Niagara winemaker wins Distinguished Alumni Award

Dr. Karl Kaiser, one of Canada's pre-eminent winemakers who introduced icewine to oenophiles around the globe, was the recipient of the 2005

Distinguished Alumni Award, presented annually by the Brock University Alumni Association.

The award is given to a Brock graduate who has made an exceptional contribution to his or her profession, the community and the University.

Dr. Kaiser, co-founder of and winemaker for internationally recognized Inniskillin Wines, earned his BSc degree in chemistry and biochemistry from Brock in 1974. He received an Honorary Doctor of Laws degree from the University in 1994.

"I am delighted to have been selected for this honour," said Dr. Kaiser, "and I am proud to be a graduate of Brock. Since my graduation 31 years ago, the University has continued to grow tremendously in enrolment, faculty and stature. I'm pleased to be a part of that proud tradition."

The award was presented at the Fall Convocation ceremony on Oct. 15.

"We were thrilled to present this award to Karl Kaiser, a Brock graduate

whose local, national and international achievements demonstrate the value of a degree from this University," said Richard Knabenschuh, President of the Brock University Alumni Association. "Dr. Kaiser's efforts have helped to distinguish Niagara as a premium wine-producing region and tourist destination, and he was also a strong proponent for the establishment of Brock's Cool Climate Oenology and

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Dr. Jack Lightstone named new President and Vice-Chancellor of Brock University

After a 10-month national search, the Board of Trustees ratified the appointment of Dr. Jack Lightstone as the new President and Vice-Chancellor of Brock University at a special meeting on Nov. 16.

Lightstone is a Professor of Religion and Associate Chair in Quebec and Canadian Jewish Studies at Concordia University in Montreal. He recently completed nearly a decade of service as Provost and Vice-Rector (Vice-President) at Concordia. Serving as Brock's fifth President, he will take office effective July 1, 2006, for a five-year term. He will succeed Dr. Terry Boak, who will continue to serve as Acting President and Vice-Chancellor until June 30, 2006.

"He is an outstanding scholar and an exceptional leader and administrator with a highly collegial style and a focus on students," said Dr. Norris Walker, Chair of the Board of Trustees. "He brings close to 30 years of post-secondary administrative and academic experience to Brock and shares our vision as an institution of research and teaching excellence. He is a team builder with strong interpersonal skills who has a genuine enthusiasm to advance the University's ambitious agenda for the future and to be actively involved with the local community."

Lightstone said he was attracted by the opportunity of providing leadership to Brock as it continues on its bold transformation to becoming a more comprehensive university offering more graduate programs and developing a greater research capacity.

"It gives me great pleasure to be part of the Brock University community as it

moves forward as a centre of undergraduate and graduate teaching and learning and as a centre of research at the national and international levels," said Lightstone.

"I share many of the ideals and values of this University. In particular, I strongly support its direction of comprehensiveness. As the University looks to its future, it does not want to lose the many positive aspects of its historic mission. These include its connection to the local community and its strong tradition of being student centred.

"I look forward to working with many dedicated individuals and groups to continue Brock's proud tradition and to serve as an agent of change toward greater achievements."

A longtime Professor of Religion at Concordia, Lightstone was Chair of his department (1979-85) and graduate program director for the MA in Judaic Studies and PhD in Religion. From 1989 to 1992, he served as Associate Vice-Rector, Academic (Research). He began his first term as Provost and Vice-Rector in June 1995, and led the academic sector through an extensive, ongoing academic planning process and a difficult period of budget restrictions. He graduated with a BA from Carleton University in 1972, and went on to complete an MA (1974) and PhD

Senate Chamber renamed for founder

Brock University held a special ceremony on July 28 to recognize the many contributions of Dr. Charles A. Sankey, the University's second Chancellor.

With Dr. Sankey and his family in attendance, the University officially renamed the Senate Chamber to the Dr. Charles A. Sankey Chamber.

Dr. Sankey, who celebrated his 100th birthday on July 31, was a member of the founding group of Brock University and served as Chancellor from 1969-

"I am touched indeed that Brock has chosen to honour my contributions by renaming the Senate Chamber after me," said Dr. Sankey. "I am privileged to have been a founder of this University and I have watched with pride the achievements of faculty, staff and students over the ensuing years. I am confident that future generations will be well served by this fine institution as it continues on its path of academic and research excellence."

