Conference planning service

Brock University now has a separate office dealing with conference planning and organization.

The Conference Planning and Management Service, directed by Vicki Lowenberger, is set up to provide support services for conference groups wanting to utilize Brock facilities.

Previously incorporated under the Housing office, Conference planning now offers a full spectrum of services including the printing of promotional material, distribution and collection of registration material, liaison with speakers for facility requirements, room assignment, conference kit preparation and special recreational and educational packages.

Organization is done on a "fee for service" basis.

Professional associations and service organizations are encouraged to use the extended services offered by the University's Conference Planning and Management Service said Mrs. Lowenberger.

"References are coming in from faculty and staff who are involved in organizations looking for Canadian locations," she said. "A lot of our work is through word of mouth."

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

Nominations for Dean of Humanities

Three nominations have been received for the position of Dean of Humanities at Brock University.

Profs. M. J. Cardy, Romance studies, G. Coggins, English, and M. Yacowar, Fine Arts are the nominees.

Prof. M. Yacowar now holds the position.

Applications closed Jan. 10. Faculty hand-book regulations state "for one week after nominations have been closed, comments in writing from individual members of the University community will be received.

Thereafter, members of the Advisory committee will not publicly discuss nominations or applications, and committee proceedings will be confidential".

The Advisory committee on the Humanities dean appointment is chaired by Prof. Bill Matheson.

Dan Madar goes to Harvard

Prof. Dan Madar of Brock's Political Science department begins a Harvard appointment in September.

He has been appointed Visiting Scholar at Harvard University and Associate of Harvard's Centre for International Affairs for 1983-84. He also receives an \$8,000 stipend.

Prof. Madar said he will continue research on trucking deregulation and Canadian-U.S. economic relations while at Harvard.

"It's an important area of research that no one else has done," said Prof. Madar.

Provincial funding

More than \$23 million is slated to go to Ontario colleges, universities and school boards under Ontario's job creation program, said Colleges and Universities Minister Dr. Bette Stephenson.

The province's universities, including Ryerson Polytechnical Institute and the Ontario College of Art, will receive \$10.9 million of the \$23.5 million total.

More than \$5 million of the total allocated for universities will be used for new or accelerated short-term labor intensive job creating projects. The remaining \$5.3 million will be used to fund certain capital projects awaiting funding approval.

Dr. Stephenson said the projects will include renovation or maintenance of buildings and upgrading of buildings and facilities to meet occupational health and fire safety standards and some energy conservation projects.

The funding was announced in December.

Bus re-route

There's a change in the Brock University

city bus route.

A note from the St. Catharines Transit Commission states that the Brock bus will continue to enter Brock from Glenridge through the parking lot to the Tower.

However instead of returning to Glenridge by reverse route, it now leaves the Tower, travels south to St. David's Road, then north on Glenridge.

The change is implemented in order to service the Niagara Regional headquarters, once it's in operation.

No parking means no parking

The University's Parking committee reminds individuals that special permits are needed to park in "No parking" areas.

Vehicles in "No parking" zones will be ticketed by Campus Police if no permit is visible.

The Parking committee alone has the authority to issue special permits and reminds University faculty and staff not to issue parking advice contrary to regulations.

IUTS extension

The Royal Military College of Kingston is now part of the Inter University Transit System (IUTS).

Established in 1967 to carry library materials between the provincial universities in Ontario, IUTS now carries a variety of inter-university mail.

Daily deliveries are made not only to the universities but also to related institutions such as COU, MCU, OCUA, AUCC and CISTI.

IUTS also links up at the National Library in Ottawa with PEBUQUILL, its Quebec counterpart, and with the Federal library delivery service.

The RMC became part of IUTS Jan. 4.

Lab safety symposium

Safety in the lab is the topic of a four hour symposium at the Glenridge campus Friday Jan. 14.

Faculty members deliver brief lectures on a number of safety aspects from the proper handling of chemicals and equipment to the procedures taken in the event of an accident. A film on radiation safety will be shown. Health threats for individuals working in labs will also be examined.

The symposium begins at 1 pm in rm 204 at Glenridge.

Refugee student sponsorship

The Brock WUSC committee is attempting to sponsor refugee student Mohamed Muktar Aliso.

Born in Ethiopia, Mohamed fled his country in 1977 after a military regime took over. He speaks English, French, and four other languages. His admission to Brock has been cleared. His major interest is Physics. The Committee would sponsor Mohamed for one year. It hopes to raise \$6,000.

Esther Sleep, Library, and Eric Muller, Mathematics are the liaison between Brock faculty and the Committee.

Faculty and staff interested in contributing to the sponsorship should contact either liaison person.

A decision to sponsor Mohamed is expected in mid-January.

Near eastern faience

The making of faience, one of the oldest of the fire-using crafts of the ancient world is the topic of a lecture given by Suzanne Heim, a doctoral candidate at the Institute of Fine Arts, New York University.

Sponsored by the A.I.A. Niagara Peninsula Society, the illustrated lecture explores the rich history of the faience industry.

As early as the sixth millennium in the ancient Near East and Egypt, pendants and beads of faience were first produced.

Ms. Heim's lecture is titled "Ancient Near Eastern Faience: a study in interconnections".

The lecture begins at 3 pm on Sunday Jan. 16. It will be held in Th 245. Admission is free for A.I.A. members and students. For non-members admission is \$2.

The official presentation

Prof Janet Rossant of the University's Biological sciences department was officially presented with the E.W.R. Steacie Memorial fellowship on Tuesday Jan. 11.

Gordon McNabb, President of NSERC presented Prof Rossant and three other outstanding Canadian scientists with their awards at the Natural Sciences and Engineering Research Council's Administration building, in Ottawa.

Prof Rossant's award allows her to continue research into early mammalian embryogenesis and fetal-maternal interactions.

Although in its early stages, Prof Rossant's research could one day provide some insight into preventing birth defects, failed preganancies and the rejection of vital organs.

The total value of Prof Rossant's award is \$96,000 over three years.

Dr. Alan Earp, the University's president, was at the Ottawa ceremony.

Snow collage

Michael Snow's collage of "Brock in construction" is once again on view in the corridor stairwell, A-Block.

Construction and renovation plans made it necessary to remove the collage in the fall.

A tribute to the early years of the University, the collage is a series of photos showing Brock in its building stages.

Library appeal to gamblers

The University Library is now collecting Wintario tickets in order to help buy Canadian books.

The Wintario Half Back program, recently re-introduced by the Minister of Citizenship and Culture, allows non-winning tickets to be used toward the purchase of books by Canadian authors.

"Since the program has been made available", said James Hogan, University Librarian "we should take advantage of it especially when inflation is making it increasingly difficult to purchase all the books we need."

Tax on insurance premiums rescinded

Personnel services sends the following word on taxation of certain group insurance premiums:

In his December budget speech, the Minister of Finance rescinded the provisions that provided for taxation of premiums

on extended health care, semi-private and dental insurance plans which are paid on behalf of an employee by an employer.

Income tax withheld and remitted on such premiums in 1982 will result in a reduction of the tax liability when 1982 income tax returns are filed.

Research grants for Brock professors

Two professors from Brock's Department of Psychology are the recipients of research grants from the Social Sciences and Research Council of Canada.

Prof Stan Sadava has been awarded more than \$9,000 for his research on "Social psychology of multiple drug use".

Prof Linda Krasnor receives more than \$17,000 for her work on "Social problem solving and friendship".

Both awards were announced in December.

Badger sets record

Candi Lohr, a member of the women's basketball team, set a Canadian women's university record, Jan. 20, scoring 49 points in a single game.

The Brock Badgers defeated Wilfrid Laurier in a basketball game held that night, 117-21.

Lohr's record breaking feat is in keeping with the Badgers' winning streak this season.

The womens' basketball team has won 19 games, losing only 2 this season. They are undefeated in league play, ranking them third in national standings.

"That puts us in line as possible contenders for the Canadian title," said Chris Critelli, assistant coach for the women's team.

"The Ontario championships will be held Feb. 26 and 27. Hopefully they'll be played here at Brock, giving us the advantage. After that we hope to get the opportunity to play for the national title" she said.

Alumni award for teaching excellence

Nominations are now being accepted for Brock University's Alumni award for excellence in teaching.

The award is presented annually by the Alumni association in recognition of a teacher's outstanding performance in areas such as classroom instruction, thesis supervision, student consultation, curriculum development and course development.

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

National universities week

The achievments of higher education throughout Canada will be marked this fall when National Universities Week takes place Oct. 2-8.

The event is the first of its kind to be held in Canada. Work on the project is underway at both national and regional levels.

The national coordinating committee is chaired by President George Pedersen of Simon Fraser University and Principal David Johnston of McGill University.

The idea for a National Universities week was endorsed by the four regional and provincial university associations last summer and subsequently approved by the Association of Universities and Colleges of Canada (AUCC).

The purpose of the week is to highlight the role of Canadian universities in community, regional and national development.

The project draws attention to the value of teaching, scholarship, research, and cultural and public service activities and will emphasize university contributions to business and industry.

Most activities will be initiated and carried out at the institutional level.

A slogan and graphics campaign identifying National Universities Week is being developed by Doug Geddie, Brock's Director of Information & Liaison, for approval by the national committee.

Repairing with BILD

Brock receives more than \$100,000 from the provincial government for repair work throughout the university.

In a program outlined by Colleges and Universities minister, Dr. Bette Stephenson, the province, under its BLD program, allocated more than \$23 million for job creation and labor intensive projects.

Universities received \$10.9 million of the total.

Repairs at Brock include cleaning and repairing induction units in the Brock Tower, replacing corroded plumbing fittings in various locations, and replacing a water damaged wall in the Print shop.

Region asked for \$1 million grant

The Niagara region has been asked to contribute \$1 million toward the University's new science complex.

The request for the grant was made to the Region's finance committee by the chairman of the science development fund, and former St. Catharines mayor, Mac Chown, last week.

The science development fund hopes to raise the \$4.5 million needed to complete the project.

The world of computers

The University Library has subscribed to Data World International, an easy-to-use, four volume reference service which provides analysis and evaluation of the world's most widely used and actively marketed EDP systems.

Coverage includes general purpose computers and peripherals, mini and microcomputers, application and systems software, data communications facilites, equipment and services.

Fach volume contains a comprehensive directory of companies, product reports with user reactions, price data and specification tables which describe and compare product features.

Data World International is kept up-to-date with monthly supplements. It is available for consultation in the Reference department, (Call No. REF QA 76.5 A 7837).

Dollar per course

Students at Brock University will be asked to donate a dollar per course toward the Brock University Science Development Fund.

If students approve the motion, decided by a referendum held Feb. 15,16 & 17, more than \$100,000 will be donated to the science fund over a five year period.

