Faculty and staff are respectfully requested to follow the procedure outlined below, for reservation of rooms in Brock University buildings:

(a) For new, or revised, room reservations involving regular day-time classes - contact Dr. E. R. Muller (Department of Mathematics) at local 231.

(b) For new, or revised room reservations involving evening classes - contact Mrs. D. Phelps (Extension Department) at local 294.

(c) For single reservations (for one day or for one evening) - contact Mrs. D. Vanblaricum (Secretary, Physical Plant Department) at local 308.

The Physical Plant Department maintains a master schedule of room usage. Occasionally, outside groups, on application to the Physical Plant Department, are allowed to make reservations at Brock if the rooms are not scheduled for use by faculty teaching day or night classes. Outside groups, of course, receive the lowest priority. It has happened, however, that an outside group has arrived on campus with a valid reservation, only to find that the room has been taken over in a change not reported, and therefore not indicated on the master schedule. The above procedure should remove this problem.

The Brock Telephone Directory presently gives the following directions concerning personal calls:

"Do not use your Q number"  
"Ask the long distance operator to bill the call to  
your home phone number in every case".

The second direction in the preceding paragraph means that anyone calling from Brock University to his home number in Niagara Falls, for example, will be charged 30¢ for a call which would normally cost 10¢. The extra 20¢; is the surcharge for billing to a number other than the one from which you are calling.

There is one way we can avoid this surcharge. Those affected are requested to call Miss G.A. Rushton, Information Desk, at Local 211. Leave with Miss Rushton your name, address and home telephone number. She will arrange to obtain for you a Long Distance Credit Card from Bell Telephone Company. With this card, you may then place the call in accordance with the directory instructions, giving to the long distance operator your credit card number. The surcharge will not be assessed.