Dr. Sankey, who came to St. Catharines in 1935 and is known for his droll sense of humour, holds a doctorate in chemistry. He is deeply involved in the area's music and arts community. Dr. Sankey's professional career spanned 40 years, culminating in his appointment as Vice-President, Research, Ontario Paper Company in Thorold. He has four children, 10 grandchildren and 17 greatgrandchildren, some of whom attended the dedication ceremony. His wife, Winifred, died in 2002.

Highlights of the 2005 Fall Convocation

Brock University conferred 379 undergraduate degrees from all six faculties, 135 graduate degrees, 71 education degrees and 24 certificates during its Fall 2005 Convocation, held on Oct. 15.

This fall, the University took pride in awarding honorary degrees to the two chief executives and co-founders of War Child Canada: Dr. Samantha Nutt, Executive Director, and Dr. Eric Hoskins, President.

The following are excerpts from the speeches delivered by Acting President and Vice-Chancellor, Dr. Terry Boak and the honorary degree recipients.

Dr. Terry Boak: "Imagination-Commitment — Innovation — they have been our guide in the past and will continue to drive us forward. . . . A university is truly a "learning environment" and while you came here to learn from us, you have certainly also learned from each other and we have learned from you. We are genuinely proud of all of you - you can take

genuine pride in Brock and in the value of your Brock University degree."

Dr. Samantha Nutt: "It is so important, not only today but in the many days from this point forward, that you continue to challenge yourselves, to ask yourselves 'Am I learning, and I growing, am I contributing?' because you can never, and should

never, settle in a world so unsettled. . . . You will leave here today with one of the greatest gifts you will ever receive — the benefit of an extraordinary, if sometimes a little arduous, university education."

Brock extends Dr. Raymond Moriyama's term as Chancellor

Brock University's Senate recently approved the extension of Dr. Raymond Moriyama's term Chancellor until Dec. 31, 2006. Dr. Moriyama, whose involvement with the University goes back 30

years, is one of Canada's most recognized and respected international architects.

"Dr. Moriyama is a man of absolute integrity and vision, and he has been a passionate supporter of education at Brock on many levels," said Brock's Acting President and Vice-Chancellor,

Dr. Terry Boak. "His guidance throughout the past five years of continuous growth and development at Brock has been extremely valuable and I'm pleased that he has agreed to continue to work alongside the University for the coming year."

As Chancellor, Dr. Moriyama will continue to contribute to the educational welfare of Brock students and play a leading role in the advancement of the University as it moves towards becoming a broad-based comprehensive institution. The Chancellor confers all degrees and diplomas at the University. Dr. Moriyama was installed as Brock University's sixth Chancellor in June 2001 at the Spring Convocation.

"I am deeply honoured for this opportunity to continue to serve as Chancellor of Brock University," said Dr. Moriyama. "I look forward to the year ahead as Brock continues to grow and strives to meet the needs of its students."

Dr. Moriyama's work is found across Canada and around the world. His major projects include the recently opened Canadian War Museum in Ottawa, Toronto Reference Library, Bank of Montreal Institute for Learning, the Saudi Arabian National Museum, the Bata Shoe Museum (Toronto), the Ontario Science Centre (Toronto), the Meewasin Valley Project (Saskatoon) and the Canadian Embassy in Tokyo.

Dr. Moriyama has also had a tremendous influence on the Brock campus designing the Walker Complex, Mackenzie Chown Complex, Taro Hall, Alumni Student Centre and Earp Residence.

Brock will be big winner once donated property is sold

Bernard Harrison was ready to sell his house and move to a seniors' home. He wasn't looking forward to the hassle of selling and asked his lawyer, Jake Hildebrand, for his advice. Hildebrand asked the long-time Brock donor what he was going to do with the money from the house sale. "Add it to my scholarship fund at Brock," was Harrison's reply.

"Then let Brock deal with selling the house," replied Hildebrand, who knew full well of what he spoke. He and his wife Katherine had already donated a property to the University. The University arranged for three appraisals that established the charitable receipt value. Brock took the property to market and met with the Hildebrands to establish terms for endowed student awards with the proceeds of the sale.

And so it went. Bernard Harrison donated his house to Brock and the University established endowed student awards with the proceeds, just one of the donations which established the late Hong Kong diplomat as Brock's largest individual donor.

Now the Hildebrands have done it again. The University's Foundation now owns a unique property in Effingham, southwest of St. Catharines and adjacent to Shorthills Provincial Park. "We

bought the property in the early 1970s, thinking of a country home for the family," explains Katherine and Jake. "While we developed plans for a house on the property, the whole family just got too busy. Brock is close to our thoughts and donating the property is a way for us to give back to our community."

