Prof. D. Goicoechea read a paper entitled: "The moment: a transition from not-to-be to to-be." at the recent AAR meeting in Boston.


Recreation and Leisure Studies

The University Library recently acquired its 300,000th monograph volume. The book receiving this distinction is Leonardo da Vinci on Plants and Gardens, written by William Emboden and published by Dioscorides Press of Portland, Oregon. This quarto volume is a comprehensive study of Leonardo in the dual role of artist and botanist, an unexpected aspect of the Renaissance genius. The text is accompanied by eight color plates and 100 sepia illustrations selected from the enormous output of drawings contained in Leonardo's notebooks. William Emboden is Professor of Biology at California State University, Northridge and is a fellow of the Linnean Society. Carlo Pedrettis, recognised as the world's leading Leonardo scholar, provided the foreword to the volume. The book is shelved in the Fine Arts Collection, Call Number ND 623 L5 E48 1987.

Pension for Part-Time Employees

January 1, 1988 is the date that changes to the Pension Benefits Act of Ontario became effective. The Act now provides for part-time employees to participate in the Brock Pension Plan.

If you have been employed continuously for the last 24 months and either (a) have worked at least 700 hours in each year, or (b) have earned at least \$9,030 in 1986 and \$9,065 in 1987, you are eligible. Membership is optional. If you join, six percent of your salary including what you already contribute to C.P.P., will be deducted from your regular pay. The University will match your contributions and the money will be invested in the Brock Pension Fund. Your contributions will be tax-deductible.

The Brock Pension Plan is a fully-vested pension plan; that means that both your contributions and the University's accrue to your benefit in the fund. Should you leave the University, both shares of contributions will remain on deposit to your benefit or, if you wish, both shares can be transferred to another pension plan or R.R.S.P. provided that the shares are locked-in; that is, the money remains in the new plan to provide a pension benefit for you when you retire.

For part-time employees, the pension plan will be a money purchase plan - pension benefits that you receive will be related to the total value of your and the University's contributions.

This is a very considerable benefit and one that we would hope all part-time employees will consider seriously. If you are interested, please contact Personnel Services. Remember you are eligible if: you have been employed continuously for the past two years; and either have worked at least 700 hours in each year, or have earned at least \$9,030 in

1986 and \$9,065 in 1987.

Smoking at Brock

There has been a lot of concern recently in the press and elsewhere about smoking in the workplace. The effect of the smoke on non-smokers and the relative rights of smokers and non-smokers are significant issues in the debate. Also at issue is the amount of responsibility an employer should assume for ensuring that employees' health is not endangered by "secondhand" smoke. The University has had a long standing policy that smoking would not be allowed in laboratories, in the library or in classrooms and seminar rooms. This policy, however, resulted from a need to establish prudent fire safety regulations rather than from any attempt to control the health risk.

There is now a lot of sound medical evidence attesting to the increased risk of heart disease, cancer and lung disease among smokers. To a lesser extent this evidence also shows increased health risk for co-workers and family members of smokers who are exposed to "secondhand" smoke. The question of the relative rights of smokers and non-smokers has been considered by lawyers who specialize in the area of human rights. The matter has been likened to assault where "one's right to swing one's fist stops at the point it impacts someone else's nose." Similarly, one's right to smoke stops at the point it begins to disadvantage someone else.

Based on the foregoing the matter may seem cut and dried but that is not the case at all. While it is clear that some control of smoking is required, and many employers and legislative bodies have put policies into place, many issues remain to be considered. Should smoking be allowed anywhere on campus? Should people be allowed to smoke in washrooms or private offices? Should visitors to the campus be similarly restricted? Universities have a long tradition of making policy decisions in an consultative way. In that regard, the President has asked me to chair a task force to develop a smoking policy for Brock. It is very important that all members of the University have an opportunity to put forward their views. Accordingly, I invite anyone with an opinion on the matter to write to the task force in care of me, Harold Leece, Personnel Services.

The task force, as well, should represent the University community. To that end CUPE 1295 and the Students Union have nominated representatives. I would like to invite people who would be interested in serving on the task force as representatives of staff and faculty to write me a short note indicating your interest. This is an issue about which some people feel very strongly. I appreciate that, but I would prefer to have task force members who are prepared to consider different views and keep an open mind on the issue of how Brock can deal with smoking on the campus. I look forward to hearing from you.

I am thankful to BUFA for conducting a survey of opinions on the subject and to others who have gathered materials and sent them to me. With these items ready for distribution to the task force, I think it should be fairly easy to draft a policy for presentation to the Board of Trustees.

A Study Year in the United Kingdom

The equivalent fees are entirely waived at the British host institution. The courses completed overseas are for credit at the home university.

\$3.7 Million to Brock

You may have read the article in last week's St. Catharines Standard comparing the grant Brock received for building (\$3.7 million) from the Ontario Ministry of Colleges and Universities with the one received by Trent University (\$7.5 million).

The article suggests that Brock lost out to Trent "2 to 1." In fact, Brock was one of only seven universities given money for capital expenditures and, importantly, Brock received all the money it was allowed to ask for keeping in line with a specific mathematical model supplied by the Ministry to assess space needs.

Using this model, a consultant assessed Brock's needs at 66,000 more square feet (or about four levels of the Schmon Tower). This report was approved and Brock will receive two-thirds funding towards its full request requiring the Board of Trustees to raise the balance from the private sector. Since the Ministry of Colleges and Universities is permitted only to grant up to two-thirds towards the cost of a project, each university and college is required to raise the balance.

Who Got What

-Brock University will receive \$3.7 million toward a \$5.6 million new building for administrative studies programs.

-The University of Toronto was awarded \$1.9 million toward a \$9.1 million addition for research.

-The University of Western Ontario will receive \$5.6 million toward a \$8.4 million addition for its occupational therapy program.

-Trent University was awarded \$7.5 million for an \$11.4 million environment and natural sciences building.

-Carleton University will receive \$7.1 million toward a \$10.7 million addition to its library.

-the University of Ottawa will receive \$9.6 million toward a \$14.4 million science and engineering complex.

-McMaster University will receive \$10.9 million toward a \$16.4 million addition to the Mills Library.



Annual Birdathon






Researchers at Brock have come up big in the latest competition for three-year grants from the Natural Sciences and Engineering Research Council (NSERC).

Last month, the University was awarded \$900,966 in grants for projects ranging from the study of gold deposits in Yellowknife to the effects of pollution on freshwater fish.

Out of 59 recipient institutions, Brock ranked second nationally in grants for equipment (\$74,111) and second for strategic grants (\$71,200). In the operating grants category, Brock ranked 30th with an award of \$755,655.

Grant committees of the NSERC are responsible for allocating money to nine areas of research. Brock was second and third in Canada in two areas: animal biology and cell biology respectively. The following are the subject areas and how Brock fared nationally. The first number is Brock's rank and the second is the number of applicants.

Animal biology: 2/43 Cell biology: 3/44 Plant biology: 20/39 Population biology: 26/43 Chemistry: 32/44 Earth science: 32/42 Computer information science: 37/39 Pure applied math: 37/47 Physics: 26/41







BIRT Comes Through

For his 50th birthday last December, Registrar Ron McGraw's staff gave him dark glasses and a stick-on black moustache. They said when McGraw's pet project, BIRT (Brock information and registration by telephone) met with problems this spring he may need the disguise.

Now that spring registration is winding up, McGraw knows he definitely can put his best (and own) face forward. "There's never been so many unsolicited positive remarks," McGraw says. "Usually all you hear around the time of registration are complaints about the long lines."

At the centre of praise, is Ontario's first telephone registration system and the first one in the world to use a synthetic voice. Registration by BIRT was mandatory for the first time this spring and about 2,300 students followed directions in the course guide to register for courses. There was staff on call in the registrar's office to instruct anyone who had difficulty with BIRT.

BIRT occupies a small office on the 3rd floor of Schmon Tower. The software is supplied by Speech Dynamics of Toronto and BIRT operates on a Unisys Canada micro-computer hooked into a Unisys mainframe computer. Whereas other universities which use telephone registration (e.g. University of Alberta) use prerecorded messages, McGraw decided to take a risk and allow Brock to be the first university to go with the synthetic voice which can can adapt its responses. BIRT's voice is a male one with a Scandinaviantype accent; one student commented the voice sounds like Arnold Schwarzenegger.

It's been just two years since the idea for a phone-in registration system was seriously considered. McGraw said the fact that students were spending up to six hours registering in the gymnasium was a major factor in changing the system. BIRT cost \$180,000 and is in place after long hours put in by staff in the registrar's office and the computing centre.



Foreign Students at Work

When Shu-ya Huang started her job at the Canadian Bank of Commerce last week, she became Brock's first grad to work under a new policy governing foreign students. But with the honour of being the first also came a lesson in negotiating the untested channels to a work permit.

Huang, a 25-year-old native of Taiwan, was a fourth-year bachelor of administration student last Febuary when she learned of the new rules and found one applied to her. Foreign students graduating from Canadian universities would now be allowed to work in their degree-related field for one year after the release of final marks. (Also, for the first time, foreign students are allowed to work on campus during the spring/summer term and non-student spouses of foreign students are allowed to work on or off campus.)

Through a friend, Huang found out about a job in the marketing department of the Canadian Bank of Commerce's Toronto office. She applied, got it, and was given a starting date (May 1) soon after her exams. Then she found out getting a work permit could take at least 2-3 months after graduation. She would need a variety of documents including a letter from her employer, proof she had graduated, and a social insurance number.

Still, Huang was ahead of the game; she already had a social insurance number which would normally take six to eight weeks after a work permit was approved. She had the letter from her employer but her marks were not yet in and would not be approved by Senate for at least two weeks after her starting date. "Our hands were tied," said Mike Somerville, registration and records officer, about giving Huang a letter stating official proof of graduation. However, in order to try to help her out, the registrar's office solicited her unofficial marks and gave her an unofficial letter of graduation for Immigration officials.

Whether Immigration accepted the letter, foreign student advisor John Kaethler said, would be one of the first tests of how stringently the law was to be applied.