BUSU (Brock University Students' Union) decided to hold the referendum following a presentation by science fund organizers at the last council meeting, Feb. 2. At the meeting the students' union was encouraged to become involved in the fund raising aspect of the science complex.

"I really think we'll have a yes", said Joanne Ursino, BUSU Minister of Publications and Communications.

"Council was really positive on the idea. With some good publicity, students will vote in favor of the idea. And they'll know where their dollar is going," she said.

In order for the motion to pass, referendum organizers need a 60 per cent response in favor of the idea out of the total taken.

Science fund organizers need \$4.5 million to complete the science project. More than \$1 million has been raised to date.

OCUA Financial analysis

In comparison with universities in other provinces, Ontario universities have fared poorly in terms of operating support and operating income from the provincial government.

That's one conclusion reached by the Ontario Council on University Affairs (OCUA) in an executive summary of the "Financial analysis of the Ontario University system - 1982."

The report, which outlines increases in operating grants since 1977-78, said that until 1982-83, universities in Ontario received a declining share of government expenditures.

"While this trend has been reversed for 1982-83, the universities remain unable to maintain the quality of service at the 1981-82 level, let alone recoup any of the shortfall of previous years," said the report.

Ontario universities ranked tenth in operating grants and ninth in operating income relative to the universities in other provinces in 1980-81.

"In order for Ontario universities to have been funded at the same level of operating grants per FTE (Full-Time Equivalent) student as the weighted average of the other nine provinces in Canada in 1980-81, the Government of Ontario, would have had to provide an additional \$264 million in operating grants in that year alone", said the report.

In terms of faculty openings, the number of FTE faculty positions in Ontario universities has declined approximately two percent since 1977-78.

Mean salaries for full-time faculty increased 39.8 per cent, while the CPI rose 48.4 per cent.

"Furthermore, the mean salary of faculty in Ontario universities has lagged behind that of the Western provinces and Quebec even though the mean age of Ontario faculty is higher than that found in those regions," said the report.

The response of many universities to financial restraint has been to cut back on items such as equipment, furniture, library books, and periodicals. Expenditures in this area declined by about 16 per cent from 1976-77 to 1981-82.

Constraints on capital funding have been even more severe.

"From 1976-77 to 1982-83, government support for capital expenditures has fallen short of Council's total recommendations by \$18.6 million", said the report.

Although the Ontario government has undertaken a new capital funding initiative for 1982-83 by providing \$5.5 million under the BILD program, most of the money is channelled into upgrading existing facilities on campuses throughout the province.

The report concludes with a brief mention of budget increases for research in Ontario universities:

"In addition to the \$8.2 million provided under the BILD program in 1982-83 for the purchase of research equipment in science and engineering, the Government of Ontario has allocated \$1.78 million towards new or expanded research employment contacts with industry".

Dear colleague...

This issue of Campus News contains an enclosure: a letter from Dr. Alan Earp to Brock University faculty and staff.

The letter contains the cheering news that two years of enrolment increases at Brock means a 14 per cent increase in operating revenue for the University this year.

In terms of percentage increase in operating revenue, Brock will be leading Ontario universities.

Although economic relief for the University is expected to continue for another year, Dr. Earp said, "...it would be foolish to ignore either the difficulties that lie ahead for all Ontario universities and with which many of them are already confronted, or the economic environment which surrounds us".

The Press moves

Renovation plans at the University have forced the student newspaper, The Press, out of their 4th floor office, Brock Tower.

The demand for classroom space means the paper needs a new location. Although details have yet to be worked out, the proposal at this time is to make room for the newspaper in the area now occupied by BUSU and the video games.

The move would take place during the summer.

"There's no final agreement on the proposed move to the BUSU area yet", said J.B. Owens, president of the students' union.

The area could eventually house student radio operations as well.

Thanks for the Wintario tickets

More than 400 tickets have been given to the Library following its request for old Wintario tickets to help purchase Canadian books.

If the tremendous response continues, the Library could net up to 10,000 tickets since the Wintario Half Back program is expected to continue throughout 1983, said James Hogan, University Librarian.

Under the program, non-winning Wintario tickets are worth 50 cents each against the purchase of books by Canadian authors.

Tickets given to the Library will help stretch the acquisitions budget for more books.

Tickets can be dropped into the collecting boxes at the Circulation desk, Main Library and in the Instructional Resource Centre, COE, or sent to the Library, Rm 214.

Elevating wheelchair in Library

A special elevating wheelchair is now available for use in the University's Library.

The wheelchair, designed by members of Brock's Chemistry department, and funded substantially by Imperial Oil, alleviates problems in consulting catalogues and reaching books on high shelves.

Those who require use of the chair should contact Janette Auer in the Reference department.

Letters such as this have often had an ominous ring, containing as they have repeated exhortations to further fiscal restraint. This year, however, we are starting to reap the benefits of that restraint and, in terms of the percentage increase in operating revenue, will be leading the universities of Ontario. The expected 7.5% increase in government grants will mean somewhat less than that for several universities, but, as a result of the enrolment increase of the past two years, it will generate about 14% for Brock. While this may not endear us to colleagues in other institutions, nor to those in more depressed sectors of the economy, it is very gratifying for us.

Since salary increases have been limited by law, we are able to estimate our overall expenditure much more accurately than is usual at this time of year. 1983 will not be the millenium but it will be a year in which we should be able to wipe out the accumulated deficit and make significant improvements in the non-salary sector, which has been so severely eroded in recent years. There will be increased appropriations for library books and equipment and some increase in departmental operating budgets. Were it not for the deficit, these increases would be more substantial.

I expect that this relief will continue for another year, but it would be foolish to ignore either the difficulties that lie ahead for all Ontario universities and with which many of them are already confronted, or the economic environment which surrounds us.

At Brock, by a combination of good fortune and our own efforts, we have earned a respite which will allow us to consolidate and improve on our position, but it is only that. Applications continue to increase, but we are reaching our enrolment limits and cannot expect above-average grant increases indefinitely.

To all those faculty and staff who have contributed to this improved position by doing their particular job particularly well, I should like to express my thanks.

8.6 % overall; 14 % for Brock

Provincial government funding for Ontario universities has increased by a total of 8.6 per cent for 1983/84.

That was the word out of Queen's Park on Feb. 15, when Dr. Bette Stephenson, Minister of Colleges and Universities announced more than \$1 billion was slated for Ontario universities this year.

The \$1,113,500,000 figure is \$77,000,000 more in regular operating support than the 1982-83 allocation.

The government will also provide a further \$12,000,000 in a special, one-time grant toward equipment expenditures for universities and related institutions.

That means a total 8.6 per cent increase in funding for universities over the 1982/83 figures.

The equipment grant will be distributed pro rata to 1982-83 operating grants.

Institutions will be asked to give high priority to equipment improvements in programs in science and engineering.

Fees for visa students at the graduate level increase by 5 per cent, in keeping with the government's inflation restraint program.

The Minister said universities are also requested to keep tuition fee increases at the 5 per cent level.

Although the Ontario Council on University Affairs (OCUA) said an 11.8 per cent increase in operating grants was required by the province's universities to maintain effective operations, OCUA has endorsed the 8.6 per cent funding increase.

"The universities do, however, appreciate that an 8.6 per cent increase in support for 1983/84 represents a serious commitment to the university sector on the part of government in the present climate of fiscal restraint", said a media release from OCUA offices, Feb. 15.

For Brock University, as a letter from Dr. Alan Earp to all faculty and staff recently indicated, increased enrolment at the University means an increase in operating revenue of almost 14 per cent.

"Generally, funding levels for all Ontario universities is tight", said Terry Varcoe, vice-president, Administration at Brock.

"However from our point of view, (increased enrolment) has meant better than average funding for the University this year", he said.

Administrative appointments

The University's Board of Trustees approved two administrative appointments at their meeting Feb. 23.

John Bird, is now Director of Development and Roger Reynolds is Part Time Programs Officer.

Both positions are effective March 1.

Work futures forum

Unemployment and the uncertain future of work is the topic of a one-day community meeting held at Brock University, Saturday March 19.

"Work Futures" investigates the high unemployment rate in the region and provides a forum for community members to learn how to draw on their own resources to resolve problems.

The forum is modelled after community meetings in the 1800s when citizens gathered to deal with matters of common concern.

Keynote speaker is Eric Trist, professor of social ecology at York University. Prof Trist has been actively involved in organizations and communities such as Cape Breton, Shell Oil, General Electric, and Hawker Siddely.

Other speakers include Robert White, Canadian president of the United Auto Workers, John houghton, president, The Ontario Paper Co., Sam Piott, chairman, Ontario Tender Fruit Producers' marketing board, Alan Cronkwright, president, Alliance of the Unemployed, and Robert Welch, Deputy Premier of Ontario, Brock MPP.

Registration begins at 8 am. Fees are \$10/person, \$5/senior citizen/student and no cost for unemployed workers.

Gallup poll supports universities

A recent Gallup poll indicates strong support for universities among the public.

The findings of the survey, released in January, show public education has retained a high fiscal priority among Ontario residents. There is also strong support for either maintaining or increasing educational expenditures.

The survey found a majority of the Ontario public (55%) are satisfied with the educational system in general.

Only medical services and job creation were given a stronger claim on tax money than education.

For the educational system in general 78 per cent of respondents said that educational expenditures should at least keep up with inflation.

For universities 34 per cent of the respondents want increases above the inflation rate while 49 per cent want expenditures to keep up with inflation.

Sixty-eight per cent oppose laying off teachers and 60 per cent oppose reducing grants to universities.

The survey also found that a majority of respondents (53%) reject a restriction of access to universities and colleges through limiting enrolment to match the availability of jobs.

However, a majority (80%) would accept a

reduction in enrolment as a means of preserving the quality of university education in the face of declining future levels of funding.

Results of the Gallup poll are accurate within four percentage points, 19 times out of 20. The survey was sponsored by the Ontario Institute for Studies in Education (OISE).

Job openings hit record low

Job listings by 1,700 employers (excluding government and institutional openings) showed only 659 vacancies this year compared with 3,414 a year ago and 4,328 in June 1981.

The statistics are found in a recent quarterly report by the Technical Service Council (TSC) and reported in "Notes from AUCC".

The TSC said job openings for accountants, executives, engineers, scientists and other professionals plunged to a record low in December.

Forty large and medium-sized companies surveyed indicate only one-fifth as many graduates as in 1982 will be hired this year.

Interim manager for Print Shop

Dennis Coppard became interim manager of the Print Shop, effective March 1.

Dennis has worked in the Print Shop as a senior offset press operator for thirteen years.

More research money needed

The federal government needs to adopt an aggressive policy on research if it's to meet the demand for long-term job creation and economic growth in Canada.

That was the response of the 26,000-member Canadian Association of University Teachers (CAUT) to the announcement that funding for university research will increase approximately seven per cent for 1983/84.