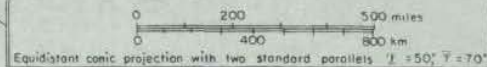

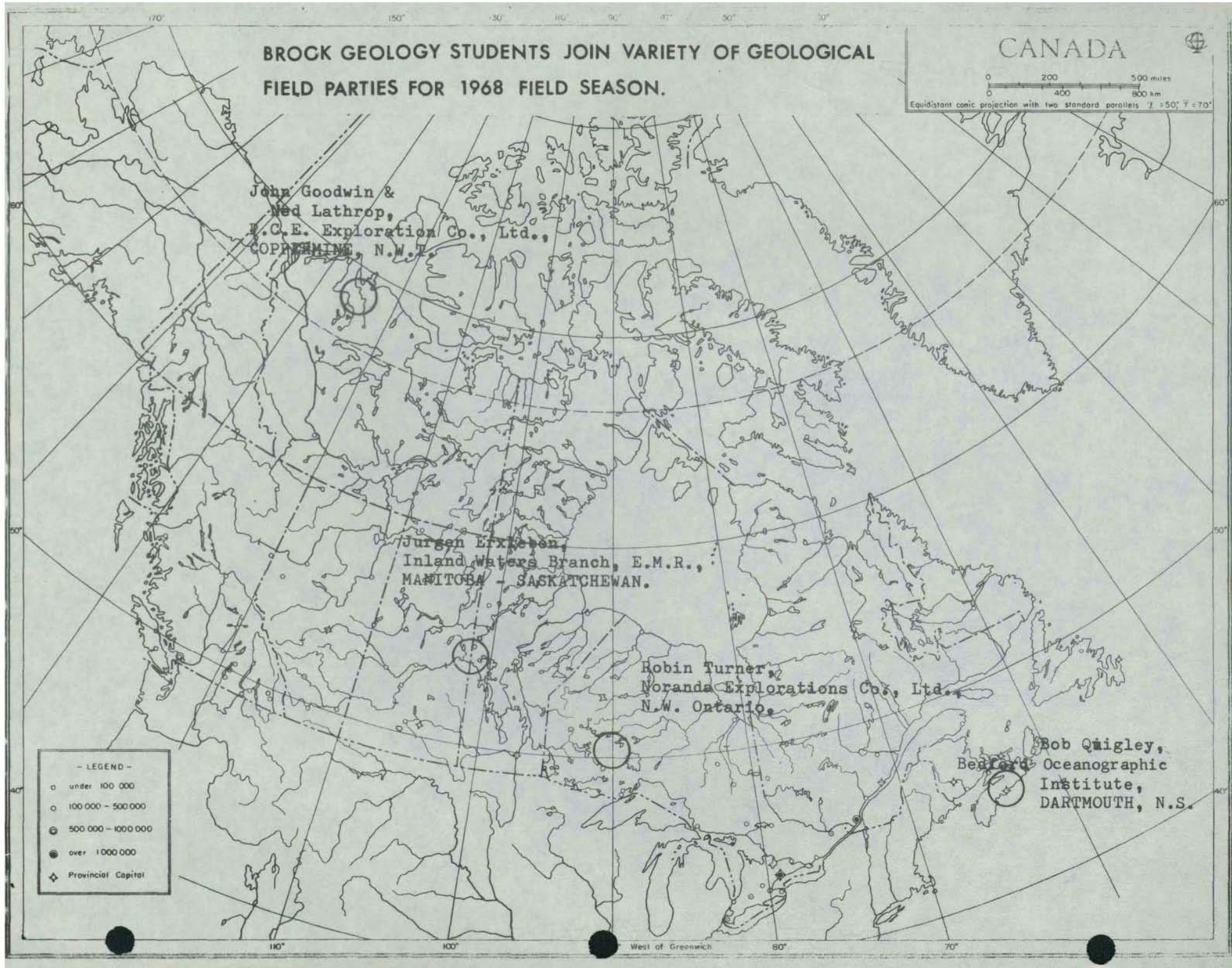

CANADA COUNCIL GRANT

Dr. J. No Jackson has received a research grant from the Canada Council to study the effects of the Welland Ship Canal on the evolution and present characteristics of settlement within the Niagara Region.

GEOLOGICAL SCIENCES STAFF HAVING BUSY SUMMER SEASON

Dr. J. Terasmae attended a conference of the Canadian Botanical Association at Lakehead University in Port Arthur, June 11-14, and presented a paper entitled "History of the Boreal Forest in the Area of the Great Lakes",

The boreal forest is the largest forest region in Canada and probably the most important. An attempt was made at this conference to summarize present knowledge of the boreal forest and to focus attention on future areas of research, Quaternary research. Some of these areas include geobotany, glacial history and paleoecology.

August 19-23, 1968, Dr. Terasmae will attend the Third International Peat Congress in Quebec City. During the Congress he will act as Chairman of Technical Session 1, which will be concerned with studies of the origin and history of muskeg and aerial photographic interpretation.

There are about 500,000 square miles of muskeg in Canada distributed mainly throughout the Canadian Shield and the James Bay-Hudson Bay Lowlands. Knowledge of muskeg is important from engineering, forestry and economic (peat) points of view.

George D. Hobson of the Geological Survey of Canada recently read a paper on the "Buried St. David's Gorge" at the Annual Conference on Great Lakes Research. Dr. Terasmae was co-author of this paper.

Dr. Peter Peach, on conclusion of a field school in the Madoc area, Ontario, turned his attention to Great Lakes research also. Most of the latter half of May and the early part of June were devoted to cruises aboard the C.C.G.S. Porte Dauphine, research vessel of the Great Lakes Institute, Toronto.

Studies were continued on water stages in the basin of Georgian Bay and the channel between Manitoulin Island and the Bruce Peninsula. Interesting limnogeological data is being compiled for this area at the Institute and the Canada Centre For Inland Waters, Burlington.

Studies of the Lake Ontario basin commenced after the Georgian Bay cruises were completed and these are presently being continued.

Mrs. Carol Dell recently completed a reconnaissance trip and collecting trip of Manitoulin Island. The Department expects to run student field trips on the Island in future years. While on the Island, Carol attended the annual field trip of the Michigan Basin Geological Society. The Society visited numerous sites of geological and archaeological interest. June 7 and 8.