When it was accepted, Huang breathed a sigh of relief; it was one working day before the first day of her new job. Niagara Immigration supervisor Dave Bown says Huang is the only foreign student in this area to apply to work after graduation through the regional office. He mentioned a "few" have applied for summer permits, as has one spouse of a student.

Brock's Kaethler is a big supporter of allowing foreign students to work in Canada but says the few applying to do so indicate the new policy's stipulations are making it difficult. He says although students are allowed to work on campus, the number of those jobs is limited, especially at a school the size of Brock. As for the provision that allows students to work after graduation, Kaethler says they would need a very patient employer to wait two-three months after hiring until that student could begin work.

Further, foreign students are not allowed to use Canada Manpower Centre boards to find work as James Busumtwi, a master's student from Ghana, found out when he tried. Butsumtwi had hoped to get an off-campus job but realized by the time the necessary paperwork was done the summer would be over and it would be time to start his PhD at the U. of T. in September. "The law is ambiguous," Busumtwi said, "it says foreign students can work but try to do it." This summer he will commute between a part-time job in the politics department at Brock and one at the U.of T.

Math Marvels

Three Brock students who spent the first weekend of their spring break tackling a math problem were recently given the prestigious "meritorious" rank for the result.

Their efforts were part of a North American-wide competition in mathematical modeling for university students. Patricia Durnford (administrative studies), Allan East (chemistry), and Robbin Bacsek (computer science) had never met each other before camping out at the school for 72 hours to tackle the predetermined math problem.

"It was surprising we worked so well together " says East, 21, who is working as a researcher in the chemistry department this summer. He says each of them brought unique strengths to the problem, and that the contest provided a unique chance to meet people from different faculties. "We didn't find the problem all that hard so we really worked on the presentation," East says.

The students were allowed to consult any inanimate aids such as computers or library books says Professor of Mathematics, Jim Mayberry, who recruited the students for the contest. The entry had to be postmarked on Monday and Mayberry remembers the results looked very professional. The results proved his preliminary assessment. Brock was one of 40 teams (out of 220) which was ranked as "meritorious."

"Results like this show Brock really has nothing to be modest about," says Professor Mayberry.





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Melvin L. Perlman, 1933-88 In Memorian

The University community is saddened by the loss of Professor Melvin Perlman who died on May 23. Dr. Perlman joined Brock University's sociology department in 1970, one year after it was formed. His teaching and research interests covered the fields of general systems theory, marriage and the family, law and ethnicity, and he was a valued contributor to the Child Studies Program.

Dr. Perlman received his degrees in human culture and behaviour, and social anthropology from Yale and Oxford Universities, and also studied at the Hebrew University in Jerusalem and the Ecole Pratique des Hautes Etudes at the University of Paris. His field work was carried out among the Toro people of Uganda.

His distinguished career was marked by many academic honours, and he is biographed in <u>American Men and Women of Science</u>, <u>Who's Who in the East</u>, <u>Men of</u> <u>Achievement</u>, <u>Dictionary of International Biography</u>, and <u>Men and Women of Distinction</u>.

In one of the letters of reference written for his posting at Brock, Mel was described as "gentle", "interested", "sharing", "conscientious" and "hard working." He never betrayed such praise.

Convocation Notes

Brock graduated 1270 students in two ceremonies last Friday. The Doctor of Laws, honoris causa, was awarded to Stephen Lewis, Canada's Ambassador to the United Nations, and the former leader of the Ontario NDP party.

The audience responded warmly as Dr. Lewis described himself as a "diplomatic lackey working for the Tories" and said when he looked at the graduates he became enamoured with the possibilities of political conversion. He complimented Alan Earp for his fine performance as Brock's President, and MPP for Welland-Thorold Mel Swart (who is retiring) for his principled commitment to politics.

In keeping with his United Nation post, Lewis urged the graduates to "find a chunk of their lives to dedicate to international society" and listed various non-governmental groups which he credited with keeping important issues on the political agenda, and influencing public policy.

President Alan Earp made his final convocation address citing the problems of space and underfunding. "You have spent your time in an overcrowded university. You have spent your time in an underfunded university," he told the graduates, their family and friends. Despite this, he says Brock's faculty have retained their commitment to be dedicated teachers.

"Intellectual activity is the real business of the University," President Earp said.

The Governor-General's Gold Medal was awarded to Lena Neubieser Cuthbertson for her average of 88 per cent in the Masters of Education program. She is a resident of White Rock, British Columbia.

The Governor-General's Silver Medal was awarded to Kai Him Anthony Mak for his average of 86.2 per cent in computer science and economics. He is a resident of Hong Kong who entered Brock University in 1985.

The Vice-Chancellor's Medal is awarded to Monika Boehringer-Gemmrich of Niagaraon-the-Lake for an 88 per cent average in achieving the Bachelor Arts degree with a major of French.

Friend of Seminary Award

Brock President Alan Earp is the recipient of the first Friend of Seminary Award given by Concordia Lutheran Theological Seminary. The award was formally presented in April at the seminary graduates dinner sponsored by the members of Lutheran Life Insurance Society of Canada.

In presenting the award, Dr. Howard Kramer, president of the seminary, noted that Dr. Earp had been influential in the conversations and negotiations leading to an affiliation agreement between Brock University and the seminary.

Further, Dr. Earp's advice has been important in the planning of the seminary building on the Brock campus and in the ongoing relationship between the seminary and University, according to Dr. Kramer.

Seminary students are registered as Brock students and receive their MDiv and MTS degrees from the University at regular University convocations. The seminary has been situated in its own building on the campus for three years.

"At all times Dr. Earp has been a valued friend of the seminary," said Dr. Kramer. Speakers echoing these sentiments included Dean of Student Affairs Roger Humann and Rev. John Korcok, pastor of Trinity Lutheran Church in Niagara-onthe-Lake.

Intermedia





Research Funding in the Social Sciences

Social Sciences and Research Council (SSHRC) grants were recently confirmed and included awards to Brock researchers: Prof. Carl Baar (politics, \$27,112) and Prof. Tom Peters (economics, \$12,180). In addition, Profs. Benjafield and Belicki (psychology), Berkes (UEST), Glenday (Sociology) and Dirks (politics) carry on with the second year of funding under grants awarded last year. SSHRC-funded projects total \$134, 436 in 1988/89.

Two Social Science faculty members were successful in the latest NSERC grants competition. Profs. David DiBattista and Peter Ramm of psychology were awarded \$12,000 and \$26,030 respectively for the first of three-year grants. There is also \$28,125 in ongoing NSERC grants from earlier years for Profs. Bob Ogilvie (psychology) and John Middleton (UEST).

Finally, there is a total of \$263,150 in funding from other agencies and foundations in Canada and the U.S., in both one year and multi-year grants and research contracts. Most of these funds have been awarded to Brock faculty, although in several projects, totalling approximately \$80,000, Brock faculty are participating as part of an inter-university research team.







New Residence For Brock

Brock will have 360 more residence beds a year from now thanks to a \$4.68 million grant from the Ministry of Colleges and Universities. The Honourable Lyn McLeod flew here July 7to make the announcement to media and university members in the alumni lounge at Brock. The total cost of the project is 7.2 million with the government contribution being spread over 25 years to reduce loan interest costs.

It comes as part of the Ontario government's University Residence Program which aims to provide affordable housing for students and, in turn, to reduce the competition between students and low-income earners for off-campus housing.

If all goes as planned, the new residence—a town house development—will be completed for occupancy next September on the main campus. Currently, Brock has the lowest (at 8 per cent) ratio of university-owned residence beds to total students of any university in Ontario. Last year, there were 766 students on the waiting list for residence.

The minister's announcement came just as Brock's President, Dr. Terry White, completed his second day at work. He thanked Ms. McLeod for coming to welcome him and bringing such a fine gift, adding that she was indeed welcome at any time. Also in attendance were James Bradley, MPP for St. Catharines, and Harry Pelissero, MPP for Lincoln.





Ken Fowler and Allan Orr to lead Brock Fundraising Campaign

Ken Fowler, President of Taro Properties, will join Brock University Chairman Allan Orr in leading the campaign to raise \$2.5 million for the University's Business and Social Sciences building.

The new building will house Brock's School of Business Administration as well as the Departments of Economics and Politics. The Province of Ontario has approved \$3.7 million for the project. Funds raised by the University Board of Trustees through this campaign will complete the capital funding of the building and will provide operating funds for the Brock Centre for Entrepreneurship, a joint venture between the University and the private sector. The Campaign is expected to wind up next spring.

The new building is being designed by Toronto architects Moriyama and Teshima Ltd., the same firm which designed the Mackenzie Chown Complex. The new building will provide space equivalent to four storeys of The Schmon Tower and will be located directly south of Thistle Corridor West. It is hoped construction will be finished by 1990 to partially alleviate Brock's overcrowding.





The New Old Isaac

There's a new "Isaac Brock Wants You" poster out, and it's back to the historical model of the man. Market research done by the liaison staff shows that the "Isaac Brock Wants You" campaign is still very successful among high school seniors. The new poster, which portrays General Brock atop his horse during the War of 1812, is an attempt to maintain but freshen the theme. Dean of Mathematics and Science Arthur Houston and Chemistry Professor Jack Miller, who have a special interest in militia, acted as consultants on the project.

"We wanted the uniform to be historically accurate, " says Dean Houston who has written several articles on medals in WWI and studies army uniforms and decorations. This poster is the one in a series and Dean Houston was keen about the move toward an historical emphasis.

"I think people sometimes forget we're named after an important general," he says. The picture was drawn by Jim Haynes (the same man who drew the two previous Isaac Brock posters) whose staff spent time in Ottawa researching the historical details for the poster.

It's part of a three-part promotional package which includes the new viewbook (available in the Office of External Relations) and a soon-to-be-released recruitment film. The poster is on sale in the Bookstore, however prospective students can obtain theirs without charge in the Office of External Relations.

Orientation For All

With 20 per cent of first year students under the age of 19 this September, Student Orientation has changed as a result of a year's planning to stage first rate non-alcoholic events, and develop a trend away from emphasizing alcohol at student events on campus.