"The government pays constant lip-service to the importance of research and innovation, and the need to educate young people in these fields in order to turn the economy around, but does far too little to bring in fundamental improvements in this area, "said Ken McGovern, CAUT president."

"The rate of inflation in research," he said, "is running at about 20 per cent at the moment because of higher costs for supplies and equipment. An increase of only six or seven per cent just means that we will barely stay at last year's level, let alone hope for any real growth in research funding", he said.

University researchers began lobbying the government seven years ago in an effort to introduce a national research and development policy which would provide for long-term stable financing and growth.

"There is no way we can meet the increased demand for highly qualified manpower with these budget increases", said the CAUT president.

Phillips, formerly of the Entomology section, Canada Department of Agriculture Research Station, Vineland Station on "A History of Fruit Crop Research in the Niagara Peninsula".

Prof B.W. Thompson of Brock's Geography department is banquet speaker. His topic is "Climatic change in the Niagara Peninsula".

The conference features a field trip to fruit-growing areas and other farm operations in the Peninsula.

"It's the only conference of its kind held in Ontario", said Prof W.B. Turner, of Brock's History department.

"Last year the conference drew around 175 participants; we expect around that this year", he said.

More money for NSERC

Canada's largest single funder of university research and development, NSERC, has been given another \$18 million for 1982-83.

That brings NSERC's total budget to \$244 million for the year.

The additional funding is allocated for the purchase of scientific equipment. NSERC had requested \$24.5 million in supplementary funding last year.

Decisions, decisions...

Brock University's student body rendered a number of decisions last week:

The new president of the Brock University Students' Union (BUSU) for 1983/84 is Linus Hand.

Linus succeeds J.B. Owens who steps down April 30.

Student representative on the Board of Trustees is Chris Cushing.

Stuart Smyth and Iain Moncur were voted the Senate representatives.

Students also voted in favor (77%) of supporting the University's Science Development Fund with a dollar per course donation.

The donation will total \$100,000 over a five-year period.

More than a million dollars has been collected to date for the \$4.5 million science fund campaign.

Brock students also voted to remain unaffiliated with the Canadian Federation of Students (CFS).

Voting was conducted over a three day period, March 15 - 17. Turnout was described as "good" with approximately 1,200 students casting ballots on each issue.

OSAP funding increased

The Ontario Student Assistance Program (OSAP) has received an additional \$9.6 million, bringing total OSAP funding to more than \$119 million for 1983/84.

That was the announcement out of Queen's Park, March 7, by Colleges and Universities Minister Dr. Bette Stephenson.

Some of the increased funding will offset a five per cent tuition increase for Ontario universities and colleges.

A larger portion of the funding will be used to meet the increased cost of the Ontario Student Loan plan.

OSAP assists approximately 90,000 students annually.

Re-appointed for four year term

Prof Maurice Yacowar has been re-appointed Dean of the Division of Humanities for a four-year term beginning July 1, 1983.

The Senate endorsed recommendation was approved by the Board of Trustees, Feb. 22.

Covered abroad

A note from Personnel Services states the supplementary plan covers full-time employees for emergency treatment outside Canada.

Hospital and medical expenses are covered up to levels which are customary and reasonable for the area where treatment is rendered.

Follow the steps outlined below when claiming such expenses:

In most cases, you will have to pay the full amount of the bill where treatment is given. Be sure to obtain detailed receipts which clearly indicate the diagnosis, treatment rendered, dates of service and name of the physician.

When you return, make copies of all receipts, as OHIP does not return any originals.

Send original receipts, along with a note that lists your OHIP number, mailing address and gives a brief description of the emergency to: Out-of-province-claims, OHIP, 25 Main Street W., Hamilton, Ontario L8P 4P9.

When OHIP returns your money, compare the amount received against the amount submitted. If there is a discrepancy, obtain a Confederation Life claim form and return it to Personnel along with copies of your receipts and the OHIP cheque stub.

Brock honors athletes

Brock University honored its athletes at the Athletic Awards banquet March 24 at the Beacon Motor Inn.

Sharing the O'Keefe award for outstanding female athletic achievment were Candi Lohr and Kathy Richardson.

Candi, a member of the Badgers basketball team that won this year's provincial championship, was on both the provincial and national all-star teams and was named the leading scorer in the Ontario Womens' Intercollegiate Athletic Association.

Kathy, a winner of the 1981-82 O'Keefe award, set records this year in the provincial 400m and 800m freestyle championships. She was also the Canadian champion in the 400m individual medley, 800m freestyle, and 200m breaststroke, setting records in each event.

Kathy was named the female swimmer of the year by the Canadian Intercollegiate Athletic Union.

The Patricia Lowenberger trophy for outstanding male athlete of the year went to David Shemilt, a member of the University's swim team.

David set records in the provincial 200, 400 and 1500m freestyle events. He was selected as the Ontario University Athletic Association's Swimmer of the Meet in Championships.

David was also the Canadian champion in the the 200m and 1500m freestyle, setting a record in the 1500.

A number of awards for various athletic activities including tennis, wrestling, running, rowing and hockey were also given out.

There was a special presentation, the "Wyatt" Earp Memorial Magnum, for the women's basketball team.

The award, presented by the University's president, is given to a team or individual deemed the most outstanding. The womens' basketball team was this year's provincial champion and a semi-finalist in the national playoffs in Winnipeg.

Research stipends suspended



It's an upward trend

March figures from Brock's Registrar's office indicate the University is alive, well and sought-after with a 19.5 per cent increase in admission applications.

The overall figure includes regular, advanced standing, and Grade 12 and 13 admission applications.

Brock's increase corelates with statistics recently released by the Coucil of Ontario Universities (COU) which show a 7.3 per cent increase in admission forms received by the Ontario Universities' Application Centre in March from Ontario Grade 13 students.

Applications from Grade 12 and 13 students listing Brock as first, second or third choice are up 26.3 per cent.

However, COU figures indicate the number of visa students applying to Ontario universities is down 6.8 per cent. Higher tuition fees are cited as the main cause for the decrease in this area.

Present economic conditions and widespread unemployment - and the prospects of unemployment - are named by the COU as determining factors in the decision of individuals to enter university at an increasing rate.

Program choices by Grade 13 students indicate applicants for arts and science programs are up 14.1 per cent and 17.2 per cent respectively - well above the system average of 7.3 per cent.

Engineering programs at most Ontario universities show the most marked decrease in applications - 8.3 per cent.

COU figures for other programs show architecture up 8.4 per cent; business administration stable; physical and health education up 11.5 per cent; forestry down 7.7 per cent; music up 8.7 per cent; nursing up 18.7 per cent; and pharmacy up 36.9 per cent.

Applications for a concurrent BA/BEd program is up 6.3 per cent, while applications from first degree holders applying for entry into the consecutive BEd program is up by more than a third.

It's still a secret

The names of professors judging research grant applications will remain anonymous despite the federal government's freedom of information law which takes effect this month.

A spokesman for the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council said that body along with the Natural Sciences and Engineering Research Council have received an exemption.

A growing reluctance among research assessors to review applications for grants because their identities would be revealed under the Access to Information Act brought about the subsequent exemption from the Act.

Changes proposed for student loans

At a press conference held in Ottawa in March, a number of proposed changes in the Canada Student Loans Act were outlined.

Changes include guaranteed loans to needy part-time students; an interest relief plan for unemployed graduates up to a period of 18 months (both full-time and part-time students would be eligible); and increased weekly student loan limits to \$100 from the present rate of \$56.25.

Secretary of State Serge Joyal said the proposed changes would inject an additional \$60 million into the Student Loans Act over the next two years.

Parliamentary approval is required before the changes become effective.

The Secretary of State said he would undertake consultations with provincial ministers of education and lending institutions regarding the proposed changes. He emphasized the federal government forwarded the proposals on the condition the provinces would maintain their student aid support.

Money for student jobs

Ottawa and Ontario will spend a total of \$205 million this summer to create jobs for students.

The federal government has allocated \$170 million to the job creation scheme with Ontario throwing in \$35 million.

Approximately 70,000 jobs will be created under the federal program. The provincial program is looking at 50,000 jobs for young people including students.

Record unemployment across the country is the determining factor in the increase in funding provided by the federal and provincial governments for summer jobs.

Ottawa's student job creation fund has increased \$50 million over last year.

"Our summer employment programs will give a much needed boost to the student labor market and in many cases will enable young people to obtain valuable work experience that will prepare them for further employment," said loyd Axworthy, Minister of Employment and Immigration-

There were 1.6 million unemployed Canadians in January, a post-depression high.

Grant for medal winner

Carolyn Grayson recepient of Brock's vice-chancellor medal at the University's spring 1982 convocation, has been awarded

a medical research grant valued at more than \$56,000.

Ms Grayson, who completed a Bachelor of Science in biology and psychology at Brock, is working on a masters degree in neurophysiology at the University of Toronto.

The grant, awarded by the Medical Research Council of Canada, allows for \$11,400 per year for a total of 5 years.

Ms Grayson is working on the plasticity of the neuromuscular system in the crayfish.

Teaching award to Prof Ursino

The 1983 Alumni Award for Excellence in Teaching goes to Prof Don Ursino of the University's Biological sciences department.

Prof Ursino was cited for his high calibre of teaching, relaxed and organized manner of instruction, and his availability to both students and the community at large-

The award, which comes with a \$250 honorarium will be presented to Prof Ursino at the Alumni Association's annual meeting in November.

Another round before regional council

Brock University has once again asked Niagara regional council to consider donating \$1 million to the University's science development fund.

At the April 7 council meeting acting president Dr. W.A. Matheson presented the University's brief to members.

"Brock is a good investment for the region", said Dr. Matheson.

With 70 per cent of the University's \$25 million annual budget spent on salaries, Brock is a sound contributor to the area's economy, said Dr. Matheson.

Councillor Bill Marshall, St. Catharines, said that taken over five years, a \$1 million contribution amounts to 51 cents per capita.

Council decided to send the request for funding to the finance committee.

The University placed a previous request for funding before council's finance committee in January.

"A decision on our request could come as early as Wednesday evening following council's meeting", said Bill Holland, science fund coordinator.

The science development fund now stands at more than \$1.5 million. Target is \$4.5 million.

Concern over visa student fees

An ad hoc committee, selected by the Striking Committee of Senate, will be formed to look into the problems visa students will have paying large tuition increases this year.

That motion, passed at the University's last Senate meeting (March 23), focused on the financial problems visa students face because of steep increases.

Dean R. McGraw, Student Services, said 230 visa students at Brock were affected by the increased fee.

As of this month, new visa students, those enrolled at Brock in the fall of 1982, or those not successfully completing 2.5 credits by Sept. 1982 will pay \$768/course. That's almost double the \$430/course, visa students who have completed 2.5 credits by Sept. 1982, are required to pay.

Dean McGraw said some visa students already enrolled in courses at Brock were not aware such increases were being imposed and would find it difficult or impossible to continue their studies.

