First Brock student to graduate with PhD in Biotechnology

At June convocation, Candace Panagabko of St. Catharines had the honour of being the first Brock student to graduate with a PhD in Biotechnology, and she passed with Distinction.

"That's a mark reserved for an accomplishment that is rare at this level," said Dr. Jeffrey Atkinson, Panagabko's academic advisor and Associate Professor and Chair of the Chemistry department at Brock.

"Candace was an exceptional student and I have no doubt that she has a bright and exciting career ahead of her in the sciences," said Atkinson.

Atkinson added that Panagabko's training at Brock, funded by the Natural Sciences and Engineering Research Council of Canada (NSERC), has prepared her to be an "exceptional" researcher who can rise to the demands of major research programs. In March, she began a new stage of research through a three-year post-doctoral fellowship at two prestigious research institutes south of the border.

She will spend about one and a half years in Bethesda, Maryland, at the National Institute of Health (NIH), in the diabetes and digestive diseases division. While at NIH, Panagabko will begin new projects on protein kinase C and various isoforms of this enzyme: determining its structure and then their function.

Vice-Chancellor September, compared to 2,750 in 2002. While we will admit fewer students this year, Brock's total enrolment will continue to grow as a result of "flowthrough," into second year. So the challenge has not gone away. Brock's

retention rates continue to climb, a result in part of the quality of students coming to Brock. As well, our graduate programs also continue to grow, as Brock pursues its ambition towards comprehensiveness.

An examination of any of the usual indicators suggests that Brock is enjoying unprecedented success. Enrolment growth, application numbers, the success of Brock graduates, our capital expansion program, the success of our researchers, all combine to create a very positive picture of Brock. Most recently, Brock received \$4.6 million from the Canada Foundation for Innovation, which will be matched by the Ontario Innovation Trust Fund, clearly a most impressive showing by Brock, as its researchers enjoy increasing success with the various granting councils. All these achievements come from the as we admitted collective efforts of faculty, staff, and over 4,300 first-year students last students. But even though we have much in which we must be pleased, there are ominous clouds on the horizon. Despite the largest faculty expansion in history (over 90 this year), we are still confronted with increasing class sizes, and increased stress on the institutional infrastructure (the Library, science labs, computing). The simple fact is that Ontario universities are not funded adequately. Comparisons with other jurisdictions paint a worrisome picture. Funding on a per capita basis place Ontario's universities 10th among Canadian provinces. North America wide, Ontario ranks 58th out of 60 jurisdictions. Such numbers suggest that Brock's successes, as well as those of other Ontario universities, are even more impressive.

> While we note with optimism the Ontario government's intention to review funding for higher education over the next year or so, we must also be concerned about higher education's lack of public profile in Ontario and in other jurisdictions as well. In a period of intense competition for public resources, higher education too often takes second

place to health care, social services, the K-12 sector, and the environment. What is overlooked is that the funding of higher education is an investment in everyone's future. It is the universities that produce the physicians and nurses, the social workers, the teachers, the engineers and the environmentalists, who are so necessary in our society, both now and in the future. Too often the only time people are really concerned about universities is when they have someone attending university. The current year generated enormous parent interest in universities because of the "double cohort." Once this "personal" connection is gone, people tend to forget about universities and their importance.

More than this, though, we must never forget that universities are about nurturing and protecting the best of who we are. In their celebration of literature, history, and philosophy, they reinforce what it means to live a "good" life, which we would all agree is far more significant than the size of one's salary. We are reminded of the highest principles of ethical behaviour and civic responsibility — this is truly the most noble of ambitions.

Universities have survived and flourished through difficult and challenging times before. Brock University will continue to move forward, as it takes an increasingly more important place among Canadian universities. It will require the work and support of us all. Alumni are part of our continuing community, upon whom we depend for critical advice and support. I know I can count on you all.

Brock University will receive more than \$4.6 million in funding for two research infrastructure projects with a total cost of \$11.9 million, through the Canada Foundation for Innovation (CFI) Innovation Fund.


