First Generation program receives \$150,000 for student 'pioneers'



The Ontario Ministry of Training, Colleges and Universities has earmarked \$150,000 for Brock University's 2006-2007 First Generation program.

First Generation students are academic pioneers, the first

in their immediate families to attend university. The initiative, developed by Student Services, ensures these students experience a smooth transition into their university academic careers.

The ministry provided seed funding of \$85,000 for the 2005-2006 program. The University also received funding to award 10 First Generation students with bursaries of \$2,500 each.

"This important investment will make it easier for these students to receive the kind of education that their families had not experienced in the past," said St. Catharines MPP Jim Bradley. "I know that this funding, along with the excellent learning environment and support services at Brock University, will make their transition to post-secondary education and future employment that much smoother.'

Jesse Barraza, First Generation Coordinator, said the overall purpose of the program will be further advanced with the additional ministry funding: "We are here to help ease first generation students into Brock and to create a community where the students feel comfortable and supported."

At Brock, 460 students have selfidentified as first generation students. Jill Brindle, Senior Learning Skills Instructor, Student Development Centre, said the additional funding strengthens existing First Generation academic

programs. Among the planned initiatives are:

- Hiring Learning Skills Instructors to provide academic support in the form of one-on-one coaching;
- Organizing small study groups for first generation students;
- Offering assistance in time management or academic pursuits such as essay writing;
- Developing coping strategies for possible academic setbacks;
- Strengthering established partnerships, such as with Services for Students With disABILITIES, Aboriginal Student Services, International Services, SMART Start, Community Connections, the Faculty of Mathematics and Science, and others.
- Reaching out to Niagara high school students to provide information about life at university.

Human rights advocate named to Order of Ontario

Professor Dorothy Griffiths, a recognized leader in services for persons with intellectual disabilities and mental health concerns, was one of 29 people invested into the Order of Ontario by Lt.-Gov. James K. Bartleman at an investiture ceremony on Dec. 20 at Queen's Park.

"It is humbling to receive an award for doing work for which I have great passion. Persons who have an intellectual disability and a mental health challenge represent a neglected group of individuals," said Griffiths, Department of Child and Youth Studies. "I am only one of many individuals and organizations who have been creating awareness for the need for expanded research and changed practice within the social service and mental health fields to better support individuals with this dual challenge."

She added: "I am so honoured that my students and colleagues from the

University and the community would choose to recognize my work by nominating me for such a prestigious award, and further honoured by this recognition from the Province. Many of my colleagues share this recognition with me, for it is our collective efforts that have made a difference."

Frances Owen, Chair, Department of Child and Youth Studies, said: "Dr. Griffiths is a passionately committed scientist practitioner whose work has influenced countless community professionals, people with disabilities, policy makers and students. She is an international pioneer who has never lost sight of local needs. Her commitment to human rights protection and education continues to have a profound influence on the quality of life for people with disabilities."

New film resource available at Library

The James A. Gibson Library has recently acquired a copy of the four-volume Schirmer Encyclopedia of Film, thanks to the generosity of Professor Barry Grant, Department of Communications, Popular Culture and Film.

Grant served as editor-in-chief of this major work (and also contributed several entries) published by Thomson Gale in 2006. The A-Z encyclopedia is a comprehensive reference set devoted to film studies, with relevance to interdisciplinary studies in areas such as art, literature, history and the social sciences. The work contains 200 topic entries and more than 230 career profiles, and is richly illustrated with 500 images, 150 of which are in colour. More than 100 scholars from 20 countries contributed to the publication. The Schirmer Encyclopedia of Film is available in the Reference Collection on the main floor of the Library under the call number PN 1993.45 S35 2007.

Biology graduate students tops at conference

Graduate students Dawn Hall (Biology) and Dylan Levac (Biotechnology), who work under Professor Vincenzo DeLuca, along with Amanda Rochon (Biotechnology) and Patrick Boyle (Biotechnology), who work under Professor Charles Després, attended the Eastern Regional Meeting of the Canadian Society of Plant Physiologists at McMaster University on Dec. 2. PhD candidate Rochon was awarded the prize for the best oral presentation by a panel of professors from various universities. Her work explains the molecular mechanisms required for the activation of defence genes when plants are exposed to disease-causing microorganisms. PhD candidate Hall was awarded the honorary mention for her presentation on the production of health-promoting resveratrol found in grape berries and wine.

MSc candidate Levac was awarded the prize for the best poster presentation for his work describing how the rosy periwinkle of Madagascar produces valuable anti-cancer molecules.



Late in 2005, Brock received funding of \$550,000 from the Ontario Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care and was able to purchase one infant simulator, a neonatal model, two adult males for critical care and trauma exercises, a nursing mother, and one child. A control room with two-way mirrors was installed to house the computer equipment. Brock also acquired a life-support system, crash cart, drug cart, virtual IVs and other equipment designed to enhance the medical skills of Brock's nursing students in a realistic patient-care environment.

Studies. "Professor Griffiths' award is richly deserved. Her work in supporting the human rights of those with developmental disabilities represents a profound contribution to our society."

Rose added, "I am especially respectful of her work with our graduate students in Applied Disability Studies and Child and Youth Studies. The importance of her success in training students who will take the lead in implementing social change in this sector cannot be overstated."

Griffiths has extensive experience in working on clinical issues regarding dual diagnosis – persons who have an intellectual disability and a mental health need. She is a researcher, instructor and mentor who has initiated groundbreaking therapeutic programs such as positive therapeutic approaches for treating persons with severe challenging behaviour.

She is currently involved in research related to the human rights of persons with intellectual disabilities as a leading member of the 3Rs Community-University Research Alliance team from Brock University and the Community Living Associations in Niagara, spearheaded by Community Living Welland Pelham. Griffiths was also one of the founders of Brock's new graduate

program in Applied Disabilities Studies, which has enrolled 60 students in its inaugural year.

Griffiths has been a member and advisory member of three board of directors for associations serving persons with developmental disabilities and mental health challenges: Community Living Welland Pelham, the National Association for Dual Diagnosis and its Ontario chapter. She also serves on the editorial boards for the Journal of Developmental Disabilities and Developmental Disabilities Bulletin.

She has co-authored/co-edited several books, including: Changing Sexually Inappropriate Behavior: A Community-Based Approach for Persons With Developmental Disabilities (1989); An introduction to the mental health needs of person with developmental disabilities (2002); Ethical Dilemmas: Sexuality and Developmental Disabilities (2002); Demystifying Syndromes (2004) and Practice Guidelines for Diagnostic, Treatment and Related Support Services for Persons with Developmental Disabilities and Serious Behavioral Problems (2006).

The Order of Ontario is the province's most prestigious official honour and was created in 1986 by the Government of Ontario to recognize the highest level of individual excellence and achievement in any field.

Construction of Plaza2006 in final phase

Plaza2006, Brock University's new "front door," is nearing completion.

Many offices are furnished and ready for occupation, concrete floors are polished, wood cladding hugs the interior walls and light pours in through massive windows even during a bleak winter day.
At the same time, dust blankets surfaces

and the sounds of construction fill the air as tradespeople work to complete the unfinished areas by the end of February. Plaza2006 is a \$22.6-million complex

under construction on the east side of the Alumni Student Centre. The five-storey, 86,000-square-foot building will redefine Brock's front entrance and house a diversity of "addresses."

The ground floor will contain a significantly expanded University Bookstore and a direct link to the Alumni Student Centre. The second and third floors will house the departments of Economics and Political Science, computer labs, classrooms and seminar rooms, and also will link to the student centre on the second floor. The upper two floors will contain research facilities for the Lifespan Development Research Centre (LDRC), a complex unique in

Terry Boak, Provost and Vice-President, Academic, said Plaza2006 "sets a high standard for buildings and provides another vision of how space can be developed."

The facility's design pays attention to the fact that students today have different learning styles from in the past, said Boak. "In my day, students went to the library and worked in private. Today, many students enjoy learning in social environments. Plaza2006, with its emphasis on inviting and stimulating spaces for student gatherings, accommodates learning in both group

interaction and individual pursuits."
The LDRC is a collaborative effort between various academic departments, providing a centralized location of expertise to study how development occurs across the human lifespan. It will bring together more than 50 faculty members and 40 community organizations to better understand issues ranging from infant development and teen gambling to questions of changes in cognition and health in aging.

"The building is coming along very quickly now," says Professor Sid Segalowitz, Psychology, one of the driving forces behind the LDRC project. "The initial move or occupancy is planned for late February, although the process of setting up the new labs may continue after that for a few weeks. We have been taking Lifespan researchers through during the construction to see the centre, and there is a lot of excitement about the new facilities."

Trudy Lockyer, Director, Bookstore Operations, says the key to a successful move to the new facility is to be well

"Each section in the current Bookstore will be packed and labelled and then taken to the new site's corresponding section, which will have been labelled well in advance of the move," she says.

Lockyer estimates it will take about two weeks to organize the new site before the actual transfer takes place.

The new home of the Bookstore and LDRC showcases structural components such

Due to his excellent training and experience, Robinson was able to keep his palate fresh throughout the challenge.

In the special amateur category where up-and-coming wine professionals are allowed to compete, two Brock students placed second and

third. Amy Blake, oenology and viticulture graduate student in Professor Gary Pickering's lab, garnered second place. Blake's studies at Brock are a continuation of her academic work, which included top honours in the grape and wine studies program. Securing a strong third-place finish was oenology and viticulture undergraduate student Rhiannon Plant. She was thrilled by her placement and is already looking forward to next year's competition.

"We are so proud of our students" placements," said Isabelle Lesschaeve, Director of the Cool Climate Oenology and Viticulture Institute at Brock. "As the administering and auditing body of this very important competition, we at CCOVI ensure a rigorous and equitable challenge. It was wonderful to see our students rise above the stiff competition. I believe that these results once again reflect the strength of our grape and wine studies program."

as ductwork, a visible element of the design. Integral to the project are the exterior materials: copper cladding, Niagara Escarpment stone, and the liberal use of glass. The interior of the building features wood, a warming element, in social gathering places, polished concrete floors and more escarpment stone.

Project design architect Brian MacKay-Lyons of MacKay-Lyons Sweetapple Architects Ltd. in Halifax has described Plaza2006 as a systems facility of "frugal beauty."

The contractor for Plaza2006 is Merit Contractors Niagara, which is headquartered in St. Catharines.



Brock to offer two new master's programs

Marilyn Rose, Dean, Graduate Studies, is pleased to announce that the Ontario Council of Graduate Studies has approved Master of Arts programs in the Departments of History and Geography.

trade mission to india results in agreement

As part of its efforts to establish and expand international academic partnerships and relationships, Brock University President Jack Lightstone signed an agreement with one university and

initiated discussions with others during an Ontario trade mission to India in January.

Lightstone was one of about 100 delegates, representing educational, research, business and cultural interests, who travelled to the country regarded as one of the world's leading emerging markets.

"Just about everyone acknowledges that India is the new China," said Lightstone.
"That India is a world economic power is absolutely evident, and if we are to understand our place in a global context, we have to understand India."

He added: "In this globalized world, with exchanges of goods, services and information, we have to learn how to get along with our neighbours."

The agreement was signed with YCM Open University in Mumbai, the heart of a major wine-producing area of India. Brock and YCM are interested in partnering in and developing programs in respect to wine making and wine tasting, and jointly developing business programs oriented to grape growers and wine producers. A joint interest in biotechnology could produce future partnerships.

Lightstone said he also had opportunities to speak to representatives at the University of Delhi about an exchange of faculty and graduate students in the field of biotechnology. Maharshi Dayanand University near Delhi also expressed interest in partnering in the areas of

biotechnology, bioscience and education.

Representatives of Jawaharlal Nehru University in New Delhi, primarily an institution for graduate students, expressed a great deal of interest in establishing partnerships and exchanges in Brock's Social Justice and Equity Studies program and Canadian Studies, plus in areas of biotechnology, biochemistry, and the environment, said Lightstone.

He added that there were initial discussions about negotiating with Panjab University a two-plus-two arrangement (undergraduate students complete two years of study in India and their final two years at Brock) in the areas of biotechnology, microbiology, biochemistry, and computer science. Panjab University is also interested in partnerships in the area of business education.

The advantage of "piggybacking" as a delegate on the trade mission, said Lightstone, is the implicit and explicit support of the provincial government.

"We have a right to call on the Province to facilitate these exchanges and relationships," said Lightstone. "The academic delegates have requested a group debriefing with the Ministry of Training, Colleges and Universities to see how to make these exchanges easier and how to better market Ontario universities."

Ontario Premier Dalton McGuinty, who led the mission, urged delegates at the beginning of the tour to promote the province's diversity when seeking partnerships.

"Our diversity gives us every opportunity to succeed, especially when it's combined with our competitive business costs and our highly skilled, highly educated and highly motivated workforce," said McGuinty.

Ontario is home to 500,000 Ontarians of Indian descent, said McGuinty, "people who have found success in every walk of life, and that is a real source of strength for us as we compete for new investment and jobs in India."



Brock researchers study exercise and osteoporosis

Members of Brock's Osteoporosis
Prevention and Research Group from the
Department of Physical Education and
Kinesiology are currently leading a study
examining the effectiveness of an exercise
program designed for older women with
osteoporosis.

Professors Allan Adkin, Kimberley Gammage and Nota Klentrou are studying the impact of a specific exercise regimen on balance confidence, mobility, strength, body image, quality of life and fall risk.

"The main goal of this project is to design and evaluate the usefulness of an exercise program, incorporating balance training, strength, and cardiovascular activities in order to reduce the risk of falling in older women with osteoporosis. The outcomes of this study are especially critical to provide strategies to enhance quality of life in this population," says Gammage. "It is well-known that physical activity contributes to improved bone health. However, no studies have examined the effectiveness of a physical activity program to address balance confidence,

body image, postural stability and falls."

Falling is a significant issue for individuals with osteoporosis. As the result of a fall, significant physical complications, such as fractures, can occur. Furthermore, psychological complications, such as fear of falling or low balance confidence, can result from a fall or even the threat of a fall. Other psychological changes from osteoporosis, such as poorer body image, may also result.

These physical and psychological consequences can modify behaviour, presenting a considerable challenge for maintaining mobility, independence, and quality of life in older women with osteoporosis.

The Osteoporosis Prevention and Research Group is still inviting women who fit the criteria to take part in this new research project examining the effectiveness of exercise in postmenopausal women with osteoporosis.

New measures enforce campus speed limit

Inspector John Trevisonn of Brock's Campus Security Services has two words for drivers around campus: "Slow down."

As the University has grown, traffic flow throughout the campus has increased – including on evenings and weekends. Compounding the congestion are the number of public transit and service vehicles on campus.

One method being used to help combat speeding vehicles is a new radar speed monitor. Last year, Campus Security personnel, with the assistance of Parking Services, used a trial machine that flashed the current speed of vehicles to drivers. Studies have shown that most drivers will respond to unattended radar speed monitors by slowing almost immediately.

Determining that there is a legitimate concern of speeding vehicles on campus, a proactive approach was taken to curtail speeders when a radar speed monitor was purchased by Campus Security late last year.

The "SpeedMinder" unit, which will be moved among several locations around campus, will also be a constant reminder to everyone who frequents or visits the University to monitor his or her speed.

"I would strongly suggest that drivers accustom themselves to operating their vehicles within the campus posted speed limit of 40 kmh," says Trevisonn. "Obey the speed limit, be part of the solution."

With the assistance of Parking Services, speed monitoring will occur at different locations at different times of the day, year round. Registered owners will be notified of multiple infractions.

Help needed in reducing vandalism

Campus Security Services is asking for the assistance of the Brock community in helping to eliminate vandalism on campus. In the past two years, damage to buildings, lighting, windows, and doors has been reported.

International experts in creative arts therapies coming to Brock

As Canadians face the challenge of maintaining healthy communities within ever-growing costs to health care, increasing attention is given to the role of the arts in fostering wellness. Brock is considering developing a program in Creative Arts Therapies, and from Wednesday, March 28 to Saturday, March 31, the University will bring together leaders in this field for a public symposium.

A joint initiative of the Faculty of Humanities and the Faculty of Applied Health Sciences with the support of Rodman Hall Arts Centre, the symposium will offer the opportunity to explore potential benefits for the Niagara region. 

Conference submissions exhibit diversity of research

Graduate students and researchers from all six academic Faculties submitted abstracts to the second annual Mapping the New Knowledges Conference to be held Tuesday, April 10 and Wednesday, April 11 in Pond

Ninety-five abstracts, a significant increase from last year, were submitted to the Conference Program Committee by the Feb. 5 deadline. Of the submissions, 82 are from graduate students and 13 are from faculty members. There will be 53 oral presentations and 42 poster presentations.

Research topics show a great range in diversity, including presentations about active living and public leisure services, the social implications of Alfred Tennyson's Idylls of the King, female risk-taking behaviours, new approaches in mortuary archaeology in the Bronze Age, a transdisciplinary approach to understanding dominant autism discourses, potential applications to liquid laundry formulations, the impact of inhaled corticosteroids on bone properties in children and adolescents, and the impact of childhood obesity on bone

Marilyn Rose, Dean, Graduate Studies, said the conference is a tremendous opportunity to showcase and celebrate Brock's research initiatives and to familiarize graduate students with a professional process by which knowledge is disseminated.

"These research papers and posters are an indication of great strides Brock has made in its transformation to a research-intensive university," said Michael Owen, Associate Vice-President, Research. "The close connections between teaching, mentoring and research emerge from these collaborations between our faculty and our graduate students."

Brock President Jack Lightstone will deliver the keynote address at 7 p.m. on April 10 and Dr. Noreen Golfman, president of the Canadian Federation for the Humanities and Social Sciences, will deliver the plenary address at 9 a.m. on April 11.

New this year are adjudicated prizes for both oral and poster presentations, and many of the student presenters have indicated a desire to have their research submissions judged by an adjudication committee.

Of the 34 graduate students whose research will be judged, 19 are oral presentations and 15 are poster presentations.

Coming Soon... The Learning Commons

Planning for the Brock Learning Commons has gained considerable momentum in recent months. With input from students, the learning commons partners and various advisory groups, Diamond & Schmitt Architects Inc. completed a major feasibility study in late 2006, and produced an exciting design layout that incorporates and transforms the upper level of the former University Bookstore and the main floor of the James A. Gibson Library. Floor plans and artist renderings will be on display in the Library in the near future.