Eighteen events including an open air dance, a pool party and movies are "non alcoholic" while nine, including events at Alphies, have alcoholic drinks accessible to students. According to Manager of Liquor Services, Paul Dwyer, there has been real concern about making this orientation--an important part of settling into school-- open to all students.

"Last year we were turning away tons of kids (without ID) at the door (of Alphies). That's orientation? c'mon. There were some events for underagers but not great ones," Dwyer says. "This year BUSU has taken a real interest in the underage student."

As well, a university-wide committee on orientation spent the summer debating the issue of drinking on campus and how to integrate activities for underage and age of majority students. It included Pauline McCormack (admin. services), Paul Dwyer (liquor services), Jacqui Tiller (student services), Jamie Fleming (residences), Karen McAllister and Charlotte Adams (athletics), Frank Wagner and George Tattrie (campus ministries), John Kaethler (foreign student advisor) and BUSU reps Michael Kovacs, Kevin Kiss, Darryl Novak, Michael Wong and Jeff Richardson.

"I was underage in my first year and I had a lousy orientation," says BUSU President Jeff Richardson, now 21, "This year we felt we had better respond to the needs of underage students. I feel we've succeeded in our goals."

With the phasing out of Grade 13 in Ontario high schools first year students will almost fully become a class of underagers and Richardson says BUSU wants to try to arrange events as interesting as the licensed ones. But events integrating underage students and age of majority students are difficult on Brock's campus because of licensing requirements. These licenses are undergoing review by LLBO and University administration. For instance at Alphies, underagers are not allowed in the building whether there are alcoholic drinks served are not. In short, no dry bars are allowed. All mixed events are taking place off-campus. A DJ Pub at the CAW Hall in St. Catharines was open to all students as is a Boat Cruise on the Niagara River.

Registration Reviews

About 6,700 students completed registration in the gymnasium last week after using the BIRT (Brock Information and Registration by Telephone) system. The system is the first of its kind in Canada and allows students to register for their courses from anywhere with a touchtone telephone.

Students were asked to read a manual outlining how to access BIRT then punch in the appropriate course codes. Staff in

the Office of the Registrar were available to answer questions in the event of confusion.

"I'd like to see students look at registration as a total package," says Registrar Ron McGraw, "When they come to the university for registration, the courses are already picked out and listed on computer print outs, they pay their fees and leave."

Here are some comments from students:

"I found it no problem," says Carmen Chimenti, a fourth-year economics student who registered from Peterborough, "It was nice and quick."

"I found the gym part fine. I was in and out in ten minutes. When I called to register by phone in July there were some problems with the system. But then I called back in a few hours and it was fine. Still it was better than waiting in line for four hours," says Lisa Gris, a fourth year BA/ BEd student from Hamilton.

"I found the processing in the gym really quick and organized. I didn't like the phone-in registration. I had to call 15 times because the system kept shutting down on me," says Ellen Roch, a fourth year child studies/psychology major.

A Peal for Peace

On Tuesday, September 20, 1988 at noon on the International Day of Peace, you are invited to join with people across Canada, the delegates of the United Nations General Assembly and others in more than 50 countries around the world to share a minute of silent contemplation to reaffirm our commitment to world peace.

The Minute of Silence will be followed by the pealing of church bells and other joyous sounds that celebrate our hope for world peace and re-establish our oneness with the rest of humankind.

Wherever you are, whatever you are doing on Tuesday, September 20th at noon — stop for a minute. Whether you are in the office or a restaurant, at home, on the street or in the classroom, pause for one minute to join in mind and heart with Canadians across the country in an expression of our dedication to peace. Then Join in a moment of joyful sound.

What is the appeal of a Peal for Peace? The appeal is its universality. It is a global ritual which is open in principle to every human being on earth.

In Canada, it includes peace activists and soldiers, people of every religion and of no religion, right-wingers and left-wingers. And when last year millions of people in over sixty countries participated we could begin to hope realistically that most of humankind might one day be involved.

The United Nations International Day of Peace

In 1981, the United Nations General Assembly declared that the third Tuesday of September would be officially observed as the International Day of Peace. Robert Muller, the former Assistant Secretary General of the United Nations, envisioned the whole world joining together for a minute of silence on this day.

By 1985 public observances were being held in London, Geneva, San Francisco, Dallas and Metro Toronto.

In 1986 Canada became the first country to officially participate nationwide in the International Day of Peace.

The Government of Canada, in official recognition of the Day, asked the Dominion carilloneur to ring the Peace Tower Carillon from 12:01 to 12:15 p.m. More than 80 mayors, from coast to coast, proclaimed the event. All provincial premiers and territory leaders endorsed A Peal for Peace; several also encouraged the participation of their civil servants. The Alberta Legislative Assembly observed the Minute of Silence, followed by the ringing of the Carillon and prayers from the Speaker.

At Expo '86, rides stopped and presentations ceased as silence descended over the entire site so that an estimated 50,000 people could pause for peace. Most pavilions participated, including those of Western governments and corporations, the U.S.S.R. and China.

Along with the successful Million Minutes of Peace Appeal which started on September 15th, millions of people around the world joined in the Minute of Silence.

Private, Public and Planetary

A Peal for Peace is private

In the privacy of our own hearts and minds each of us will be focusing on peace during the Minute of Silence.

Some people will pray, others will ponder. We may differ in our thinking about the best ways of promoting peace, but on this day these differences will be set aside as we express our common humanity and our common desire for peace.

A Peal for Peace is public

Many of us will also be making a public expression of our concern as we communicate our desire for peace and join with others in the many public events that will take place on this day.

A private Minute of Silence will be followed by a joyous Moment of Sound as we celebrate life and reaffirm our kinship with humankind. In some cities the church bells will peal a message of peace and hope. In other areas doorbells will sound, car horns will honk, train whistles will blow and people will sing. Whatever the sound, the message will be clear: we know that peace is possible and we are conveying our determination to make that goal a reality.

A Peal for Peace is planetary

We all share a desire to preserve the planet and everything that lives on it — and, despite the diverse interests and beliefs of the many people who share it with us, we want to acknowledge our common humanity.

On this, the International Day of Peace, we cross many borders and join in mind and heart with others around the world who long, as we do, for world peace.


IF YOU DISCOVER A FIRE:

- 3. DO NOT USE ELEVATORS.
- 4. Assemble outside building keeping all entrances clear.

Do not re-enter the building until <u>Campus Police</u> have indicated it is safe to do so. The alarm bells will stop ringing after a short period of time, but this is not an indication that it is safe to return.





BROCK TO HOST GEOMORPHOLOGISTS

What's a geomorphologist? Is it some kind of extraterrestrial? Well, not exactly; it's much more down-to-earth. Geomorphology is the study of the Earth's surface, and the history of this science is the subject of the 19th Annual Binghamton Geomorphology Symposium, Sept. 23-25, hosted here at Brock by the Department of Geography. Professors from Great Britain, France, Poland, the United States and Canada will deliver papers considering the ways we terrestrials have been affected by changing ideas on the history of our planet's surface.

For example, explains symposium host Prof. Keith Tinkler, before the advent of carbon dating, natural historians used various methods to determine the Earth's age. One early 18th-century method involved clocking Niagara Falls' erosion toward Lake Erie from what was believed to be its original location at the Niagara Escarpment. (The idea that this can date the Earth's age has been discredited by modern scientists, but the basic idea of recession is still true.) The symposium will include an early-morning field trip to the Falls to see them from the early historians' perspective and in light of contemporary knowledge.

The symposium will honour James Hutton, whose paper "A Theory of the Earth..." was published 200 years ago; and John Hack, for his work on landform development for the US Geological Survey. Visiting Professor Mott Greene (University of Puget Sound) will lead all discussions in the symposium and, while on campus, will also deliver a lunchtime lecture Sept. 22nd as part of the Department of Biology's speaker series. The symposium is supported by a Conference Grant from SSHRC. Contact Keith Tinkler at ext. 3486 for more information.

Concordia Seminary Adult Education Programme Expanded

Concordia Lutheran Theological Seminary will begin its second year of adult education courses in religious studies for lay people.



Scholars Honoured

Three hundred and seventy-six Brock students were invited to awards dinners given by President White this month. The number of Ontario Scholars (high school graduates with an 80 per cent or higher grade average) entering Brock has increased this year to 214 (compared with 160 in 1987, and 60 in 1986). The Dean's Honours List totaled 162 students this fall (compared to 133 in 1987, and 86 in 1986). "It's a big job organizing these dinners," says Registrar Ron McGraw, who originated the idea, "and we're not sorry the job is getting even bigger. It's great to have so many students to honour."

Construction Update

The 25th Anniversary Campaign

Charity, as they say, begins at home. And this is the philosophy behind an internal campaign to raise money for Brock's Administrative Business and Social Sciences Building, and the 25th Anniversary Scholarship Fund.

"We want to set the pace internally so that an example is set when we solicit for outside funds," says Director of Development John Bird.

The internal campaign will be led by Jim Lennard of the Computing Centre and Howard Prout of the School of Administrative Studies. The campaign is in its formative stages and information sessions will be held for Brock faculty and staff. Organizers are convinced that when everyone is full informed about both projects there will be a generous pattern of support.

The 25th Anniversary Scholarship Fund was established by the Faculty Board Scholarship Committee and the Development Office to improve Brock's position as the lowest ranking in the province for scholarships. The objective is to collect \$250,000 over five years. As of Sept. 1, 1988, \$96,925 has been received in cash and pledges.

The other exciting project, the BASS building, will change the face of Brock's campus. Brock must raise two-thirds (or about \$3.5 million) towards the cost of construction under Ontario government regulations. The BASS campaign has a proposed objective of \$250,000 over a five year pledge period.

1990-1991 Canadian Commonwealth Fellowships

Canadian Commonwealth Research Fellowships are intended to bring to Canada, from universities and research centres of other Commonwealth countries, scholars of established reputation whose presence in Canadian universities is expected to benefit themselves, their home countries and Canada. Fellows may pursue independent or collaborative research and are expected to engage in activities that will enhance interaction with Canadian colleagues during their stay in Canada.