This funding announcement represents the largest-ever grants for Brock through the CFI. The University anticipates the funding will be matched by the Ontario Innovation Trust later this year. Brock is also the recipient of an additional \$326,916 in CFI funding through a grant to The Shared Hierarchical Academic Research Computing Network (SHARCNET), a multi-institutional, high performance computing institute, which promotes excellence in research and accelerates the production of research results in the natural and social sciences, engineering and business.

The two projects approved by CFI at Brock include:

• \$2.01 million to fund a collaborative research effort headed by Dr. Doug Bruce, a Professor in the Department of Biological Sciences. The project, entitled Integrated Tools for Biotechnology, will enhance the research capacity of the departments of Biology, Chemistry, the Centre for Biotechnology, and the Cool Climate Oenology and Viticulture Institute (CCOVI).

• \$2.6 million to fund the establishment of the Lifespan Development Research Centre. Dr. Sidney Segalowitz, Professor in the Department of Psychology, will lead the project with a team of 40 faculty members from the faculties of Social Sciences, Education, and Applied Health Sciences.



Raising profile of Graduate Studies



Dr. Marilyn Rose

Dr. Marilyn Rose is in "a high learning mode" as she prepares to provide new leadership to Graduate Studies at Brock for the next four years.

Her recent appointment as the new Dean of Graduate Studies, effective July 1, 2004, puts her at the forefront of Brock's mandate to become a comprehensive university — a mandate that centres, in a large part, on the continuing growth of graduate programs.

"Dr. Rose has enjoyed a long and distinguished career at the University as a teacher, researcher and administrator," said Brock President David Atkinson. "Graduate Studies is one of the most rapidly growing parts of the University, and I am certain that Dr. Rose will provide the leadership and vision so important to the continuing development of innovative programming in this area."

Rose, who joined Brock in 1981, has

an impressive list of academic and administrative achievements at the University. She is currently a Professor in the Department of English Language and Literature. She is Brock's Academic Colleague on the Council of Ontario Universities (COU), and serves on the COU's Executive Committee. Rose also is the Founding and current Director of Brock's Humanities Research Institute.

"I need to spend my first year listening in order to assess how we strengthen the initiatives that are in place now and to continue with program development," she says.

Within the past five years, Brock has expanded from eight Master's programs to 20 along with four PhD programs. Another seven Master's programs are in the advanced stage of planning or approval.

"We are known for the breadth of our programs and we must work to become better known for their substance and originality," she says. "We have to become more of an active presence in the graduate studies community in Canada."

To advance the reputation of Brock's programs, Rose says it is important to raise the profile of graduate students.

"Students are our partners in research and dissemination of information," she says. "I want to give them an opportunity to be out in the community where they can demonstrate what they know and what they have to contribute. Students are an extraordinary resource for us. We have to encourage them to help us put Brock on the map for Graduate Studies."





It is with deep regret that the Department of Physics announces the recent passing of Professor Emeritus

Colin A. Plint

Colin A. Plint who died peacefully on Saturday, April 3, 2004.

Plint obtained his BA and MA from Oxford, and then came to Canada, obtaining his PhD from the University of Toronto.

Plint was the Dean of Arts and Science at Brock for seven years (1969 to 1976) and a member of the Physics Department until his retirement in 1991. He was appointed the first Chair of the Physics Department in 1968. He also served on the Ontario Council of Graduate Studies.

He retained his passion for physics until his death.

Plint leaves behind his wife of 56 years, Florence, daughters Hilary Plint (BSc, geol. '76), Alison Sawatzky (BA, poli, '80; BEd,'91), Heather Plint (BSc, geol, '84) and Amy Plint (BSc, biol, '87). His son Jeremy died in 1983.

Plint was determined that all of his daughters be university educated and have the opportunity to achieve good careers. All who knew him will remember his keen sense of humour, as well as his total dedication to academics. He insisted that one try to walk in another's shoes before judging. His calm, rational and reasoned approach to life always set things right. His gentleness and compassion for both people and animals were unsurpassed.