The successful BUSU referendum outcome last November marked a significant milestone for the Learning Commons. In that referendum, students provided a strong endorsement of the Learning Commons by approving a proposal to commit \$1 million to the project over the next five years.

In developing an architectural design for the Learning Commons, the major focus has been on the creation of academic space that will promote and facilitate informal learning (the learning that takes place outside the classroom). Planning has been informed by site visits to learning commons at other universities and by the developing body of research related to the relationship between design and independent learning. It is clear that a number of elements are critical for such a space to be successful:

- it should be welcoming, comfortable, and inspiring - this involves physical comfort (furniture, ambience and proximity to food), as well as display space to celebrate the accomplishments of learning;
- it must provide group study space in support of collaborative learning, as well as areas for individual study, with appropriate zoning for noise;
- it must offer a robust technology infrastructure where students may use provided equipment or their own wireless devices; and it must afford ready access to an array of learning support services. With respect to this last requirement, the Brock Learning Commons incorporates a Writing Centre, thereby providing increased emphasis on services that will help students improve their writing

The design of the Learning Commons will facilitate the integration of learning support services provided by the Learning Commons partners (Library, Student Development Centre, Career Services, and the Centre for Teaching, Learning and Educational Technologies.) Collaborative programming will provide students with opportunities to acquire basic essential skills, and will help them to establish connections among processes such as critical thinking, studying, reading strategies, information seeking and essay writing. Student peers will play a vital role in the delivery of Learning Commons programming, and will serve as important role models to other students. Referrals to additional support services on campus, such as academic advising, also will be an important aspect of service delivery.

Regular updates on the Learning Commons project will be provided over the next few months as the pace of development increases.

Brock Student Ambassadors have another "outstanding" year

Once again, the Brock Student Ambassadors have brought home a coveted award. At this year's CASE/ASAP District II conference, held at Philadelphia University, Penn., the Brock Student Ambassadors received the prestigious Outstanding External Program Award. They were competing against 20 schools from Canada and the United States. The award was granted for their Brock Student Ambassador Bursary Award. The Ambassadors created the bursary by donating \$10,000 through the Ontario Trust for Student Support (OTSS) program. Their donation was matched by the government and realized a sum in excess of \$23,000 for the bursary.

The Ambassadors also won the coveted Spirit Award. This is given to the school that not only shows spirit for their own school but encourages spirit in students from other schools.

The recent "apple juice war" challenge between the Ambassadors and staff members of the Office of Alumni Relations, Development and Donor Relations and University Communications generated approximately 100 large cans of apple juice, which Ambassadors donated to the Out of the Cold Program where they volunteer weekly.



The Brock University men's wrestling team captured their ninth straight Canadian Interuniversity Sport (CIS) Wrestling Championship on March 3 at the University of Saskatchewan. Brock and Simon Fraser University (SFU) tied with 53 points each, but the tiebreaker was determined by total gold medals; Brock had two golds to SFU's one. The host Huskies placed third with 51 points

Fifth-year student Jamie Macari (St. Catharines) made history, becoming the first wrestler to finish his varsity career with five straight OUA and CIS individual titles. He

ended his University career with a perfect 35-0 record at OUA and CIS championships. In the championship final at 54 kg, Macari won by technical superiority over University of Alberta's Anthony Kulak. Macari also was named the CIS Most Outstanding Wrestler of the Year and was the recipient of the R. W. Pugh Award for Fair Play. Macari was the original CIS Male Rookie of the Year in 2002-03.

The highlight match came in the 90 kg category where Brock rookie standout Alex Brown-Theriault (Ottawa) defeated top

Brock will help Niagara to move forward: Lightstone

Gone are the days when Niagara thrives largely on a manufacturing-based economy: the region's future success lies in knowledge and knowledge-based activities.

This was one of the messages delivered by Brock President Jack Lightstone at a Town Hall Meeting to the Brock community on March 7.

No institution is in a better position than Brock to help move Niagara forward economically, culturally and socially, Lightstone told the audience gathered in the Sean O'Sullivan Theatre. With its cuttingedge research initiatives and its rapid and diverse growth in graduate education, the University will be able to provide the

knowledge critical to the region's growth.

Niagara and Brock are both at crossroads, said Lightstone. The region, as it overcomes its over-reliance on traditional industrial manufacturing, will look to Brock as an important partner in its efforts to compete in an increasingly global economy. While there is a limit to how quickly or how hard people can work, there is no limit to new and bright ideas.

Brock is poised to work with the region to become an incubator for these creative solutions and innovations, he said, "to ensure that students' ideas fly here rather than somewhere else."

The University is also at a crossroads, he added. Student enrolment has reached a plateau, faculty has greatly increased and research is pervasive throughout the campus. And now is the time, he said, to discard the aloofness associated with an "ivory tower" image by taking knowledge to the region, to Canada and to the world.

Hindering Brock's progress at present, said Lightstone, is an insufficient operating budget and the fact that the University has the most under-spaced campus in Ontario.

Lightstone also fielded audience questions on issues ranging from the importance of information technology on campus, morale, building maintenance and student involvement.

He said he has experienced a deep sense of family and community at Brock.

"Families hang together, they see themselves through the tough times and the good times, and they really gather strength from one another," he said. "And that's what we'll do."

Review of weather criteria underway

Over the next several weeks, the University will conduct an evaluation of the criteria for basing decisions on the cancellation of classes during weather-related conditions.

This evaluation comes in the aftermath of the Feb. 14 snow conditions and the Brock community's reaction to the University's decision to hold morning classes.

Steven Pillar, Vice-President, Finance and Administration, says as part of a review of criteria, the University will be proposing a shift in its approach toward winter class cancellations.

"In the past there has been a reluctance to cancel classes unless absolutely necessary and the inclination from the community, based on recent experience, is for us to be less rigid in this regard," he says. "If the University is to become more inclined to cancel because of weather, then Brock will need to offset the lost class time by increasing the number of snow days at the end of semester. There is somewhat of a balancing act to this and we want to be sure people understand that before we proceed.

"Overall, it is important that we take this opportunity to establish effective criteria that we can implement consistently in order to address the concerns of our community and, at the same time, accommodate the requirements of the academic program."

Pillar says the review will involve collecting information and feedback in a number of ways. The University will look at the processes and criteria in place at other institutions. A memo will be sent out to Faculties, administrative departments, union representatives, the Brock University Students' Union and the Graduate Students' Association to ask for input. The Brock community is invited to provide feedback in writing. Comments can be e-mailed to universitycom@brocku.ca by March 30.

The assessment of weatherrelated criteria and guidelines will be applied in accordance with policy and procedures currently in place for the interruption of normal operations.

"Once the input stage is completed, we will share with the Brock community a proposal for new criteria to be considered as we work toward finalizing our position," says Pillar. Brock men's wrestling...continues from page 1.

New Brock course will focus on public health and the HIV/AIDS pandemic

A new course offered by the Department of Community Health Sciences – CHSC 4V51, "Current Public Health Issues of the HIV/AIDS Pandemic" – will be offered this Spring term, taught by Dr. Eduardo Fernandez, Visiting International Professor from a partner institution in Honduras. This topic is of pressing concern to health scientists and population health professionals and should be of particular interest to students who hope to pursue careers in international health.

Department Chair Dr. John Hay emphasized "we strive to view health in a global context and this topic is of particular importance – certainly a major health concern in Canada and an even greater one in the developing world. This course will significantly expand our present course offerings in the area of infectious diseases and global issues... it will address the single most pressing health concern today facing the global community."

CHSC 4V51 will examine the multifactorial causality of HIV/AIDS with the ultimate goal of increasing understanding and awareness of the ongoing pandemic. A transdisciplinary model will be used to analyze the biological, physiological, environmental, and behavioural factors involved in transmission and persistence, as well as to study the epidemiological patterns and individual and societal factors that determine the occurrence and impact of HIV/AIDS in different populations.

DiBattista honoured with prestigious national teaching award

A professor known for inspiring students and his dedication to quality scholarship has been named as a recipient of one of Canada's most prestigious national teaching awards.

David DiBattista, Professor in the

Department of Psychology, is a recipient of the 2007 3M Teaching Fellowship from 3M Canada and the Society for Teaching and Learning in Higher Education (STLHE).

The 3M Teaching Fellowship is the only national teaching award for post-secondary education in Canada. It is given to individuals who not only excel in the teaching of their own courses but also demonstrate an exceptionally high degree of leadership and commitment to the improvement of university teaching across disciplines. A maximum of 10 awards are presented nationally each year among the 35,000 professional academics across Canada who are eligible.

"David is an outstanding classroom teacher and has dedicated himself to the further development of both his own and the institution's scholarship of teaching," said President Jack Lightstone.

As a past recipient of Brock University's Chancellor's Chair for Teaching Excellence, DiBattista has embarked on a program of scholarship that examines assessment issues such as the way in which multiple choice test questions can encourage critical thinking and the impact of the Immediate Feedback Assessment Technique. In addition to his commitment to both excellence in teaching and the scholarship of teaching, DiBattista also exercises educational leadership at Brock in his role as the Associate Dean of Social Sciences.

"I couldn't have received this award without the people who have helped me to become the teacher that I am, and that includes faculty, students and the Centre for Teaching, Learning and Educational Technologies," says DiBattista. "I spend a lot of time focusing on my teaching and my presentations because I value the learning of my students. I frequently ask myself 'How can I make my presentations more effective? How can I reach more students?'"

Students have recognized DiBattista as a student-friendly and extraordinary teacher. One student indicated that he "undoubtedly has had a remarkable impact on my career and my life," while another indicated that "David loves teaching and it shows."

DiBattista is the eighth Brock Professor to be named a 3M Teaching Fellow.

Previous Brock University 3M award winners are: Lorne Adams (2004), John Mitterer (2004), Maureen Connolly (2003), Anna Lathrop (2001), Barry W. K. Joe (2000), Donald Ursino (1991), and Clarke Thomson (1989).

The Global Health Research Initiative (GHRI) has awarded a grant valued at \$1.5 million to Professor Ana Sanchez, who will be working in collaboration with stakeholders in Honduras to help combat infectious diseases within the country.

Sanchez, from the Department of Community Health, and her co-investigator Lourdes de Madrid of the Department of Microbiology, Universidad Nacional Autonoma de Honduras (UNAH), have been awarded one of 13 Teasdale-Corti Team Grants, which was selected following a stringent peer-review process among more than 250 proposals submitted in 2006 to the GHRI from across the globe.

The title of Sanchez's four-year program of research and capacity strengthening is "Increasing Capacity to Achieve Millennium Development Goal #6 in Honduras: Combating Infectious Diseases." The Millennium Development Goals (MDG) are eight targets that 191 United Nations member states have agreed to try to achieve by the year 2015.

"Honduras has one of the highest Central American rates for AIDS, tuberculosis and malaria and it is also affected by ancient infectious diseases including zoonoses that not only affect people's health but also their livelihood," says Sanchez. "Furthermore, the potential for emerging problems such as avian influenza, bioterrorism, and bovine spongiform encephalopathy, as a result of globalization, cannot be overlooked."

The main objective of the program will be the creation of a local graduate master's program open to a wide array of professionals that will function in collaboration with current public health and epidemiology programs. The program will address infectious disease not only from a biomedical perspective, but also considering broader determinants of health, health behaviour change and community participation.

In Honduras, the third-poorest country in Latin America, poverty and inequality are primary determinants for the occurrence and impact of infectious diseases and zoonoses, but these diseases are also a major obstacle to recovery and growth.

"The project will help foster in Honduras the development of a multidisciplinary research environment and of a national network of stakeholders needed to tackle new emerging threats, including those of animal origin," says Dr. Francois-Xavier Meslin, Co-ordinator, Zoonoses and Veterinary Public Health, World Health Organization.

GHRI is a collaborative health research partnership between the Canadian Institutes for Health Research, International Development Research Centre, Health Canada and the Canadian International Development Agency – with input from the Canadian Health Services Research Foundation and Canadian and developing country partners.

The Teasdale-Corti Team Grants honour the legacy of Canadian researchers Dr. Lucille Teasdale and her husband Dr. Piero Corti who dedicated their lives to improving health care in Africa.

Working towards

A thorough accessibility audit of Brock University has yielded recommendations into how the campus can become more accessible for those persons living with disabilities and it also noted where the University has already successfully removed physical barriers.

Conducted by the Herrington Group Team of St. Catharines in 2006, the

Conducted by the Herrington Group Team of St. Catharines in 2006, the accessibility audit reviewed each building at the St. Catharines main and east campuses, Rodman Hall and the Hamilton campus to determine the following: what barriers exist and where they exist; how those barriers can/should be removed; resources necessary to undertake action; and cost projections.

Brock undertook the audit of its publicly accessed areas to further its commitment to persons with disabilities and to ensure compliance with the Accessibility for Ontarians with Disabilities Act.

"Undertaking the outside audit demonstrates Brock's pro-active and continued commitment to persons with disabilities," said Margaret Sanderson, Accessibility Co-ordinator, Office of the Associate Vice-President, Student Services. "We now know what type of physical barriers exist on campus, and we also know what we're doing well."

Sanderson is the only designated Accessibility Co-ordinator at any university in Ontario.

Tom Saint-Ivany, Executive Director, Facilities Management, said the accessibility audit recommendations "provide a long-range planning tool for the identification of and removal of existing physical barriers in academic and administrative areas at all Brock sites by 2025."

He has put in place processes that will allow prioritized needs to be implemented through annual operating and capital project budgets.

Standards used in the audit assessment tool were taken from the Canadian Standards Association, the National Building Code, the Ontario Building Code and various disability-related organizations, including the Canadian National Institute for the Blind, the Canadian Hearing Society and the Canadian Learning Disabilities Association.

A hefty binder contains the recommendations that are ranked one-to-four in priority:

 Priority 1 considerations are simple and maintenance related, such as installing new light bulbs to ensure appropriate lighting levels or lowering sign;

 Priority 2 changes are urgent and need immediate consideration and action;

 Priority 3 changes are not urgent but will assist in more effectively meeting the access of needs of people with disabilities;

 Priority 4 changes are suggestions for consideration in future planning.

Sanderson facilitates Brock's Barrier-Free Working Group comprised of faculty, staff, students and representatives from organizations and individuals in the Niagara community.

It's official: Brock announces a new Faculty

In a unanimous vote, the Brock University Senate endorsed the creation of the Faculty of Graduate Studies at its March 22 meeting.

"The creation of Brock's Faculty of Graduate Studies is a wonderful step forward for the University," said Marilyn Rose, Dean, Graduate Studies. "The new Faculty will bring graduate faculty and graduate students together across the disciplines and will definitely enhance the profile of research and graduate studies at Brock University."

Terry Boak, Vice-President, Academic and Provost, said the new Faculty will be of tremendous value to students and faculty in that it will improve the profile of the University, a mature and complex institution, as one that prizes graduate education.

"Over time, we will see continuing growth of graduate work at Brock and the other six Faculties will benefit from the support of the Faculty of Graduate Studies," he said.

Boak added he was also "extremely pleased that Senators supported so strongly the formation of the Faculty of Graduate Studies."

Brock offers 37 graduate programs, including six PhD programs. From 2000-06, there was a 106 per cent increase in graduate programs, a 92 per cent increase in graduate degrees awarded, a 55 per cent increase in graduate scholarship applications, and a 1,250 per cent increase in workshops offered to graduate students and faculty by Graduate Studies.

From Bibles to bullies, conference features diverse research

An opportunity to receive feedback on her research is one reason that master's student Claire Meldrum will participate in the second annual Mapping the New Knowledges conference on April 10 and 11.

Meldrum, a student in the Comparative Literatures and Arts program — she has a Bachelor of Fine Arts degree from York University — also welcomes the chance to build connections at the University, enjoy other research initiatives featured at the conference "and put faces to faculty and other graduate students."

The student, who juggles motherhood, research and teaching responsibilities as a teaching assistant, has explored the interplay between iconography and narrative in 20th-century illustrated children's Bibles and the resulting messages that are conveyed to children through religious socialization. "I've discovered there's a lot of 'do what I say, not what I do' in the children's Bibles," Meldrum observed.

Carrie Kelly, who will finish the requirements for her Master of Business Administration this year, has

entitled her oral presentation "The Devil Wears Prada — Bully Bosses."

"Employees are protected by law from sexual and racial harassment" said Kelly, "but research has shown that non-sexual and non-racial harassment may be much more common and just as damaging to a person in the long term."

In addition to the 53 oral presentations, there will also be 42 poster presentations.

Research topics show a great range in diversity, including presentations about active living and public leisure services, the social implications of Alfred Tennyson's *Idylls of the King*, female risk-taking behaviours, new approaches in mortuary archaeology in the Bronze Age, and the impact of childhood obesity on bone strength.

Marilyn Rose, Dean, Graduate Studies, said the conference is a wonderful opportunity to showcase and celebrate Brock's research initiatives and to familiarize graduate students with a professional process by which knowledge is disseminated.

"These research papers and posters are an indication of great strides Brock has made in its transformation to a research-intensive university," said Michael Owen, Associate Vice-President, Research. "The close connections between teaching, mentoring and research emerge from these collaborations between our faculty and our graduate students."

Brock President Jack Lightstone will deliver the keynote address at 7 p.m. on April 10 and Dr. Noreen Golfman, president of the Canadian Federation for the Humanities and Social Sciences, will deliver the plenary address at 9 a.m. on April 11.

Chris Rudge, who was named CEO of the Canadian Olympic Committee (COC) in January 2003, stopped by Brock University on March 19 to deliver a guest lecture in Pond Inlet to more than 120 students from first-year Sport Management class "Understanding Sport Industry Sectors" taught by Professor Joanne MacLean. Rudge began his discussion with a DVD presentation of Canadian Olympic highlights and then proceeded to speak about the structure of sport in Canada and how the COC is facilitating success for Canadian athletes on the international stage.



Attorney General speaks about human rights reform in Ontario

The Department of Child and Youth Studies and Applied Disabilities Studies Program at Brock welcomed Ontario Attorney General Michael Bryant to the University on March 8 to speak about human rights in Ontario. Bryant spoke to and answered questions from a capacity crowd of more than 110 students, faculty and staff members in Thistle 245 about legislation he introduced in April 2006 to bring about changes to Ontario's human rights complaints system. His visit to the University was part of a cross-province tour to discuss and solicit feedback on Bill 107, which received royal assent last December.

