Brock officially dedicates its sixth residence to Dr. Arnie Lowenberger

More than 200 members of the Brock community spanning four decades of the University's history gathered on the campus recently to mark the official dedication of the Arnie Lowenberger Residence.

Brock's sixth residence is named after Dr. Arnie Lowenberger, a Queenston resident and former Brock faculty member who retired in 1992. Lowenberger was the first Dean of Students and the first Director of the School of Physical Education and Athletics. When the School became the Faculty of Physical Education, Recreation and Athletics, Lowenberger was appointed its first Dean.

"Having a residence named after me is an immense honour," Lowenberger said. "I was very fortunate in arriving at Brock when I did. The University gave me a marvelous opportunity of making a contribution to both its physical appearance and its curriculum and that is something for which I will always be grateful."

Lowenberger's many significant contributions to the early building of the University include the introduction of varsity sports (men's and women's basketball and men's hockey), management of the first residence system, implementation of the first health and counselling services for students, planning the design of the original Physical Education Building, and drafting of a unique Physical Education Degree Program that focused on the movement education approach to physical education. Brock has since gained a reputation for training some of the most competent teachers of physical education in Ontario.

Expansion continues at Brock

Brock's Board of Trustees approved two capital projects for the campus that will see an expansion in academic space and faculty offices over the next year. The \$12.8-million investment also includes a new and expanded campus bookstore.

A 45,000-square foot, \$10.3million addition to Taro Hall, near the centre of campus, will contain three floors of classrooms and academic space. The building will also house a new 12,000-square-foot campus bookstore, which will be relocated from the Thistle Complex. The project will create a finished plaza between the existing Taro building and

the Alumni Student Centre. The Ontario government is contributing \$3.82 million to the Taro Hall project as part of the 2003 SuperBuild initiative. An 11,000-square foot, \$2.5-

million addition to the MacKenzie Chown Complex at the east end of the campus will house faculty offices. The original building was constructed in 1971 by Moriyama and Teshima Architects and is noted for its architectural uniqueness. It is a large multi-use building containing faculty offices, laboratories, classrooms, and support space for a variety of departments.

Brock graduates lead in employment rate

Results from a provincially sponsored survey show that graduates from Brock University boast the highest employment rate among Ontario universities.

The latest provincial performance indicators show that 98.2 per cent of Brock graduates are employed six months after graduation. Employment rates two years after graduation are also high for Brock University graduates, at 97.5 per cent. Both figures are well above the provincial average. "These employment rates once again show the outstanding success of our graduates in the workforce, and the quality of our growing academic

programs" said Brock President David Atkinson. "Our outstanding faculty and staff continue to excel in preparing students for life and work. Students are clearly making the right choice when they choose Brock as their university." The Ministry of Training, Colleges and Universities and the Council of Ontario Universities co-sponsored the survey, which was conducted by the Ontario Universities' Application Centre (OUAC). The survey examined the employment experiences of graduates of undergraduate degree programs in Ontario in 2000, six months and two years after graduation.

Brock applications continue to grow

Brock continues to be one of the leaders in the growth of applications among Ontario universities, with 18,843 applications from secondary school students wishing to attend the University for the 2004-05 academic year.

Initial figures show that overall applications to Brock rose from 10,095 in 2001 to the current 18,843, up 86.7 per cent. The system-wide average increase for the same period is 49.6 per cent. As application volumes were inflated in 2002 and 2003 in part due to the double cohort phenomenon, the Ontario Universities' Application Centre is using 2001 as the base year for comparison because it pre-dates the double cohort effect.

First-choice applications to Brock totalled 3,623 for 2004-05, an increase of 34.5 per cent from 2001's 2,694 and 2002's 2,854 (26.9 per cent). The overall average increase of first-choice applications to all Ontario universities for the upcoming academic year, compared with 2001, totalled 19 per cent.

Return to Iran links memories with new opportunities

Around the middle of last December, like most other *Surgite!* readers, I was watching for signs of snow and wondering if Christmas was ever going to arrive. But I was doing my watching and wondering far from Canada. I was in Urmia, a city in the northwest of Iran.