The Hildebrand property is 5.7 acres of rolling Shorthills heaven. Katherine Hildebrand says that "in 1981, our son Tom and several friends planted 7,000 white spruce trees. Tom was a forestry student at the University of Toronto and envisaged a small Christmas tree farm to launch his career. After graduation, his career took him in other directions and visits to the property consisted of family outings and giving away Christmas trees to

Tom is now a forester with the Toronto and Region Conservation Authority in Greater Toronto and hopes the ultimate owner will respect the conservation and environmental aspects of the property. Jake hastens to add: "Katherine herself was very much involved in the planting and provided the snacks and lunches to sustain the tree planters."

Upon the sale of the land, the Hildebrands would like the proceeds to be applied to the Lifespan Development Research Centre and student awards at the University. The legacy of the land will become a legacy for Brock students.

history and success.

"While many universities have accounting programs that produce CAs, accreditation brings the Institute into a partnership with a university," said Brian Hunt, FCA, President and CEO of the Institute. "The Institute of Chartered Accountants has set high standards for a program's infrastructure, education processes and graduate success that must be met before a university is accredited."

Brock, with its newly accredited Bachelor of Accounting program, Option A, joins the University of Toronto as Ontario's only two universities with accredited programs, although other universities are also pursuing Institute accreditation.

Accreditation pays dividends for the school and its students that go beyond the obvious benefits of meeting the Institute's high standards. A key component of the accreditation process is the provision of financial and other support through the creation of a joint CA/University Centre. Annual funding to the Joint Centre is provided on the basis of \$1,000 per first-time Uniform Evaluation (UFE) writer who graduates from the program, up to a ceiling of \$100,000.

"Brock University is honoured to be recognized with this accreditation from

the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Ontario," said Martin Kusy, Dean of the Faculty of Business at Brock. "This affiliation with the ICAO provides a professional partnership for the Accounting programs, and will be of great benefit to the students who enroll in those outstanding programs."

The ICAO is the qualifying and regulatory body of Ontario's 31,000 CAs and 3,500 CA students. Since 1879, the Institute has protected the public interest through the CA profession's high standards of qualification and the enforcement of its rules of professional conduct. (1977) at Brown University in Rhode Island. He was a Visiting Research Graduate Fellow at Hebrew University in Jerusalem in 1974-75.

An expert on ancient and contemporary North American Judaism, Lightstone has written and lectured extensively. He remains an active scholar funded by external peerreviewed grants. He is the author of six books and is widely published in scholarly and professional journals. He is fluent in English, French and Hebrew.

Lightstone has broad administrative

experience demonstrated throughout his nine years as Concordia's Provost and Vice-Rector and other administrative assignments. He was involved in almost all bodies of the University's central governance — chair of the Senate Committee on Academic Plans and Priorities, Senate Research Committee, Senate Academic Programs Committee; member ex officio of Senate and the Senate's Steering Committee as well as the Board of Governors.

Lightstone has made valuable contributions to post-secondary

education in Quebec. He served on, and for a two-year period chaired, the Academic Affairs Committee of the Conference des Recteurs et Principaux des Universités de Québec (CREPUQ, the Quebec parallel of the Ontario Council of Universities).

Lightstone, 54, was born and raised in Ottawa, Ont. He is married to Dorothy Markiewicz, PhD. They have two children.

Lights! Cameras! Brock graduates entertain us

Whether they are in front of cameras and microphones or working in production, Brock University graduates are making their marks in the entertainment industry.

Rick Campanelli (BPhEd, '94), also known as teenage heartthrob Rick the Temp, has recently made a move to Entertainment Tonight Canada, a borderjumping spinoff from the iconic American television show. Campanelli, who will remain in front of the camera as an entertainment reporter, left a longtime position as a popular vee-jay on MuchMusic.

In part, he credits his success to his years at Brock while studying physical education.

"I was always a shy kid growing up in Hamilton," he says. "Once I stepped into Brock, I was forced to open up a lot more. I became involved in soccer, wrestling and social events, and I lived off campus, which encouraged me to come out of my shell even more.

He adds the research skills he gained while at Brock have been useful as he researches material for his show.

Campanelli's career path took a sudden detour when he won a contest

in his final year at Brock to work parttime at MuchMusic in Toronto. He recalls the long commutes from Toronto to St. Catharines to earn his degree.

"I have not been back to Brock since I got my degree," he says. "It was always such a beautiful campus and I'm sure there have been many changes."