Bryant spoke about the history of the act, noting that Ontario has a distinguished legacy when it comes to human rights. It was the first province in Canada to establish a Human Rights Commission and to legislate human rights by adopting such acts as *The Racial Discrimination Act* (1944).

But Bryant also explained to the audience in attendance why it needed change. One of the main criticisms of the existing system, which has been in place for 45 years, is that it can take years for a case to move from filing with the commission to resolution before the tribunal. According to Bryant, most claims take up to three to five years to resolve, and in some cases the process takes seven to eight years. He noted that "justice delayed is justice denied."

The new human rights system in Ontario will be a "direct access system" and will strive to resolve claims fairly, effectively and quickly. It will consist of the Ontario Human Rights Commission, the Human Rights Tribunal of Ontario and a new Human Rights Legal Support Centre. The Tribunal will now deal with all claims of discrimination filed under the Human Rights Code and will establish new processes that are open, accessible and provide effective resolution of cases.

"No claim should take more than a year," he said. "That's the goal."

People in the news

Assistant Professor and Chair of the Department of Nursing Lynn Rempel was interviewed by the Welland Tribune for a Feb. 28 article – "Keeping Nurses in Ontario" – about the Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care's program that will quarantee that all 4,000 graduating students from Ontario nursing schools will have full-time jobs for at least seven-anda-half months. The program, first announced in 2006, will see the province spend \$89 million to cover the cost of paying full-time wages to nurses for a sixmonth period. In the article, Rempel noted that "It's quite exciting because so often students cobble together part-time positions in order to try and get that first full-time position."

Rempel was also interviewed by the St. Cothorines Standard, along with Brock nursing student Jeff Biletchi, for a March 15 article about the same announcement, entitled "Program gives shot in arm to nursing students." Biletchi, who graduates this year, has already secured a position in the surgical unit at Greater Niagara General Hospital in Niagara Falls.

Dean of Mathematics and Science Ian Brindle was interviewed by the *Niagora Falls Review* for a March 2 story – "Public credited for Niagara River rebirth." – about the ongoing cleanup of the Niagara River.

Brindle was also recently interviewed by the St. Cathorines Standard for a March 10 story about the release of the inventory of chemicals that were in the warehouse of Clean Harbours Canada Inc., in Port Robinson, when it was destroyed during a Feb. 19 explosion. The article, which was also reprinted in the Niagara Falls Review and Welland Tribune, noted that the blast was primarily fuelled by 83,000 kilograms of lithium batteries.

Associate Professor of Recreation and Leisure Studies Ann Marie Guilmette was recently interviewed by the St. Catharines Standardfor a March 3 Niagara Closeup article about the proliferation of young gamblers. In the article, entitled "Youths the target of gambling boom," Guilmette notes that "to make a successful prediction is very empowering. It's very empowering at a time when their identities are forming.... Gambling is a perfect opportunity for them to receive that kind of powerful confirmation and affirmation of success."

'New and grand commitment' to graduate studies

With the creation of the Faculty of Graduate Studies, Brock University sends a strong signal about its "new and grand commitment to graduate studies and research," says Professor Miriam Richards, Chair, Senate Graduate Studies Committee.

The University Senate unanimously endorsed the creation of Brock's seventh Faculty on March 21. Graduate Studies joins the Faculties of Applied Health Sciences, Business, Education, Humanities, Mathematics and Science, and Social Sciences.

"I think this represents a major philosophical change, because in the past, graduate studies and to some extent research, have been 'add-on' to the primary enterprise of the University, which was undergraduate education," says Richards. "Now undergraduate and graduate education, and teaching and research can be integrated into a larger academic enterprise that really is about 'higher learning'."

"The creation of Brock's Faculty of Graduate Studies is a wonderful step forward for the University," says Marilyn Rose, Dean, Graduate Studies. "The new Faculty will bring graduate faculty and graduate students together across the disciplines and will definitely enhance the profile of research and graduate studies at Brock University."


Brock offers 37 graduate programs, including six PhD programs. From 2000-06, there was a 106 per cent increase in graduate programs, a 92 per cent increase in graduate degrees awarded, a 55 per cent increase in graduate scholarship applications, and a 1,250 per cent increase in workshops offered to graduate students and faculty by Graduate Studies.

A report to the University Senate, presented by Richards, said "this commitment must be made clear both externally, to government, to other institutions, and to the Niagara community, and internally, to all sectors of the University, both academic and administrative."

In addition to promoting and supporting graduate education and research, a dedicated Faculty will also help to attract top national and international graduate students, formalize a collectivity of members who have a common voice, join other Ontario, North American and European universities that also have a Faculty of Graduate Studies or equivalent, and advocate for students.

Calling it a step in the right direction, Ashleigh Miatello, President, Graduate Students' Association, said that "by recognizing graduate students as a collective at Brock, we will be able to foster a sense of community and inclusion on campus.

Research conference wraps up today

Today is the final day of the Mapping the New Knowledges conference, which showcases and celebrates leading-edge research by Brock's graduate students and faculty.

The conference is being held at Pond Inlet, although breakout sessions will be held in various rooms throughout the day.

Ninety-five presentations — 53 oral and 42 poster — explore areas as diverse as active living and public leisure services, the social implications of Alfred Tennyson's *Idylls of the King*, children's illustrated Bibles, workplace bullies, female risk-taking behaviours, new approaches in mortuary archaeology in the Bronze Age, a transdisciplinary approach to understanding dominant autism discourses, and the impact of childhood obesity on bone strength.

Of the submissions, 82 are from graduate students and 13 are from faculty members.

Brock President Jack Lightstone delivered the keynote address yesterday and Dr. Noreen Golfman, president of the Canadian Federation for the Humanities and Social Sciences, delivered the plenary address this morning.

The conference begins to wrap up at 5 p.m. with the presentation of awards and the draw for conference prizes.

Election of a staff representative to the Board of Trustees

Completed ballots are to be returned to the Secretary to the Board of Trustees, sealed in the envelope that will be provided. Ballots not returned in this manner and by the close of the poll at 4:30 p.m. on May 18 will not be counted.

Learning Commons: Looking forward

Planning for the Learning Commons has gained considerable momentum in recent months. With input from students, the Learning Commons partners and various advisory groups, a major feasibility study has been completed that provides an exciting design layout that incorporates and transforms the upper level of the former University Book Store and the main floor of the James A. Gibson Library. Floor plans and artist renderings are now on display in the Library. A series of profiles will appear in upcoming issues of Brock News explaining the benefits that the new Learning Commons will provide to various constituencies around the University.

Heather Hudson and Amy Gradwell provide vital services to students, even though they are students themselves.

For many, the transition to postsecondary studies or first jobs may seem ominous. Hudson and Gradwell help take out that fear of the unknown for many Brock students.

Hudson is a Studywrite Assistant for mathematics and science and Gradwell is a Learning Skills Assistant, both with the Student Development Office. Their job is to help students succeed. They provide help with grammar, time management, exam techniques, components of essay writing and the promotion of good study skills. They conduct writing clinics, workshops on procrastination avoidance, and "how to ace tests and exams" clinics.

In addition to completing their own studies, they see 15 to 40 students per day in their role as peer assistants. Some students cite the benefits of talking to a peer helper –

the peer helper is closer in age and has been through the same experience more recently or the student might not want to alert the professor that there is a problem.

Hudson and Gradwell hold workshops and do one-on-one consultations in various spaces across the University, moving from room to room. Due to space restrictions on campus, students requiring assistance may have to search to find out where they might find help on any given day.

Both students are looking forward to the completion of the new Learning Commons where there will be space dedicated to learning support. There will be space for collaborative and individual study. There will be information technology help and Career Services. There will be computers, wireless access and tables and comfortable chairs. There will be coffee. Students will have a convenient, comfortable, welcoming and inspiring space – a space that will help them succeed.

Professor to receive professional recognition award

Frances Owen, Chair, Department of Child and Youth Studies, will be recognized tomorrow for her professional leadership and achievement by the Ontario Association for Developmental Disabilities (OADD).

Owen and Barbara Vyrostko, Executive Director of Community Living Welland Pelham, will share the Professional Recognition Award for 2007 at the annual conference of OADD for their work with Rights, Respect and Responsibility — Community University Research Alliance (3Rs – CURA), a program for persons with intellectual disabilities.

Ten years ago, Community Living Welland Pelham invited researchers from Brock University to assess its abuse prevention program. As a result of that invitation, 3Rs – CURA was formed. The community director of the program is Vyrostko and the University lead is Owen.

The two women have worked to ensure that there is a culture of rights that protects even the most vulnerable. The program is a multi-tiered approach to rights protection: training for individuals in rights and self-advocacy, training for staff, education of medical and legal professionals, an empowered planning approach and an arbitration procedure for rights restrictions. They have created a culture in which rights can be exercised with respect and responsibility.

Their efforts have also received provincial and federal recognition and funding to continue and extend this model throughout Niagara and beyond.

Persons with intellectual disabilities are twice as likely to experience abuse and 150 per cent more likely to be sexually abused. Abuse is the greatest mental health risk for persons with intellectual disabilities. It was discovered that persons with intellectual disabilities did not know they had the right to say "no", even to abuse. It was also found that abuse was a symptom of a larger issue — the denial of the rights.

"I am excited about the new graduate culture that will inevitably develop on Brock's campus," she continued. "Working together, the Graduate Students' Association and the new Faculty of Graduate Studies will have the opportunity to enhance the graduate student experience at Brock University."

Another key component in the Faculty's formation is improved competitiveness in obtaining government funding, said the report.

"The creation of a Faculty of Graduate Studies is of paramount importance to the current climate of Ontario university funding," said the report. "Funding for both operations and capital expansion is now tied to increases in graduate enrolment."

Specifically, the report noted, the province has recently announced funding to add 12,000 graduate spaces to the Ontario university system by 2009-10. It will only fund graduate studies growth, and capital investment will only follow graduate enrolment growth.

"Universities have no choice but to attempt to meet these aggressive expansion targets," said the report to Senate. "To fail to do so will be to lose both operating and capital project funds — the only source of increased funding that will be available to the universities for the foreseeable future."

Brock plays host to high school students

Nine students from Thorold Secondary School (TSS) visited Brock on March 22 as part of a shadow day program where they were partnered with current Brock students.

The program was conceived through ongoing discussions between various Brock partners (including the Office of Recruitment, the Registrar's Office, SMART Start, Student Awards and Financial Aid, the Student Development Centre and the First Generation program) and representatives from Thorold Secondary earlier in the year.

What initially resulted was a question-and-answer period for Grade 12 students at the school informing them about university life.

On March 7, Jesse Barraza of the First Generation program, Kevin J. Kiss, Deputy Registrar, and five Brock students – Jordan Taylor, Susan Abou Fadel, Mary Gray, Santy Restrepo, and Kate Pettypiece – provided a 45minute informal discussion to students at TSS who planned to attend a university. The five students discussed academic life, social involvement, athletes, working on campus, balancing time, being successful at university, living away from home, living at home and going to school locally, services that are offered on campus, First Generation and enjoying the university experience.

"The biggest visible benefit is that the students hear about the experiences from their peers students who have faced the same challenges and the same scenarios," says Irene Gibbins, Head of Student Services at TSS.

"The impact of experiencing a lecture and taking in a class provides a real context for these students in advance of their full-time university studies."

The goal of the session was to make students aware that high school is very different than university and the expectations are much greater. The Brock contingent wanted to impress upon the high school students that they can be successful. Part of the university experience is to take advantage of all the services and events that a university has to offer. Much of the learning at university takes places outside the classroom.

At the question-and-answer period, the high school students were offered the opportunity to attend Brock for a day to spend on campus with Brock students.

"We want to give the students a chance to see their new university community, connect with students, take part in seminars and lectures, eat on campus, take a tour and get a feel for university life," said Kevin J. Kiss. "This type of program is an innovative way for us to get students thinking about university early enough to ensure their success."

Some other pilot projects that are ongoing with TSS include a question-and-answer session with Grade 11 students. Also a parent question-and-answer session is being planned for later this month.

"The more prepared we can make our incoming students, the more positive experience they will have," says Kiss.

Larry Savage, Assistant Professor of Labour Studies and Political Science, was interviewed by the *St. Catharines Standard* for a March 16 story about his role in helping the St. Catharines and District Labour Council organize a protest outside Club Roma during a private appearance by Liberal leader Stephane Dion in St. Catharines on March 17. The Council is protesting the Liberals' plan to withdraw support for proposed anti-scab legislation in Bill C-257. 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Layton visits Brock to speak on education issues

The Brock University Students' Union (BUSU) and the Brock New Democratic Party welcomed federal NDP leader Jack Layton to the University on April 11 to speak about education issues with more than 100

students, faculty, staff, local labour leaders and members of the public.

Layton, who was introduced by BUSU President Kithio Mwanzia, showed up for his speaking engagement 20 minutes late and thanked the crowd for waiting, noting that he "got tied up in the Tim's [Hortons], which is where politics is done in this country, when it's not being done in the pub or elsewhere."

Layton, who studied political science at McGill and York Universities and was a professor at Ryerson University, has been leader of the federal NDP party since 2003. His 45-minute presentation addressed two specific topics: post-secondary education and the environment.

With respect to education, Layton spoke about reductions in student access and the quality of education on university campuses across the country as a result of larger classes and increasing student-teacher ratios. He also addressed the issue of the rising cost of post-secondary education, noting that "students used to carry about 20 per cent of the cost of post-secondary education. Well it's now over 40 per cent."

Layton elaborated on the consequences of these trends, noting that students now have to work more while pursuing their studies and have to incur greater financial debts than ever before. He noted that "we need to make this basic principle of fairness of access to education a fundamental in Canadian society and that means a proactive role for a national government, especially when its got a great big surplus."

Layton stated that the NDP has proposed a Canada Post-Secondary Education Act to help reduce tuition, enhance quality and protect Canada's public post-secondary education system.

On the subject of the environment, Layton noted that Canadians are fed up after years of inaction on climate change. He pointed out that the NDP's comprehensive changes to the Conservative's Clean Air Act with Bill C-30, which will re-commit Canada to its Kyoto Protocol obligations, is the "best environmental bill in Canadian history.'

After his initial discussion in which he remarked, "I'm here as much to listen as I am to speak to you," Layton opened up the floor and responded to questions from the

\$6.6 million from province will aid infrastructure upgrades

A recently announced multimillion dollar investment in Brock University from the provincial government will support quality improvements at the University.

On April 10, Chris Bentley, Minister of Training, Colleges and Universities, and Jim Bradley, MPP St. Catharines, were on campus to announce that the institution would receive \$6.6 million in one-time year-end provincial funding.

Speaking to 50 invited guests and media, Bentley highlighted the importance of investing in postsecondary education and its impact on regional and provincial prosperity.

"Record numbers of students have found opportunity in our colleges and universities - 86,000 more than when we started," added Bentley. "Ontario's new economic strength depends upon access to quality postsecondary education and training - which is why we're helping students gain skills that will last a lifetime."

"Now students at Brock University will benefit from even higher quality education," added Bradley. "This investment will also deliver economic benefits to St. Catharines by supporting projects at Brock."

As announced in the 2007 budget, the McGuinty government is providing an additional \$365 million to create a better learning environment for students in college

and university, including support for new classrooms, modernized lab equipment and greater energy efficiency. This builds upon the government's \$4.2-billion investment in new faculty, library acquisitions and student services at colleges and universities this coming year. Under the \$6.2-billion Reaching Higher plan, funding to colleges and universities is increasing by 35 per cent over five years.

Brock President Jack Lightstone expressed his thanks to Bentley and Bradley for their commitment to postsecondary education at Brock.

"It goes without saying that we are pleased and grateful to receive these additional funds to support our core infrastructure as we strive to develop further along our chosen path," said Lightstone. "We are grateful to the Ontario government for their investment these last several years in Ontario's colleges and universities. It is among the wisest investments any government can make in the future welfare and development of the population it serves."

The funding to Brock will be put towards infrastructure needs such as the replacement of the 40-year-old fire alarm system for Schmon Tower and Thistle corridor as well as classroom modernization projects, including upgrading audio-visual equipment.

Conference celebrates multidisciplinary research

Graduate student Toran Sanli said he learned at the Mapping the New Knowledges conference that research at Brock has taken on a robust life of its own.

"My eyes were opened to the magnitude and diversity of research at Brock," said Sanli, who has completed his first year of a two-year Master of Science program in the Faculty of Applied Health Sciences. "Even in my own research, I have been guided by faculty to look outside the boundaries and to take a multidisciplinary approach."

Sanli was showcasing his research —
"Resveratrol, a Red Wine Polyphenol
Reverses Fatty Acid-Induced Insulin
Resistance in Rat L6 Skeletal Muscle Cells" —
at the second annual conference held April
10 and 11 in Pond Inlet and other campus
sites.

Ninety-five presentations —53 oral and 42 poster — explored areas as diverse as active living and public leisure services, the social implications of Alfred Tennyson's *Idylls of the King*, children's illustrated Bibles, workplace bullies, female risk-taking behaviours, new approaches in mortuary archaeology in the Bronze Age, a transdisciplinary approach to understanding dominant autism discourses, and the impact of childhood obesity on bone strength.

The winners for the poster session were Kendra Thompson (Social Sciences) for "Why are 4-Year-Olds Poor Eyewitnesses?" and Katarzyna Zygmunt (Applied Health Sciences) for "Naringenin, a Grapefruit Flavonoid, Stimulates Glucose Uptake in L6 Muscle Cells."

The winners for the adjudicated papers were Cindy Lee Scott (Classics, Humanities) for "Life, Death and the Late Bronze Age: New Approaches in Mortuary Archaeology at Ayia Sotira, Nemea, Greece" and Angela Duarte (Applied Health Sciences) for "Waiting Patiently: The Strategy of Latent Tuberculosis."

Brock President Jack Lightstone officially opened the conference. He said that working with graduate students and supervising their research greatly enhances any faculty member's own research endeavours, and that graduate students and faculty are true partners in the research enterprise. He also explored the importance of

multidisciplinarity, which helps researchers to think beyond disciplinary categories and constraints. These new perspectives "twist the kaleidoscope" and often lead scholars into new and productive ways of thinking. He added that this multidisciplinary approach had broadened and deepened his own understanding as a historian of religion, and that it is one of the great advantages of an interdisciplinary conference such as Mapping the New Knowledges.

