving programs. "You have to match the needs of the donor and the needs of the University," says the former fundraising and communications director of the Niagara Peninsula Conservation Authority. "It has to be a relationship of mutual benefit."

It's a challenge she enjoys, and as she says, "a thrill to see donors delighted with their investment in the University." A lot of time is spent reaching out to communities where Brock has grads. "We are asking them to define what role they wish the University to play in their future," Christine says. "We are encouraging them to network and to counsel prospective students who wish to explore what Brock has to offer."

Brock has a life-long interest in the success of its graduates. As for graduates, they can derive long-term benefits from the successful growth of their alma mater.

"It is a relationship well worth our investment," she adds.