Bob Janes, recently appointed as Laboratory Instructor, expects to move to St. Catharines from Rexdale before July 1. Bob will also teach Geology 325, Glacial and Pleistocene Geology, during the Summer Session.

Donald Hurst, a geologist presently teaching at Port Dover Secondary School, will instruct students electing Science A of the Grade 12 Program, 1968. This science offering will include various aspects of the Biological and Geological Sciences. Mr. Hurst has instructed in Summer and Evening Session courses at Brock on previous occasions.

C.B.C PRESIDENT KEYNOTE SPEAKER AT BROCK UNIVERSITY LATIN INSTITUTE

Dr. Arthur D. Kahn, Chairman of the Department of Classics, Brock University, announced today that George F. Davidson, President of the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation, will be the keynote speaker at the Latin Institute sponsored by Brock University, College of Education, Toronto, Althouse College of Education, Ontario Department of Education, Niagara Peninsula Classical Association.

Mr. Davidson's address entitled "The Role and Relevance of the Classics" will be delivered at the opening banquet at the Sheraton-Brock Hotel in Niagara Falls on Sunday, August 25th. The remaining sessions of the week-long Latin Institute will be held at Brock University in St. Catharines.

The Brock University Latin Institute is being held to afford an opportunity to high school and university teachers of Classics to discuss and investigate new methods and techniques for teaching Latin in the secondary schools. Both in Canada and in the United States, the approach to the teaching of Latin is being re-examined.

At the Institute, university professors will present brief papers on the leading Latin authors taught in high schools, and master high school teachers will provide demonstration lessons on video tapes on these authors and other significant aspects of Latin teaching.

Work shops in the language laboratories will provide the opportunity for the teachers to practice reading Latin prose and verse aloud. Special seminars will be organized on questions important to Latin teachers where they will be able to exchange ideas.

Approximately 150 Latin teachers from all over Ontario, other parts of Canada and the United States as well as one from Manchester, England have enrolled for the institute.

Among the distinguished participants are Professor John R. Latimer, George Washington University, Executive Secretary of the American Classical League, who will evaluate the week's experience at the closing luncheon on Friday, and Professor Erick Hoder of the Educational Corporation of Copenhagen, Denmark.

Professor Erik Hoder, the author of a text on a new method of teaching Latin, will address the institute Tuesday afternoon. Professor Hoder's text is widely used in Europe and the United States and will be used for the first time in Canada at Brock University when classes commence in September.

The proceedings of the Institute will be taped for subsequent publication and distribution to all registrants and for general sale.

The members of the institute will be billeted at Ridley College, St. Catharines and will attend the Shaw Festival presentation of the "The Chemmy Circle" at Niagara-on-the-Lake on Tuesday evening.

MEETING OF THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS

ENROLMENT

The enrolment at Brock University for the academic year 1968/69 was a whopping 1092 full-time day students and 46 part-time day students for a total of 1138 in all years. Dr. John R.A. Mayer, Associate Dean of Arts and Science, reported to the Board of Governors at its first regular meeting of the 1968/69 fiscal year held 17th September.

The enrolment for credit courses in the Division of Continuing Education is correspondingly as large, Dean Mayer reported to the Board.

The 1968/69 enrolment shows 861 students registered for 1048 courses.

Chairman of the Board of Governors, E.R. Davey of Niagara Falls stated that all members of the Board were exceedingly pleased with the growth in enrolment in both the day courses and the courses offered by the Division of Continuing Education at Brock University.

Mr. Davey noted that the increase in enrolment had been consistent and encouraging in both divisions of the University since opening in September 1964.

Mr. Davey noted that requirements for admittance to the evening and summer credit courses were the same as those required for admittance to the day courses of the university and that successful completion of such courses counted toward the attaining of a degree. He added that there was great significance in the fact that 861 Niagara Peninsula residents would be using Brock University facilities for this purpose during the 1968-69 academic year.

Dr. Mayer stated that there would likely be a few more late registrations in both the day courses and the Division of Continuing Education courses which would mean a slight revision upwards of the figures.