Noreen Golfman, president of the Canadian Federation for the Humanities and Social Sciences and Associate Dean of Graduate Studies at Memorial University of Newfoundland, re-titled her plenary presentation (with apologies to the Dixie Chicks, she added) to "Shut up and teach: the perils of the public intellectual."

She described the firestorm that resulted when, as an academic, she critiqued in the St. John's newspaper *The Independent* the "relentless sympathetic reporting" of Canada's involvement in Afghanistan, including the soft coverage by Newfoundland native and entertainer Rick Mercer.

Mercer's rebuttal letter, which she described as a hard-core assault, was posted on the Internet, and for the next three weeks, said Golfman, she was assailed "24 hours a day with a steady torrent of hate mail." When the written attacks escalated to phone calls, she arranged for security.

"I was demoralized by the antiintellectualism and the misogyny," she said. "It became an opportunity to dump on university research and culture."

Debate must be encouraged by universities, concluded Golfman, although in the age of the Internet and post-9/11, speaking out is not without risks.

She said universities must make research accessible beyond campus borders, to create a world where people are educated in language and thought as they strive for tolerance, diversity and respect for human rights. She also urged faculty to participate in public debates as "public intellectuals" who can raise the kinds of questions that may otherwise remain unspoken.

Learning Commons: Looking forward

Planning for the Learning Commons has gained considerable momentum in recent months. With input from students, the Learning Commons partners and various advisory groups, a major feasibility study has been completed that provides an exciting design layout that incorporates and transforms the upper level of the former University Book Store and the main floor of the James A. Gibson Library. Floor plans and artist renderings are now on display in the Library. A series of profiles will appear in upcoming issues of Brock News explaining the benefits that the new Learning Commons will provide to various constituencies around the University.

Many staff members at Brock University take advantage of the tuition benefit to further their own education and some have children enrolled at Brock. Julia Gottli (Child and Youth Studies) and Al Ross (Parking Services) each have children attending Brock. Gottli is also pursuing her degree in sociology.

In discussing the value of the new Learning Commons, Gottli and Ross felt that one of Brock's continuing strengths is the seminar system, where students learn in small group settings. Currently, beyond the seminar system, it's difficult to find space on campus for groups to meet and many end up at off-campus coffee shops. Building on Brock's reputation for group learning, the Learning Commons' variety of group discussion and

study areas and coffee bar will increase the opportunities for small group discussions and learning for all students, Teaching Assistants and faculty. The Learning Commons will also have an increased number of computer stations and laptop loans to help students who do not have daytime access to their computers.

Gottli noted that many mature students take evening classes and have difficulty locating services they require. With service areas in the Learning Commons including Career Services, the Centre for Teaching, Learning and Educational Technologies, the James A. Gibson Library and the Student Development Centre, resources will be available throughout the evening with staff and peer helpers on hand to serve all Brock students.

Athletics set to welcome 2007 Hall of Fame inductees



Election of a staff representative to the Board of Trustees

If an election is required, ballots will be distributed to all members of the permanent staff on or before Wednesday, May 9. Completed ballots are to be returned to the Secretary to the Board of Trustees, sealed in the envelope that will be provided. Ballots not returned in this manner and by the close of the poll at 4:30 p.m. on May 18, will not be counted.

The candidate leading the poll will be declared elected to the three-year term.

Revisions to weather policy and procedures

In March, the University invited the Brock community to share feedback as part of an evaluation of criteria for basing decisions on the cancellation of classes during weather-related conditions.

This feedback has provided the University with a better understanding of the Brock community's concerns and issues during times of inclement weather. Based on the responses, the University will work toward revising its policy and procedure to reflect a lessstringent approach toward winter class cancellation.


"We want to thank everyone who took this opportunity to provide feedback," says Steven Pillar, Vice-President Finance and Administration. "It is clear from the community's response that the University must shift its approach and, in particular, recognize the impact that closures in the region, including the school boards, have for our faculty, staff and students.'

Concerns over safety will be paramount to the University's review of current policy and procedures. In addition, the review will take into consideration other feedback from the community, such as:

- child-care implications for members of the Brock community with school-age children when schools close for the day
- lack of public transportation for faculty, staff and students who live outside of city bus routes
- the need to address the confusion created when some individual classes are cancelled
- the impact on academic programming for faculty and students as a result of low class attendance
- improving communications of weather-related announcements
- changing the procedure to declare that the University is open or closed rather than continuation or cancellation of classes
- providing a clearer understanding of "essential staff"

As part of this consultative process, the University will share proposed changes to policy and procedures with the community prior to finalizing its position. It is intended that new policy and procedures will be in place for the beginning of the academic term in September.

Scientifically Yours, a three-day program in which girls in Grade 11 live on campus and experience the sciences hands on, welcomed close to 100 high school students to the campus from April 30 to May 2. The program offers workshops designed to encourage young women to pursue studies in the sciences and mathematics.

In the 17 workshops and projects, students had the opportunity to learn what coffee cups, DNA and slime all have in common and investigated a heinous crime and identified the perpetrator as a member of CSI Brock.

Exciting new projects this year included: "Sunprints: where science meets art," an interdisciplinary project where students learned how to make cyanotypes, some of the earliest photographic processes;
"Measuring the Mind," which teaches
students about neuropsychology and how a
brain functions; and "Take a Calcoolus Tour" - featuring interactive games developed by

Brock math professors.

During the 18th annual conference, students also had the opportunity to view the night skies as telescopes were set up on campus by volunteers with the Royal Astronomical Society of Canada – Niagara

Also included in this year's program was a live teleconference with Julie Payette from the Canadian Space Agency. Payette flew on space shuttle Discovery in 1999 and has been the Chief Astronaut for the Canadian Space Agency since 2002.

A highlight of the program is a dinner with women who have careers in the sciences. Students were provided with an opportunity to talk with them during and after dinner about their careers and everyday lives. In addition to women working in academia at the University, professional women from the surrounding community, including medical doctors, dentists, pharmacists, veterinarians, engineers, forensic scientists, marine biologists, geologists, and chiropractors were in attendance.

A keynote address was given by Nancy Parsons, a Brock graduate from the Faculty of Mathematics and Science. She is also the general manager of Sopherion Therapeutics Canada, Inc., a biopharmaceutical company

that develops anti-cancer agents. Scientifically Yours began with 50 students and has grown over the years due to its popularity. The program is co-ordinated by the Faculty of Mathematics and Sciences' Scientifically Yours Committee.

New energy and water conservation initiatives announced

Brock has recently announced a series of wide-ranging energy and water conservation initiatives that are intended to lower the University's greenhouse gas emissions while allowing it to redirect the financial savings to academic and non-academic programs. The initiatives support planning and design guidelines for future savings as well as measures intended to achieve immediate results.

One of the most visible indicators of Brock's commitment to energy and water conservation is the recently completed Plaza2006, a \$23-million, five-storey, 86,000-square-foot building that houses the new Campus Store, classroom and lab space, and research facilities for the Lifespan Development Research Centre.

Plaza2006 was designed to achieve the Silver Certification of the Canada Green Building Council's Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) green building rating system and is expected to use 43.5 per cent less energy annually than a building designed to the National Energy Code of Canada for Buildings.

Last month, Brock's Board of Trustees approved the use of the University's new "Guide to the Planning, Design, and Architecture of the Natural and Built Environments" that endorses and promotes the use of green-building technology.

"Our planning for both new and renewed buildings will now actively consider sustainable sites, water efficiency, energy and the atmosphere, materials and resources, and indoor environmental quality," says Scott Walker, manager, Campus Planning, Design and Construction Services.

Immediate measures include adjusting thermostats, turning off lights in offices, classrooms, and laboratories, and turning off powered devices and equipment, such as computers, printers, monitors, and copiers, when not required to be in use. The University will also be looking at where and when parking lot lights are required to be turned on, along with emerging LED parking lot lighting technology.

"The most noticeable aspect of the new conservation program will be that the familiar ribbon of white lights around the top of Schmon Tower will no longer be turned on at night," says Thomas Saint-Ivany, Executive Director, Facilities Management.

Water conservation measures will see certain grassed areas of the University's Main Campus receiving less water through the irrigation system. Overall savings from this and other initiatives will enable the purchase and installation of replacement fixtures and devices such as water-efficient toilets with the goal of achieving a 54 per cent water savings.

"A number of initiatives have been identified by consulting with the University community, in particular with the trades and custodial staff of Local 1295 of the Canadian Union of Public Employees," says Saintlany.

Healthcare workers benefit from Nursing and Alzheimer Society workshop

The Department of Nursing, in partnership with the Alzheimer Society of Niagara Region, held a P.I.E.C.E.S.(tm) for Educators workshop on April 18. P.I.E.C.E.S.(tm) is a framework that supports nurses' providing holistic care for older persons with complex health challenges. Most nurses need specialized knowledge of geriatric nursing. "Students and nurses need to know they are geriatric nurses, no matter where they work," said workshop facilitator Marge Dempsey, Director of Client Services, Alzheimer Society of Niagara Region. Seniors are three times as likely as younger Canadians to be admitted to hospital and once in hospital they spend more time there than younger patients.

Facilitator Ann Tassonyi, Psychogeriatric Resource Consultant from the Alzheimer Society of Niagara Region and the Niagara Geriatric Mental Health Outreach Program, described assessment approaches for older persons with mental and physical health challenges including delirium, dementia, and depression. Participants practised using a tool that promotes teamwork and problem solving when faced with these complex health challenges.

"This workshop helps us by providing more tools that support students' critical thinking and learning to lead in our community," said workshop organizer and Nursing faculty member Lynn McCleary. The 15 workshop participants commented that the workshop will help them in their teaching and in their nursing practice.

Nurses in long-term care across the province have been trained as P.I.E.C.E.S.(tm) resource nurses and it is being implemented in Niagara. Brock is the first university to provide P.I.E.C.E.S.(tm) education for faculty and clinical instructors, with funding from the Ontario Alzheimer Knowledge Exchange.

Brian Roy, Associate Professor of Physical Education and Kinesiology, was interviewed by *Homemaker's* magazine for an article on burning calories, entitled "Calorie Cruncher." In the story, Roy notes that individuals burn calories at an elevated rate when resting for some time after activity.

Barb Davis, Registrar, was interviewed by the St. Catharines Standard for an April 16 article – "Davis running in Boston second time out" – about her participation in the 2007 Boston Marathon. In the article, Davis notes that "It's such a rush and a very personal accomplishment."

Health researchers receive more than \$130,000 in funds

Two projects by researchers in the Department of Community Health Sciences have recently been awarded more than \$140,000 from the Canadian Institutes of Health Research (CIHR). The two projects were included in an announcement recently of 589 health research grants worth \$217 million for a wide range of projects across Canada.

Professor Ana Sanchez will receive \$39,784 over two years for a project that is part of a program jointly managed and funded by the Health and Social Security Sectorial Research Fund of Mexico (Fondo Sectorial de Investigacion Salud y Seguridad Social) and the CIHR. Its aim is to promote collaboration between Canadian and Mexican researchers in the area of tuberculosis in regards to health research, research training and knowledge translation, and to help develop sustainable networks of researchers in this area. Sanchez's project will specifically look at issues surrounding

pulmonary tuberculosis in Mexican agricultural workers in Canada.

Professor Terrance Wade will receive \$93,608 over two years to study mental health issues surrounding the heads of single-parent families. The project will examine the prevalence of mental health problems and mental health service utilization (access to care) among single-parent fathers and mothers in relation to married fathers and mothers.

"Promoting groundbreaking health research is a crucial component of our government's plan to build a healthy, prosperous and innovative Canada," said Health Minister Tony Clement. "The funding highlighted is helping to enhance the health research capabilities of our institutions across Ontario, which will benefit all Canadians."

Laughter really is the best medicine

Go ahead – chuckle, giggle, guffaw, roll in the aisles, split your sides. It's good therapy for you.

Humour can achieve emotional well-being, and this was the message offered by Professor Ann Marie Guilmette, Department of Recreation and Leisure Studies and the Women's Studies Program, at a free presentation last night, part of the 2007 Mental Health Week events on work/life balance.

The session was a collaborative event between the Office of the Accessibility Coordinator at Brock and the Niagara branch of the Canadian Mental Health Association (CMHA). Interest in the conference was so great that the session had to be moved to a larger venue on campus.

"We were very pleased to partner with CMHA to present this free and informative session to the Brock community and the broader Niagara community," said Margaret Sanderson, Accessibility Co-ordinator at Brock. "It was a very successful event and we look forward to partnering with CMHA

and other Niagara organizations for future events. The aim is to create awareness, remove barriers and build a more caring inclusive community."

During her presentation, Guilmette said that a community that laughs is a community that cares. Humour builds a sense of camaraderie and reduces the judging of other people's lives.

"Laughter and humour remove barriers, and we listen to each other more," said Guilmette. "As a society, we need to invoke strategies where we care about people and not just for people. It's not enough to train caregivers to do that; the whole community must be involved."

She cited the seven steps to healthier emotional lives as described by the Menninger Clinic, a centre in Houston, Tex., that offers psychiatric treatment, research and education: adapt to change, control anxieties, consider others, give of yourself, face reality, curb hostility and learn to care.

This year's recipients of Faculty awards of excellence are:

Professor Gail Frost, Department Physical Education and Kinesiology, Faculty of Applied Health Sciences:

Professor Gail Frost knows that students learn well when they are given the opportunity to apply their knowledge in contexts that relate to their chosen profession. Her effective teaching strategies include problem-based learning opportunities that guide student learning both inside and outside of the classroom.

Through her commitment to studentcentred teaching and assessment strategies, Professor Frost provides students with confidence in their own abilities so that they may continue to learn and apply their knowledge after graduation.

Professor Dorothy Griffiths, Department of Child and Youth Studies, Faculty of **Social Sciences:**

On May 14, the Faculty of Graduate Studies celebrated the many graduate fellowships, scholarships, awards and prizes earned by Brock's graduate students over the past year, while acknowledging the generosity of donors who have helped to establish more than 30 graduate awards.

Among the awards were the Dean of Graduate Studies In-Course Scholarships granted to graduate students in the Faculties of Business and Education, 56 Ontario Graduate Fellowships, 19 Social Science and Humanities Research Council awards, 13 Natural Sciences and Engineering Research Council awards, and one Canadian Institute for Health Research award.

Dawn Hall, a student in Biological

Sciences, was recognized as a recipient of an NSERC post graduate doctoral fellowship for her work on the functional characteristics of various genes found in grapevines. She hopes her research will contribute to improving the quality of wine produced in the Niagara region.

President Jack Lightstone, who spoke to an audience of nearly 100 people gathered in Pond Inlet, emphasized the way modern society benefits from the creative and innovative contributions of those undertaking research in our universities. Marilyn Rose, Dean of Graduate Studies, suggested that Brock's high success rate in external competitions was a reflection of the increasing vitality of the University's research culture.

National scholarship foundation facing sunset in 2009

A national foundation that has offered financial support to 6,505 Brock University students since 1999 will wind down in 2009 — that is, unless the federal government steps in to address the situation.

The Canada Millennium Scholarship Foundation has awarded Brock students \$19,383,156 in scholarships and bursaries since an act of Parliament established the incorporated arm's-length foundation in 1998 in response to mounting student debt. The federal government contributed \$2.5 billion in seed funding to the organization.

The foundation has been an important source of financial support for Brock students and for students all over this country," said Brock President Jack Lightstone. "It will be a serious detriment to students to have this support lapse."

Agazi Afewerki, who has completed his second year in Business Communications, received a foundation bursary of about

"Tuition, residence and food costs total about \$12,000 for the entire year, so the foundation scholarship is very helpful and it is awarded without any additional applications," Afewerki said. "It's always nice to know that I'll have additional cash coming my way to help pay off such an immense cost. This scholarship has

definitely helped me a lot by easing my worries about getting in debt."

According to the foundation's website, its objectives "are to improve access to postsecondary education for all Canadians, especially those facing economic or social barriers; to encourage a high level of student achievement and engagement in Canadian society; and to build a national alliance of organizations and individuals around a shared post-secondary agenda."

Norman Riddell, executive director and CEO of the foundation, said the last awards will be made in the 2008-09 academic year. Once that happens, about 30 per cent of non-repayable financial assistance currently available to students will disappear.

'This is a matter of considerable concern for the students and for the provinces with whom the foundation partners," said Riddell from the organization's headquarters in Montreal.

The current federal government is expected to make major funding announcements about its role in providing student financial assistance in its 2008 budget next spring, he said, and two recent government-commissioned reports have been favourable to the foundation.

Between 1999 and 2006, Brock students

The program will equip students with the knowhow required to accomplish both academic and personal success at university.

The conference, which takes place at various locations across the University, includes all snacks and meals, an opening dinner featuring a motivational guest speaker, and overnight accommodations with residenceorientation activities.

The program is designed specifically for students with a diagnosed learning disability who have been accepted and will be entering their first year of study at Brock in Fall 2007. The event is free for all qualified applicants.

Honduran delegation visits as part of research initiative

Five delegates from Honduras were at Brock recently to take part in the first training activity for a \$1.5 million project headed by Professor Ana Sanchez, Community Health Sciences. Earlier this year, the Global Health Research Initiative (GHRI) awarded a grant valued at \$1.5 million to Sanchez and her co-investigator Lourdes de Madrid, Professor and Chair of the Department of Microbiology, Universidad Nacional Autonoma de Honduras (UNAH) to combat infectious diseases in Honduras. This is one of 13 Teasdale-Corti Team Grants that was selected following a stringent peer-review process among more than 250 proposals submitted in 2006 to the GHRI from across the globe. As one of the first project training activities of this project, the five delegates from UNAH and the National University of Agriculture in Honduras, including Dr. Lourdes, were invited to visit Brock for two weeks from May 14 to

While at Brock, the delegates joined a formal reception to recognize the Teasdale-Corti Team Grant. They also participated in a series of workshops as part of a two-week research management training program delivered by Brock faculty and staff.

The title of Sanchez's four-year program of research and capacity strengthening is "Increasing Capacity to Achieve Millennium Development Goal #6 in Honduras: Combating Infectious Diseases." The Millennium Development Goals are eight objectives that 191 United Nations member states have agreed to try to achieve by the year 2015. The main objective of the program will be the creation of a local master's program, open to a wide array of professionals that will function in collaboration with current public health and epidemiology programs. The program will address infectious disease not only from a biomedical perspective, but also considering broader determinants of health, health behaviour change and community participation.