He suggested the Senate do what it could to encourage the provincial government to change its policy by delaying increases for those who are already in course.

The ad hoc committee will draft a motion, to be sent to the government, requesting a roll-back in fees for visa students.

Donald Bent picnic site

Construction of a picnic site in honor of employee Donald Bent begins this week.

That was the word from Director of Administrative Services, Al Pedler, who said the concrete and natural wood area located on the knoll adjacent to the Thistle, and north of the Tower is slated for completion this spring.

The project was the concept and design of Gary Johnson, of the University's Physical Plant department.

Brock faculty and staff raised more than \$2-thousand for the project. However, more capital was required to complete the project, thus causing a delay in the construction process.

Donald Bent was the University's mailman from 1969 to 1981.

COU wants 9.9 per cent

The Council of Ontario Universities (COU) is calling for a 9.9 per cent increase in basic funding for Ontario universities.

In a brief presented to the Ontario Council on University Affairs (OCUA), April 8, the COU said the suggested increase is "based on an extremely conservative funding model".

The 9.9 per cent increase "makes provision only to offset inflationary trends and to maintain present levels of service at Ontario universities for the expected student enrolment" (estimated at 3.2 per cent for 1983/84).

The increase doesn't include such things as funding for improvements in university teaching, research, or community service. Nor does it patch the gap in funding required to catch up to past levels of support.

The COU brief also states that on a nation-wide scale, Ontario's grants per student are in tenth and last place.

The province now stands approximately \$1500 per student behind the rest of the country.

The brief urges the province to take a hard look at university affairs and concludes that "short-term financial hardship on the Province's part today cannot stand as excuse for continuing neglect of the issues surrounding the future role of universities in Ontario".

The University Library has produced a 7-minute orientation film designed to provide a general introduction to library services and collections.

Faculty members are invited to view the film which will be shown in the Special Collections Room (2nd floor of the Library).

Show times are Tuesday through Friday, April 19, 20, 21 and 22 at 10 am and 2 pm.

The Library commissioned the film in order to let students know what resources and manpower are available to them.

Faculty are invited to use the film in class when discussing research requirements or term papers.

The film will be available in a number of formats including 16mm and videotape.

Stats from the Library

From the Library comes the following piece of information:

"In 1918, in Canada, 124 tobacco products plants produced 160,593,000 cigarettes. By 1948 the number of plants had dropped to 62 while production rose to 16,071,779,000 cigarettes. In 1978, only 17 plants produced 64,151,900,000 cigarettes.

These facts and many more can be found in the Library's recently acquired microfiche collection of Statistics Canada publications on the Food, Beverages and Tobacco industry, 1918-1969 (more recent figures are available in paper copy publications).

The collection, which includes a copy of all publications in Statistics Canada's 32 catalogue series issued in this time period, is located in the Documents department of the University Library.

Early Chinese painting

An illustrated lecture, "Archaeological discoveries related to the early history of Chinese painting" will be given by Prof Richard Vinograd of Columbia University on Sunday April 10.

The 1970's saw a steady stream of major discoveries in field archaeology in the People's Republic of China. Finds related to bronze-age culture, Ch'in dynasty sculpture, and the history of Chinese ceramics were especially plentiful and well-reported.

Prof Vinograd's lecture provides a broad overview of these recent discoveries, and will focus on such areas as 3rd and 2nd century B.C. silk paintings from Ma-wangtui, 1st and 2nd century A.D. funerary wall paintings, and themes and styles of the Six Dynasties period.

Brock hosts OCUA spring hearings

The Ontario Council on University Affairs (OCUA) held the third of its scheduled spring hearings this year at Brock University, Friday April 15.

The Council, which assesses Ontario universities on an annual basis, and serves as an advisory board to the provincial government, holds a series of spring hearings at which time various universities are queried as to their financial outlook, enrolment data, and general operating procedures.

Brock was lauded for its increased enrolment which shows a 55.9 per cent increase over a five-year period. The increase for the universities system overall is 15.6 per cent over five years.

Dr. Alan Earp, the University's president, welcomed Council to Brock and began the session with an overview of the University's present situation.

Stating that a few years back Brock was "the underdog determined to remain competitive", Dr. Earp went on to point out that "in 1983 there's less of the underdog about us".

"An extraordinary productivity has taken place at Brock over the past five years," said Dr. Earp to Council members.

He went on to cite the progressive research taking place in the sciences at Brock, Biologist Janet Rossant's awardwinning research into embryo development, and the construction of the science

building on the DeCew campus as positive aspects of the sciences at the University.

Increased enrolment appears to have more stringently enforced admission standards at the University as opposed to detracted from the standards, and although space is of premium quality these days, Dr. Earp said classes were being fairly well accommodated.

Acknowledging that some programs (especially in the arts and humanities) were suffering from underfunding, Dr. Earp nonetheless said Brock was able to function adequately with the provincial funding scheme for universities presently in use.

"Uniformity of opportunity and uniformity of quality have been part of the university system in Ontario for a long time, and I would be reluctant to see that change," said Dr. Earp in response to a query on the government funding for universities in general, and student loan programs in particular.

"Accessibility is the main aim of the university system," said Dr. Earp.

However Dr. Earp did admit to a certain "frustration over ministerial discretion as to how to distribute funds" and suggested that perhaps OCUA would be a more effective body in the proper dispersion of capital funds.

Following the Brock presentation, the Council also met with representatives from the University of Guelph, McMaster University, and the University of Toronto.

OCUA meets again at the University of Windsor on April 29.

Parliamentary internships for grads

Brock students Barb Holman and Autumn Watson have been offered parliamentary internships in Ottawa this year.

The two students, completing their Masters in Judicial Administration at Brock, have been offered two of ten positions allotted university students throughout the country this year.

Remarkably enough, both girls have also been offered provincial internships with the Ontario government for the same time period as the Ottawa posting.

Admitting to a "slight dilemma", Barb said the Ottawa offer appeared "a bit more attractive", although her final decision is still pending.

Both the provincial and federal internships are geared to provide government backbenchers with assistance during House sittings.

The program is also designed to supplement the theoretical knowledge graduates receive in university with the practical experience of working with MPs or MPPs on a daily basis.

Interns, whose posting begins in September and ends in June of the following year, spend half their time working for members of the present government and the other half for opposition members.

Their work includes researching various topics and writing speeches .

The parliamentary internships also provide a number of extra benefits including travel to various parts of the country as well as to Washington, England and Germany.

The federal internship program also includes a language training program for interested interns.

Interns are usually paid stipends of approximately \$9,000 to \$10,000 per ten month period.

Update on renovations

With construction on the new science complex proceeding according to schedule, renovations in the University's interior are also nearing completion.

New labs for the Geography department have been finished and drafting tables and other equipment installed. The labs are on the 4th-level, C-Block.

The English and Politics departments begin moving to their new quarters on the 3rd-level, A-Block on Monday April 25, said Mike Little, Physical Plant projects engineer.

Painting and the installation of electrical systems continues on the second level of A-Block (formerly the Registrar's office). Administrative studies and Sociology are slated to move into the area.

Restructuring education program

The Ontario Association of Deans of Education (OADE) is calling for a significant restructuring of the province's teacher education program.

The OADE presented the report to the Council of Ontario Universities.

The submission proposes that Ontario's ten faculties of education maintain present enrolment levels - but spread the program over two years, with the teaching practicum increased from eight weeks to 16 weeks.

The deans said that formula funding losses in the transition year could be supplemented by a special government grant.

The report outlined three options: maintaining the status quo; cutting back on core programs; or expanding the preservice teacher education program.

It concluded a full two-year teacher education model was needed to adequately meet the curricular, academic and organi-

zational demands called for by an ideal program.

Save visa students

The Canadian Federation of Students (CFS) has issued a strongly worded statement calling for immediate ministerial intervention in visa student tuition increases.

"Every university in Ontario has willfully misinformed visa students about a 40 per cent tuition increase for the coming academic year...", said Jeanne Stephens, a researcher at CFS-Ontario.

More than 3,000 first-year visa students system-wide are affected by the increase.

The CFS is asking Minister of Colleges and Universities, Bette Stephenson to impose a 'grandfather' clause (retroactive exemption) on the increase for visa students who registered for the first time in September, 1982.

Costs for visa students have increased about 40 per cent this year.

Bursary for visa students

The University's Finance committee has asked the Board of Trustees to approve an additional \$10,000 in bursary funds for financially strapped visa students.

The move comes in light of a 40 per cent increase in funds for visa students having less than 2.5 credits as of September 1982.

In a presentation before the committee, BUSU president J.B. Owens and vice-president, Mike Kerr stated, the 230 visa students at Brock directly affected by the increase had assumed they would pay the 5 per cent increase issued visa students currently enrolled in the system with 2.5 credits or more.

Foreign students without the necessary credits will pay \$768/course in 1983-84, visa students with 2.5 credits or more will pay \$430/course and Canadian residents will pay \$232/course.

The committee decided in favor of additional money for the bursary after declining to take action on two other alternatives offered by Mike Kerr: the University could subsidize the affected visa students through to the completion of their studies (approx. \$600,000); and the University could allow visa students to work on campus to help defer their education costs.

In response to the first suggestion University president, Dr. Alan Earp, said that although the University was in sympathy with the students, Brock has a substantial deficit and could not absorb the

substantial sums that would incur as a result of subsidizing the extra cost to the students.

Dr. Earp also pointed out the matter of foreign students working on campus was a federal government decision and did not rest with the universities.

The committee carried a motion "that the Board of Trustees of Brock University request that the Government of Ontario reinstate immediately, effective from April 1, 1983, the "grandfather clause", whereby beyond the levy of differential fees at their initial registration, foreign students are protected from any rate of fee increase that is in excess of the rate of fee increase to which Canadian students are also subject".

The visa student situation was discussed at the April 19 meeting of the Finance Committee.

1983-84 operating budget

The University's accumulated operating deficit of \$800,000 (incurred to April 30, 1982) should be "substanially reduced" with the implementation of the 1983-84 budget.

That was the word from Terry Varcoe, vice-president, administration, who told the April 19 meeting of the Finance Committee that the first draft of the new budget calls for a deficit reduction of \$500,000, which taken with the surplus of approximately \$200,000 from 1982-83, would almost remove Brock's operating deficit.

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

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Residence facelift

With lawsuits on the tile spalling of the DeCew residences now terminated, the Building, Property and Facilities committee will begin looking at ways to permanently repair the residence walls.

The committee will look into three repair options: aluminum siding, split face block and standard brick.

Seminary ground breaking

Ground breaking ceremonies were held Sunday April 24 at the construction site of the new Lutheran Theological seminary.

The seminary, an 18,000 square-foot, multi-storey building is being constructed on the north side of the Brock campus, opposite the Shaver Institute.