#### CONSTRUCTION PROGRESS DELAYED BY STRIKES

Mr. E.J. Barbeau, Chairman of the Building Committee, reported to the members of the Board that the contractors had already lost 10 weeks of summer construction time because of the labour troubles in the construction industry.

Until the Carpenters' strike is settled contractors will not discuss a rescheduling program. The original schedule had timed the completion of the east and north sections of the Thistle project surrounding the Brock Tower for the end of July, Mr. Barbeau explained.

To accommodate the greatly increased enrolment not only are we behind schedule, Mr. Barbeau added, but the west end of the north half of the project is not completed and only parts of it can be used and under the greatest of difficulties.

#### RESIDENCE BUILDINGS

The 10 "houses" of the residence buildings, for which the contract was recently awarded to Stewart Hinan Corporation Limited and John Andrews has not really commenced said Mr. Barbeau. Some earth moving has been completed but until the carpenters' strike is settled, nothing can be started on the form work, hence the project is completely held up.

GLENRIDGE CAMPUS

Mr. Barbeau stated that the original time schedule had called for completion of the Glenridge Campus renovations by registration day on the 9th September; however the project has now ground to a halt.

The removal of the contractors' materials and equipment in the auditorium and cafeteria in the Glenridge building has resulted in providing open space that is being used for lecture space and cafeteria space, all of which is most unsatisfactory Mr. Barbeau pointed out.

OFF CAMPUS

Dr. Peter Rand represented Canada in Round Table Discussions on "Fluid Dynamics in Medicine and Biology" in Paris last week. The discussions were to inform a fluid dynamics panel of The Advisory Group for Aerospace Research and Development, a NATO organization, about the work going on in the biological field of fluid dynamics in all the NATO countries in order to decide whether it would be worthwhile to have a specialists meeting in the future. Typically the French delegate, although present, made no presentation.

In general, "stand-alone" mode will be used for data-processing functions such as listings, accounting and label preparation. For academic programs involving computations the 360/20 will be switched to "linked" mode.

To ensure a fair distribution of the computing facilities, a system of (dollar) allowances and (dollar) charging for all computer usage has been set-up. All departments and sections should ensure they are represented on one or other of the committees which apportion the allowances. PRESIDENT'S PRESS CONFERENCE

At a news conference held in the Board Room on the 13th Floor of the Tower on Wednesday morning, October 16, Dr. James A. Gibson, President and Vice-chancellor of Brock University reported the full-time day enrolment had now reached a figure of 1148 full-time day students which is an increase of 687. over last year. This puts the University "over the hump" financially, and also means it is back on course in terms of the first five years projection. It is likely that the University will surpass 1500 students next year, which will be ahead of schedule.

Some of the reasons for the increased enrolment Dr. Gibson explained are as follows:

1. The revised Grade XIII program qualifies more students for University entrance.
2. Brock is now better known.
3. There has been a rounding out of the academic program.
4. There are modified student residences - 156 students are now living in temporary residences.
5. Grade XII student summer program.

Dr. Gibson stated that because of the increased enrolment, additional building plans will have to be considered and the Science Complex and the Athletic Complex are now on the drawing boards. It is likely that the administration will be out of the Tower in 5 years.

There is plenty of space in the Tower for expansion of library facilities. The library is now approaching 90,000 volumes, and 100,000 volumes was the working target for 5 years. Slightly more money than budgeted will be put in library acquisitions in the future said Dr. Gibson.

"It is not likely that there will be any new teaching departments, but graduate studies will reach out", said Dr. Gibson. There are inter-disciplinary challenges in linking for example geology with urban planning and local government. The physics program will probably branch out towards business administration and engineering.

The 3 month construction strike does not appear to have crippled the student residence plans. It is thought that by mid September next year, we will be able to accommodate 360 in residences.

"There is something going on almost all the time from 8:00 a.m. until midnight at the University" said Dr. Gibson. There are several lecture series and organized events going on every day of the week.