Faculty awarded more than \$2 million in NSERC grants

Researchers at Brock were recently awarded more than \$2 million in grants for 24 projects ranging in topic from aging, memory and attentional control to the algebraic structures of group rings.

Natural Sciences and Engineering Research Council (NSERC) awarded grants to Brock faculty members totalling \$2,126,699 over five years, all of which are for new or renewed projects. Of that amount, \$308,264 was awarded for six equipment grants. Brock students also received 34 NSERC scholarships totalling \$587,300 in the latest round of funding.

"These funds help to provide the resources that enhance the University's research capacity," said Michael Owen, Associate Vice-President, Research and International Development at Brock. "Our faculty are continuing to create a robust and dynamic teaching and learning environment for our graduate and undergraduate students."

The latest grants will fund research projects in the fields of biological sciences, chemistry, community health sciences, computer science, mathematics, physics, psychology, and marketing, international business and strategy.

Examples of the recently funded NSERC projects at Brock include:

Professor Michael Bidochka,
Department of Biological Sciences,
has been awarded a research grant
to study natural pathogens of
insects that can be used for
biocontrol. He is particularly
interested in the virulence factors
by which certain biocontrol fungi
kill insects, and is seeking out the
best way to genetically manipulate
these factors for widespread use.
This research will contribute to the
development of an environmentally
friendly alternative to chemical

pesticides.

Professor Martin Head,
Department of Earth Sciences,
received a research equipment
grant to purchase a vitrinite
reflectance and fluorescence
microscope workstation in
association with co-applicant
Professor Andrew Miall from the
University of Toronto. The
equipment is used to evaluate
source rocks and will be used to
conduct research and analysis on
the oil sands of Alberta and the
Western Desert of Egypt. This is
the only equipment of its kind in
central Canada.

Parliamentary Secretary Colin Carrie, MP, on behalf of Minister of Industry Maxime Bernier, and Suzanne Fortier, president of NSERC, recently announced the results of the national 2007 Grants and Scholarships awards, which will see \$583 million disbursed to 10,000 professors and students across Canada

NSERC is a federal agency whose role is to make investments in people, discovery and innovation for the benefit of all Canadians. The agency invests in people by supporting some 23,000 university students and postdoctoral fellows in their advanced studies. NSERC promotes discovery by funding more than 11,000 university professors every year and supports innovation by encouraging about 1,300 Canadian companies to invest in university research and training. Over the past 10 years, NSERC has invested \$6 billion in basic research, university-industry projects, and the training of Canada's next generation of scientists and engineers.

Notice of application of larvicide for mosquito control

From Monday, June 4 to Sunday, Sept. 30, Brock University will conduct a larviciding program under the authority of the Medical Officer of Health to control larval mosquitoes in order to prevent their development into vectors of West Nile Virus. The larvicide Methoprene (ingot formulation, PCP No. 27694) under the federal Pest Control Products Act will be applied by direct hand application into catch basins at Brock University owned and leased properties within the Region of Niagara.

The biological larvicide(s) B.t.i. (granular formulation, PCP No. 18158, liquid formulation PCP No. 21602) may be placed by direct hand application into selected bodies of surface water such as ditches and ponds, depending on the results of testing for the presence of mosquito larvae. Signs will be posted at surface water locations where B.t.i. is applied. All larvicides will be applied by Ministry of the Environment licensed applicators. Mediatalk People in the news

Convocation celebrates the Class of 2007

The most degrees and certificates ever conferred in Brock University's 43-year history took place at this year's Spring Convocation, where an estimated 4,000 students graduated during nine ceremonies from June 12 to 16.

At each commemoration, graduates and guests listened to inspiring advice from Brock President Jack Lightstone, four honorary degree recipients, two 2007 Faculty Award for Excellence in Teaching recipients and three guest speakers.

You have managed to complete hundreds of readings, assignments, papers, presentations, research projects, tests, examinations, and discussions. You have deepened and broadened your understanding of the complex world in which we live."

The following is a sampling of the messages guest speakers shared with graduates:

Dr. Robin C. Williams, Medical Officer of Health and Commissioner of Public Health, the Regional Municipality of Niagara:

Finally, on this life journey, this path, this roller coaster ride you're on, today you're just at the top of one of the peaks on your ride - where there is an instant of pause to reflect and look around. And although I don't know how many hills or valleys, or curves your ride will include, or how many times you'll go round the track, or who will get on or off your train, I do know you'll be thrown around a bit - life's like that. And I also know that you're not on this ride alone; life's a team sport so I ask that you have a look at who's on the train with you, your friends, your teachers and mentors, and of course your parents and family.'

Professor Lorne Adams, Department of Physical Education and Kinesiology, Faculty of Applied Health Sciences and Director of Athletics:

'Change is unsettling, change is scary, change is anxiety inducing. That is why we have phrases like, 'That's the way we've always done it.' It's known its safe, it's familiar. Clasp you hands together. Notice which thumb is on top. Pull your hands apart. Now put them together again, but put the other thumb on top. It's uncomfortable. It will require courage when there are lots of thumbs out there and they all want to be on top."

"My message to you graduates who are here

today — you are our future policy makers, teachers, politicians, business leaders, community leaders — is to think about your work and look at the

Today's teachers are expected to know vastly more about every subject they teach than my mother's generation; to address the needs of every student in the room, not just the ones who learn easily; to embrace technology that even the dreamers could not have imagined 80 years ago. But with all the changes, one thing remains constant. The heart of teaching is in the relationships you establish with your students.'

The first, and largest, component of the plan to be executed is a renewal of the Tower Cafeteria, including the development and enclosure of the adjacent 12,000square-foot outdoor courtyard.


"This exciting project has the opportunity to utilize underused space for the benefit of the entire Brock community," says Tom Arkell, Director of Community and Ancillary Services. "In addition, the transformation and expansion of the food service facilities will provide greater choice and service for

The plan would see the courtyard enclosed, and the new space will

accommodate a 4,500-square-foot marché, a 1,000-square-foot fresh food marketplace, and will triple the amount of available seating currently being offered. As an added bonus, the space will provide much-needed social space for students, staff and faculty, immediately adjacent to the new Learning Commons.

"The Learning Commons facility will be greatly enhanced by this adjacent development," says Kim Meade, Associate Vice-President, Student Services. "Prospective students, parents, faculty, staff, students, alumni and community members will benefit from the additional features being offered in the courtyard."

The cafeteria and courtyard projects will be self-financed through revenues from the University dining

The CFI awards more than \$125,000 to Brock researchers

The Canada Foundation for Innovation (CFI) announced recently that it has awarded \$127,514 to Brock University to support two projects led by Professor Isabelle Lesschaeve of the Cool Climate Oenology and Viticulture Institute (CCOVI), and Georgii Nikonov of the Department of Chemistry.

'Knowledge-intensive economies and societies of the 21st century will be characterized by innovative research, and a highly educated and skilled workforce," says Dr. Eliot Phillipson, president and CEO of the CFI. "Over the past 10 years, the CFI's investments have been a major factor in enabling Brock University to attract some of the world's best researchers. Today's investment will ensure that this trend continues.'

Lesschaeve's work will focus on consumer behaviour and preference, by gaining an understanding of sensory and non-sensory factors affecting Canadian consumer perception of wine quality. Lesschaeve, Director of CCOVI, intends to establish a consumer behavioural laboratory to conduct both qualitative and quantitative measurements of consumer liking, purchase intent and consumption in simulated contexts. She has been awarded \$68,922 in this round of CFI funding.

Nikonov's research interests focus on hydride chemistry, including applications to molecular catalysis. This approach is designed to meet the growing demands of chemical manufacturers, including pharmaceutical companies that seek more efficient and "greener" (less waste-producing) chemical processes. He will receive \$58,592 in CFI funding for the project.

Brock welcomes its first Fulbright scholar

The Centre for Teaching, Learning and Education Technologies (CTLET), Brock International and the Office of the Associate Vice-President Research and International Development are pleased to announce the arrival of Brock University's first Canada-U.S. Fulbright scholar, Richard L. Lanigan.

Lanigan is an acclaimed professor and researcher from Southern Illinois University at Carbondale (SIUC). As Director and Fellow of the International Communicology Institute and a Fulbright Senior Specialist, he specializes in intercultural communication and semiotics, focusing mainly on Asian culture. His research interests include sign, symbol, and representation theory; semiotics; social code theory; the philosophy of communication; as well as intercultural and cross-cultural communication.

Lanigan will give an open public lecture, entitled "The Home-World Model of Culture and Communication", on Monday, June 25, from 3 to 4:30 p.m. in Pond Inlet, followed by a wine and cheese reception.

Michael Hawes, executive director of the Foundation for Educational Exchange Between Canada and the United States of America, will also attend the lecture and will give a brief overview of opportunities for Brock scholars (both professors and students) to participate in Fulbright. The foundation, based in Ottawa, is responsible for administering the Canada-U.S. Fulbright program in Canada. Their programs aim to give

scholars more opportunities to share their research with relevant audiences in both countries and participate in various national and binational debates.

Lanigan will be at Brock for a little more than one month. During his visit, Lanigan will collaborate closely with his academic colleague and host, Maureen Connolly, Director of CTLET, and with the Office of the Associate Vice-President Research and International Development.

In addition to joint research with Connolly, Lanigan will be delivering a series of workshops and tutorials for interested participants at Brock, including teaching assistants, graduate students, faculty and staff. Session topics will range from non-verbal communication and east-meets-west culture systems, to interviewing techniques and small group dynamics, to qualitative research methods, academic publishing, and visual culture.

TAP offers students opportunity to become global citizens

Students from the Department of Dramatic Arts will become global citizens as they participate in TAP (Turn Around Project), an interdisciplinary applied theatre research project in Port Antonio, Jamaica, this summer.

On Thursday, June 28, Professor Jane Leavitt from the Department of Dramatic Arts, and Michael St. George, an arts educator and renowned Dub poet, will lead 18 Brock students in the intensive applied theatre project.

Fifteen students enrolled in DART 3F99, an Advanced Tutorial in Dramatic Arts, are required to co-ordinate and run workshops as well as prepare and analyze data for 110 children. Two students from Brock's Film Studies program will create a documentary about TAP that will be used in presentations at academic conferences, and Ryan Burke, President of the Black Students' Society from Brock University, will also accompany the group on the trip.

During this project, Brock students will face social, cultural and educational issues that have important ramifications for personal, professional, and intellectual growth.


"By equipping students with cultural knowledge, artistic and analytical skills, and by offering an international teaching experience, we help students become global citizens," says Leavitt.

The goal of TAP is to offer Jamaican children a free arts program for five years in order to contribute to a movement to inspire lives and communities. Educators from the University of the West Indies in Kingston, Jamaica, and from the College of Agriculture Science and Education in Port Antonio, Jamaica, will work with TAP examining relevant social issues through drama, music, art, storytelling and dance. The data and research acquired in this year's pilot project will assist in the design of subsequent years.

The arts project will be held at Titchfield High School in Port Antonio. Children participating in TAP will come from three primary schools and Titchfield High School, all in Port Antonio, and from the August Town community in Kingston. This area of Jamaica is considered challenging because of the difficult conditions that many children live with every day.

Nine-year-old cancer survivor ready for relay



Brock Taraba is linked to Brock University by more than his first name. The nine-year-old boy is an example of the connection that the institution enjoys and encourages with the broader community.

Last year, Brock completed the Survivor Lap at the Relay for Life, an annual fundraiser for cancer research that was held at the University through its Community Connections program. He will participate again at this year's event, which takes place Friday, June 22 on the University campus.

Brock's mother, Lori Synes-Taraba, who graduated last week with an Honours degree in Child and Youth Studies, says "that first lap with my son was one of the most emotional walks I have ever had."

Brock was diagnosed with high-risk acute lymphoblastic leukemia at the age of 10 months. Synes-Taraba and her husband Stephen (BA, admi/soci, '96) were told their baby had 20 days to live.

After intensive treatment, including radiation therapy, the little boy was given

the "all clear" in November 2005. Brock is now a patient of the After-Care Clinic at McMaster Children's Hospital for posttreatment and growth and development checkups.

"Brock University has been tremendous in its support for allowing the Relay for Life to take place," says Synes-Taraba, who sits on the Relay for Life committee. "It was extra special that Steve and I met there, that we named Brock to represent our beginnings as a couple, and that Brock was able to walk his first Survivor Lap there

"As a whole, Brock University has been there for all of our family accomplishments," she continues. "It was so fitting that Brock took his first Survivor steps at a place that means so much to our family."

The active boy with the winning smile sums things up best: "It's great to be here."

Nationalism book by Brock professor receives national award

"Ît's fitting that the Smiley Prize would be awarded to someone like Professor Stevenson who has contributed so much to the understanding of Canadian politics over the years," says David Siegel, Dean of Social Sciences at Brock.

The prize was established in honour of the late Donald V. Smiley, an internationally renowned professor of Canadian government and politics.

Gillian Kemp, program director of Brock's Corporate Social Responsibility and Sustainability Initiative in the Faculty of Business, was interviewed by Niagara This Week for a June 6 article – "Brock business program gets boost from Meridian" – about a \$50,000 donation from Meridian Credit Union to support the initiative over the next three years.

But they can also be damaging at times – like when we slot people into categories and we forget they're just like other objects in the world."



Lightstone gears up for another year

A synchronized meshing of gears will move Brock University and the Niagara region forward in the next year, says Jack Lightstone, Brock President and Vice-Chancellor.

Reflecting on his first year in office — he was named to the position on Nov. 16, 2005, and was officially appointed on July 1, 2006 — Lightstone said a significant challenge facing the University is the development of strategies in which Brock's partners work in concert to reach shared objectives.

"I'm struck by the extent to which Brock, the Region of Niagara and Niagara College have to be understood as key to the cultural, social and economic well-being of the region," said Lightstone. "The gears have to mesh. Part of the gears belong to Brock, part to the community and part to Niagara College."

To create this 'transmission', said Lightstone, meetings have been taking place, and will continue indefinitely, with Terry Boak, Vice-President, Academic; Kim Meade, Associate Vice-President, Student Services; and their counterparts at Niagara College.

Their task, said Lightstone, is to find new ways to collaborate.

"The level of Brock's engagement in the community is now more fully understood by ourselves and our partners, and over the next year we'll see the mechanisms develop to move us forward," he said.

Looking into the future, Lightstone said a critical challenge is to address Brock's space deficit.

"We need better and more academic space, and we know this will not happen overnight," he said. "A great deal has been accomplished, though, to lay the groundwork to address the problem."

Brock, he explained, is lobbying the provincial government "with persistence and rigour, and we are making headway."

Fundraising will be another part of the financial solution. David Petis, newly appointed Vice-President, Advancement, will play a major role in this arena, he said.


Brock's budget exercises, Lightstone continued, will be tough again this

"By not allowing the University to slip into debt on the operational side, Brock will be in much better shape to use future government funding to develop instead of using it to pay off debt."

Lightstone concluded that the strength of Brock lies in its people—faculty, staff and students.

On the matter of faculty, Lightstone said he was struck, upon his arrival at Brock, by the reality of how many new faculty had been hired in the past six years.

"This represents tremendous transformative potential for Brock in the long term," said Lightstone. "It is very exciting and very energizing."

Brock partners with Japanese universities

In a demonstration of its strong commitment to international collaboration, Brock University signed an agreement of cooperation with two universities in Tokyo, Japan, in early June.

Kim Meade, Associate Vice-President, Student Services, and Glen Irons, Director, International Market Development, represented Brock on the overseas mission.

"Exciting opportunities for faculty, students and administrators present themselves with these agreements," said Meade. "They will provide a basis for promoting international and intercultural understanding and will enrich the educational environments of all parties."

Brock and the two Japanese institutions
— J. F. Oberlin University and Hosei
University — agreed to pursue and promote
the following initiatives:

- Exchange of faculty and staff for teaching, research and professional development
- Student exchange for academic programs, language and cultural experience
- Exchange visits of administrators

- Exchange of teaching and research
- Long-term English as a Second Language (ESL) students will receive academic credit at the home institution for each semester they study full-time ESL at Brock
- Further avenues of co-operation, such as short-term group exchanges, student internships and other related initiatives, as agreed upon by both parties

Irons said the intake of students from Oberlin University for long-term ESL programs will begin in Fall 2007, and the second intake arrives in May 2008. September and May will be the intake months in subsequent years.

The first intake of Hosei students, said Irons, will be in September 2008, with May and September intakes of about 20 to 30 students thereafter.

Brock already has an agreement with Hokkai-Gakuen Education Consortium in Sapporo, Japan. Groups of high school and university students have been arriving in March and September for the past seven years.

On June 21, approximately 120 public health professionals attended the "First Canadian Symposium on the Hygiene Profession and Science: An Integrated View," at Brock's Hamilton campus, hosted by the Stanier Institute at Brock and organized by Dawn Prentice, Assistant Professor of Nursing, Brock University and Dave Young, Manager of Health Protection and Promotion, Niagara Region Public Health.

Hygiene topics discussed at the symposium covered three main areas of concern: food and water quality, toxic materials in the environment and pathogen transmission and prevention. These subjects were presented from the viewpoint of education, research and practice involving manufacturers, service providers, public and environmental health inspectors, as well as hospital and clinical professionals.

Alun Hughes, Associate Professor of Geography, was interviewed by the Niagara Falls Review for a June 14 article about the first published sketch and eyewitness account of Niagara Falls contained in the book - "A New Discovery of a Vast Country in America" - published in 1698, which chronicles the voyage of Father Louis Hennepin, a French missionary and adventurer who explored the Great Lakes region of Canada in the 1670s. In the article, Hughes notes that while it is not certain who first discovered Niagara Falls, Hennepin was certainly the first to write about it and use the modern spelling of "Niagara" in his book. The article was picked up by the Canadian Press and published in newspapers across the country.