Up to three fellowships will be available each year, tenable anytime between April 1, 1990 and March 31, 1991. Normally the fellowship covers an academic year at a single university; but programs of one term will be considered, as well as those including short visits to additional institutions.

The Canadian Commonwealth Scholarship and Fellowship Committee welcomes nominations by the Heads of Canadian universities. Nominations will be considered on the basis of demonstrated research ability, significance of the proposed research, and appropriateness of the proposed program. SSHRC Grantsmanship Workshop

The Research Grants Office arranged for Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council representative, Nina Stipich, to visit with Brock faculty last Tuesday, at an informal on-campus workshop. Some 60social scientists and humanists attended the half-day session. Ms. Stipich explained the budgetary pressures facing the federally-supported Council that have led to recent changes and cutbacks in its grant programs for faculty and student research. She pointed to the current government's initiative to encourage private sector funding of research, by offering to match those funds with federal moneys. In what soon became quite a lively discussion, Ms. Stipich then fielded questions about the practical and political aspects of preparing grant proposals. 

What has prompted the naming of our offering place of victuals and sustenance?

A certain mysterious aura surrounds "Sophia Shaw", daughter of General AEneus Shaw, and the young woman betrothed to General Sir Isaac Brock.

Born on May 31, 1792 Sophia and Isaac had developed a deep attachment. They whiled away spare moments with whist and cribbage, *''diversions'' he said, ''that sharpened a man's wit''.


It was that fatchil day, the 13th of October 1812, when Isaac Brock, on a furious gallop to Queenston Heights, reigned up to bid her farewell, taking from Sophia a cup of coffee - a "stirrup cup" - his last. He rode away to his death, and distinction.

Gn Brock's death, Sophia remained unmarried.

Brock Student wins Oil Institute Award

John McAllister, an MSc candidate in the Department of Geological Sciences, has won the prestigious Ontario Petroleum Institute Award for 1988, for his BSc thesis, "Geochemistry of Trilobites: Examples from the Silurian and Ordovician." His study deals with the prehistoric crablike creatures familiar to fossil-hunters.



In January of 1988, the **Pay Equity Act** was passed into legislation by the provincial government. Since that time, the Pay Equity Commission has been established; part of its mandate is to develop and distribute guidelines to assist employers with understanding and complying with the technical aspects of the legislation.

Brock University is committed to Pay Equity and the staff of Personnel Services are currently working towards implementing the legislation. To that end, we have met with representatives of the Pay Equity Commission, consultants from Hay Management Associates and salary administrators from other Ontario universities and employers. We are finding out as much as we can about the legislation and are planning the various activities involved in complying with it. The University has until 1990 to post a Pay Equity Plan.

The following summary introduces and explains some of the concepts related to the legislation. Not every aspect is dealt with; in subsequent issues of Campus News, we will be providing more information about the legislation, the University's specific plans and how Brock employees fit into and will be affected by the legislation. If you have questions or concerns, we would like to hear from you; questions and comments can be directed to Personnel Services, either verbally or in writing.

All of us working together will ensure that Pay Equity at Brock is a successful endeavour.

PAY EQUITY: WHAT IS IT ALL ABOUT?

Perhaps the best way to understand this legislation and its implications is to determine what Pay Equity is, and also, what it is not.

From our perspective, **Pay Equity is about fairness.** The legislation aims to ensure that salary and wage scales for female-dominated and male-dominated jobs are based upon the value of the work performed regardless of the gender of the person doing the work. Pay adjustments will be made if it is discovered that a female-dominated job is paid less than a male-dominated job of comparable value.

Pay Equity will narrow the male/female wage gap but will not eliminate the entire wage gap. Women in Ontario earn, on average, 63 per cent of what men in Ontario earn; however, the difference in wages results from many factors which include differences in education, experience, hours worked, amount of time in the labour force, etc. Only one-quarter to one-third (i.e., 10 per cent to 15 per cent) of the wage gap is presumed to be because of the historic undervaluation of work performed mainly by women. As these are general figures, they may be misleading and may not apply equally to all establishments. Although some of us may feel our work is undervalued. such is generally not the case. For those organizations who use job evaluation and classification and who regularly conduct salary surveys to ensure internal equity and competitive rates of pay, it is reasonable to conclude that, in general, their employees are fairly compensated. These establishments, Brock University included, can expect that any changes resulting from the Pay Equity legislation will not be extreme; rather, a "fine tuning" of salary administration and compensation systems is anticipated. Possible changes may involve establishing new salary ranges, reclassifying some positions and adjusting some salaries.

Pay Equity is equal pay for work of equal value and is different from equal pay for equal work which has been law in Ontario since 1951. The latter requires employers to pay men and women equally for performing <u>substantially the same kind</u> <u>of work</u>; for instance, it ensures that male and female electricians performing substantially the same work are paid the same regardless of the gender of the worker. This legislation does not require comparisons to be made among jobs which are <u>different</u> from each other. Pay Equity goes beyond "equal pay for equal work" by requiring comparisons to be made among jobs which are different from each other. It stipulates that men and women be paid equally for work that is <u>different</u> but of <u>equal</u> <u>or comparable</u> value. It will ensure that salary and wage scales for different job classifications are based on the value of the work performed regardless of the gender of the person doing the work. Situations where work traditionally performed by women has been undervalued and underpaid in relation to work traditionally performed by men will be corrected, resulting in the wage gap between men and women being narrowed.

The legislation requires comparing jobs predominantly occupied by women to jobs predominantly occupied by men and assessing the value of those jobs. Comparing unlike jobs (such as nurse and groundskeeper) can be accomplished in much the same way as comparing unlike fruits (such as apples and oranges). In the same manner that fruits can be compared on the basis of common factors (such as colour, texture, weight, calories, nutritional value), jobs can be compared on the basis of common factors. The factors for comparing jobs are skill, effort, responsibility and working conditions.

Job evaluation is used to compare the factors and to assess the value of jobs. First, the content of jobs (such as job duties, required qualifications, decisions made, working conditions) is described; then, the jobs are evaluated to determine value. Job content, <u>not</u> the person performing the work, is evaluated. Once the evaluations have been done, the compensation for jobs performed mainly by men will be compared to the compensation for jobs performed mainly by men will be compared to the compensation for jobs performed mainly by men will be compared to the compensation for jobs performed mainly by men.

Pay Equity is different from Affirmative Action and Employment Equity. Employment Equity refers to a wide range of equity measures which are designed to improve the position of disabled persons, native persons, women and visible minorities in the workplace. It is intended to ensure that members of these target groups are fairly represented in all workplaces in all types and levels of positions; its focus is on recruiting, hiring, training and promoting individuals of these groups. Affirmative Action is one aspect of Employment Equity—it calls for setting goals or quotas with respect to the employment of individuals who belong to these target groups and taking specific steps to meet these goals or quotas.

One result of Employment Equity and Affirmative Action initiatives will be women moving into jobs traditionally performed by men. As this happens, women's wages will increase. These initiatives do not, however, address situations where women choose to remain in jobs traditionally performed by women and these jobs are not paid fairly when their value is equal to the value of jobs traditionally performed by men—such situations are the focus of Pay Equity.

Pay Equity will not be achieved by lowering pay. Pay reductions will not be permitted when a female-dominated job is paid less than a male-dominated job of comparable value. This circumstance would require an increase to the pay for the female-dominated job. There are, however, some acceptable reasons for wage differences such as seniority, temporary training, red-circling, merit pay and skill shortages so long as these exceptions apply to men and women equally and employers can justify the differences.

Pay Equity adjustments. Employers in the broader public sector (such as Brock University) have five years to phase-in the required pay adjustments, beginning in 1990. A timetable and explanation of any required adjustments will be communicated to Brock employees at that time.


At its first meeting for 1988-89, held on Tuesday, September 27th, the Board of Trustees:

Hainey to Seoul

Seoul-bound Tom Hainey was at Brock last week swimming with the varsity team and fine-tuning his strokes with Coach Herb deBray.

Hainey, 22, is a former Badger swimmer who holds three world records for disabled swimmers in class six—the least impaired. He has spina bifida which still allows him to walk but gives him limited use of his legs in swimming.

"I mainly use them for balance," Hainey says. "I don't train any differently than other swimmers." Hainey will compete in five events at the Paralympics to be held in Seoul, Korea from Oct. 10 to 25. Although he is a world record holder, Hainey says he is not favored to win his events because he is recovering from falling 55 feet from a balcony in Winnipeg last winter. (His own fault, he says).

He will spend the year at his hometown of Atikokan, near Thunder Bay, and says he hopes to be back studying psychology at Brock next fall.

President Completes 40 Years of Full-Time Church Service

Howard W. Kramer of St. Catharines, Ontario is completing his 40th year of full-time service in the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod.

Dr. Kramer, currently completing his fourth year as President at Concordia Lutheran Theological Seminary, and a native of Uniontown (Perry County), Missouri, attended St. Paul's College, Concordia, Missouri; Concordia Seminary, St. Louis (M. Div. and S.T.M.); the University of Louisville (M.A.) and the University of Michigan (Ph.D.). A Kellogg Foundation grant sponsored summer studies in Oxford and Cambridge, England; later he also did research at The College of All Saints, London.

Kramer is an ordained clergyman in the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod, and served congregations in Carthage, Missouri, Louisville, Kentucky, and St. Louis, for 18 years before he entered the field of higher education.

As a student, Kramer was an announcer, newscaster, programme writer, and assistant production manager at radio station KFUO in St. Louis, and he occasionally served as announcer for the International Lutheran Hour. During his career more than 100 of his sermons and devotions have been published in works such as The Concordia Pulpit, Portals of Prayer, My Devotions, Teenagers Pray and a variety of similar publications. More recently he has written an anniversary hymn for the 25th anniversary of Concordia College, Ann Arbor, Michigan.

Prior to his coming to St. Catharines, Kramer taught at Concordia College, Ann Arbor, Michigan in the areas of English, New Testament and Humanities. Later he became Academic Dean and also served as Acting President.

Dr. Kramer is married to the former Valerie Moeller, a registered nurse. The four Kramer children live in Hong Kong, Ann Arbor, Michigan, Joplin, Missouri, and Austin, Texas.