He remembers looking out of the windows on the top floor of the James A. Gibson Library towards Toronto. "When I return to Brock, I'll look out through those very same windows, in the same direction, and contemplate how much my life has changed."

Melanie Joy Douglas (BA, '00) was another shy student when she entered her first year at Brock. The singersongwriter-pianist, known professionally by the name Melanie Joy, has just released her first solo album called Magic. "My English language and literature background at Brock really helped my lyric writing, and my Brock education in general immensely helped my ability to think analytically," says the Torontobased recording artist. "Not only that, at Brock I found that my opinions mattered

and were valued, and that gave me a lot of confidence," says Joy, who describes her music as alternative pop-rock.

She gained enough confidence to embark on a solo career after 10 years of collaborating with other singers, and to turn down offers from established labels. (Joy feared she may have to compromise her artistic integrity.) She chose instead to deliberately travel the much-harder road in the entertainment industry, that of independently producing the album. Her co-producer is Peter Linseman of Toronto.

"I chose to pay heed to that inner voice and to do it my way," says Joy, who also has a master's degree in professional writing from the University of Waterloo, "I was involved in the entire creative process: from writing all of the songs on the album, to arranging and co-producing the songs, to being involved with the fine details of the artwork and graphics."

He landed his first job in the industry when contacted "by a friend of a friend of a friend" about a new position that had opened up.

Pollock plans to further his academic career in Australia by working towards a master's degree in film and television, with a focus on distribution and production.

He thanks his Brock professors for transferring their passion for film and television to him.

"They energized me and helped to foster a new appreciation for film and television. They continue to encourage me, including writing references on my behalf to the graduate school in Australia, and I can't thank them enough."



Viticulture Institute (CCOVI)."

Dr. Kaiser maintains his commitment to the University by conducting research in collaboration with Brock faculty. He also has lectured in the past to CCOVI students.

The winemaker now focuses his attention solely on icewine, a late-harvest icon that has gained international prestige and is in high demand. In 1991, Dr, Kaiser won the Grand Prix d'Honneur at Vinexpo for his 1989 icewine, drawing the world's attention to Canadian wine and introducing wine lovers everywhere to Canada's gift of winter.


Dr. Kaiser was born in Austria and was a student in a monastery where viticulture and winemaking were time-honoured traditions. After compulsory military service, he taught at a vocational school and spent his spare time helping in the cellars of a small wine producer. In 1969, he immigrated to Canada, returned to school, and

earned his science degree from Brock.

While studying at the University, Dr. Kaiser began planting his own grape vines and making his own wine. He met his future business partner, Donald Ziraldo, and they applied for a winery licence, which resulted in the formation of the award-winning Inniskillin Wines.

Several years ago, Dr. Kaiser was appointed National Vice-President, Quality and Science, for Vincor International, Inniskillin's parent company. He is an active member of the American Society of Enology and Viticulture and the Canadian Society of Oenology and Viticulture.

Earlier in 2005, Dr. Kaiser received the Ontario Wine Society's first Lifetime Achievement Award. In 1993, he received the Order of Ontario and in 2002, he was presented with the Golden Jubilee Award, which recognized the 50th anniversary of the Queen's coronation. brockpeople.ca

Graduate-supported bursaries ease hardships for cash-strapped students

The following story was submitted by Jason Sykes, a fourth-year Political Science student.

Without the generous support of donors to Brock's bursary and scholarship program, my University education likely would have shipwrecked on financial shoals several years ago.

I come from a family of four children. When we were growing up, my mother was, for the most part, our sole financial supporter. She was never given the opportunity for a post-secondary education, despite being one of the brightest women I have ever known.

Her family simply did not have enough money.

My mother went into debt so my older sister could attend university, and when it came to my turn to make the push for a better life though a higher education, resources were scarce. Even with full funding from the Ontario Student Assistance Program (OSAP), there still remains a serious gap in the funding needed for school. Though I work full time during the summer, there is little left after I pay for clothing, transportation, and summer rent.

At the start of each year, my mother and I sit down, talk over my finances and how much, if any, she is able to help me. Every year, the amount she can spare decreases, while the cost of university increases. OSAP recently increased its payments, but I'm still left with a significant hurdle to overcome.

Each year, bursaries supported by Brock donors have given me the ability to overcome this financial hardship. Although there have been several times that I did not think I would be able to continue, the fall of 2004 posed perhaps the greatest roadblock. It was then my mother was diagnosed with cancer. To fight her illness, she needed to take time off work, while at the same time absorbing the cost of medication and transportation associated with her treatments. This occurred about the same time my funding had reached its end, the last weeks of November.