Antonia Kronlund, Assistant Professor of Marketing, International Business and Strategy, was recently interviewed by the Globe and Mail for a June 20 story about funding that she and fellow researcher Isabelle Lesschaeve, Director, CCOVI, received from the Canadian Foundation for Innovation to study consumer behaviour and preference, by gaining an understanding of sensory and non-sensory factors affecting Canadian consumer perception of wine quality. The article -"Why you drink what you do (apart from the obvious reason)" – focuses on the creation of the new consumer behaviour laboratory at Brock and notes: "Part psychology lab, part focus-group boardroom and part stage set, the facility, which was launched last week with a \$69,000 federal grant, will enable researchers to create a variety of ambiences, including a barrel-cellar tasting room, candle-lit restaurant and liquor store.

South Africa graduate student first in partnership

North-West University in South Africa has been one of Brock's partner institutions since 2005. Although a relatively new partnership, it certainly has been a very active one in terms of student and faculty participation.

For the past two years, senior administrators, faculty members and students from both universities have participated in institutional visits, research collaboration, project development and academic internships. In 2006 and 2007, two Master of Education students from Brock were able to take part in rewarding 16-week internships at North-West University, through the Student for Development Program funded by Canadian International Development Agency.

Most recently, in February 2007, Anitha Jacobs, a Master of Education student, was selected as the first student from North-West University to come to Brock for a 16-week internship experience. Her internship was made possible by a pilot project launched by Foreign Affairs and International Trade Canada (DFAIT).

The goal of the pilot project Commonwealth Africa Graduate Students Exchange 2007 was to encourage universities to develop or expand their graduate level exchange programs involving African Commonwealth countries and to provide opportunity for developing-country students to participate in existing exchange programs.

2007-08 tuition fee

structure amended

Brock University has amended the school's recently approved 2007-08 tuition fee structure so that it will now only apply to new incoming Year 1 students for the 2007-08 academic

The implementation for continuing students is postponed until 2008-09.

The delay in implementation will

The delay in implementation will provide continuing students at the University with the opportunity to plan their program of study and assess any potential financial impact a year before the fee change takes affect.

In March, the Brock University Board of Trustees approved changes in the tuition fee structure that would take effect during the 2007-08 academic year. Similar to full-time tuition fee policies and models at other Ontario universities and colleges, the flat fee is a full-time fee equivalent to the rate of 5.0 credits for all undergraduate students taking a credit load of 4.0 to 5.0 credits in the Fall/Winter session.

Undergraduate students would continue to pay on a per-credit basis for credit loads less than 4.0 or more than 5.0 and those in the Spring/Summer session as the typical credit load is less than 4.0 credits. The "flat fee" terminology was adopted to avoid confusion with the full-time enrolment definition of 3.0 credits.

Summer Instructional Skills Workshops-Faculty and Teaching Assistants



Scholarship established in appreciation of professor's dedication

A Brock University graduate has shown his gratitude to one of his former professors with the establishment of a scholarship named after him. Roelof Makken (BA, economics/BAdmin,'85), principal of his own firm Tern Analytics Inc. and a member of Brock's Board of Trustees, has established the Mohammed Dore Graduate Scholarship, named for Professor Mohammed Dore, Economics.

"I was surprised and almost shocked when I was informed of the scholarship at a special lunch with Dr. (Terry) Boak (Vice-President. Academic)," said Dore. "But as my Dean (David Siegel, Faculty of Social Sciences) says, it provides a capstone to my long teaching career. It is good to know that my teaching made such a difference to one bright student, who has decided to thank me in this special way. The scholarship is in perpetuity and so it will be there for students long after i am gone."

The first scholarship will be presented in 2008 to a graduate student who is actively involved in research and other activities in the fields of economics or business. If there are multiple candidates, preference will be given to a bilingual student.

Dore encouraged Makken to attend graduate school after he earned his undergraduate degrees instead of leaving academia to enter the workforce. Dore even picked out the graduate school — the Katholieke Universiteit Leuven in Belgium.

"My education at Brock had me well prepared for Leuven," said Makken. "Since graduating from university, I have had a fantastic professional life. I realized if it hadn't been for Professor Dore, all this might not have happened.

"I have a tremendous admiration for people who go out of their way to make a difference," he continued. "I felt that Professor Dore's extraordinary lectures, mentoring and enthusiasm should be recognized."

The endowment to fund the scholarship is \$50,000. Makken contributed \$25,000, an amount that was matched by the Ontario government

"I hope that others who have had an extraordinary time at Brock and have reaped the benefits of a terrific education will also contemplate helping the University," said Makken

Africa last Fall, Jacobs participated in a larger research project titled "Women across races who have aspired to educational administration in Canada and South Africa". Kobus Mentz, North-West University, and Denise Armstrong, Brock University, are the co-investigators. Professor Dolana Mogadime, from Brock's Faculty of Education, the lead investigator, has been the champion and driving force for the ongoing collaboration with North-West University, and also served as Jacobs' internship supervisor and mentor. Together, they conducted many interviews with women taking leadership roles in the field of education in Ontario. "This has been an experience of a lifetime..." said Jacobs, reflecting on her internship. She gained both professionally and personally from this academic and research experience over the past four

The DFAIT internship provided an opportunity for Jacobs to attend the largest national educational conference in Canada entitled, the *Canadian Association for the Study of Education (CSSE)* at the University of Saskatchewan, Saskatoon, May 26-29, 2007.

CSSE is the major national voice for those who create educational knowledge, prepare teachers and educational leaders, and apply research in the schools, classrooms and institutions of Canada.

After exploring the literature by Canadian scholars on women in administration, Jacobs commented that her experiences of the Canadian educational research literature "was enriched" by meeting those same scholars at CSSE.

"This has been an invaluable opportunity to explore new research areas related to women, social equality, and democracy from international contexts."

2007 Lou Cahill Scholarship winner announced

Jeff Nicholls of Ridgeway, Ont., is the 2007 winner of the first Lou Cahill Scholarship in Communications, awarded by Brock University. - Provide access to programs offered by the Centre for Teaching, Learning and Educational Technologies which will assist them in their role as Teaching Assistants;
- TA's can refer their undergraduate student to the resources available to assist them in their learning;
- Provide additional employment opportunities to gain teaching experience;
- Allow access to programs offered by Career Services and the Student Development Centre;
- Better serve students who are completing their degrees on a part-time basis or in a nontraditional time frame.

Zinni, Assistant Professor of Organizational Behaviour, Human Resources, Entrepreneurship and Ethics, was recently interviewed by *The Business Executive* for an article about changing management trends in the workplace, entitled "Balancing a workplace that is no longer a one-size-fits-all," which appears in the magazine's July 2007 issue.



Chancellor's Chairs for Research Excellence Announced

Brock University has named four 2007 Chancellor's Chairs for Research Excellence. They are Professor Michael Ashton from Department of Psychology, Professor Dirk DeClercq from the Department of Organizational Behaviour, Human Resources Management, Entrepreneurship and Ethics, Professor John Hay from Community Health Sciences and Professor Hans-Georg Moeller from the Department of Philosophy.

The Brock award recognizes individuals who demonstrate excellence in their scholarly research and creative abilities, and have made exceptional contributions to the advancement of their field. Successful nominees receive a three-year grant to undertake a specific program of research leading to a significant development in their scholarship. Recipients of the award will also present a lecture on their research to the Brock community during the upcoming academic year.

"This year's Chancellor's Chairs represent an investment in Brock's future as a comprehensive, more research-intensive University," says Michael Owen, Associate Vice-President, Research-and-International—Development. "These awards acknowledge and support those faculty members with innovative ideas, great potential and a commitment to translating their research into programs and publications accessible to scholars, communities, and our economy."

Ashton is a social psychologist specializing in personality variations. His research will examine the political views that may be related to certain dimensions of personality and explore the possibility of predicting ethical decisions based on those traits.


From the individual to the corporate to the national level, De Clercq looks at the factors that motivate, inform and shape venture capitalism. His research will explore the impact of entrepreneurs on the innovation levels within a country.

Hay is an expert in pediatric health and exercise. Analyzing his existing research database on the health and physical activity levels of Niagara children, he will develop gender- and age-based tools to assess children's perceptions of their own physical activity. He will also evaluate interventions designed for children with Developmental Co-ordination Disorder.

Building on his recent book, Luhmann Explained, Moeller will examine current conceptions of civil society and the potential drastic effects of implementing the theories of the controversial German social theorist.

Created in 2001, the Chancellor's Chairs for Research Excellence recognizes high-quality research, scholarly and creative achievement by providing a three-year grant to support an individual's research program. Building on the Canada Research Chair Program, the Chancellor's Chair Program is a key element in Brock University's transition from a primarily undergraduate to a comprehensive, research-intensive institution.

Athletes still standing after 'Try a Triathlon' event



Competitors from across the campus came together recently to participate in the first ever "Try a Triathlon" hosted by Campus Security Services.

There were no podiums or national anthems at the end of Campus Security's first "Try a Triathlon", but participating athletes came away feeling like champions nonetheless.

On July 31 in blistering heat, 27 athletes of varying abilities swam, cycled and ran to complete the event. Thirteen individual competitors, four teams of three and one team of two gave their all in the exciting and personally rewarding challenge. There were a few laughs along the way and no one was injured.

The goal was not to be the first across the finish line, but to finish.

The race started with a 100-metre swim in the Eleanor Misener pool, followed by 12 km of cycling and then a three-km run to the finish line. The paved cycling course had enough straightaways for the road-racing cycle owners to get up some speed and enough twists and turns to allow those on mountain bikes, one complete with a baby seat, to be keep page.

Human dolphin Ian Young, Department of Recreation Services, led the swim portion for his team, powering through the 100 metres in one minute, 21 seconds. Kevin Grout, University Advancement, who learned to swim just three weeks earlier, inspired onlookers with his tenacity.

Terry Boak, Vice-President, Academic, challenged student Matt Rocca for the lead through the cycling and running but it was Rocca who crossed the finish line first.

Student Erin Cox persisted despite the mechanical problems with her bike, and she finished the race holding to her mother's pre-race advice of " don't drown, don't get hurt, and don't cheat."

Everyone who participated met official "Try the tri" standards if the swim would have been lengthened by 275 metres.

Many thanks to volunteers, staff and students who came out to cheer and to Sodexho and Community Connections for their donations of food and staff. This sort of event is not possible without the strong support of the Brock community.

More than \$1.2 million for research in the human sciences

The Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council of Canada (SSHRC) recently awarded funding totalling \$1,260,974 to support 15 research projects at Brock in areas ranging from poetry and psychology to physical education and political science.

"We are excited by the research opportunities that this funding represents," says Michael Owen, Associate Vice-President, Research and International Development. "These awards recognize the high-quality research being conducted by Brock faculty – research that can have a real and significant impact, not only on the academic community, but on the daily lives of people in the Niagara region and beyond."

Among the Brock researchers receiving funding is Philip Sullivan, associate professor in the Department of Physical Education and Kinesiology. Sullivan's research will investigate the impact of adult coaching in youth sport. "This is an extremely important issue for the health and development of Canada's youth," he says. Ultimately, he hopes the research will encourage Canadian youth to get and stay active in sport.

Comparing the Canadian "mosaic" and American "melting pot," Professor Garth Stevenson of the Department of Political Science will explore the ways cultural diversity have been experienced on both sides of the border. Stevenson's SSHRC award will enable him to travel to national archives in Ottawa and Washington, and to hire graduate students as research assistants, "which will expedite the research at the same time as it contributes to their development as young scholars," says Stevenson.

With his SSHRC research grant,
Angus Smith, a professor in the
Department of Classics, will be
travelling to Greece to excavate an
endangered Mycenaean cemetery. "As
an ongoing international project
incurring major equipment expenses
and employing dozens of students and
specialists, the need for generous
financial support is crucial," he says.

The funding for Brock researchers was announced as part of a national SSHRC investment of more than \$77.8 million in research funding for more than 2,800 projects at universities across Canada.

SSHRC is an independent federal government agency that funds university-based research and graduate training through national peer-review competitions. SSHRC also partners with public and private sector organizations to focus research and aid the development of better policies and practices in key areas of Canada's social, cultural and economic life.

Welland Canal survey maps now online

In the late 1980s, fifty-three survey maps detailing the second Welland Canal from Port Dalhousie to Port Colborne were destined to be pitched in the trash. Fortunately, the historical value of these maps was not lost on Dr. John N. Jackson who rescued these treasures and transferred them to the Brock University Special Collections and Archives. These maps have been digitized and are now available for viewing at: http://images.ourontario.ca/brock/. Use the word "Welland" in the search field to see all the maps.

These maps were most likely created in the 1860s in an effort to keep track of the land and structures associated with the canal. The layout of the canal is recorded with incredible detail – even the surveyor's notes and measurements in pencil and ink are visible. Remnants of the first Welland Canal are noted where appropriate. But the maps go much further to document some local businesses, homes, landmarks, property owners, and streets.

The maps have been mounted onto a digital cultural content portal called OurOntario. The portal is designed as

a one-stop site where digitized materials from all over Ontario can be viewed by researchers anytime. The OurOntario website has a number of features to help visitors utilize the records through simple and advanced text searches. The website also links to Google Maps which displays modern views of the maps either as a satellite image, road map or a hybrid of both.

OurOntario takes the user experience one step further. It allows you to be an active contributor to the presented history. If you have particular insights into a feature on a map, you can add a comment for future users to read, learn from and explore further. You can even create and submit an essay (complete with photos) that can be linked to the map collection. To spark a historical dialogue, we have included one or more "Mystery Questions" to accompany each map. It would be great to have these questions answered and to see new questions posed. Whatever interests you about these maps is up for discussion.

Professor Danielle Parks

Professor Danielle Parks of the Department of Classics died quietly at her home on Tuesday, July 31 after battling Leukemia for two-and-a-half-years. She was 41 years old. Her death is a great loss to us all and to academe worldwide.

Danielle was dedicated to her research and teaching, and especially to her students. She set high standards for herself and for all whom she encountered. She inspired many of her students to attend graduate school. At Brock, she was instrumental in the establishment of our graduate programme and was Graduate Program Director for the first year of the programme. Danielle loved being in the field and included many of our students in her work overseas on Cyprus. She spent many of her summers training undergraduate students in our field school

there. She was also active in the local community, serving on the executive of the Niagara Peninsula Chapter of the Archaeological Institute of America.

Danielle was a scholar of international stature. Her research focused on the Roman to late Roman Amathus Gate Cemetery at Kourion, Cyprus. While still a PhD student, she became director of the excavation. Her recent work there has focused on processing the remains and using the material to investigate the transition from paganism to Christianity on Cyprus. She recently published Roman Coinage of Cyprus (Cyprus Numismatic Society, Nicosia 2005), which looked at how coinage types and distributions clarify issues of provincial relations, trade and economy. She is also the author of numerous articles and chapters in books relating to both areas of interest.

Danielle continued to be active in the department with teaching and service and continued her involvement in field projects, conferences and publishing throughout her illness. She never lost her zeal for life. She had much more to offer and contribute, but there is much to celebrate about the life she had. She was a dear friend and colleague and will be greatly missed.



Brock awarded Silver designation for going green

Brock University is celebrating its membership in an exclusive environmental club.

The Plaza Building, formerly known as Plaza2006, is the third post-secondary building in Ontario and the seventh in Canada to earn the LEED (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design) Silver certification. The award recognizes energy conservation and environmentally responsible construction such as construction waste disposal, healthy indoor environment for occupants, site selection, and other initiatives.

LEED certification is awarded by the Canadian Green Building Council (CaGBC) once stringent environmental expectations have been met and the environmental and resource impact has been reduced.

To earn the Silver designation, Brock accomplished the following:

- High thermal efficiency of boilers
- High thermal resistance of the walls and roof.
- Double-glazed, argon-filled, low e-coating windows with thermally broken aluminum frames
- Lowered lighting power density
- Reduced indoor potable water use by 60 per cent with dual-flush toilets, lowflow urinals and lavatories
- Rainwater collection
- Used more than 30 per cent regional material
- Provided superior indoor environmental quality for the tenants with construction indoor air quality management, lowemitting materials, indoor chemical control and thermal comfort.


The energy cost performance is almost 43 per cent better than the Model National Energy Code for Buildings.

The Plaza Building officially opens on Tuesday, Sept. 18.

The five-storey, 86,000-square-foot building, which has redefined Brock's front entrance, houses a diversity of "addresses", including the Lifespan Development Research Centre (LDRC). The ground floor contains a significantly expanded campus bookstore and a direct link to the Alumni Student Centre. The second and third floors house academic offices, computer labs, classrooms and seminar rooms and the upper two floors contain the LDRC research facilities. A key feature is the social space now available to

LDRC, a facility unique in Canada, is a collaborative effort between various academic departments and community organizations providing a centralized location of expertise to study how development occurs across the human lifespan.

Three professors from Brock University have been recognized by the Province of Ontario for their outstanding classroom skills and ability to stimulate students to think creatively and critically.

This evening at the Opening of Term celebration, Brock will recognize Professor Ernest N. Biktimirov, Finance, Operations and Information Systems, Professor Barry W. K. Joe, Digital Humanities, and Professor Anna H. Lathrop, Physical Education and Kinesiology, who have each been awarded one of the province's inaugural Leadership in Faculty Teaching (LIFT) awards.

The LIFT award was developed by the Ministry of Training, Colleges and Universities to recognize and encourage teaching excellence at colleges and universities in Ontario. One hundred LIFT awards were awarded to faculty who influence, motivate and inspire students as well as demonstrate leadership in teaching methods.

Winners will receive \$20,000 over two years to encourage continued excellence in the classroom setting.

Professor Ernest N. Biktimirov joined Brock University in July 1999. He teaches both undergraduate and graduate finance courses, and conducts research in the areas of investments and financial education.

He has been the recipient of the University and Faculty of Business Distinguished Teaching Awards. He is also a holder of the Brock Chancellor's Chair for Teaching Excellence. In 2006 he won the inaugural Teaching Excellence Award competition at the Academy of Finance conference in Chicago.

Biktimirov has published many papers in the area of finance and financial education. Several of his educational papers won the best paper award at the Financial Management Association International (2002), International College Teaching Methods and Styles (2005), and Administrative Sciences Association of Canada (2006) conferences.

"It is a great honour to be recognized among the distinguished teachers of Ontario's colleges and universities," says Biktimirov. "As a recipient of this prestigious award, I feel increased responsibility to advance teaching excellence in academia."

Professor Barry W. K. Joe has taught at Brock University since 1980 in three departments across two faculties. He was originally appointed to the Department of Germanic and Slavic Studies, was later crossappointed to Communications Studies, and most recently became the first fully appointed faculty member of Digital Humanities, where he teaches in the innovative Interactive Arts and Sciences program.