1989-90 NSERC Undergraduate Awards

The purpose of this Award is to stimulate the interest of undergraduate students in research by providing them with valuable experience in the university laboratory, and to encourage these students to undertake graduate studies. Applications are assessed on the basis of the student's academic record and research aptitude, and the awards are normally tenable during the summer months. For further information, contact the Research Grants Office. Applications must be submitted no later than Jan 9, 1989.

International Student Exchange Programme

The ISEP programme offers an opportunity for several Brock students to study in the US for a year, at one of a number of American universities which participate in the programme. 






Bigger Switchboard On Its Way!

Help for one of Brock's most irritating problems is due to arrive by the first of the year. The University's offer has been accepted on a four-year-old switchboard which will increase our capacity from less than 600 to 110 locals. This means every faculty member will have his or her own local.

The price-tag for the switchboard is some \$46,000 U.S., or less than half what it would have cost new. Vice-President/Administration Terry Varcoe says the "switch," whose original users were the Heinz food people in Pittsburgh, is the same make as our old one (which will be retained for spare parts), but twice as big. According to Don Adams, Director of Computer and Communications Services, it will handle digital transmission, and allow us to add "voice mail" (a message-taking system for persons not at their local when the call comes in) and "automated attendant" (which allows outside callers who know the correct extension to bypass the operator).

And, says Terry Varcoe, the new "switch" will be capable of handling a larger number of trunks during the September crunch. As it is, each of our three consoles can handle only six calls at any one time, or a total of 18. Now we'll have the option of adding other operators, each with that many more lines, during periods of particularly heavy use, like registration.

Communications Services Assistant Director Bruce McCormack is scheduled to be in Pittsburgh this week to oversee the dismantling, packing and shipping of the switchboard, which is due to be installed here at Brock between Christmas and the New Year. Necessary renovations will be made to make room for the equipment.

This is good news for everyone, not least Brock's switchboard operators, who have been working against heavy odds to maintain the standards of good cheer and helpfulness which contribute to the University's positive image in the community.

Is General Brock Really At Rest?

General Isaac Brock died 176 years ago last Thursday, October 13th, in the Battle of Queenston Heights. But it seems his troubles were not over. Brock University History Professor Wesley Turner and Superintendant of Niagara National Historic Parks Walter Halderson provided the details:

During a gale on the night of Apr. 15, 1929 the pointing right arm fell off the General's statue at Queenston Heights. In the light of day, repairmen discovered that the whole upper torso needed replacement, which took place the following year. After repairs were completed, the statue's original shoulder lay on the ground outside the base of the monument for half a century.

In the early 1970's the shoulder, complete with braided epaulet and military badge, was transported to the Brock University campus, where it now lies - once again on the ground - among some boulders between Blocks B and C of the Mac Chown Complex.

Would the University's 25th Anniversary Year be a good time to give *our* Brock monument a place of honour?

Development Information

As the University approaches its 25th Anniversary next year, it is on the threshold of many structural changes on campus. A new student centre is being financed by the stu-

dent body, a new townhouse-style residence is fully-financed by the provincial government. Both are expected to be finished by next Sept.

Also in the works are important additions to Brock's academic life. There is going to be an single appeal to staff and faculty for two important areas. They are the 25 Anniversary Scholarship Campaign and the Brock Business Administration and Social Science Building Campaign.



The 25th Anniversary Scholarship Campaign is aimed at increasing the amount of scholarship money for students. This campaign is being undertaken by a committee committed to rewarding top incourse students and attracting top prospective students to Brock.

Also in the works is "The Brock Business Administration and Social Sciences Building", otherwise known as the "BASS" building. Soon there will be information meetings for faculty and staff. First these questions and answers will provide you with preliminary information about the BASS building. Next is an appeal from the 25th Anniversary Scholarship Campaign and lastly is an invitation for your questions.

Where exactly is this new BASS building going?

It will be built directly south of the language labs in Thistle East. The ramp will be removed and the traffic will be routed south of the building.

Why do we need a new building?

We all know how crowded Brock is. The faculty can see students jockeying for seats in the classrooms and seminar halls. The 127 staff members who take courses know how the crowded conditions can detract from an excellent atmosphere in which to learn. It is important that Brock provide an atmosphere that will foster excellence in academic studies for its 10,000 students. Our status is being threatened.

Are we really that overcrowded?

Yes, Brock has just 77 per cent of the space its enrolment should generate, according to provincial standards.

How has the provincial government responded to Brock's overcrowding?

It has provided full funding for Brock's 360bed residence, and the University anticipates government approval of a grant for two-thirds of the estimated cost of the BASS building, as it does for all other universities. The total cost is \$8 million and the Brock University Board of Trustees has undertaken responsibility to raise \$3.5 million needed to pay for the building.

Where will the \$3.5 million come from?

There will be an internal campaign here at Brock, and outside private sector fundraising. Allan Orr, Chairman of the Board of Trustees, and Ken Fowler, Board of Trustee Member and President of Taro Properties, are co-chairs of the fundraising campaign.

Who goes in the BASS building?

The departments of Administrative Studies, Politics and Economics. However, it is important to note that the new building will create a domino effect throughout the University, and will allow more space created by the three departments which will be relocated.

UNIVERSITY RESEARCH INCENTIVE FUND WORKSHOP

The aim of the Ministry of Colleges and Universities University Research Incentive Fund (URIF) is to encourage universities and the private sector to enter into cooperative research ventures with each other. The URIF program will match, dollar for dollar, eligible investments by the private sector in university-based contract research. Eligible projects include basic or applied research and preliminary or feasibility studies in areas of potential economic benefit to the province. While the majority of projects funded are in the natural sciences, the Ministry encourages researchers in all disciplines, with eligible projects, to apply. In 1988, two members of Brock faculty were successful in receiving URIF awards, totalling approx. \$180,000. The Ministry has funded 238 projects provincewide to-date, totalling \$19 million.

As the programme has matured over the past two years, it has become necessary to make policy adjustments to adapt to current demands, and ensure the program objectives continue to be met. In order to familiarize faculty with the program and these recent changes, the Research Grants Office has invited Gordon Stokell, of the URIF Secretariat, to address interested faculty at an informal workshop. The URIF workshop will be held on Friday, October 21, 1988 from 1:30 to 4:00 pm in the Senate Chambers. If you are interested in attending, or think you might like to attend but require

Leave Non/Leave Research Grants

The Brock Research Board, jointly appointed by the University and BUFA, has now been set up and will begin receiving applications for research grants. Grants awarded under this programme are considered as taxable income. However, the grant payment will be treated as T4A income for tax purposes and accordingly, no income tax will be deducted by the University. Award recipients are responsible for reporting the income to Revenue Canada and declaring against it eligible expenditures. Programme guidelines and application forms may be obtained through the Research Grants Office. Applications will be reviewed by the Research Board three times each year. The upcoming deadline for applications is Nov. 1, 1988.







Convocation '88

Our Man in Pittsburgh

Assistant Director of Computing and Communication Services Bruce McCormack is in Pittsburgh at Heinz Foods this week to oversee the dismantling, packing and shipping of Brock's new telephone switch. Plans are to install the system over the Christmas Break; this will increase the number of locals from 600 to 1,110 (not 110 as printed last week).

When it became obvious Brock's switch was overloaded (the switchboard operators now field 2, 500 calls per day) McCormack put out the message through an association he belongs to--the Colleges and Universities Telecommunications Association--that Brock needed a new switch. He was responsible for tracking down the switch and negotiating the terms of the deal. The University purchased a Wescom 580M, with the capability to be expanded if necessary. It will replace the Wescom 580S.

Brock an International Centre?

Visitors from Dunkerque, France had a bird's-eye view of the Brock campus last Wednesday morning. The President of the Dunkerque Chamber of Commerce, the Deputy Mayor of Dunkerque, business leaders, academics and students were here as part of an initiative to make St. Catharines and Dunkerque twin cities. President Terry White, several faculty members and External Relations staff were on hand to greet them in the Alumni Lounge.

A city of 75,000 in an immediate region of 210,000, Dunkerque is only 25 kilometres from the "chunnel" under the English Channel which is due for completion in 1992. Once it is open, Dunkerque will be part of an "enterprise zone" offering 10 years tax free to businesses which locate there. Seeing in St. Catharines not only a similar industrial base, but also a nearby international border (with a free-trade agreement under consideration), the Dunkerque Chamber of Commerce is eager to exchange information, ideas, and ultimately products.

The Dunkerque visitors were particularly interested to see our campus, as they are just beginning to build their own university.

Crispo-Rae Debate to be Televised

Prof. John Crispo of the University of Toronto Faculty of Management, and Bob Rae, Ontario MPP and Leader of the Opposition, will debate the Canada-US Free Trade Agreement on November 2 in The Theatre at 7:30 pm. The event is part of the "Excellence in the Eighties" series sponsored by the School of Administrative Studies.

Crispo is Professor of Political Economy and specialises in industrial and labour relations. He has consulted for government and industry, published numerous books and articles in his field, and edited the book *Free Trade: The Real Story* (Gage Educational Publishing Co., Toronto: 1988).

Before entering politics, Bob Rae earned a law degree from U. of T. and - as a Rhodes Scholar - a politics degree from Oxford. Since his election to the Ontario legislature in 1982, he has been most active on the issues of health and safety, gender and racial equality, housing, and the effects of economic measures on the lives of working people.

The Office of External Relations arranged for the participation of CHCH-TV as a cosponsor. The Hamilton station will videotape the debate and it will be rebroadcast on Saturday, November 5 at 8 pm on Channel 11.

At the live debate, questions will be invited from the floor. Admission is free, but you are advised to come early to be sure of getting a seat.

Candidates Debate

The three federal candidates for St. Catharines were at Brock last week to give their party's platform on the environment, focussing on responsibility for hazardous waste. They were joined by Activist Margherita Howe, Moderator Prof. Bill Hull, and an audience that packed the College of Education Lounge. The panel was one in a series staged by the Region Niagara Political Issues Forum.