Brock is prepared to accept up to 5 qualified Czechoslovakian refugee students. Some families in the community have indicated a willingness to take them in. Unless they are fluent in English, however, Dr. Gibson feels that it would take considerable time to orient them.

The Thistle project should be in use by the end of March. The 3 month construction strike has been serious, but not crippling. The theatres should also be in operation by March.

The University has now acquired substantially all the property as outlined in the Master Plan. It owns 522 acres and is acquiring suitable property that comes into the market.

Dr. Gibson described many of the highlights of his trip to the Congress of Commonwealth Universities.

#### JUNIOR CLASSICAL LEAGUE MEETS AT BROCK

Up to 200 high school students and 100 teachers from 100 Ontario secondary schools from every part of the province will attend an all-day conference at Brock University Saturday, October 19th announced Dr. Arthur D. Kahn, Chairman of the Classics Department of the University.

The purpose of the conference will be to organize the Junior Classical League of Ontario. The Brock Classics Club along with the newly formed St. Catharines chapters of the Junior Classical League will act as hosts for the organizational conference. There will even be a busload from Ottawa with delegates from each of that city's schools. Students coming from long distances will be billeted in homes on Friday night.

The students will meet separately from the teachers on Saturday morning. They will work on a constitution and draw up programs while the teachers hold a workshop led by Miss Natalie S. Hosford, Richview Collegiate Institute who will speak on "Attracting Students to Latin." The teachers and students will have lunch together followed by student committees reports.

Mrs. Frederick R. Cadwell, who is in charge of the New York State Junior Classical League, will discuss experiences she has had in New York State and will bring 2 student officers with her.

The purpose of this session is to stimulate study of Latin and add excitement to the teaching of Latin in high schools. Plans will be made to hold a provincial wide convention in the spring with dramatic competition.

BOARD OF GOVERNORS MEETING, TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 12COMPLETION DATES ON THISTLE PROJECT

Dates for the completion of the unfinished portions of the Thistle Project surrounding the Brock University Tower were reported to the Board of Governors by D. Whiting Lathrop, Vice-Chairman of the Building Committee, at its regular meeting held last Tuesday night.

It is anticipated that the Book Store will be ready for occupancy by January 15th, the Theatre by March 15th, and the 400 seat Lecture Hall by April 15th, 1969, Mr. Lathrop stated.

He added that the completion of the remainder of the Thistle Complex will take place progressively up to June 1st, 1969 and noted that practically all areas in the east and north wings have been in service since the beginning of the fall term.

PROGRESS ON RESIDENCE COMPLEX

Mr. Lathrop also reported that steady progress was being made on the first ten units (to accommodate 36 students each) of the first Residence Building, with dining facilities, on the Brock University Campus.

It is too early to predict completion dates but it is planned to complete 5 units and the dining facility, to be followed soon after by the remaining 5 units.

THE LATE FRANK C. CULLIMORE

RESOLUTION OF SYMPATHY

Frank C. Cullimore was born in England in 1891; he died at Niagara Falls on November 10, 1968. He had lived in Canada since 1912. During the First World War he served with the 31st Battery, Canadian Field Artillery. He joined Dominion Chain Company in 1919, and at his retirement he was its President.

Mr. Cullimore during his long residence in Niagara Falls and Chippawa had played the Good Citizen part to the full, alike as Secretary-Treasurer of the Board of Governors of the Greater Niagara Falls Hospital, in the Boys' Club of Greater Niagara as Director and President and in the Boys' Clubs of Canada, and as member and Past President of the Rotary Club.

He was first elected to the Board of Governors of Brock University on November 10, 1964, and he was present when the Founders' Committee formally became the Board of Governors on December 8, 1964. He had served on several committees of the Board - notably Finance, Residence Study and Scholarship and Bursary - and his interest and helpfulness to the officers of the University was constant, informed, and never-failing. He looked at the problems of a growing university with all the sympathy and understanding which had distinguished his concern for the public welfare and the well-being of this region; and all of his colleagues are the poorer for his passing.