He was Director of the Centre for Teaching, Learning and Educational Technologies from 1998 to 2002, during which time he was also Special Advisor to the President on Teaching. In 2003, he became the founding Director of the Centre for Digital Humanities.

Joe was the recipient of the Brock University Distinguished Teaching Award in 1999, and in 2000 he was honoured with Canada's national post-secondary teaching award, the 3M Teaching Fellowship Award.

"The Leadership in Faculty
Teaching Award from the Province of
Ontario demonstrates the importance
that the government has placed on
post-secondary teaching, as
universities help shape the future
citizens of Ontario," says Joe. "I share
this distinction with my students,
past, present, and future, for their
intellectual growth is the ultimate

With the recent approval of its Applied Behaviour Analysis graduate course sequence by the Behavior Analysis Certification Board (BACB), the Centre for Applied Disability Studies is positioning itself to help meet the growing demand for qualified behaviour analysts in Ontario.

Students obtaining a Master of Arts in Applied Disability Studies, Master of Applied Disability Studies or the Graduate Diploma and who specialize in the Applied Behaviour Analysis (ABA) field will now be eligible to apply to become a Board Certified Behaviour Analyst.

Brock's master's programming in Applied Disabilities Studies, which offers specialization in ABA, is the only graduate program of its kind in the province, and only the third in Canada, to offer an approved course sequence to become a BCBA-certified behaviour analyst.

"This is big news for the disabilities community because there is a tremendous need for well-trained and accredited behavior analysts in Ontario," says Maurice Feldman, Director of the Centre for Applied Disability Studies. "The BACB qualification is becoming increasingly important for many positions involving interventions for persons with a variety of disabilities, including autism, intellectual disabilities and acquired brain injury."

brain injury."

Many of Brock's Applied Disabilities students are part-time students who are employed full time in the community. Hence, the Centre offers the BACB-approved course sequence at times and places convenient to working students, including week-long and weekend courses in some cases. Courses have been offered in Toronto and Hamilton, as well as in St. Catharines, and there are plans to offer a satellite program in the Ottawa area in the near future.

"This is welcome news for our organization, since BACB-certified staff are needed to supervise Intensive Behavioral Intervention (IBI) programs in the province's nine regions currently serving more than 1,000 children with autism," says Margaret Spoelstra, Executive Director, Autism Ontario. "Parents of children receiving IBI will be very pleased to know that this certification has been granted to Brock University - right here in Ontario; and that the bar has been raised for professional qualifications and standards. Parents want to know that their children with autism are receiving treatments and educational supports based on the most current and respected evidence, and that the people responsible for implementing those programs have received the best possible training, with clear professional accountability."

ABA is also the treatment of choice for persons with developmental disabilities and acquired brain injury,

The undergraduate students have already committed \$1million through their recent referendum. The Board of Trustees and senior administration have heartily supported the project.

All faculty and staff will be given the opportunity in early September to join the growing numbers in support of this project that has campus-wide appeal and farreaching positive effects. Once all of the Brock community has had a chance to show its support, the campaign will go public. The extended community will be pleased and encouraged to hear of the University's enthusiastic internal support.

The construction contract for the Learning Commons has been awarded to T. R. Hinan Contractors Inc. of St. Catharines, Ont., and construction is expected to begin in late August/early September.

The Learning Commons is one of the University's most important projects for 2007-08. Designed by Diamond & Schmitt Architects Inc., the project will transform the entire main floor of the James A. Gibson Library, including the area formerly occupied by the University Bookstore, and will encompass more than 20,000 square feet. When completed, the Learning Commons will provide an array of learning support services in a vibrant academic space designed to promote informal learning.

The Brock blitz — thousands of students move into residence

Six hours, 2,400 students and their families, more than 100 volunteers — it must be residence move-in day at Brock University.

In its traditional one-day blitz, Brock University will welcome thousands of students in one-hour increments, beginning at 9 a.m. and ending at 3 p.m., to its six residence complexes on Labour Day Monday, Sept. 3. Six hours and thousands of boxes and bags later, students will have moved into their rooms and parents will have made their goodbyes. At 4 p.m., residence students will gather for meetings for the start of Orientation Week.

Jamie Fleming, Director, Residences, has missed only one move-in day in his 25 years at Brock, and that was to move his son into an out-of-town university residence a few years ago.

Co-ordinating the marathon moving day is Cindy Chernish, Manager, Residence Facilities and Finance. Preparation and training begin months in advance.

In July, several pages of useful information (Where do I get my keys? Can I bring or rent a fridge?) and the moving-day schedule is sent to students, giving them and their families a few months to plan their arrival.

A small army of student volunteers and Brock staff help to ensure that the day moves along as quickly as possible.

Head Residents, eight students who are the senior members of the Residence Life Staff, began intensive training July 29. They will oversee their buildings and will help to train the residence dons (44 students), activity co-ordinators and academic programmers (14 students) who began their training Aug. 26. Responsibilities range from directing traffic to team building, mediation, event planning and risk

management. The Residence Action Council executives began training Aug. 26 and they will also help with move-in day activities.

About 50 student volunteers from Brock University Students' Association will do the heavy lifting of belongings at each residence on moving day and also join in the pep rally on the holiday Sunday.

Staff departments also pitch in to help families. Conference Services provides a golf cart/van and safety vests; Sodexho serves dinner to all 2,400 students Monday night and keeps three outlets open for the day; SMART Start staff operate the key pickup tables; IT/Communication Services assist with internet/phone problems and provide ID cards for those who haven't yet received them; Parking Services provide sign boards and access to locked gates; Facilities Management provides a locksmith and carpenter to handle emergencies; Custodial staff arrange for extra bins and help to keep things looking tidy; and Campus Security maintain a helpful presence throughout O-Week.

"For some of our volunteers and staff people, this is one of the most exciting days of the year," says Chernish. "There is a vitality and excitement in the air as the students, and their parents, enter a new stage in their lives. A sense of celebration permeates the whole day."

"Brock has an advantage over other universities in that move-in day is a very well co-ordinated team effort requiring the involvement of several departments, most of which have been participating in the Labour Day move for many years," says Fleming. "Also, the residences are geographically well-spaced and there are different entrances to the campus from different roads, which relieve some of the congestion."

The information, in accessible, easy-touse formats, helps teachers to recognize behaviours that cause them concern. It provides prevention and early intervention strategies to promote learning and mental health, and tips on finding help for children with mental health problems.

The ABC's of Mental Health will soon be released to educators via the Hincks-Dellcrest website.

I am pleased to announce the appointment of Dr. Greg Finn to the new position of Vice-Provost and Associate Vice-President, Academic.



After seven years at Brock, including three as Associate Vice-President, Research and International Development, Owen is pleased with how far the University has come.


"While our sponsored research funding has certainly grown (\$1.5) million in 2000 and now in excess of \$13 million)," Owen noted that research intensity is measured by more than dollars. "It is more an attitude of faculty members for whom research, scholarship and creativity are integral components of their lives. The growth of research funding and the transformation of the University can be attributed to the influx of faculty who see research and scholarship as a wall-to-wall activity."

"Moreover, we have also made significant strides in our capacity to support researchers — from the idea through to the innovation," he says. "The in-depth nature and the quality of the research that our faculty are able to do has been increased through several factors, including the significant growth of graduate programs.

With Owen's departure, a shift in responsibilities will occur in the Faculty of Mathematics and Science. Ian Brindle, currently Dean of Mathematics and Science, will become Interim Associate Vice-President, Research and International Development on Oct. 1.

Joffre Mercier, Department of Biological Sciences, will take on the role as Interim Dean of Mathematics and Sciences. Rick Cheel, Department of Earth Sciences, has been elected to the position of Associate Dean, Mathematics and Science.

"These administrative changes will help Brock continue its forward movement in the areas of research and international development," says Terry Boak, Provost and Vice-President, Academic. "The appointments of Joffre (Mercier) and Rick (Cheel) will also assist the Faculty of Mathematics and Science to maintain its level of excellence in providing quality leadership for students and faculty."

CFI awards \$83,884 to Brock professor in support of language processing research

The Canada Foundation for Innovation (CFI) has awarded \$83,884 to Brock University to support a research project led by neurolinguist and Assistant Professor of Applied Linguistics Veena D. Dwivedi.

According to Dwivedi, her CFI-funded project, "A Neurophysiological Investigation of Language Processing" will examine "the real-time processing of language - what your brain is doing on a millisecond per millisecond basis during language comprehension, and how the different subcomponents of language, syntax and semantics interact in this process."

Dwivedi directs the Psycholinguistics and Neurocognition of Language Lab, the only language processing lab of its kind in southern Ontario. The funding provided by CFI for Dwivedi's research will greatly complement the existing critical mass of research expertise in electrophysiology that already exists at the University, including the newly constructed Jack and Nora Walker Canadian Centre for Lifespan Development Research.

"This is probably the best place in Canada to conduct this kind of research," says Dwivedi, "because we have the technical expertise here, as well the collegial environment that is special to Brock, in order to conduct studies in language comprehension that also examine where in the brain processing is happening, as well as how this process changes as we age."

"I am very pleased that the CFI recognizes Brock University as a leader in this type of cutting-edge research," says St. Catharines MP Rick Dykstra. "By this investment in Dr. Dwivedi's work, the CFI is supporting the types of innovative projects that will produce tangible benefits for our society."

The Brock award was part of the latest round of CFI funding, which awarded \$26 million to fund a total of 136 projects at 40 institutions across Canada.

Brock rolls out welcome mat for off-campus students

Roughly 8,000 off-campus students are attending Brock University this year, and new and existing initiatives are available to welcome them to Niagara and to encourage engagement in their neighbourhoods.

Brad Clarke, Off-Campus Housing Officer, says that Brock's focus on off-campus living is a strong indicator of the University's commitment to the overall student experience while being a strong community partner in Niagara. Brock is one of a handful of colleges and universities in Canada that has an office that focuses on off-campus student living and neighbourhood relations. The office was initiated in 2003 in recognition of the importance of fostering student success off-campus and the role which Brock can play in helping students to become positive and engaged citizens.

Some of the new initiatives for offcampus students include:

- Student welcome kits that will be delivered to 1,000 student households in September. The kits include information about issues that relate to student housing, waste management, volunteering, shopping, responsible partying and much more.
- Project Badger, in which students are hired to patrol the neighbourhoods around Brock University and identify property standards violations such as grass that is too long or garbage that is strewn on the lawn. The students, trained by St. Catharines and Thorold bylaw officers, contact the landlords to report violations.
- The Student Civic Pride campaign that starts in September and encourages students to become engaged citizens and positive community members. Key messages will be delivered through advertising and public relations initiatives that will feature graduates and community and student leaders.
- Wekome Wagon, where student, University and community representatives go door to door to welcome students to their new neighbourhoods and answer questions the students or residents may have.

Some of the existing initiatives include:

- The Brock Off-Campus Society, an organization run through the Brock University Students' Union with the goal of providing social programming and supports for students living off-campus. Members also participate in a variety of community events and charitable initiatives throughout the year.
- The Good Neighbour Guide that is distributed to 45,000 homes in St. Catharines and Thorold during Orientation Week and at other events throughout the year.
- Great Neighbour Week, which takes place in mid-October. Off-campus students are encouraged to meet and offer to help their neighbours and clean up their properties, activities that are encouraged year round.
- Community Connections, which is dedicated to fostering, promoting and providing engagement opportunities for Brock students that encourage personal learning experiences and enrich the Brock and Niagara communities. Launched in September 2006, the program had 1,800 registrants in its first year. It is estimated that 35 per cent of these were off-campus students. Some of the events and organizations in which students participated were Shinerama, Brock Days, Walk for Heart, United Way, CIBC Run for the Cure, Adopt-A-Road, graffiti cleanups, dragon boat races, Walk for Juvenile Diabetes, Out of the Cold program, and many others.

Clarke said that the majority of students today prefer to live in smaller groups rather than in environments made famous by such movies as Animal House. He credits that with the fact that many students come from smaller families and are accustomed to fewer people in a household, and that they want to focus more on their studies. Landlords, he added, have tailored the length of their leases, offering four-month leases for co-op students and eight-month leases for the academic year, instead of the standard year-long lease.

Recruitment already underway for 2008-09

The 2007-08 academic year has barely begun, and Brock University is already busy recruiting students for 2008-09.

One of the events that University representatives will be attending is the Ontario Universities' Fair at the Metro Convention Centre in downtown Toronto on Sept. 28 to 30. About 100 volunteers — faculty, staff and students — will be on hand to field questions about Brock from prospective students and their families.

"This is a huge event for us," says Beth Natale, Director, Recruitment and Retention. "There have been close to 80,000 attendees at the fair in previous years and having a strong Brock contingent allows us to address all of the questions that students may have."

Future students will be able to speak directly with faculty members about academic programs, gain a student's perspective abut life at Brock, or talk to staff professionals about topics as varied as admissions, scholarships and financial aid, residence options, varsity athletics, clubs, and recreation.

"This will be a one-stop shopping environment," says Natale, "and our aim is to generate excitement about all that Brock has to offer."

Brock officially opens Canadian Centre for Lifespan Development Research

A Brock University research centre that explores development of the entire range of the human lifespan, making it a one-of-a-kind facility in Canada, officially opened last week.

The Jack and Nora Walker Canadian Centre for Lifespan Development Research is unique because it brings together in a central location 62 faculty members from all seven of Brock's Faculties, and more than 40 not-for-profit community organizations, to study human development from early childhood to old age.

The research centre is located on the top two floors of the \$22.6-million, five-storey Plaza Building, which also officially opened on Sept. 18. The bottom three floors of the Plaza Building include the Departments of Economics and Political Science, academic space, computer labs, informal gathering spaces for students and an expanded Campus Store.

Jack N. Lightstone, President and Vice-Chancellor at Brock, said the Canadian Centre for Lifespan Development Research is a reflection of the University's thoughtful, passionate and continuing commitment to pervasive leading-edge research throughout the entire campus.

"Brock's faculty and graduate students will be able to address and research quality-of-life aspects of the human lifespan from the perspectives of many disciplines in a state-of-theart facility," he said. "As a result of our community partnerships, families in Niagara, Canada and internationally will benefit from the innovative and important research that is taking place between these four walls."

Lightstone added the Plaza Building begins to address the serious shortage of academic space as the University continues to expand in student enrolment, number of faculty members, and in research.

The multidisciplinary research centre is the first of its kind to have been funded by the Canada Foundation for Innovation (CFI), the major federal agency supporting new infrastructure initiatives at Canadian universities.

The centre was funded by a combined \$5.2-million grant from CFI, the Ontario Innovation Trust and Ontario Ministry of Research and Innovation, and \$1.3 million in private donations from the Walker family, Brock Plaza Corporation, E.S. Fox Ltd., Jacob and Katherine Hildebrand and others.

"Our community donors and funding agencies recognize the importance, the uniqueness and the mandate of the Canadian Centre for Lifespan Development Research," said Lightstone. "As a result, they have been generous to this University. Their contributions to groundbreaking lifespan research will unquestionably advance the quality of human life."

The facility encompasses more than 15,000 square feet of custom-designed lab and meeting space and houses

state-of-the-art interview and observation rooms for naturalistic studies of human behaviour and assessment. New computer labs for very large databases, as well as

workspace for post-doctoral students and visiting scholars working with Brock faculty, are also key aspects of the research centre.


"This centre clearly positions Brock University at the forefront of innovation in research," said David Siegel, Dean of the Faculty of Social Sciences. "Multidisciplinary research institutions of this kind are very rare across North America, yet the kind of research they produce is being demanded by more and more funding agencies."

National and international collaborative opportunities are rich and unique components of the research facility, said Centre Director and Psychology Professor Sid Segalowitz. Researchers from differing disciplines will be working alongside one another in adjacent physical locations, facilitating a 'knowledge spillover', he said.

"The participation of the many not-for-profit organizations that meet the needs of the people in the community will allow the research to have a direct and more immediate impact on the community than traditional research," he added.

The 86,000-square-foot Plaza Building is the third post-secondary building in Ontario and the seventh in Canada to earn the LEED (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design) Silver certification. The award, presented by the Canada Green Building Council, recognizes energy conservation and environmentally responsible construction such as construction waste disposal, healthy indoor environment for occupants, site selection, and other initiatives.





People in the news

Alun Hughes, Associate Professor of Geography, was interviewed by *Niagara This Week* for an Aug. 31 story, "String interest in Sunday's heritage walk," about his involvement with the first City of Thorold Heritage Walk that took place on Aug. 26. In addition the University will undertake a review of the Code of Student Conduct and its scope with respect to off-campus residents. This process will be initiated in early October but will take several months to conclude.


Brock will continue to be proactive in educating students about their responsibilities as residents and neighbors in our community.

High-profile accreditation a feather in Brock's nursing cap

As a result of a rigorous review process, nursing programs offered by Brock's Department of Nursing have earned the maximum seven-year accreditation from the Canadian Association of Schools of Nursing (CASN).

Loyalist College in Belleville, which collaborates with Brock's Nursing Department, also received the accreditation.

"We are extremely pleased with this national recognition of excellence," said Lynn Rempel, Chair, Department of Nursing. "Accreditation not only raises the profile and stature of current nursing students, it also adds value to the degrees of our nursing graduates. Awards of seven years are very prestigious and demonstrate an extremely high level of excellence in nursing education."

Many of Brock's nursing graduates continue to work in Niagara and Ontario after graduating, helping to make up for the serious shortfall of trained nurses.

"Recruiting nurses to the Niagara Health System after they graduate from Brock University is one of the key elements of our nursing recruitment strategy," said NHS President and CEO Debbie Sevenpifer. "Our nurses have an opportunity to develop solid working relationships with the Brock nursing students as mentors and colleagues during the students' work placements with the Niagara Health System. Our nurses tell us how impressed they are with the students' knowledge, skills, professionalism and compassion for our patients and their families.

"The calibre of nurses graduating from Brock University is second to none, and Brock's Nursing Department is well deserving of this recognition of excellence from the Canadian Association of Schools of Nursing," said Sevenpifer.

Brock established its Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BScN) program in 2000 as a degree completion program for registered nurses who already had a college diploma, followed a year later by a four-year BScN program in which students complete two years at Loyalist and two years at Brock to earn their degree. The option of completing all four years at Brock was first offered in 2005.