I was faced with a serious choice. I had enough money for either my December rent, or food. That was all the money I had. I could not turn to my mother, and had no one else to fill in the void.

To say the least, I was up all night. I was a mess. It seemed my dream of a university education, one for which I had fought for four years, was coming to an end. The next day, Brock notified me that I was the recipient of another bursary. My dream was alive again.

I have the donors to thank for this. Without them, I almost certainly would have dropped out and been forced to give up my ambitions.

I have spoken to many Brock students who have been the recipients of bursaries or scholarships. In all of them I find a deep appreciation for these gifts. Many of them speak of showing their thanks by helping to support future generations of Brock students by donating to scholarships and bursaries when they themselves are graduates.

This, too, is my intent. I can think of no better way to say thank you to those who have supported me than to continue their good works as a future donor.

I'm grateful to those who have already generously given, and encourage others to contribute. Donors really do make a difference in the lives of people. Mine most certainly would not be the same without the financial assistance for which I am so grateful.



Annual rankings measure Brock's performance

Brock students gave the University a score of A- for quality of education in the *Globe and Mail's* annual University Report Card published on Nov. 2.

And for the first time, Brock ranked as one of the top Leaders of Tomorrow in the primarily undergraduate category of the annual *Maclean's* magazine rating of Canadian universities. The report was published Nov. 7.

Overall in 2005, Brock was 14th in the primarily undergraduate rankings. Last year, the University was 13th overall

With a student population of more than 17,000 full- and part-time students, Brock continued to perform well within the medium-sized universities classification (enrolment between 12,500 and 25,000), the *Globe and Mail's* largest category, which included other Canadian institutions such as McGill, Simon Fraser and Queen's.

Brock was one of only two schools among the 17 medium-sized universities to score consistent A-level grades in the quality of education category, which includes criteria such as teaching quality, class sizes, faculty-student interaction and faculty availability outside classroom hours.

The following were some of the highlights from the *Globe and Mail's* survey:

• Brock placed within the top three for each of the following criteria in the survey's medium-sized university category: quality of academic advising, faculty members' knowledge of subjects, student residences, career counselling/placement services, opportunities to acquire work-related knowledge skills, labs/research

equipment and recreation/athletics programs/services.

• Brock also received an overall grade of A- in the Technology category. The survey noted that Brock was among several universities that experienced improvements in their ratings on labs/research equipment.

• Brock student services received an overall grade of A-, the highest ranking in the category for medium-sized universities, along with six other schools.

• Brock received an overall grade of A in the Atmosphere category, which included criteria such as extra-curricular activities, sense of community and attractiveness of campus.

Brock students gave the University an A- rating or better in 31 categories and a B+ to B- rating in another 32 areas.

In the *Maclean's* report, Brock placed fifth in the Leaders of Tomorrow subcategory that falls within the important reputational category of the magazine's ranking. The category reflects the opinion of high school principals and guidance counsellors, university officials, heads of organizations, CEOs and recruiters at corporations across the country.

"We are pleased that leaders in education and business throughout the country identify Brock as being an institution that provides a quality university experience," said Michael Manley-Casimir, Acting Vice-President Academic and Provost at Brock University. "More importantly, they recognize that Brock is positioned to make important contributions and to set exciting new directions in post-secondary education."

Master's student receives \$17,500 for enzyme research

A student in Brock's Master of Science program has been named the recipient of a Canada Graduate Scholarship (CGS) Master's Award totalling \$17,500 from the Canadian Institutes of Health Research (CIHR).

Laura MacPherson, of Corunna, Ont., was recognized for her research into an enzyme involved in the process of fat oxidization, which plays a pivotal role in the onset of diseases including type 2 diabetes and obesity. Pyruvate dehydrogenase (PDH) is a key enzyme complex that regulates oxidative glucose disposal, and thereby indirectly the proportion of fat and carbohydrate oxidized in the body.

MacPherson also completed her undergraduate Bachelor of Science degree in Applied Health Sciences at Brock in 2004.

Over the course of her studies at Brock, MacPherson has been the recipient of an Ontario Graduate Scholarship, a Natural Science and Engineering Research Council Undergraduate Student Research Award, a Brock University Alumni Association Award, and was on the Dean's Honour List.

In addition to her academic achievements, MacPherson is also an accomplished varsity athlete with the Brock swim team, and recipient of the Athletic Director's Award, and the President's Surgite Award for outstanding involvement and accomplishments at Brock.

Milestone for coach Ken Murray