The members of the Board of Governors, at their meeting today, desire to record their sense of loss in Mr. Cullimore's death, together with their lively appreciation of the generous and perceptive contributions which he made to Brock University, both as a citizen and as a member of the Board. They desire that their sympathy may be conveyed to Dr. Cullimore and to other members of the family, and that this Resolution should be entered into the Minutes. November 12, 1968.

ACADEMIC DEPARTMENT ACTIVITIESCLASSICS DEPARTMENT

On November 8, Professor S.A. Alleyne and Bill McCormack, a Year II Classics major spoke to about twenty-five Latin teachers in London, Ontario on Classics at Brock. In the discussion that followed the high-school teachers expressed their concern that the major revisions being made in the high-school Latin program throughout the Province seemed to prepare their students for Classics at Brock but not at other universities in the Province.

High-school Latin teachers in the Sudbury area have prevailed upon Laurentian University to conduct monthly Workshops for Latin teachers. Because these workshops are being modeled on those held at Brock, Dr. Arthur Do Kahn, Chairman of the Classics Department, has been invited to inaugurate the Workshop series as the first speaker in January.

Sixteen members of the Brock Classics Club have volunteered to visit local high-schools to deliver slide lectures on Greek and Roman civilization. Requests for their services have come from as far as Toronto.

The Brock Classics Club is preparing to invite Classics majors, undergraduate and graduate, from other universities in the Province as well as in Western New York to a weekend of meetings and varied activities in February.

The annual convention of the Junior Classical League, which was organized at Brock last month, will be held in St. Catharines on March 17. Some of the activities, which will involve 1,000 high-school students from all over the province, will be held at Brock.

Mrs. Marion Farr, Chairman of the Latin Department at Newtonbrook Secondary School in Willowdale, will be bringing a full class of students to observe a day in Classics on January 14. This will be the first of a series of such visits.

#### DEPARTMENT OF HISTORY

History Lecture. The History Department is presenting a special lecture on Thursday, November 28, at 1:00 p.m. in Room 107. The speaker will be Prof. R.A. Preston and his topic "Canadian defence policy and Canadian Nationhood, 1867-1914". REPORT ON THE 43rd MEETING OF SENATE

The publication of this and subsequent reports in the Brock Campus News is only part of a significant program undertaken by Senate to improve communications between Senate and members of the University Community. The latest edition of the University Handbook (originally called the Faculty Handbook) will soon be ready for distribution and monthly revisions, including all relevant Senate decisions, will appear as the University Gazette. The approved minutes, together with all appendices of Senate, will be circulated to the Chairman of the Board of Governors, all offices of the teaching departments, and the President of B.U.S.A. A copy will also be given to the University Librarian to be open to the Brock Community.

Senate accepted with regret the resignation of Professor G.M.C. Sprung and expressed its appreciation for his services while a member of Senate. As of December 1, 1968, Professor J.R.A. Mayer will revert to his former position as an elected member of Senate; his term to expire on May 26, 1970. Also, from December 1, 1968 until May 27, 1969 the Provost of the University will be an ex officio member of Senate in his capacity as Acting Dean.

The two approved resolutions dealing with seminars and financing of research, which were forwarded to Senate by the Committee of Chairmen and Faculty Board, were unanimously approved by Senate.

Senate has approved the establishment of an M.Sc. program in Biological Sciences. The program has been successfully appraised by the Appraisals Committee of the Ontario Council of Graduate Studies, Senate is also permitting the Physics Department to proceed towards appraisal of a Masters program by the Ontario Council of Graduate Studies.

A fifteen page brief on Entrance Scholarships was approved in toto by Senate. This brief consists of an extensive study of questionnaires sent out to all scholars who were offered Brock Entrance Scholarships, together with discussion of academic and economic benefits of such awards. This brief will be forwarded to the Awards Committee of the Board of Governors.

To conclude, I should mention that there exists, naturally, a time delay between one meeting of Senate and the appearance of the approved minutes of that meeting and that this report is intended to communicate as quickly as possible significant proceedings and decisions of Senate.