The Thorold construction firm of Donn-Hope

has been chosen as contractors for the building with a \$1.01 million bid.

The seminary will be a tri-level building containing two classrooms, two seminar rooms, a chapel, a 36,000-volume library, a student lounge and an archive room.

It will eventually house 60 post-graduate students and four full-time and six part-time staff.

The building should be ready for occupancy in late November or early December.

Brock swimmers in World Games

Brock swimmers Kathy Richardson and David Shemilt are going to Edmonton this summer to compete for Canada at the 1983 World University Games.

Kathy and David qualified by swimming at the 1983 Canadian University championships in March. Their times were fast enough to withstand challenges from Canadian swimmers competing in the Canadian Open and NCAA championships.

Kathy will swim the 200m breaststroke and 400m individual medley; David will swim the 400m and 1500m freestyle.

The Games take place July 1 - 11.

Games head coach is Herb de Bray

As Head Coach of Canada's men's team, Brock University swim coach, Herb de Bray, is also heading to the 1983 World University Student Games in Edmonton this summer.

De Bray was selected Head Coach by the Canadian Amateur Swimming Association.

He has also been chosen Assistant Coach to the 1983 Pan-American Games in Caralas, Venezuela, August 16-23.

Faculty squash team winners

The move came in light of a 40 per cent tuition hike for foreign students with less than 2.5 credits as of Sept./82.

The Board went on to carry a motion that "with respect to students currently enrolled at Canadian universities, the Board of Trustees of Brock University reaffirms both its recognition and its appreciation of the cultural and scholastic enrichment which foreign students impart to the university experience, and, therefore, urges the Government of Ontario to redress the financial policies to which these students are subject, since such short-range fiscal expediencies may serve not only to reinforce social prejudices, but also may damage Canada's international status, especially in developing countries".

The Board meeting drew more than 40 visa students protesting the fee hike.

Awarded honorary degrees this year are: Charles Alfred Sankey, former chancellor of Brock University (1969-74); Nora Chatwin, physical educator and one of the founders of Brock's degree program in physical education; and John Meisel, chairman of the Canadian Radio-television and Telecommunications Commission (CRTC).

Mr. Meisel is guest speaker at the convocation ceremony.

Prior to his CRTC appointment Mr. Meisel was Hardy Professor of Political Science at Queen's University and still is general editor of the "International Political Science Review", the journal of the International Political Science Association. He has written extensively on various aspects of politics, notably parties, elections, and ethnic relations.

The honorary degree recipients receive the degree of Doctor of Laws, honoris causa.

University chancellor, Ralph Misener, and Brock president, Dr. Alan Earp, preside over the afternoon exercises which begin at 3 pm.

The appointments were approved at the April 26 Board meeting. All five are Canadian citizens and are tenure track appointments.

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

Two-part tuition fee

The University of Manitoba will introduce a new structure for academic fees this fall - the first of its kind for Canadian universities.

According to an item in "Notes from AUCC", the total academic fees payable by a student at the University of Manitoba will have two parts: a standard tuition fee for all regular session students regardless of their program, and a supplementary course service fee that is charged on a per credit hour basis.

The new structure eliminates incidental and special fees, replacing them with a clearly identifiable system of course service fees which go directly to the academic units within the university to assist in defraying course-related costs.

Tuition fees go up by 9.5 per cent in Manitoba for 1983-84, and with the change in the level of other fees, the university projects a total increase in income from fees of 10.8 per cent.

The two-part tuition fee however, does not affect the medicine, dentistry and graduate studies programs, which will continue to charge an overall fee, as these programs are not uniformly organized on the credit hour system.

New coach named

Michael Quinn is the new coach for the Brock Badgers hockey team.

Director of Athletics, Garney Henley, made the announcement May 24.

Mike served as assistant coach for the Badger hockey team for the past three seasons.

"Mike Quinn has had a very strong bearing on the improved Badger game. Our recent

Diplomas, awards and smiles

Diplomas, awards, and smiles were the order of the day as more than 850 Brock graduates were awarded degrees at the University's 33rd convocation, June 3.

The spring convocation featured Dr. John Meisel, chairman of the Canadian Radio-television and Telecommunications Commission (CRTC), as guest speaker

Dr. Meisel spoke to graduates and guests on "Graduating into the Information Society" and presented a synopsis of "society as it is now evolving in which the production, storing, processing and transmitting of information is the dominant source of employment and the motor driving a great many other matters".

Acknowledging the current tight job market for recent graduates, Dr. Meisel said "I have decided not to give you any advice at all but to point to certain areas or problems in the society evolving before our eyes which could benefit from your efforts in the future".

Dr. Meisel said the "information society" which has "emerged as the result of fusion of modern computer technology with contemporary means of communications" is the key to future employment prospects.

"It is because of this that some who recognize the impossibility of separating computing from communications now speak of the new world being dominated by one continuous process called compunications, or

more elegantly by the French, télématique, or telematics", said Dr. Meisel.

Telematics creates "a totally new world in which new problems and new needs arise. These will have to be met and will require the dedicated and intelligent attention of new generations of graduates," he said.

Traditional institutions of education, work-place and home will all undergo major upheavels as the new society continues evolving said Dr. Meisel.

"One consequence of these developments will likely be the continuing growth in unemployment and the increase in available leisure time. What new occupations will emerge as a result?" he said.

The CRTC chairman also cautioned his audience that "one possible result of the new technology concerns the unequal use people may make of the available resources. Are we going to widen the gap between the haves and have-nots (both individually and with respect to nations and continents) by creating the information rich and the information poor?

"It is therefore most appropriate that, at a moment when many of us here are about to embark on a new phase in our lives, the question be raised of what each of us can do to help channel the information society into acceptable paths.

"This is critical because, as I have mentioned, the consequences of the new technology for society are not preordained or automatic. They are amenable to human volition. Whether the human condition will

improve or deteriorate as the result of telematics will depend on how we, the ultimate producers and users of knowledge, handle it," he said.

Dr. Meisel, along with Charles Alfred Sankey, former chancellor of Brock University, received the degree of Doctor of Laws, honoris causa.

Convocation also conferred prestigious awards to three area students for outstanding academic achievement.

The Governor-General's medal for highest overall academic standing went to David Jamie Learn, 24, of Fonthill, Ont. David, with a 92 per cent average, received a Bachelor of Administration (Honors) at the Fall'82 convocation.

The University's vice-chancellor's medal, also for outstanding academic achievement, was awarded to Nichola Ann McKay Davison, 22, and Laurie Ann Solowey, 21.

Nichola, with an 89 per cent average graduated with a Bachelor of Science (Honors) in Geological Sciences; Laurie, with 88 per cent graduated with a Bachelor of Science in Computer Science.

University Chancellor Ralph Misener, and Brock President Dr. Alan Earp, presided over the afternoon ceremony.

The ceremony also marked the conferring of the 10,000th degree at Brock. Susan Pirillo, graduating with a Bachelor of Education, was the recipient of the 10,000th degree.

In his concluding remarks, Dr. Earp suggested that the University's next convocation might be held in two parts due to the length of time involved in graduating several hundred students at one ceremony.

Following the close of the formal exercise, at the invitation of Dr. Earp, graduates and guests gathered on the grounds outside the Phys Ed building for refreshments.

Guest lecture on Greek art

"Akrotiri on Thera: Society and Religion" was the topic of an illustrated lecture given by Dr. Nanno Marinatos from Athens, Greece in May.

Dr. Marinatos, a lecturer in Greek art and archaeology at College Year and Deree College in Athens, based his lecture on the Late Bronze Age frescoes from the site of Akrotiri on Thera in the Aegean Sea.

The lecture was sponsored by the University's Department of Classics and the Niagara Peninsula Society of Archaeological Institute of America.

Failing official language

Canadian universities could do better in advancing the country's bilingual nature.

That's the word from Max Yalden, Canada's official languages commissioner, who in his annual report (1982), describes post-secondary institutions as "very sniffy about accepting any responsibility for the future quality of linguistic life in Canada".

Mr. Yalden reiterates his position that the second language should be required for high school graduation and university entrance.

The languages commissioner criticizes the post-secondary sector for its inability to provide adequate programming for graduates from bilingual and immersion high schools.

The present offerings in French by the nine English majority provinces are incomplete said Mr. Yalden.

He suggests a "rethinking from the ground up" for French language post-secondary education outside Ouebec.

Farewell to Mac Chown

More than 600 friends and associates attended a memorial service for Mackenzie Chown, Friday June 17, at Mountainview United Church in St. Catharines.

Brock University President, Dr. Alan Earp, was honorary pallbearer at the service.

Final tribute was paid to the 62-year-old lawyer who held a number of municipal posts, including mayor of St. Catharines from 1968 to 1972.

Throughout his life, Mr. Chown remained an ardent supporter of Brock University. His association with Brock began with the founding of the University and in 1963 he became a member of the University's Board of Governors. Mr. Chown became chairman of the Board of Trustees in 1975. In 1978, Brock honored Mr. Chown with an honorary degree at spring convocation.

Mr. Chown also served as chairman of the Brock University Science Development Fund, inaugurated last spring in order to raise the \$4.5 million needed to complete the DeCew science complex.

"He made an exceptional contribution to the University's development", said Dr. Earp. "He will be greatly missed at Brock and throughout the community at large".

Mr. Chown is survived by his wife Doris, and five children. The family requested donations be made to a number of fund raising projects in the city including the Science Development Fund.

Running the torch

With flags flying in the breeze, and the torch clasped in his hand, David Heyworth, a member of Brock University's track and field team, led the brigade of runners who carried the Universide torch to McMaster University in Hamilton, Saturday June 18.

Nineteen area athletes took part in running the torch, which, following tradition, is being "run" from university to university across Canada, to mark the staging of the World Student Games in Edmonton, Alberta.

The torch should arrive in Edmonton for the start of the Games, July 1.

Brock University President, Dr. Alan Earp, welcomed both guests and runners at a brief ceremony held at the University prior to the run.

"It's (World Student Games) an exciting event because it symbolizes the enthusiasm of youth not limited by international boundaries," said Dr. Earp who added a measure of levity to the event by quickly donning a Universiade T-shirt prior to lighting the torch.

"To our runners and their entourage, 'Bonne chance'", he concluded.

Ken Atkinson, a St. Catharines alderman, brought greetings on behalf of Mayor Roy Adams and wished both the runners going to Hamilton, and the Brock athletes competing at the Games in Edmonton, "Good luck".



Schmon Tower and Chown Building

Brock University's East Block complex has been named the Mackenzie Chown Building and the Brock Tower is now known as the Arthur Schmon Tower.

That was the decision reached by the University's Board of Trustees, June 28, at the Board's end-of-term meeting.