Brock has a number of international connections around the world. Urmia University is among the newer ones. About a year ago Brock began a collaborative agreement for a non-credit English Language Program there. I was invited to Urmia to conduct workshops for teachers in that program.

I had last been in Iran a quartercentury before that trip. For some years I was a university teacher in the southern city of Ahwaz, not far from the Gulf. I worked there until just before the Islamic Revolution. My original experience in Iran was wonderful and I had always hoped to return. Walking across the tarmac from the airplane at Tehran International Airport was a very emotional experience!

But the steps along the way were more rational than sentimental. In order to flourish, international agreements between universities need a solid foundation. Above all, a strong academic context is required. Initial contacts are typically made at international conferences, where professors have a chance to meet others in their field with similar scholarly interests. That's what occurred in this case.

A few years ago I met Professor Ebrahim Khodadady at the annual conference of the Canadian Association of Applied Linguistics. He gave a fascinating paper on aspects of the reading process and, into the bargain, he was from Iran! So, I made a point of speaking with him. One thing led to another. We met at further conferences and he also came to Brock. After meeting with the appropriate administrators here, Professor Khodadady was able to serve as an intermediary in facilitating a collaborative agreement between the

two universities.

As with this project, successful international cooperation very often begins small, based on some specific person-to-person contact. That way, there are people with hands-on involvement from the outset. This is frequently much more effective than a big, high-level plan with few people directly involved on the ground.

And sometimes those modest beginnings grow mightily. With time, the Brock-Urmia connection may perhaps grow through the gradual addition of other collaborative ventures where these seem suitable. Of course, the future remains to be seen. In the meantime, the collaborative English Language program is very worthwhile in itself.

For Urmia, it provides an excellent opportunity to improve and promote a high-quality English program that is part of that university's overall plan. And for Brock, it offers a valuable setting for research and professional experience that can contribute to the quality of education for future teachers of English as a Foreign Language at our University. So, there are benefits on both sides.

But as important as these practical concerns truly are, there is also a more personal dimension to international academic co-operation. In Urmia I met a former student who had been in class in 1974! Now he is a leader in the provincial association of high school English teachers based in that city. After all those years, it was remarkable to sit down with him over a traditional Iranian breakfast and reminisce about old times: the students he still knew, about whom he could tell me; the teachers whose subsequent careers I was able to recount to him.

Years and kilometres are powerful dividers, and each of us has an individual destiny to fulfill in our own time and place. Yet friendship, mutual respect and shared ideals can unite even those whose paths might seem at first glance to be inevitably divergent. Building and maintaining international links among universities, teachers and students is one important way to remind us of our common challenges, values and aspirations.

Brock Board of Trustees approves record \$125-million budget

Brock University's Board of Trustees approved a record \$125-million operating budget, which contains significant spending increases due to preparations by the University for the effects of the double cohort.

Trustees approved the balanced budget, the largest in the University's history, for the 2003-2004 fiscal year following a revamped, moreconsultative budget process. Significant in the budget is an additional \$24 million in spending over last year — at that time the University's largest budget — to accommodate additional faculty and staff hiring as well as programming and physical changes to the campus, in preparation for the double cohort.

"While facing the most significant expansion in its history, Brock has been able to maintain a balanced budget by way of sound financial planning," said Steven Pillar, Vice President, Finance and Administration, at Brock. our goals for the future."

Brock received better than expected performance funding from the province. The University received funding totalling \$894,589 based on criteria such as employment rates for recent graduates. Brock University graduates boast the highest employment rate among Ontario universities six months after graduation, at 98.2 per cent.

"We are unwavering in our commitment to providing our students with the highest quality education, and we are well positioned to meet


The Office of External Relations is now the Office of University Advancement.