Brock's newest Canada Research Chair relocates from Switzerland


A Swiss-based chemist who is considered a future world leader in the field of materials chemistry has relocated to Brock as the University's newest Canada Research Chair.

"We are thrilled that Brock has secured another top and emerging researcher through the Canada Research Chair program," said Dr. Jack Miller, Associate Vice-President of Research and Dean of Graduate Studies at Brock. "Dr. Melanie Pilkington's experience and knowledge will provide another pocket of expertise that helps strengthen the University's position as a major research centre."

A British citizen, Pilkington arrives at Brock from the University of Berne, Switzerland. In her new position within the Faculty of Mathematics and Science, she plans to expand the role of chemistry into new areas of science and technology, and to establish a multidisciplinary competitive international research program in materials chemistry at Brock.

As a Tier 2 Research Chair, the University will receive funding of \$500,000 over the next five years. Tier 2 positions are awarded to researchers who are acknowledged by their peers as having the potential to lead in their field.

"The primary purpose of my research and educational mission at Brock will be the training of students and postdoctoral fellows, which I hope will serve to support the establishment of a new Chemistry PhD program that will compete nationally in attracting and producing outstanding graduates," said Pilkington.

CFI funding supports new researchers

Brock University welcomed the Canada Foundation for Innovation's (CFI) investment of \$295,704 recently in support of three research projects led by new faculty members:

• Brian Roy, Assistant Professor in the Department of Physical Education and Kinesiology, received \$90,345 for the Laboratory for the Study of Skeletal Muscle Cell Volume and Metabolism. Roy will be exploring factors that influence muscle function including abnormalities that lead to diseases like Muscular Dystrophy.

• Jeff Stuart, Assistant Professor in the

Department of Biological Sciences, received \$117,208 to study Mitochondrial Oxidative Metabolism and Genomic Stability. His research will investigate proteins that participate in preserving the integrity of mitochondrial DNA, which are essential to a healthy aging process.

· Kimberley Gammage and Phillip Wilson, Assistant Professors in the Department of Physical Education and Kinesiology, received \$88,151 for The Centre for the Advancement of Research in Physical Activity and Health. The Centre will provide an exercise facility for a wide array of research into physical activity.

These investments, approved by the CFI Board of Directors on March 2, were made under the New Opportunities Fund, providing \$23 million for infrastructure support to newly recruited academic staff, and the Infrastructure Operating Fund providing \$6.9 million to help with operating and maintenance costs associated with new infrastructure projects.


Owen brings to the position a

Head rowing coach resigns


Brock University rowing coach Joe Dowd will be leaving the University at the end of June.

eight compounds and of these, our body keeps only one, alpha-tocopherol when we eat vitamin E rich foods or take supplements.

Panagabko will spend the remainder of her time at the Ernest Gallo Research Clinic and Institute at the University of California at San Francisco (UCSF), where she will work to develop a drug to inhibit protein kinase C that could be applicable for the treatment of anxiety and alcoholism.

Panagabko said she feels "indebted" to Atkinson, her graduate supervisor, for

her past and future achievements. "I was introduced to the mystery and wonder of science through his eyes. From there, he offered me the perfect balance of independence and guidance that allowed me to cultivate my own passion for research and creative thought."

She holds an undergraduate degree in Biochemistry from Brock, having transferred here after her first year at McGill University. While at Brock, she was impressed with the calibre of instruction and vibrant energy in the Chemistry and Biology departments.

What Panagabko valued most about Brock was the extensive hands-on training she received with instruments and techniques. She experienced a high level of enthusiasm from both professors and teaching assistants, and a spirited camaraderie matched with a "zest for science that is compelling and inspiring" for students.

"The effect of the fostering environment is readily apparent by the extent of technical expertise and the depth of knowledge evident in fellow graduate students I have known," she said.

The Faculty of Mathematics and Science introduced the Biotechnology PhD program at Brock in 2001, eight years after the undergraduate program began. There are an estimated 100 students enrolled in Brock's graduate undergraduate and Biotechnology programs at Brock.