'Mac' Chown was connnected to Brock throughout the University's history. As a young St. Catharines alderman he sat on the founding committee of the University and was named to the first Board of Trustees. He served as Chairman of the Board and in 1978 was awarded an honorary degree by the University. Mr. Chown was also named Chairman of the Brock University Science Development Fund, a position he remained in until his death in June of this year.

Arthur Schmon also served in a 'builder's' role at the University. Mr. Schmon headed Brock's founding committee and was responsible for the establishment and planning of Brock. "It's fitting that Brock's first building, the Tower, be named after our principle founder", said Dr. Alan Earp, president of Brock University.

The names are effective immediately, and the buildings will be formally renamed as part of a current program of building graphics and signage now underway at the University.

Tuition break for visa students

Undergraduate visa students in Ontario will be given a partial exemption of the planned 40 per cent tuition fee increase recently announced by Queen's Park.

Minister of Colleges and Universities, Dr. Bette Stephenson, who made the announcement last month, said foreign undergraduate students who registered "for the first time on or after September 1, 1982 and who have already been assessed the first stage increase" will be given a one-term deferral of the 1983/84 fee increase, except for a five per cent increase over 1982/83 visa student fees.

Tuition fees for all students have been increased five per cent for 1983/84.

Visa students who entered the Ontario university system last fall will be allowed the one term deferral of the differential fee increase, however, visa students enrolling for the first time this year will pay the full differential fee.

In a letter to the Council of Ontario Universities, Dr. Stephenson said the planned second stage increase for visa students who entered the university system last September will be phased in over the 83/84 fiscal year.

Ministry officials said the exemption will cost the province \$2 to \$3 million in lost revenue for the university system.

Donald Bent memorial

A brief ceremony, Wednesday July 21, officially opens the Donald Bent picnic area.

The picnic area has been constructed as a memorial to former University employee Donald Bent. It is located on the grassy knoll adjacent to the Thistle complex and behind the Schmon Tower.

Prof John Mayer officates at the ceremony, which begins at 12:15 pm. All members of the Brock community are welcome.

Funding formula remains the same

The enrolment-based formula for operating grants for the province's universities remains the same for the 1983/84 academic year.

Minister of Colleges and Universities, Dr. Bette Stephenson, made the announcement last month in a letter to Ontario university presidents.

The Minister was responding to a formula change recommended by the Ontario Council on University Affairs (OCUA) She said a lack of consensus within the university system about the OCUA proposal was a factor in her decision to leave the formula as it is for the fiscal year.

In her letter, Dr. Stephenson outlined what the Ministry considers the criteria needed to develop a satisfactory distribution mechanism:

The formula should provide funding stability and predictability, allocate funds equitably, provide accountability to the public, and be simple and practical.

The formula should also discourage aggressive competition for enrolment among Ontario universities.

The distribution mechanism of the formula should encourage program rationalization and new program development to respond to technological developments, the changing needs of society, and student demands.

The formula's mechanism should also be such that changes in enrolment in Sept/83 would have relatively little effect on funding for 1984/85.

Finally, the Minister states that the formula's funding mechanism should be conductive to regular review and adjustment to respond to rapidly changing conditions.

The funding formula now in effect for distributing the operating grant among post-secondary institutions provides a financial incentive for increased enrolment.

While some universities are in a no growth or limited enrolment situation, other universities, such as Brock, are looking at substantial enrolment increases.

Dr. Alan Earp, president of Brock University, said although the present funding formula is advantageous for Brock now, he agrees with OCUA that a revision of the funding formula is in order.

"No one is really sure what the new formula will be, except that we anticipate that it will be a modification of the existing one, rather than a complete change," said Dr. Earp.

"Our principal concern is that any modification will allow for and recognize the importance of the flow-through of students already in the system," he said.

Dr. Earp said he expects the Minister of Colleges and Universities to announce a formula change for the 1984/85 academic year.

Degree granting legislation

The Ontario government passed an act on June 30/83 setting out stringent guidelines for degree granting in the province.

Bill 41 makes it illegal for any person to sell a degree diploma, to grant a degree, offer post-secondary programs leading to a degree, or advertise such programs as being offered in Ontario, without the approval of the provincial government.

The Bill, known as the Act to Regulate the Granting of Degrees, requires all degree granting institutions to be chartered by the provincial legislature.

Private, religious-based institutions, theological schools, and bible colleges are exempt provided they obtain the required statutory charters from the province.

Secular institutions that want to offer degree programs in the arts and sciences are required to affiliate with a recognized degree-granting institution outside the province that has ministerial consent to operate in Ontario.

Learning skills program

The Counselling Centre at Brock is offering the following Learning Skills program in August, open to both first year and returning students:

Study skills for students in Administrative Studies: The program covers topics such as case studies, seminars, study strategies, time management, note taking and reading, and will be tailored specifically for the student in Admin. studies. The program begins Aug. 8 through to Aug. 23, Mondays and Wednesdays, 7pm-9pm.

General Study skills: Topics covered include time management, concentration, notetaking, reading, essay writing, and preparing for and writing exams.

While this course is not tailored to students in a specific course of studies, an effort will be made to meet individual student needs in a variety of subject areas. The program is ten hours in length and runs Tuesdays and Thursdays, Aug. 16 - Aug. 30, 7 pm to 9 pm.

Re-entry Mathematics (August immersion): The program teaches the basic mathematics skills needed for entry into university credit courses in statistics and other mathematics courses required for non math majors (ie: Psychology, Business Administration, Geography, Urban and Environmental Studies).

Topics depend on student needs but typically include integers, order of operations, fractions, per cent, algebra, exponents, scientific notation, and roots. The program is 30 hours in length, and will run Mondays and Wednesdays, Aug. 2 - Aug. 31, 6pm to 9pm.

Burroughs Canada donates computer

Burroughs Canada will donate a BI855 computer system to Brock University.

That was the news contained in the July 26/83 letter from Mr. T.I. Csathy, president of Burroughs Canada, to Dr. Alan Earp, president of Brock.

The computer is valued at \$428,000, and represents the company's contribution to the University's Science Development Fund.

The B1855 will be used to handle conversion work which will lead to smoother installation, next year, of the University's purchase of a new B7900.

The system will also be used to develop administrative programs for application on the B7900.

Teachers and students will benefit from the system which allows for the teaching of business systems design using LINC, and the design and implementation of compilers and operating systems.

The B1855 will be installed in the Computing Centre for now, but will ultimately make its way to the Department of Computer Science said Dr. Earp.

The computer system will be installed by the end of the summer with the B7900 expected to arrive next May.

Development Fund at half-way mark!

The Brock University Science Development Fund, with \$2,245,203.98 in pledges and contributions, is at the half-way mark.

"We're delighted to have achieved fifty per cent of our goal," said John Bird, Director of Development at the University.

"We're half-way there, and, if everything we're planning in the next while goes according to schedule, I'm very optimistic we'll reach the \$3 million mark by the end of the year," he said.

A Fund Management meeting on Aug. 10 determines the activities the Development Office will undertake in the next few months. A car raffle is one suggestion the Fund committee will decide on.

"In general, we're confident, the Science Development Fund will reach its objective of \$4.5 million," said Mr. Bird.

Elderhostel boasts 171

The Elderhostel program, offered by the Office of Part Time studies at the University, registered 171 participants this summer.

"We had people here from 20 different states, 19 communities in Ontario, as well as from Montreal, Quebec, and Moose Jaw, Saskatchewan", said Roger Reynolds, Part Time programs officer.

This year, the Elderhostellers on campus ranged in age from 57 to 86.

Comprised of Americans and Canadians, participants in the Elderhostel program, are offered dicounts on travel and residence accommodation at various universities and colleges throughout North America. More than 500 campuses are involved in the program.

Each university sets up its own itinerary, which often includes structured classes, field trips and social activities.

Some of the events included in the Brock program this year were visits to the Shaw Festival in Niagara on the Lake, wine and cheese social hours, and classes ranging from "Eat, drink and be active" to "Cleaning up our act: Transborder environmental problems".

Brock's Elderhostel program was four weeks in length this summer, from July 4 to July 29, and accommodated a new group of approximately 42 per week.

Judging from the response to questionnaires participants in the program completed, the Brock program was a success with one American couple stating "We're very pleased...we've never had so much Tender Loving Care from Elderhostel. Hurrah for Canada!".

A Heidegger convention

Insights and disussion into the philosophy and works of German philosopher, Martin Heidegger, will be the topic of a four-day convention at Brock University, August 29 to Sept. 1.

The program deals with a number of issues regarding Heidegger and is sub-divided into various sections: Roots, Living, Persons, Academy, Poesis, World, Polis, and Being.

Dr. Alan Earp, president of Brock, opens the session on Aug. 29.

The program has been developed in conjunction with the University of Waterloo and Wilfrid Laurier University.

The president of the University of Waterloo, Douglas Wright, and the president of Wilfrid Laurier University, John Weir, will each chair a session.

Morning panel sessions begin at 9 am through to noon; afternoon sessions are from 2 pm to 5 pm. All sessions take place at the Brock University Playhouse. The closing day program will be televised by MacLean Hunter Cable T.V.

CAUT condemns B.C. government actions

The Canadian Association of University Teachers has issued a strongly worded statement censuring recent actions resulting from the B.C. government's restraint program.

The July release states that CAUT condemns "in the strongest possible terms the British Columbia government's attempts to abolish the protection of academic freedom in the universities, to erode university autonomy, and to reduce access to universities by slashing student aid by 40 per cent".

CAUT also criticizes legislation which would allow civil servants, school teachers and community school teachers to be fired without cause.

"This places the public servants and the teachers at the mercy of gossip, vendetta, and political malice", said the release.

CAUT said it considers the B.C. government's attempt to remove tenure and academic freedom for professors a gross

violation of university autonomy.

"Professors could become victims of political vendettas and intrigues; programs, departments, and faculties could be jeapordized because of partisan political considerations", states the release.

The newly introduced legislation "constitutes an unwarranted attack on the sanctity of the contracts signed in good faith by professors in B.C.", said CAUT.

CAUT summed up its position by saying the B.C. government's actions will, by making the recruitment and retention of good faculty extraordinarily difficult, in the long term, reduce the quality of education in the province.

University congress gathers

Brock University will send two representatives to the gathering of the Commonwealth Universities Congress in England this summer.

Dr. Alan Earp, president of the University, and Terry Varcoe, vice- president, Adminstration, are the Brock delegates.

The congress, which gathers every five years, meets at the at the University of Birmingham this year.

The congress is slated from Aug. 11 to Aug. 19, with the meeting of executive heads, Aug. 11-13, and the general congress, Aug. 14-19.

The theme of this year's congress is "Technological innovation - university roles".

The secretary-general of the Commonwealth, Shridath Ramphal, will deliver the opening address.



Science building ready for students

According to Bob Holmes, management consultant on the project, teaching areas in the Chown complex will be open and ready for science students as of Monday Sept. 5.

Research labs are expected to be operational one month later, in early October.