Fred Casler 'changed my life forever'

In September of 1971 I began my study of ancient Greek with Fred Casler, here in St. Catharines, at Brock University when it was less than a decade old. My reasons for learning Greek don't matter much; what matters is that Fred taught me. That it was Fred who taught me turned a simple matter of course selection into the event that changed my life. I have gone on to devote my life to Classics, as Fred did his. But even if I had not, I can look back over more than 30 years and know that studying Greek with Fred would have changed my life forever anyway.

Fred taught Greek with an intelligence and rigour that I strive in my own work to emulate even today, for he refused merely to teach Greek. He taught language. He showed me not just the ineffable beauty of the Greek verb system, the incomparable riches of the participle, and the subtle structure of ancient Greek phonetics. He taught language. He gave his students the tools to understand the inner logic of any language and shared his own deep comprehension of its history. He taught us a great deal about the beauty and order of the human mind; he taught us that some things about our species transcend the mere details of a time and a place. And he did it in the most astonishing way possible, by exploring the mechanics and history of a long dead language. To be fair, the language he did it with is a very fine language. But he could have done it just as gracefully with any of the many other languages that he knew then or went on to learn later. Humans are language users by their nature, and Fred knew the essentials of this part of human nature more sensitively than anyone I have ever known.

Learning Greek is hard work. Fred never relaxed his demands. It is complex, and Fred had the gift of making the complexities of the system lucid. Fred, more than anyone I have ever known, taught me how much fun it can be to do something really difficult. He didn't just show me how to teach Greek; he gave me and many other students a proud paradigm of what is best in the life of the mind: toughminded intellectual joy. To this day, because of his example, I work to give my students, no matter what the subject, some sense of the same joy. Fred's generosity was boundless. He taught anyone who wanted to learn

Professor Frederick H. Casler of the Department of Classics passed away on January 5. Professor Casler first came to Brock in July 1968 as a lecturer. He was promoted to Assistant Professor in 1971 and Associate Professor in 1974. In January 2001, Professor Casler took the opportunity of faculty renewal. from him and spared no efforts or labours to do it, whether it was translating for his students an obscure German textbook in Indo-European linguistics, adapting a book on Latin verse composition, or devoting endless hours of laborious fun to the mounting of entire plays performed in Greek or Latin. In my later years at Brock he transformed my life yet again by getting me to perform in a Plautine comedy, learning not just a thousand lines of Latin for oral delivery but (even better) learning how to be a stand-up comic in front of strangers. Fred got us all to extend ourselves and showed us again and again that hard intellectual work could and should be surrounded by humour, fun, and wit.

Any Classicist can tell you a story about the person who somehow ignited their love of the subject. I have been very lucky, for I can think of several inspiring teachers who made it not just possible but irresistible. But none of them gave me more than Fred Casler; more than anyone else he showed me what it can mean to be a teacher. If I could dedicate something to him though now it is tragically too late — I would know how to inscribe it: didaskalos didaskalôi.

Brock receives largest gift

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A recent \$1.6 million gift from the estate of the late Bernard Harrison is the largest gift ever received by Brock University. Mr. Harrison, who passed away last January at the age of 95, was a long time supporter of Brock.

Over a period of nearly 40 years, Mr. Harrison made significant contributions to the University and to its students. In total, his gifts and pledges now exceed \$2.4 million, and his scholarships have provided valuable learning opportunities for more than 40 graduate and undergraduate students.

The estate gift of \$1.6 million will be endowed as the Harrison-Thompson Bursary Trust with the interest providing awards for outstanding students who have financial need. The donation brings the University's Good, Better, Brock! campaign to 91 per cent of its \$29.62 million goal.

Brock student goes north.... way north... for co-op placement

In early January, Brock University Co-op student Annalisa Streicher travelled over 1,500 kilometres to Iqaluit, Nunavut, to begin a work term. The placement represents the farthest that any co-op student has travelled for Brock's Co-op Accounting program.

Streicher is a second-year student in the Bachelor of Accounting Co-op program (BAcc). She accepted a co-op placement with MacKay Landau Chartered Accountants in the city of Iqaluit.