Each Candidate—Liberal Barbara Buchanan, PC Ken Atkinson and NDP Rob West—echoed the other as they said responsibility for hazardous wastes rests with five levels: each citizen, the municipal government, the regional government, the provincial government, and the federal government.

Liberal Candidate and Brock researcher Barbara Buchanan called for the election of a broader segment of society to the Parliament, especially scientists such as herself who have a more in-depth knowledge of the technical aspects of pollution. Among her recommendations were excavating dump sites along the Niagara River, establishing a Toronto/Guelph Toxicology Centre, initiating major treatment of beaches, recycling, and co-operating with industry. She also interprets the Free Trade Agreement as a bad deal for Canada and the environment.

"Our standards are higher than in the US," Buchanan said adding that the free trade agreement would force Canadian standards to decline instead of vice versa.

NDP Candidate Rob West agreed that the Free Trade deal was a threat to Canada's environment. He also called the small fines given to polluters "a license to pollute".

West said the New Democratic Party believes the environment can be better and would call for jail terms for polluters "to initiate a strong direction."

PC Candidate Ken Atkinson defended the environmental record of the Tory government and mentioned the \$125 million Prime Minister Mulroney committed during this election campaign to help clean up the Great Lakes. He described the Free Trade agreement as chiefly an economic agreement and said its terms would not serve to harm the Canadian environment. He also mentioned the agreement's cancellation clause which would allow either country to terminate the agreement with a six-month notice.

Environmental activist Margherita Howe followed the candidates' speeches and spoke about the need to change our sense of values. "We are a very affluent society, we demand the use of herbicides, pesticides, we have much too much," she said.

Most of the questions were directed to PC Candidate Ken Atkinson. He was questioned by an angry woman who lives at the bottom of the Glenridge Landfill dump and who feels helpless to prevent the pollution of her back yard, and another who was distressed her pets have developed mouth cancer from drinking from Niagara's lakes and creeks and says she is looking to get out of this area.

This Hazardous Waste panel was one of two staged by the Region Niagara Political Issues Forum and was organized by Professor of Politics Pat Sewell.

(The previous night President White opened a Forum on "Hazardous Wastes: How Serious?" with Prof. Ian Brindle (Chemistry), Prof Mike Dickman (Biological Sciences) and Lynne Matthews (Envrionmentalist and President, Glenridge Landfill Citizens' Committee.)



PAY EQUITY: DEVELOPING AND IMPLEMENTING PAY EQUITY PLANS

The Pay Equity Commission has published a ten step process which employers can follow to develop and implement their pay equity plans. At Brock University, two Pay Equity Plans will be developed and posted by January 1, 1990. The ten steps are as follows:

l. Determine the establishment and the number of plans.

Within each establishment, a separate plan is required for:

-each certified bargaining unit-all other non-unionized employees.

Brock University is the establishment, and it will have two plans: one for CUPE 1295 and one which covers all other staff and faculty. The plan for faculty and staff will be comprised of separate sections which represent the established groups of employees.

For each plan, the University will:

2. Determine male and female job classes.

A job class is comprised of positions which: -have similar duties and responsibilities -require similar qualifications -have the same compensation schedule, salary grade or range of salary rates -have been filled by similar recruiting procedures

Examples of job classes at Brock University are Department Secretaries, Electricians, Circulation Clerks, Electronic Technicians, Faculty.

A female dominated job class is one where 60% of workers are female; a male dominated job class is one where 70% of workers are male. (These percentages reflect the proportion of females and males in the labour force, where approximately 45% of workers are female and 55% of workers are male.)

With respect to faculty, the job class may be defined as individual rank, discipline, or (as suggested by the COU/HAY study) all ranks making up one job class; each of the preceding would result in a male-dominated job class. The determination of job class and other matters relating to implementing pay equity will be done in consultation with the Brock University Faculty Association (BUFA).

Similarly, the determination of job classes and other pay equity matters related to staff will occur through consultation. To facilitate consultation, a task force will be established; members, who belong to the various employee groups on campus, will be sought. The terms of the task force and an invitation for volunteer participation will appear in the next newsletter.

3. Select method of job comparison.

The Hay Methodology (a point-factor system) will be used to make the comparisons among the non-unionized staff. The method of comparison for the unionized staff is yet to be determined.

4. Evaluate job classes.

All female job classes must be evaluated, while all male job classes must be listed in the pay equity plan, but not necessarily evaluated. Male job classes to which female job classes will be compared will be identified in step 5:

5. Determine possible comparable job classes.

All female job classes seek a male comparator job class.

6. Compare compensation of male and female job classes which are of equal or comparable value.

The legislation uses the term job rate plus benefits when referring to the compensation which must be compared. Job rate does not mean an individual's actual salary; it means the normal maximum rate of pay which will be paid for the position. At Brock, the job rate for staff whose positions are classified in a salary range is the maximum of the salary range. Suppose two jobs of equal value were paid as follows:

Α.	Job A (which is in a female job class)	Salary range = \$17000-\$25000	Individual's salary = \$19000
	Job B (which is in a male job class)	Salary range = \$17000-\$25000	Individual's salary = \$22000

In this example, the job rate is \$25000 and is the same for both the female and male job class; therefore, no change would be required.

B. If, however, the salary range for job A is \$17000-\$25000 and the salary range for job B is \$19000-\$28000, then the job rate is \$28000 and the salary range for Job A would be changed to \$19000-\$28000.

To illustrate this in a different way:

	female job class		male job class
IF	value	=	value
THEN	compensation	=	compensation

Differences in compensation are allowed for: formal seniority system, temporary training, red-circling, temporary skills shortage, formal merit system.

7. Determine adjustment required to achieve pay equity.

Using the above example, if the new job rate is \$28000, then the total difference is \$3000. This difference must be made up during the five years following the posting of the plan (i.e. by 1995).

8. Prepare the Pay Equity Plan. The document will:

-identify the establishment

-identify the group to which it applies

-list the male and female job classes

-identify the job classes that were compared

-describe the evaluation system

-list the permissible differences if applicable


-list female job classes where pay equity does not exist and describe how the compensation in those job classes will be adjusted to achieve pay equity -indicate the date of the first wage adjustments

9. Post the Pay Equity Plan.

At Brock, the Plan will be posted before or on January 1, 1990.

10. Begin making the required pay adjustments.

Pay adjustments at Brock will begin in 1990.

TERRY WHITE INSTALLED AS PRESIDENT

Dr. Terrence H. White was installed as third President of Brock University before last Friday night's convocation ceremonies. More than 100 guests witnessed his installation, including other university presidents and representatives, and officials from various levels of government.

Among them was Prof. Harry Arthurs, President of York University and of the Council of Ontario Universities, who in his remarks described Dr. White as "intelligent, vigorous, and a skillful academic administrator. And he is the right man for Brock today. This is a university on the move: it enjoys greater and greater popularity with the young people of Ontario, and greater and greater respect from other institutions across the country."

Dr. White's installation address focussed on the University's mandate to prepare students for the Twenty-First Century, pointing to the challenges of "globalization" with its increased language requirements, the growing need for lifelong learning, the "staggering influences of technology," the necessity to bridge the "gulf of incomprehension" between scientists and artists.

"Brock University was created," he continued," as a result of the foresight and determination of people in the Region and has thrived by maintaining close working relationships with the community. Certainly, it will be a priority of mine to not only continue those links, but to strengthen them and build new ones."

Philosophers Discuss Meaning Of "Human" At Brock

Philosophers from universities in Guelph, Toronto, Tennessee and Massachusetts will join Brock faculty in discussing different views of ourselves as humans, at the Autumn Colloquium of the Brock Philosophical Society, November 4 and 5.

Simply stated, humanism is concerned with the freedom and worth of the individual. 

- 1. ENDORSED, on the recommendation of CAP, the President's proposal concerning a Vice-President, Academic.
- 2. RECOMMENDED, to the President, certain changes to the proposed list of duties for the Vice-President, Academic and that consideration be given to providing the Vice-President, Academic with opportunities for normal scholarly activities.
- 3. APPROVED, on the recommendation of the Rules Committee, the establishment of a Campus Development Committee with the following terms of reference:

"In assisting Senate to advise the Board of Trustees on the development and effective use of the physical resources of the University, the Committee on Campus Development shall make recommendations on:

a) the creation, development and revision of a long-range plan for University development;

b) the requirements for and locations of buildings and other facilities, such as parking lots, roadways, paths and recreation areas;

c) the effective use of existing facilities, including the conversion of these facilities to new uses; and

- d) landscaping and campus beautification."
- 4. APPROVED, on the recommendation of SEP and GS&R, the awarding of 438 degrees at Fall Convocation (227 BAs, 31 BAdmins, 12 BBEs, 16 BEds, 26 BPhEds, 5 BRLSs, 41 BScs, 4 MAs, 2 MDivs, 66 MEds and 8 MScs).



S.R.O. At Crispo-Rae Debate

An overflow audience filled The Theatre plus an auxiliary viewing facility in TH 247 for last Wednesday's debate on whether the Free Trade Agreement is good for Canadians. The debate between John Crispo (for) and Bob Rae (against) was moderated by Dan McLean, news anchor for Channel 11, who were taping the event for delayed broadcast Saturday night. Panelists were Brock faculty members Nicolas Baxter-Moore and Arthur Smith, and George Szostak, business reporter for Newsroom 11.

The spirited, sometimes hot-tempered exchange between Crispo and Rae (who claim to be good friends despite their differences) was lightened by sparks of humour on both sides, like Rae's joke about the pig and the chicken discussing breakfast (pig=Canada, chicken=U.S., breakfast=Free Trade Agreement): "To you it's only breakfast," says the pig; "for me, it's life and death!"

Inspired by the debators' war-like tone, onlookers cheered or booed each comment, and lined up six deep at both audience microphones to ask questions. The debate started at 7:30 and was still going strong two hours later when the Channel 11 director rang the finish bell, knowing he must later edit the two hours down to a one-hour program. Channel 11 had scheduled the broadcast opposite Saturday night NHL hockey and *Dirty Dancing*.