Construction on the \$13.5 million building began in the spring of 1982, after the provincial government announced it would foot \$9.15 million of the total construction bill. The Brock University Science Development Fund was established to raise the remaining \$4.5 million - the Fund is now at the halfway mark.

We're back in full swing!

Heat and humidity didn't seem to dampen the enthusiasm displayed by students lining up to register for the new academic year at Brock on Sept. 6.

For new students changes that have occurred throughout the summer won't be apparent but returning students will note several on-campus additions or renovations.

To begin with, there are some new names for existing campus structures. The Brock Tower is now officially known as the Arthur Schmon Tower and the former East Block complex (including the new science facility) is now referred to as the Mackenzie Chown complex.

The new science building (H-Block of the Chown complex) replaces the Glenridge facility which housed the Biology, Chemistry and Physics departments. Classes begin tomorrow, with laboratories expected to be functional within a month.

The Registrar's office is now on the third floor of the Schmon Tower. The Dean of Social Sciences and the Dean of Humanities are also located on the same floor.

The department of Administrative Studies (Accounting and Finance, Management and Marketing) and the department of Sociology are now in A-Block, Chown complex, in the area formerly occupied by the Registrar's office.

The departments of Politics and English are in A-Block of the Chown complex. That area was formerly occupied by the Carousel cafeteria.

The department of Computer Science has re-located to B-Block of the Chown complex (where Sociology used to be).

In an effort to properly accommodate the changes that have taken place throughout the year, the University is undertaking a massive graphics and signage program.

The lobby is one of the first areas to illustrate on-campus changes. A new directory and information kiosk are planned. A sign construction plant has been established in the carpenters' shop and new signs will soon be appearing throughout the campus.

The student residences on DeCew are receiving a face-lift with re-tiling of the exterior walls expected to begin this month.

The cafeterias throughout the University opened for business with the start of classes. The Schmon Tower cafeteria, The Pond delicatessan, located at Pond Inlet, the student residence cafeteria, and a number of sandwich carts will operate throughout the academic year. Lunch in the Faculty and Staff Lounge is also being served. Non-smoking sections have been designated in each of the cafeterias.

Parking in the main lot remains free, with a charge for parking in the lot beside the Physical Education centre.

Funding formula under discussion

The recent furor caused by the statement made by the Minister of Colleges and Universities, Bette Stephenson, that qualified university applicants may be forced into community colleges because of enrolment cutbacks at universities due to budget restraints, was the topic of debate at Queen's Park on Tuesday Sept. 6.

Dr. Alan Earp, president of Brock University, was present at the committee debate, along with representatives from York University, the Ontario Confederation of University Faculty Associations, the Council of Ontario Universities, and the Ontario University Students Association.

The committee was scheduled to examine legislation proposed by the Ontario government to limit the deficits universities can incur.

At the same time the committee was expected to question Dr. Stephenson about the province's policy of guaranteeing qualified students a place in an Ontario university.

Dr. Stephenson said last week the policy issued by former premier John Robarts in 1958 was being re-examined because of the emergence of community colleges.

A statement issued last week by acting president of Brock, Bill Matheson, said the University has turned away approximately 500 applicants.

Because of the outcry resulting from the disclosure that qualified applicants were being turned away from certain universities, the Minister postponed announcing the revised funding formula for post-secondary institutions, which was to have been made Aug. 26.

Dr. Stephenson has yet to re-schedule a date for announcing the new funding formula.

Aerobic fitness classes!

With a return to full-time academics, the Physical Education centre is once again offering the University Community a chance to get physically fit.

Aerobic fitness classes begin again on Monday Sept. 19. Classes will be offered on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays at 7:30 am and 12:10 pm.

Registration for classes begin Sept. 12th to the 14th from 9 am to 1 pm; and again from 5 pm to 7 pm in the Phys Ed lobby.

Course enrolment is up!

Brock University President, Dr. Alan Earp, told faculty and staff gathered at the annual "Opening of Term" dinner at Pond Inlet, Friday Sept. 2, the University has experienced an 18 per cent increase in course enrolment.

Dr. Earp said preliminary figures based on registration data indicate the 18 per cent increase in course enrolment "in spite of our efforts to limit enrolment by increasing our admission standards."

"The substantial increase will put pressure on many areas throughout the university, however it's exciting for us to be confronted with these sorts of problems", he concluded.

Dr. Earp also welcomed the 32 new additions to Brock faculty and staff. The new appointments effective July 1/83 are:

BUFA presents brief to minister

The Brock University Faculty Association presented its brief dealing with Bill 42 (Deficits legislation) to Dr. Bette Stephenson, Minister of Colleges and Universities, at a special committee meeting at Queen's Park on Sept. 7.

Prof Deborah Harrison, BUFA president, presented the brief stating BUFA considers "the term 'Deficits Legislation' to be a misnomer. It presents an image of irresponsible university administrators who are incapable of managing money, when the onus would be more accurately placed on the underfunding that Ontario universites have endured for the past twelve years."

"The underfunding reflects this government's declining commitment to university research and teaching, which is concretely manifested in its effects of discouraging talented people from pursuing academic careers, and reneging on the policy Premier Robarts enunciated 25 years ago of accessibility to university for everyone qualified", read the brief.

The BUFA report went on to deplore the government's funding scheme stating "in

1982/83 Brock received \$712 less per student than the University of Guelph, \$741 less per student than McMaster, \$816 less per student than the University of Toronto, and so on.

"When you multiply these discrepancies by Brock's 1982/83 enrolment of 7,800, you get a loss of income resulting from the current formula of almost five-million dollars, which is some 20 per cent of Brock's operating budget".

Prof Harrison voiced BUFA's concern over the government's pending announcement of the new funding formula for universities:

"The new formula that Dr. Stephenson is about to announce is rumoured to penalize Brock's growth even more, perhaps to the extent of compromising the University's commitment to its existing students.

"If this is the case, we hope Dr. Stephenson will change her mind. Brock, I might add is in the worst situation in this regard in the whole province, having achieved this dubious distinction by paradoxically being the most successful university at executing government accessibility policy".

Prof Harrison presented the BUFA brief, along with representatives from York, the Council of Ontario Universities, and the Ontario Confederation of University Faculty Associations to the Queen's Park committee which has been set up to look into Bill 42.

Children's arts program a success

The University's first annual Brock summer arts program for children was an "unqualified success".

That was the word from Roger Reynolds, Part-time Programs officer, who said the success of this year's program ensures its repetition next summer.

The program, involving children from eight to 13, included participation in music, art and drama events.

This year's program had an enrolment of 144 children.

"Judging from the reaction of parents and the children, the program was well-received and we intend on repeating it next summer," said Mr. Reynolds.

Comments from students in the course included adjectives such as "fun", "different" and "When I do art at school I do awful. I found that when I knew it was just for fun I did a lot better. I really enjoyed this course".

Preparing for a phonathon

Vette draw offically underway



Justice down under

"Of course you can put a price on justice. Whether we like it or not, all governments do," said William J. Robinson, the Deputy Under Secretary of Justice and Courts Administrator of New South Wales, Australia. He was speaking to students and alumni of Brock's Judicial Administration program on Sunday, September 18, on campus.

Robinson described the organizational and operational problems of the New South Wales courts, many of which parallel the courts in Canada. At the same time his state, with a population of five million, has fewer judges per capita than any province in Canada, and has unified its administrative apparatus beyond that of any jurisdiction in Canada.

Robinson visited Brock as part of a nationwide visit to study developments in Canadian courts that might be instructive for Australia.

BUFA objects to low operating grant

Figures released by the Brock University Faculty Association show that Brock receives the lowest provincial funding per student of any Ontario university.

In a press release issued last week, BUFA said figures from Ontario government agencies show that in 1982/83, Brock received operating grants of \$2,188 per student unit. That figure places Brock 15th out of the provinces 15 universities.

The average grant per student unit across the province in 1982/83 was \$2,764. The University of Toronto had the highest at \$3,004 and McMaster in Hamilton was second at \$2,929.

BUFA said Brock's low figure is a result of its rapid increase in enrolment. Grants to all Ontario universities are discounted when student numbers grow.

"Brock's very success in drawing students is penalizing it in the eyes of the provincial government," said Prof Carl Baar, BUFA vice-president.

Although the provincial government is planning a change in the funding formula for the next academic year, BUFA said in the release that "preliminary indications suggest that, if anything, Brock will receive even less per student unit."

Archaeology lecture

Science fund gets boost from region

The Brock University Science Development Fund, pending Niagara Regional Council approval, stands to receive \$200,000 from the region.

In a recommendation by the region's finance committee on Oct. 12, \$200,000 was allocated for the Brock science fund.

The money comes from a \$1 million contingency fund.

Brock originally asked the region for a \$1 million donation. Councillors have stalled on reaching a decision on funding requests both by Brock and the CAT Scan campaign.

Wednesday's meeting allocated funds for both projects with a motion forwarded that future consideration for additional funding be accorded the campaigns next year.

"We're delighted the region is supporting the Fund to that extent this year," said John Bird, Director of the Brock University Science Development Fund.

"We've also been invited to make a presentation to council in February of 1984 in order to request further funding in the 1984 budget year," he said.

The Science Development Fund stands at \$569,861 in cash, \$1,399,914 in pledges, and \$430,579 in other revenue.

Autumn colors and fall convocation

"You are the cream..."

"You have worked hard and by ability and self-discipline have reached today's honor," said the Hon. Mr. Justice J. Rod Barr to the graduates assembled for Brock University's 34th convocation, Friday Oct. 28, 1983.

Mr. Justice Barr, honorary degree recipient and guest speaker, told the 272 graduates that "all past experience shows that you will not only have a more satisfying and constructive life but that, perhaps in the short term, and certainly in the long term, you will have the material rewards that are your due".

Encouraging the graduates to look at new times as meaning "new opportunities", Mr. Justice Barr said although the spectre of another war "overshadows all our thoughts for the future" history shows us that civilization has never been obliterated and always survives.

Mr. Justice Barr, a long-time barrister in the Niagara Peninsula, now serving as a justice on the Supreme Court of Ontario, also expressed some of his views on law in our society:

"As the sixties were times of challenging authority, of sit-ins and occupations of romanticizing the underdog, so today, in the eighties, we appear to be entering an era of reaction, of so-called 'law and order' where the cry is for less tolerance, for more laws, and for more severe punishment."

Mr. Justice Barr went on to say he believes "law and order will depend on first-class police work and this is only possible where the police have the whole-hearted cooperation of the general public".

Miss Nora Chatwin, physical educator, was also presented with an honorary Doctor of Laws degree at the ceremony.

The welcome address was delivered by Brock University president, Dr. Alan Earp, who lauded the opening of the new science complex on the DeCew campus and noted with "satisfaction that Brock University is the choice of an increasing percentage of Ontario applicants".