Her contact at MacKay Landau is a Brock graduate. Andrew Plunkett, (BBA, '93), is a partner at the firm, and helped arrange the placement with the Accounting Co-op office. The company has four resident partners and six fulltime staff. During its peak workload season, it employs up to seven additional Chartered Accountants.

"I've always enjoyed new places, so to get schooling and work experience in such a unique location is a great opportunity for me," said Streicher, a resident of Millbank, Ontario. "I grew up near New Liskeard, Ontario, so hopefully the climate in Iqaluit won't be too much of a shock."

Iqaluit is the capital of Nunavut, with a population of approximately 5,000. It is also the most northerly capital city in all of Canada, located on the southeast corner of Baffin Island.

Streicher will face unique conditions. During the winter season, the area only receives six to seven hours of daylight. The average temperature for the area in January is -30 degrees C, before the wind chill. By April, when her placement is scheduled to end, the daylight will last up to 20 hours.

"We place hundreds of students in co-op positions each year," said Jennifer

Cockell, Coordinator of Accounting Co-op Programs at Brock. "This placement was definitely our most exotic locale yet. We continually strive to find challenging and exciting opportunities for our students that will enhance their overall educational experience."

Brock's Co-op Accounting option is the second largest program of its kind in Ontario, with a near 100 per cent employment rate for students. With 32 co-op options, Brock has the second largest selection of co-op offerings among universities in Ontario.



Graduates support campus advances in wireless technology

Thanks to the support of Brock graduates, the University is one of the most technologically advanced universities in Canada with the activation this fall of a new high-speed wireless network. The new wireless technology allows students to move around campus with their laptop and PDA computers while remaining connected to the Internet.

The \$100,000 investment in computing and telecommunications infrastructure includes \$30,000 in donations from graduates and parents of students through the University's TeleGrad fundraising program. The balance of the cost was covered by the University.

"Bringing the latest technology to the campus is a key priority for the University, but it is a costly investment," said Christine Jones, Director of Alumni Advancement. "We are truly appreciative of the generous support we have received for this initiative from graduates and parents of Brock students."

This technology enhances learning and research opportunities for students by providing them with increased computer access. Students with a laptop computer and a wireless network card (sold as a standard item with many laptops) will have full Internet access to online library resources and e-mail accounts, and they can retrieve course information and submit assignments from their computers. Faculty and staff can also take advantage of the seamless, portable opportunities offered by a wireless campus.

"As a technology-based university, Brock is committed to ensuring that the latest information technologies are readily available to students in order to enhance their learning and research opportunities to the fullest," said Dr. Terry Boak, Vice-President, Academic, and Provost at Brock. "This new network will help to address the pressures of the double cohort year by lessening demand for computer labs and by opening up more public areas for students to study and to do research."

The network currently covers 60 per cent of the main campus, with plans to reach 100 per cent coverage late next year. Current coverage includes many of the large classrooms, small seminar/teaching rooms not previously hard wired, corridors and large student gathering areas.

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Brock experiences third-largest increase in research funding among Canadian universities

Brock University experienced the third largest percentage increase in external research funding among Canadian universities between 2001 and 2002, according to a recent report by Research Infosource entitled Canada's Top 50 Research Universities. The 68 per cent increase in research grants and contracts awarded and dollars obtained is the direct result of the University's commitment to becoming a comprehensive university and the high quality of research programs of faculty members in all disciplines.

One of the greatest impacts on the amount of funding at Brock has been the addition of new faculty who are leaders in their field, including several Canada Research Chairs, over the past year. This increase in research funding will help to attract even more top researchers to Brock, which will then in turn attract more top students to the school. This process ultimately leads to the creation of spin-off companies, and increased business activity in the local economy.

Research Infosource also ranked the universities by the amount of research sponsorship money they had. Brock placed 36th overall, up from a 42nd place finish last year. Brock's research funding rose to more than \$8 million in 2002, up from just over \$5 million in 2001.