No clear winner emerged from the combat. As one visitor from the States observed, both debators "seemed to have Canada's best interests at heart, but didn't appear to be reading from the same document. Crispo seemed to be talking about economics while Rae was talking about politics."





Alumni Association Teaching Award


It's time once again to reward the University's best teachers. Nominations are now being accepted for the Alumni Association's Award for Excellence in Teaching.

Nominees must be full-time members of faculty, hold regular faculty rank, and have completed at least three years of teaching service at Brock University. The nomination must include the names and addresses of two individuals, other than the nominator, who are prepared to comment upon the candidate's performance as a teacher, and a statement (no longer than 1,000 words) detailing the candidate's classroom instruction, consultation with students, thesis supervision, course and curriculum development.

"The alumni remember how important their professors were," says Mike Somerville, Coordinator of Alumni Affairs, "They want to continue to publicly recognise Brock's teachers in an effort to encourage excellence in teaching."

Former winners are: John Benjafield (psychology), Alan Arthur (history), Norah Carlsen (psychology), Martha Husain (philosophy), Angus Somerville (English), Don Ursino (biological sciences), Wayne Jolly (geological sciences), Vicki Soady (classics), and Bill Matheson (politics).

Nomination forms can be picked up at the Alumni Office (TH 263), and the deadline for submission is January 31, 1989.



The New Townhouses

The campus of Brock University will be home to 360 more students next September as a result of a new \$9-million-dollar townhouse development. Construction of the foundation is expected to begin this year to the west of parking lot B1 (south of campus). The development should reduce the residence waiting list by half, according to the Director of Residences, Jamie Fleming.

Brock University currently houses students at the DeCew, Shaver, and Queenston residences, but there is always more demand than supply. Brock has traditionally had the lowest proportion of on-campus residence accommodation to student population in the province. But last September, the Minister of Colleges and Universities, Lyn McLeod, announced a grant to subsidise interest on the townhouse mortgage over 20 years.

The townhouses have been designed by the St. Catharines firm of Flemming & Baker. Each unit will be fully-furnished with four single bedrooms, two-bathrooms, a kitchen and living room arranged in a split-level design. There will be no mandatory meal plan and students of either gender can apply in groups to live together, or individuals will be matched by the Housing Office. Each cluster of 15 townhouses will have a centre courtyard to create its own identity. There will also be 100 parking spots exclusively for townhouse residents.

Jamie Fleming says he anticipates a ratio of approximately 60 per cent first-year students and 40 per cent upper year students will form the townhouse population next September.

Holland Receives Biotech Research Grant

Chemistry Prof. Herbert L. Holland has been awarded an NSERC Strategic Grant of \$147,600 over a three-year period to research new ways of producing anthracycline antibiotics, which are used in cancer therapy. As currently made by purely chemical means, the drugs cost anywhere from \$1,000 to \$10,000 per gram. Holland's research would use fungi to speed up the work, making the drugs much less expensive. He expects to begin his research next February.

The Dean of Maths & Sciences, Arthur Houston, points out that only 1/4 to 1/3 of the applicants for these grants receive any funding. Prof. Holland's success reflects the similar research he just completed (also on a three-year NSERC Strategic Grant) toward a new method of making prostoglandin hormones, which control muscle contraction and body temperature. Medically they are used to induce labour, to control blood clotting, to treat ulcers, and to treat infertility in males, where the problem is not lack of sperm, but not enough prostoglandin to cause the muscular contractions in the female's vagina that carry the sperm to its target, the egg. Treatment with the old form of the hormone used to cost \$800. Holland's new method of production will greatly reduce the cost, making the treatment available to many more childless couples.



Brock Student Receives Environmental Research Award

Graduate student Xiao-chun Le will receive one of five Excellence in Environmental Research Awards next week at Environment Ontario's 1988 Technology Transfer Conference in Toronto. The award, which includes a check for \$1,000, will be presented by Minster for the Environment Jim Bradley.

Le, along with fellow Brock scientists, Chemistry Professor Ian Brindle and Graduate Research Assistant Barbara Buchanan, will also present at the conference the paper "Analysis of Germanium and Tin by Hybride Generation D.C. Plasma Atomic Emission Spectrometry: Application to Determinations of Germanium and Tin in Air Filters."

Prof. Brindle, former fourth-year student Ann Chu (now working at the Hospital for Sick Children in Toronto) and graduate student Xing-fang Li will present the paper "Determination of Organic and Inorganic Contaminants in the Welland River".

Prof. Tony Shaw will represent Brock's Geography Department with a summary of his paper "Feasibility Study for Assessing and Modelling Microclimatic Conditions on the Fonthill Kame (Phase I)." New MEd Specialisation

The University Senate has approved a new specialisation, Master of Education in Adult Education for College Personnel, which is now being offered as a pilot programme to instructors at Seneca College of Applied Arts and Technology.

This means that 18 students from Seneca College will receive this designation on their MEd degree this spring, according to College of Education Chairperson Patricia Cranton. The programme will be evaluated in April '89, and a decision will be made on whether it will be offered on a continuing basis in September.


At present, 18 per cent of MEd students are community teachers and The College of Education aims to meet their needs within the existing master's programme. As there is no systematic programme in Ontario for the professional development of community college personnel, Brock's offering is unique.




College of Education



25th Anniversary Fund \$240, 247 and Climbing

With almost half of Brock's faculty and staff yet to report, \$240, 247 has been raised in support of the 25th Anniversary Fund and the BASS building project. The achievement was reviewed at a canvassers meeting last Friday afternoon. At the meeting, President White announced a commitment from a single, to date anonymous member of the Board of Trustees. The donation is triple the total funds raised by the Board for the Science Development Fund.

Canvassers are urged to complete follow up calls. Faculty and staff who are still considering their support of the campaign are asked to return their pledges by Friday, December 16.

Fifty per cent of Brock's 688 staff and faculty members contributed to the Fund which includes appeals for both the (BASS) and the 25th Anniversary Scholarship Fund.

The Scholarship Fund drew \$57,454 (\$97,960 had been previously pledged) for a total of \$155,414. Fifty-seven faculty members donated an average gift of \$622, and 96 staff members pledged an average gift of \$229. The interest on the endowment will be used to provide entrance and in-course scholarships to students with high academic achievement. As well, 177 pledges were made to the BASS campaign. Forty-three faculty members pledged an average of \$887 each, and 134 staff pledged an average gift of \$348 each. The total to date is \$84,832. This support will augment funds for the capital campaign to construct a new academic building.

Visiting Scholar Award

Biology Prof. Mike Dickman has been awarded the Ontario-Jiangsu Educational Exchange Programme Visiting Scholar Award. He will spend two months next spring studying one of China's largest lakes—Lake Taiho—along with Prof. Zheng Changsu of the Nanjing Institute of Geography and Limnology.

From May to June, Prof. Dickman will study the lake which, while expansive, is never any deeper than 15 feet. "Why is it so massive and yet so shallow?", Prof. Dickman wants to know. As well, he and Prof. Changsu will take cross-sections of the sediment of the lake bed, date them, and compare the data to see if their findings correspond to written history.

This is Prof. Dickmans's second trip to China. The results of his last trip (in 1986) will be published as a chapter in the the CRC Press book, "Acid Stress and Aquatic Microbial Interactions."







What Are We All About?

President Terry White has formed a Planning Steering Committee (PSC) to draft a mission statement for Brock University. The purpose of the mission statement, Dr. White says, is to provide a clear outline of who we are and what kind of university we aspire to be in the next decade or so.

The PSC will serve to develop a preliminary set of "cornerstones" which will allow for future planning by other groups on issues concerning the size of Brock's student population and curriculum review. The mission statement will be submitted to the Committee on Academic Policy, then to the Senate, and from the Senate to the Board of Trustees.

President White says ample opportunities will be provided for input from a wide range of interested individuals and groups. The Planning Steering Committee is just beginning its work and will be providing regular progress reports. Vice-President, Academic

Last month Dr. Bill Matheson who has been teaching politics at Brock for 19 years, was appointed Vice-President, Academic. This new position will give Vice-President Matheson new areas of responsibility including academic budgets (75 per cent of the University's total) and academic planning. He will continue to act as chief excecutive and academic officer in the absence of the President.


Bill Matheson had been serving as Vice-President of the University when President Terry White recommended redefining his job description and title. Dr. White wrote to the Senate and Board of Trustees:

"In the brief time that I have been here at Brock it is apparent to me that if I am to be responsible for overseeing all operations of the University (the academic and non-academic), and to meet the expectations communicated to me by the Committee on the Presidency that I should endeavour to be active in the community, communicate regularly with the various publics, facilitate fund development, and so on, I will not have sufficient time to focus on the day-to-day academic administrative activities exclusively as is required by the scale of our operations.

Certainly, there is no question that the President continues to have a major interest and involvement in the academic affairs of the University, even when there is a Vice-President, Academic. The distinction is that the Vice-President, Academic works on day-to-day academic matters and coordinates with the Deans and Department Chairs academic policy recommendations. The President continues to work with academic officers on broader academic policy, strategy, and planning issues.

....this clarification and adjustment of duties and responsibilities for the Vice-President, Academic will ensure a balanced relationship between the academic and administrative sides of the University.

Vice-President Matheson holds four degrees. After completing his MBA (Western) degree, he worked in private industry for 10 years, and then went to Nigeria to under



take development projects (specifically constructing fish ponds) with Canadian Crossroads. "It stimulated me to change the direction of my life," he said recently. While there, he worked mainly with university students and decided there were other things he wanted to do; these things involved being around university students.

Armed with his MBA and a BA (economics, Dalhousie University), he went to Carleton University to earn an MA and PhD in political science. (His PhD thesis on the Canadian Cabinet was published by Metheun Publishing Co.) He then accepted an offer to teach at Brock University and has remained here throughout until his recent appointment as Vice-President, Academic.

"My job is to administer day-to-day academic matters and to provide academic leadership," he says, "This includes doing whatever I can to allow the academic community to teach well and carry on high quality research."

Vice-President Matheson says he tries to provide encouragement and to allocate resources where possible. He describes lack of adequate funding as the University's greatest downfall, and the commitment to undergraduate teaching and research as its greatest strength.