Chancellor Ralph Misener presided over the ceremony, with two students, Steven Graffi, and John Russell, awarded the vice-chancellor's medal for outstanding academic achievment.

Faculty nixes unionization

In what Brock University Faculty Association president, Deborah Harrison, termed "the biggest turnout in BUFA history", Brock faculty decided against certification at a meeting held Sunday Oct. 23.

The 66-62 vote, with 2 abstentions and 3 late votes, puts the issue of a unionized Brock faculty to rest for another "six months or 10 years, depending on the faculty", said Prof Harrison, in response to the outcome of the general meeting.

"Obviously I'm disappointed," said the BUFA president. "I think certification is the way to go. But my job is to serve the Faculty Association and the Faculty Association has shown us that this is the way they wish to go for now".

Both Prof Harrison and faculty member Joe Kushner, who led the motion to discontinue the action BUFA was taking to form a bargaining unit, with a unionized faculty as the end result, said the general meeting was characterized by "good debate and good humor".

"I think the faculty are a more united group than ever before," said Prof Harrison. "There was a feeling of well-being that I've never seen before. Collegiality is very strong at Brock."

In answer to a query as to whether the motion presented at the meeting was "anticertification", Prof Kushner said the motion was rather one "of procollegiality".

"If Brock was managed badly then the faculty would have no choice but to certify, but in my opinion the Board of Governors at the University has done a very effective job," said Prof Kushner.

The last time Brock faculty gave certification serious consideration was in 1976 said Prof Harrison.

Minutes from Queen's Park

From the pages of Hansard comes the following excerpt (Oct. 11/83 - special committee on Bill 42):

Mr. Conway: The minister is quite confident and secure in the knowledge that there are problems out there in terms of failure to report early, on time, or completely. All I'm saying in the sweet reasonableness of the first evening sitting of the fall session of the Ontario legislature is to let us, as people who have to make the decision, have some of the facts; let us have some of the evidence.

Has Father Guindon been unhelpful to the minister?

Hon Miss Stephenson: No, I don't think so.

Mr. Conway: What about Dr. Earp and the good people at Brock?

Hon Miss Stephenson: Perhaps from time to time they have been slightly unhelpful, but --

Mr. Conway: Oh, well now, Mr. Chairman -

The Acting Chairman: Let us not involve any more people in this.

Mr. Conway: Let me note that it was a very reluctant and passing smile that reference drew from Dr. Earp, the vice-chairman of the Council of Ontario Universities.

The instant I resume my place at 10:30, I am going to dispatch the member for St. Catharines (Mr. Bradley) to engage Dr. Earp with a view to ascertaining his understanding of deficiencies as between the reporting of that institution and York.

Hon Miss Stephenson: On a point of order, Mr. Chairman: The honourable member really doth protest too much. It is insignificant that the member is raising the issue related to Dr. Earp, who happens to be present. I do not recall on any occasion that Brock University has not provided us with information, albeit it may have been done slowly from time to time; but it is not the example that I raised.

The Acting Chairman: I can only say, minister, if you involve members of the

public in the debate of the House then unfortunately --

Hon Miss Stephenson: It was not I. It was the honourable member who raised the fact that Dr. Earp was here.

The Acting Chairman: It was you, though, I fear, who may have drawn him in. Perhaps without further admonishment, if we could keep the debate reasonably centred back to ourselves and more particularly back to Bill 42, we might meet with some greater measure of progress.

Mr. Conway: Mr. Chairman, it is extremely helpful for the minister to clear the air about that distinguished institution in the great electoral districts of St. Catharines and Brock.

Hon Miss Stephenson: I really should have learned a long time ago that you are viperish.

Mr. Conway: That bothers me, to have the minister call me a viper.

Hon Miss Stephenson: Oh no, I didn't say you were a viper.

Mr. Conway: Well, she said I was viperish.

The Acting Chairman: There is nothing to be gained, I am sure, from either the comment which provoked the response or the response itself: perhaps we could proceed.

Exercise those walking legs!

There's been a change in elevator service at the Arthur Schmon Tower: effective Monday Nov. 28, elevators will no longer stop, at the down command, on the 2nd, 3rd or 4th floors. Individuals located on those floors are asked to use the stairs to walk down.

"People can certainly take the elevators up to those floors", said Bill Armstrong, Physical Plant manager. "We're simply asking them to walk down from the 2nd, 3rd or 4th floors".

For handicapped students, or those who cannot walk down stairs, the elevators will stop on the 2nd, 3rd or 4th floors, only if an up button is pushed.

"It will be inconvenient for the handicapped, because they'll have to call an up car, and possibly go up a few floors before they get down to the level they want," said Mr. Armstrong.

"But the traffic congestion and the demand for the elevators is so heavy that we're going to try this on a trial basis to see if the problem can be alleviated," he said.

To repeat: faculty, staff and students are asked to walk down the stairs from the 2nd, 3rd and 4th floors of the Schmon Tower; cars will still be available to take them up to the floors.

Handicapped individuals and those unable to walk down the stairs, are asked to call for an up elevator, and will eventually reach their down destination.

Of the four elevators in the Schmon Tower lobby, two are used to service the Library and the other two service the rest of the Tower.

The swelling ranks of the Brock population have placed a heavy demand on elevator service and "we're hoping for more efficient serivce this way" said Mr. Armstrong.

United Way total up



Operating without a deficit

The University's Board of Trustees were given some good news at their meeting on Tuesday Nov. 22: for the first time in several years the University is not expected to operate under a deficit.

"Our accumulated deficit over the years stood at about \$820,000 as of April 30, 1982," said Terry Varcoe, Vice-president, Finance.

"However a surplus in 82/83 let us reduce the deficit to \$478,000. We've budgeted a \$500,000 surplus for the 1983/84 year, and that effectively should clear up our accumulated deficit," he said.

Also on the agenda at the Board meeting was discussion on the fate of the old Glenridge campus.

Board members were told the old building would probably not be re-used for academic purposes by the University, and that "it be recommended...that steps be taken to amend the zoning status of parcel 5 (Glenridge campus) from "University" to "Residential".

A further recommendation stated that "the costs of demolition of the building be ascertained and a comparison be made with all costs of maintenance of the present premises".

The Board was also told that any re-zoning that might take place in the area would be

done in consultation with residents of the surrounding neighborhood.

The next Board of Trustees meeting is scheduled for Tuesday February 28, 1984.

Province limits wage increase to 5%

A batch of documents out of Provincial Treasurer Larry Grossman's office suggests that major recipients of provincial funds should not expect a funding increase of more than, or even at, 5 per cent for the coming year.

The five per cent figure is what the rate of inflation has been pegged at.

The wage restraints include municipal governments, school boards, hospitals, universities and colleges.

The new program of public sector wage and price restraints was introduced by Mr. Grossman in early November.

In introducing the Public Sector and Compensation Review Act in the provincial legislature, Mr. Grossman also announced that collective bargaining rights would be restored to public employees.

The effect of the wage restraint program on employees at Brock has yet to be determined said Bob Anderson, Director of Personnel.

"Once we've had an opportunity to digest and interpret the program, we'll be able

to determine the impact it will have on our various employee groups," said Mr. Anderson.

The spirit of human rights

Saturday Dec. 10 marks the 35th anniversary of the United Nations' Universal Declaration of Human Rights.

The UN declaration forms an integral part of the preamble to the Ontario Human Rights code, which begins with the following:

"Whereas recognition of the inherent dignity and the equal and inalienable rights of all members of the human family is the foundation of freedom, justice and peace in the world and is in accord with the Universal Declaration of Human Rights as proclaimed by the United Nations;

"And whereas it is public policy in Ontario to recognize the dignity and worth of every person and to provide for equal rights and opportunities without discrimination that is contrary to law, and having as its aim the creation of a climate of understanding and mutual respect for the dignity and worth of each person so that each person feels a part of the community and able to contribute fully to the development and well-being of the community and the Province..."

A message from the chairman of the Ontario Human Rights Commission, has asked that the message of human rights be relayed to residents of the province, especially in honor of the anniversary of the UN declaration.

Four digit extensions

Four digit extension numbers will be the end result of the upgrading the University's telephone system is now undergoing.

"The change allows for full use of the PBX switch capacity," said Bruce McCormack, Manager, Instructional Media Centre.

"You can only use so many three digit numbers and then you run out of them," he said. "It's better to open and expand the switch now, so that any change in the future will be easier to implement".

Beginning in January, the digit '3' will precede all extension numbers. For example, 247 becomes 3247.

The change will be noted in the new telephone directories scheduled to come out later this month.

The opening of the new science complex on the DeCew campus has resulted in several changes in location and telephone extensions for departments throughout the University; the new directory will contain the latest information regarding those changes.

Where to put those lost & founds

Basketball star Candi Lohr, all-time intercollegiate scoring leader and national all-star, begins playing with the Brock Badgers in January again.

Candi was instrumental in bringing the Badgers to their provincial championship win last year and to the national playoffs.

She had decided not to return to the team this year in order to spend more time with her husband. However a change in her husband's career plans will put both husband and wife on the Brock campus in the fall and Candi decided on an early return to the Badgers.

"We're all very pleased. She's an allaround basketball player. She's one of the best and any team in the country would be glad to have her," said Chris Critelli, assistant women's basketball coach.

When asked what Candi's return would do for the Badger's chances in the playoffs, Ms. Critelli said: "I think it will make us deeper and stronger in every way. We've

been ranked seventh without Candi, so who knows where we'll go with her."

Candi is expected to be ready for the varsity circuit in January.

"A flourishing, vital university system"

In a brief submitted to the Royal Commission on the Economic Union and Development Prospects for Canada, the Ontario Confederation of University Faculty Associations has reiterated its stance for "a healthy, flourishing, vital university system (as) a necessary precondition to the attainment of Canada's economic and non-economic goals."

The brief, submitted on Monday Dec. 5, outlines the importance of higher education in producing the highly qualified and adaptable people needed for Canada's future.

"Our future is in a complex, information-based world. Employment in this society will require professionals who are highly trained not just in specific skills, but who are able to adjust to change...," said the report.

It is the nature of a university to educate the flexible, adaptable people needed for society said the report.

The brief also emphaizes the value of university research and bemoans the lack of funding in the area.

"Very alarming is the extent to which federal granting council funds are becoming targeted funds - funds which are tied to some strategic area. Such boundaries place strictures on researchers freedom to go where the enquiry leads..."

The brief also outlines the positive contribution universities make to the economy in general: "Through contributions to the regional and local economies of the communities in which they are located; and

through contributions to Canada's ability to compete in world markets."

The report concludes that universities "are producers of both economic and social wealth without which neither the economy nor the society can continue for long."

"In addition, the university as an institution serves as the social conscience or critic of society and as the preserver of the heritage."

"Spending on higher education is simply the most important investment that we can make in our future," summed up the brief.