Brock professor receives \$250,000 to fund research in vascular diseases

Brock University Professor Hui Di Wang is the recipient of more than \$250,000 in funding from the Canadian Institutes of Health Research (CIHR) to continue her study of vascular diseases such as hypertension that affect thousands of Canadians. Wang's innovative research looks at the outer layer of blood vessels, called the adventitia, in connection with hypertension. Traditionally, research in vascular diseases, such as hypertension, has concentrated on the role of the cells found in the inner and middle layers of the vessels. The adventitia has long been

considered a silent bystander in vascular function.

According to the Heart and Stroke Foundation of Canada, 50 per cent of Canadians over age 55 have hypertension, and 87 per cent of those

This funding announcement for Brock came on the heels of a recent report that showed Brock University had experienced the third largest percentage increase (68 per cent) in external research funding among Canadian universities between 2001 and 2002.

New partnership with Owl Children's Trust

Brock University has entered into a new partnership with the Owl Children's Trust to establish important new initiatives in child and youth research.

The partnership will see several projects initiated, including an annual conference on the study of children, youth and media; the establishment of seed funding for research projects and a department chair; and the creation of an endowment and fund-raising activities

to provide stable and on-going funding for additional initiatives.

As part of the agreement, Owl Children's Trust will donate an initial \$110,000 to the University to fund the initiatives in the Brock Research Institute for Youth Studies (BRIYS) and the Faculty of Education.

Athletics highlights

• Brock University men's wrestling team made it six straight CIS National titles in front of 1,100 fans at the Bob Davis Gymnasium. The Brock men made CIS wrestling history as they captured a new CIS record six golds out of 10 weight classes. The men's and women's wrestling teams both captured the 2004 OUA Wrestling Championship individual team titles. This was the men's 10th straight conference title dating back to 1995 and the women's fourth straight.

• The women's curling team captured the 2004 OUA Championship as they posted a 4-1 record, ending the season with a 9-3 overall record. Skip Margie Darnley led the squad of Abbie Darnley, Amy MacKay, and Stephanie Lingard.

• Stacey Farr, a fifth-year forward on the women's basketball team, set a record for all-time career points in OUA scoring history. Farr has surpassed the 1,171 career-point mark held by Michelle Vesprini of the University of Western Ontario.

• Jennifer Marsh, a member of the

Badgers rowing team, was one of 18 female scholar-athletes honoured by the Ontario University Athletics (OUA), last November, at the Chatelaine Women of Influence Luncheon, held at the Metro Toronto Convention Centre.

• Men's wrestler Evan MacDonald won a gold medal at the Olympic Trials, held in December, to become the fifth Brock wrestler in school history to make the Olympics. He will be a member of Team Canada at the 2004 Olympics in Athens. The other four former Brock Olympians were Marty Calder (1992 Barcelona, 1996 Atlanta), Paul Ragusa (1996 Atlanta), David Hohl (1992 Barcelona, 1996 Atlanta) and Colin Daynes (1996 Atlanta).

• Chris Critelli, head coach of the women's basketball team, recorded her 300th career victory in January, while Ken Murray, head coach of the men's basketball team, recorded his 400th career coaching victory in February.

• Men's hockey coach Murray Nystrom was honoured by the OUA as one of two recipients of the Coach of the Year award.


Grad in Hall of Fame

Brock graduate David Shemilt (BSc, math/phs, '87) will be inducted into the Ontario Aquatic Hall of Fame on May 1, 2004. Shemilt, a Canadian record holder and champion in the 800m and 1500m freestyle events, swam for Brock from 1982 to 1987. He was a member of Canadian teams that competed at Commonwealth Games, Pan Am Games and tours to Europe. At the 1984 Olympics in Los Angeles, Shemilt was a finalist in the 1500m freestyle. He

is the second Brock Badger to be inducted into the Ontario Aquatic Hall of Fame. Brock graduate Kathy Richardson (BPhEd, '84), a 1980 Olympian, was honoured three years ago.

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
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Childhood career goal: To be Nurse Dixie McCall from Emergency (I'm so dating myself with that response).