"We don't have a high-turnover of staff, and yet our salaries are not the highest," he says, "I'm sure many of our faculty have had other offers, and I have too."

Ideally, he says, he would like to see the University expand in physical size and budget but keep the numbers of students and faculty and staff. He would like to see the university receive funding to start new programmes, such as nursing.

In addition to his administrative duties, Vice-President Matheson continues to teach a second-year politics course. (He was the first recipient of the Alumni Teaching Award). At interview time, he was preparing to mark 150 term papers. He doesn't plan to give up his teaching responsibilities.

"I love teaching. I think that teaching reminds me of what we're all about."

\$4,000 from the Shaver Hospital Foundation

Chemistry Prof. H. Holland recently received word from Ross T. Sawle, President of the Shaver Hospital Foundation, that \$4,000 will be donated toward upgrading Brock's Nuclear Magnetic Resonance (NMR) Equipment.

According to Prof. Holland, the \$4,000 will go toward the \$12,000 cost of adding a variable temperature accessory to the NMR equipment to make it easier to figure out molecular structures. Since his work involves researching anti-cancer drugs, the Shaver Hospital Foundation had a relevant

interest in the equipment, Holland said. He hopes to raise the balance of the money needed through NSERC grants, private donations, and university allocations.


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

Senate Synopsis

At its 339th meeting, held on Wednesday, December 7th, Senate:

1. APPROVED, as part of its consideration of the Joint BAC/CAP Report, the following motions:

a) That Senate ask the President to restore the original flexibility in timetabling by permitting two and three hour teaching blocks.

b) That Senate as the President to implement the following:

i) the provision/maintenance of adequate low cost furniture in selected areas;

ii) the provision of more chairs and blackboards in seminar rooms, including the repair of damaged chairs, such that the actual capacity is the same as the supposed capacity; and

iii) the opening of the Tower Cafeteria and/or Pond Inlet after the normal hours of operation to provide student study space (this would also reduce pressure on Library space),

c) That Senate ask the President to explore the possibility of extending the hours of operation of the Micro Labs and/or Terminal Labs, perhaps with minimal services.

d) That, as the immediate short term priority is Library acquisitions (in accordance with divisional priorities), the budget reflect this and disbursements be authorized, beginning with the current year.

e) That, after Library acquisitions, budget priority be given equally to:

- i) research support, in accordance with divisional priorities;
- ii) the establishment of a Research Fellowship Fund; and
- iii) scholarships.

2. APPROVED, on the recommendation of APC, changes in the major program requirements for Communication Studies and the Department of Computer Science and Information Processing.

3. TABLED, until such time as CAP can bring forward recommended criteria for the establishment of departments, a recommendation from CAP that Senate approve the designation of Music as a department separate from Fine Arts.

4. APPROVED, on the recommendation of CAP, Canadian Studies as a combined major program.

5. APPROVED, on the recommendation of Striking Committee, the appointment of Professor C. Sales as a member of SCAD (to replace Professor S. E. Wilson).

Although many aspects of implementing pay equity at Brock University, and elsewhere, will be determined by legislation, all organizations must make important decisions which will affect the development and content of the posted pay equity plan(s). Examples of these decisions would be determining job classes; selecting those jobs which will serve as "benchmarks" against which other jobs will be compared; deciding the timing, order, and distribution of pay adjustments.

Our wish, at Brock University, is to learn about and respond to questions and concerns related to pay equity from employees of the University community. To this end, all interested employees are invited to put forward their views; one such vehicle for doing so is through this newsletter where written questions, directed to Personnel Services, can be answered. Other opportunities will be available at Pay Equity Information Seminars which will begin in the New Year.

More direct consultation and participation related to developing the staff section of the Pay Equity Plan is being sought through volunteer participation on an advisory task force, whose terms of reference appear in this newsletter. (BUFA is being consulted with respect to the faculty section of the Pay Equity Plan.) The task force for staff should be representative of the employee groups on campus, and, as the Pay Equity Guidelines suggest, should include employees of both sexes, of varying ages and years of experience, of a number of different occupations and different occupational levels.

committee comprised of several of its members.

The Dean of Social Science, Lou Soroka, has agreed to act as chair of the Advisory Committee. Harold Leece, Director of Personnel Services, Cindy Paskey, Manager of Employment and Salary Administration and a consultant from Hay Management Consultants will sit as members and will provide data and reference material for the committee's review and consideration.

Anyone interested in serving on the task force is invited to write a short note, addressed to Harold Leece or Cindy Paskey, indicating your interest; responses should be received by January 5, 1989.

The immediate goal is to post the Pay Equity Plan, as required, by the end of 1989. Once the Plan is posted, a review of all other positions, to ensure internal equity, will be done; requests for position reviews which have already been received and which have been postponed will also be reviewed and acted upon while the pay equity review is underway, but will not necessarily be included in the posted Pay Equity Plan.

The terms of reference for the Advisory Committee include consideration of and deciding on a range of policy and procedure matters, many of which coincide with the steps (outlined in the October 26, 1988 Pay Equity newsletter) involved in developing and implementing pay equity plans. Not every step, however, will require consideration; for instance, Step 1 (Determine the establishment and the number of plans) has been specified by the legislation and requires that the establishment, Brock University, will have two plans. Step 3 (Select method of job comparison) has been decided upon; the Hay Methodology will be used to evaluate all non-unionized positions. As well as deciding on policy and procedure, Committee members will learn how to evaluate jobs and will participate in the selection and evaluation of benchmark jobs against which other jobs will be compared for evaluation purposes. It is anticipated that staff in the Personnel Office will evaluate the remaining jobs.

ADVISORY COMMITTEE ON PAY EQUITY

TERMS OF REFERENCE

To consider and review pay equity legislation and guidelines and decide on the following matters involved in developing and posting Brock University's pay equity plan:

-determine male and female job classes

-review and identify male job classes to which female job classes will be compared

-determine the range which constitutes comparable value (i.e. how close in value must two job classes be before a pay adjustment is required)

-decide on the process by which the job content of the job classes is collected (ex: who completes the questionnaire, who approves the questionnaire, how is the job content reviewed before an evaluation is done)

-review the job questionnaire which will be used to collect job content information and the glossary of terms which will be used when completing the questionnaire


-develop a procedure to deal with employee questions and complaints

-respond to employee questions and complaints

-review and recommend the content of information seminars which will be held beginning in 1989

-review the pay equity plan before it is posted


Doors With Technical Difficulties

What do Mike Pelino and John Brophy have in common? Nada. NHL coach Brophy will spend the holidays ruminating about his last place Leafs while Brock coach Pelino will relax satisfied with the first term Badger position. Number one.

Brock defeated McMaster 11-6 to clinch first place in the Ontario Universities Athletic Association West Division with 16 points. Trailing are Ryerson with 15 points, Windsor with 13 points, and McMaster and Laurentian with three each. (Two points are awarded for a win and one for a tie game.) Last year, Brock was in second place at Christmas.

"I'm really proud of them," Pelino said in a recent interview, "It's been a demanding season." Brock played each team in its division four times and each team out of its division once. The team has an 8-3 record.

Pelino credits goaltender Dennis Schrapp and team captain Bill Dowd with providing strong performances, but adds that the team's talent is well-balanced with an even distribution in scoring points between about 10 players.

After Christmas, the Badgers will play a schedule of 19 games before playoffs. The first game after the holidays is to be played against the strong team of Trois Rivieres. Action begins at 7:30 pm on Friday, January 13, 1989 at the Thorold Arena. Rates are reduced for fans wearing red.

Operating Grants Increase Tuition Fees Increase

Total provincial operating grants to Ontario's universities will increase by \$116.2 million or 7.5 percent in 1989/90, the Minister of Colleges and Universities said last week. But that doesn't necessarily mean Brock will get a 7.5 percent increase.

"We won't know exactly what increase we'll get until at least next spring," says Terry Varcoe,Vice-President, Administration. He explains that the \$116.2 million will be divided according to various funding formulas and that the University is guaranteed a 4 percent increase in base funding. Varcoe says the increase just keeps pace with inflation, and is the usual yearly increase allocated to Ontario universities.

Tuition fees will also be raised 7.5 percent (or about \$107 for a full-time student) in direct proportion to the increase in government funding. At Brock, tuition fees represent approximately 24 percent of the University's operating budget.

The Good ol' Green and Red

Brock's Schmon Tower is a shining beacon of Christmas green and red thanks to Operations and Maintenance Manager George Martin and his electrical staff of Fred Durksen and Ken Enns. Equipped with safety-belts running through the doors behind the tower lights, they substituted one hundred thirty 150-watt flood lamps to add a special Christmas touch to the Niagara Peninsula landmark.

Martin says Director of Physcial Plant Bill Armstrong came up with the idea and the tradition began last year.

Award to Dixon

Tim Dixon, a senior student in Recreation and Leisure Studies, has won the Recreationists' Association of West Central (RAWCO) Ontario Student Award. The award is made for exceptional performance in academic work, field placements and volunteer work. It includes a \$100 prize, commemorative plaque and one-year free membership to RAWCO.

Dixon is a Georgetown native and also a member of the varsity wrestling team. John Larsen, Chairman of the Department of Recreation and Leisure Studies, said Dixon is a "A" student who started off with 65 percent average in first year and finished with 85 at the end of third. He commended Dixon's performance during his internship with the Wisconsin Department of Correctional Services where he was involved in adventure-based counselling. He also had a strong record of voluntary service with such groups as OPIRG and the World Leisure Congress.

Wildlife Toxicology Fund

The Wildlife Toxicology Fund is a co-operative grant program supported by Environment Canada, World Wildlife Fund, Noranda, Alcan, Inco, and the provincial governments of Ontario and Quebec. The purpose of this programme is to provide highquality scientific information that can be directly applied to the protection of wildlife in Canada from harm caused by toxic chemicals. Research proposals will be funded to a maximum of 50 percent of the cost of a project, with remaining funds to come from a public or private source. There are no formal deadlines for applicants, as proposals will be evaluated on an on-going basis as they are received. Contact the Research Grants Office for guidelines and applications.

Parking Permits