Members of the Department of Nursing prepared for accreditation for almost two years. The lengthy process involved a comprehensive self-study of the department and a review of the educational support provided by Brock for the nursing programs, the curricula, and the student outcomes of each of the three programs. Input from partners and stakeholders was gathered and graduates were surveyed.

To help enhance the Brock experience for graduate students and to raise its profile, the Graduate Students' Association has embarked on a series of important milestones, including its official incorporation and the creation of its first five-year plan.

The GSA, the official voice of graduate students on campus, assists its members with all aspects of graduate life at Brock University. Its mandate is to promote academic, professional and social student development, create opportunities for interaction between students from all departments, and act as an advocate and lobbyist for student concerns and issues.

More than 1,300 graduate students are involved in the research opportunities that exist on campus. Brock offers 38 graduate programs, including six PhD programs, with more in development.

GSA president Claire Meldrum, a master's student in the Comparative Literature and Arts program in the Modern Languages, Literatures and Cultures Department, said

incorporation is part of the move to make the GSA more professional and to give it greater autonomy.

"As we grow as an organization and our membership diversifies, we need to insure that we are representing the interests of graduate students in the best way possible," she said, "and our incorporation is an important step towards that goal."

A five-year plan is a necessary procedure, she said, to ensure that the momentum of the GSA is maintained from year to year, as the rapid transition of membership is a reality as graduate students complete their education and move on.

Short- and medium-term objectives will be mapped out and answers to some of the following questions will be pursued: What does the GSA want to look like in a few years? What services should be added, removed and maintained? What does the Brock administration, community partners and Faculty of Graduate Studies expect of the GSA and what should the GSA expect of them? How can the GSA raise its profile?

How can revenues be diversified so that the financial burden of running the organization isn't borne disproportionately by the students, and how can the GSA best serve its membership?

William Tays is a PhD candidate in psychology and the GSA representative on Brock's Board of Trustees. He said the level of dedication is the biggest change when moving from an undergraduate to graduate program. Full-time graduate students often clock almost 60 hours a week in academic pursuits, he said, and in addition, many also work or TA.

The social events held by the GSA are necessary to periodically break the intensity of studies. An opening-of-term barbecue at Alphie's attracted close to 200 graduate students, and a monthly appetizer hour is also planned (the GSA will pick up half the appetizer tab). An annual social during the winter festive season is also planned.





Researchers working in collaboration with major pharmaceutical company

A Brock University professor worldrenowned for his work in green chemistry was recently presented with a \$30,000 cheque from Noramco Inc., a subsidiary of Johnson & Johnson, for new methods he and his team of researchers developed to manufacture pain relief medication.

Tomas Hudlicky, Canada Research Chair and Professor in the Department of Chemistry and Centre for Biotechnology, received the license fee for his team's work in developing new analgesic compounds and the processes for producing them. This is the latest financial contribution in a two-year relationship between the researchers and Noramco Inc. and marks the first licensing agreement between Brock and a pharmaceutical company.

"Professor Hudlicky's research illustrates the importance of combining a profound understanding of the art of chemical synthesis with green science," says lan Brindle, Acting Associate Vice-President, Research and International Development.

Until now, manufacturing of analgesics and various antagonists used in addiction treatment relied on a potentially toxic class of substances. Noramco was challenged to either reduce or eliminate the amount of the potentially toxic substance used in production.

Hudlicky's work focuses on the development of shorter and more environmentally benign methods of synthesis by combining chemical and biological methods. His research meets the needs of Noramco because it is aimed at redesigning those steps in the manufacturing process of analgesics that use or produce toxic substances. In addition, new derivatives of known analgesic compounds are being developed and tested.

New Chancellor urges students to make mistakes — and learn from them

In a solemn ceremony during Fall Convocation on Oct. 12, Dr. Ned Goodman was officially installed as Brock University's seventh Chancellor. He succeeds Dr.

Raymond Moriyama who was present in the audience.

Speaking before graduating students, their families and friends, Goodman said that though he has four degrees, "none gives me more honour than the one that has been bestowed today."

As Chancellor, Goodman assumes a leadership role in advancing the University and plays a vital role in the educational welfare of Brock students. The Chancellor is the titular head of the University and presides over all Convocations.

Goodman, founder and CEO of Dundee Corporation and Dundee Wealth and Chairman of Goodman and Company, acknowledged he's made "many, many mistakes" and he encouraged graduates to do the same. If one learns from mistakes, he said, one progresses

As an example of moving forward because of mistakes, he cited Niagara's success as a premium wine-producing area. The first mistake, he said, was the reluctance of wineries to shift to different grape varieties. Once they did, their sales and reputation grew. Icewine was also discovered by mistake, he said, and is now the region's signature wine.

He also urged graduating students

to pursue their dreams "because the pursuit of a dream rarely leads to regret." And like hockey great Wayne Gretzky, he advised them to "go where the puck is going, not where it is."

Goodman also encouraged his audience to be "works in progress", have fun, be curious, and live with a sense of humour and humility.

"What we receive, we must share," he said. "We learn what we can, we improve what we can, and we pass it on."

Goodman is the founder and benefactor of the Goodman Institute of Investment Management, a graduate school providing an MBA degree and a CFA charter, which was established at Concordia University in Montreal. He serves there as an Adjunct Professor and as a member of the Associates of the Chancellor.

In addition, he connects widely with the community as Chairman Emeritus of the Canadian Council of Christians and Jews, a Governor of Junior Achievement of Canada, a Vice-Chair of the Heart and Stroke Foundation of Ontario and as a member of the Toronto Society of Financial Analysts and the Canadian Institute of Mining and Metallurgy. He is a founding director of the Roasters Foundation, the Jodamada Foundation and the Dynamic Fund Foundation.

Goodman, completed his undergraduate studies in Science at McGill University and graduate studies in Business Administration at the University of Toronto. He achieved a Chartered Financial Analyst from the University of Virginia in 1967. A Doctorate of Laws, honoris causa, was conferred upon him by Concordia University in 1997.

Flags lowered, muskets fired to commemorate Sir Isaac



Hundreds of onlookers gathered on Oct. 12 to commemorate the death of Maj.-Gen. Sir Isaac Brock on the campus of the University for which he is named. The ceremony is to become an annual event.

Felled during the Battle of Queenston Heights on Oct. 13, 1812 by a musket ball fired by an American sharpshooter, Sir Isaac was remembered as a hero who was instrumental in the shaping of Canada.

The ceremony took place in front of the Schmon Tower on the brisk autumn day and was hosted by the Brock 1812 Bicentenary Committee. Uniformed re-enactors from the fife and drum corps from Fort George and Fort Erie began the event. They represented the 49th and 41st regiments and native allies and also fired muskets following the remarks of dignitaries. Professor David Schimmelpenninck, Chair, Department of History, welcomed the onlookers and guest speakers.

"We are fortunate that the battles of that war ended all war in this region," said Brock University President Jack Lightstone, who called war a terrible business. The victory was a turning point in the war, he said, and without that victory, "Canada would not have come into existence."

He added that almost 200 years of peace on Canadian soil have followed the War of 1812 victory.

Following Lightstone's remarks, the crowd observed the lowering to half staff of the three flags that traditionally fly on campus — the Ontario provincial flag, the Canadian Maple Leaf flag, and the Brock University flag.

Rev. George Addison, Campus Ministries, is a descendant of Rev. Robert Addison who presided at the funeral of Sir Isaac. Rev. George Addison honoured those who gave their lives before and during the War of 1812 and those who have sacrificed their lives since. Addison also noted that Sir Isaac rose to his military position by dint of hard work and talent, rather than by wealth or family position. He also praised the significant contributions of the British army's native allies.

Speakers also included Damien O'Brien, Vice-President University Affairs, Brock University Students' Union, and Claire Meldrum, President of the Graduate Students' Association. After the ceremony, hot cider was served at Isaac's.

The Hudlicky research team includes postdoctoral associate Dr. Robert Carroll and graduate student Hannes Leisch.

The Johnson & Johnson company through its Pain and Worldwide Narcotics Franchises actively pursues safer, more effective and less expensive medications and treatment strategies for the reduction of pain and chemical dependency.

As part of this program, the company enlists the aid and financially supports skilled researchers in the academic sector in research programs which benefit the community at large as well as the

researchers and students who are engaged in these projects.

Since 2006, the Hudlicky research team has received more than \$350,000 in support from Noramco Inc. and submitted three patent applications.

"The relationship between Dr. Hudlicky and Noramco fits well with Brock University's goal of making an impact in the world of research," says Brindle. "We look forward to ongoing developments in collaborative research with Noramco."

The potential financial impact of the discoveries is considerable. The market for pain analgesics is expected to reach \$75 billion by 2010 as companies try to satisfy public demands for effective relief from acute pain. The multibillion-dollar market for pharmacotherapies is expected to continue to grow with the increasing prevalence of alcohol, nicotine, and narcotic dependencies, as well as the need for treatments for methamphetamine, phencyclidine, and gambling addictions.

Noramco, a subsidiary of healthcare giant Johnson & Johnson, makes active pharmaceutical ingredients used in a number of pharmaceuticals manufactured by Johnson & Johnson subsidiaries, including Ortho-McNeil Pharmaceutical and Janssen Pharmaceutica.

Tecumseh Centre supports Native Mexican researcher

Eva Arellano, a Native graduate student at the Department of Education Universidad de las Américas at Cholula Mexico, spent two days in the Niagara region this summer interviewing a number of Native people for her thesis. Her work was supported by faculty, staff and students at Brock's Tecumseh Centre for Aboriginal Research and Education.

Arelllano's research involves a comparative study of the barriers experienced by Native people in Mexico and Canada because their first language is not English.

"It is important for Indigenous scholars and researchers from many countries to share their experiences and stories at this time in history," said Michael Manley-Casimir, Acting Director of the Tecumseh Centre. "The Tecumseh Centre has the opportunity to support and participate in that dialogue and this is an example of that work."

Brock partners with University of Buffalo on new international initiative

Brock University has established a major new exchange partnership with the University of Buffalo (UB) that calls for a variety of co-operative research and educational initiatives, with a particular focus on the shared border region of Southern Ontario and Western New York.

A major feature of the new agreement is a commitment to jointly establish a binational Institute on Border Studies that would be the first joint institute of its kind established by Canadian and U.S. universities.

The agreement calls for Brock and UB to offer cross-listed and team-taught courses, and for faculty from each campus to develop jointly new courses and curricula that will strengthen programs of shared interest.

The agreement was signed on Oct. 1 by UB President John B. Simpson, who hosted a delegation of 10 senior administrators and faculty from Brock, including Brock President and Vice-Chancellor Jack N. Lightstone

Brock and UB share the distinction of being major universities in close proximity to their respective sides of the Canadian-American border. Border issues, including border security, trade and investment, regional economic development, and tourism, will continue to be among the key areas of shared interest between the two institutions.

The partnership will build on and formalize Brock's longstanding ties to UB. These include a continuing collaboration between Brock and the Urban Design Project of the UB School of Architecture and Planning on regional and public policy planning for the binational region.

Brock is currently developing a regional

Brock is currently developing a regional policy institute and is drawing on the example and expertise of the UB Regional Institute. Brock's institute, provisionally named the Niagara Observatory, will gather, analyze and interpret data about the Niagara Region of Ontario for the benefit of scholars and policymakers.

The agreement also makes provision for student and faculty exchange between the two universities and commits the partners to providing significant seed funding to support joint research activities by Brock and UB faculty across a range of disciplines.

"Our shared commitment to exercising a leadership role in the future development of our surrounding communities will help strengthen and advance all of the collaborative activities that Brock and UB undertake, and will help promote increased understanding and co-operation between the leaders and communities on both sides of our shared border." Simpson said.

of our shared border," Simpson said.
Lightstone noted, "Brock University and
the University at Buffalo share a common
commitment to partner with their respective
communities in order to spur economic,
social and cultural development.

"We have many complementary strengths and our communities face similar challenges in an age of globalization and similar opportunities as gateways of trade between our nations. Therefore, both the universities and our host regions have much to gain by deepening co-operation between Brock University and the University at Buffalo," Lightstone added.

Also attending the signing ceremony were representatives from the Consulate General of Canada in Buffalo and the U.S. Consulate General in Toronto. Officials from both consulates have expressed strong support for the new UB-Brock agreement.

The University at Buffalo is a premier research-intensive public university, the largest and most comprehensive campus in the State University of New York. UB's more than 28,000 students pursue their academic interests through more than 300 undergraduate, graduate and professional degree programs. Founded in 1846, the University at Buffalo is a member of the Association of American Universities.

New centre offers students a glimpse into medieval history

This past September, the Faculty of Humanities launched the new Centre for Medieval and Renaissance Studies. The Centre offers an innovative BA program that uses an interdisciplinary approach to study the Medieval and Renaissance periods. Understanding Medieval and Renaissance culture(s) illustrates their legacy, and their importance in shaping who and what we are.

The program offers students the opportunity to delve into these periods in more detail than is possible through any single discipline. About one dozen professors from Classics, Drama, Music, Literatures and Cultures, History, Modern Language, and English are contributing to the program. With interests ranging from medieval Icelandic literature to Renaissance Italy to British history, many of these professors will lecture in the first year course.

To officially celebrate the launch of the program, the Centre is hosting a special lecture by Patricia Sutherland from the Canadian Museum of Civilization in Ottawa, Ont

Sutherland, curator the museum's of Eastern Arctic Archaeology, will present a lecture entitled "Norse/Native Contact in Arctic Canada" on Friday, Oct. 26 from 4 to 6 p.m. in Academic South 216.

Her past Arctic research has included studies of the Inuit and pre-Inuit occupation of the High Arctic and the Mackenzie Delta. Her recent projects focus on early European/aboriginal contact in the Eastern Arctic.

Andrew McDonald, Director of the Centre for Medieval and Renaissance Studies, says students and faculty will gain much from the presentation "Dr. Sutherland's exciting work is reshaping the way we think about the relationship between the aboriginal peoples and the Europeans who met in the Arctic in the centuries after 1000 AD," says McDonald. "Her work shows sustained contact hundreds of years before Columbus's voyages."

Everyone is welcomed to this free event sponsored by the Centre for Medieval and Renaissance Studies, the Humanities Research Institute and the Brock University Students of History.

Professor and graduate student travel to Mexico to film CBC documentary

Ana Sanchez, Professor of Community Health Sciences, and graduate student Angela Duarte travelled to Puebla, Mexico, from Oct. 9 to 16, to film a CBC documentary on invasive parasites and collaborate with colleagues at the Benemérita University of Puebla.

Sanchez was invited by the CBC program *Nature of Things* to take part in filming for a science documentary, entitled "Project X". The documentary will be comprised of several episodes and one of them will examine the topic of invasive parasites, an area of expertise for Sanchez. Puebla was selected as a location because of its similarities with Honduras, the country where Sanchez has done most of her research on parasites.

Episode director David New, program host Jennifer Gardy and their production crew, accompanied by Sanchez and Duarte, filmed footage at endemic communities, local hospitals and research laboratories. The footage illustrated the significance of the invasive tapeworm parasite *Taenia solium* and its affects on humans and swine. This important global health issue is an ongoing area of research for Sanchez. The documentary is scheduled to air on CBC in January 2008.

While in Mexico, Sanchez and Duarte were also guests at the Benemérita University of Puebla where they presented preliminary results of the collaborative study they conducted over the summer months, "Latent Tuberculosis in Mexican Migrant Workers in the Niagara Region".

Duarte also delivered an invited talk for microbiology students at the University, entitled "Diagnostic Application of the Interferon-gamma Release Assay QuantiFERON for latent Tuberculosis".

Films explore faith, sexual diversity

The Que(e)rying Religion film festival, which explores the relationship between different faith traditions and sexual diversity, will take place on campus Friday, Nov. 23 and Saturday, Nov. 24.

"We hope this film festival will help open a conversation about religion and sexuality," said Chaplain George Addison, Campus Ministries. "Too often we have been constrained by ancient taboos to even talk openly about sexual orientation. The result has been exclusion and much pain. Each of these films offers an opportunity for a different outcome and deeper understanding."

On Nov. 23 at 7 p.m., the independent film *The Business of Fancydancing* (Native American) will kick off the festival with a screening in Academic South (STH) 204 following

an hour-long reception.

"Although I am studying Chinese Philosophy at Brock, the opportunity to travel to China will give me additional cultural information and a truer sense of the country today," he said. "I have considered the possibility of doing future philosophical and language study there."

The Wuhan program included daily lectures on topics such as ancient and modern Chinese history, the Chinese economy and development, Chinese law and the legal system, the Chinese educational system, and language and cultural classes and tours.

"I will always remember the professor who shared his life story, describing the impact of the Cultural Revolution on his family," says Skorobohacz. "Another lasting memory will forever be of the cultural mosaic we formed in our program – spirited international students from all over the world, alongside Chinese students and volunteers who made us feel so welcome and comfortable. We came together for a common purpose: to unite in friendship, learn from each other and immerse ourselves in a rich and extraordinary culture."

Can icewine be too sweet for its own good?

It may be hard to believe, but icewine juice can be too sweet for its own good, says a new study by a researcher at the Cool Climate Oenology and Viticulture Institute.

Debra Inglis, Associate Professor of Biological Sciences and lead author of the study, stressed the value of the research for Canada's role as the global leader in icewine production. "It's an important step toward setting icewine quality standards so that we can continue to lead the international market." And, by identifying chemical and sensory markers of the product, the research is aimed at protecting the authenticity of Canadian icewine. "We're starting to define what truly makes Canadian icewine unique," says Inglis.

Inglis and her team used chemical and microbial analyses of icewine fermentations to show that raising the sugar level of icewine juice above 42 °Brix (i.e., 42 per cent sugar by weight in solution) hinders yeast growth, fermentation rate and alcohol production. The researchers also found that yeast produce more acetic acid – the primary source of volatile acidity (VA), a wine fault – as a response to greater stress imposed by super-sweet icewine juice.

In fact, say the scientists, icewine juice in excess of 42 °Brix is so stressful for yeast that they have extreme difficulty producing a minimum of 10 per cent alcohol by volume – the industry standard for icewine. And the researchers advise that, in excess of 52.5 °Brix, icewine juice is theoretically non-fermentable

Along with finding ideal conditions for icewine fermentations, Inglis and her team are working to better understand yeast metabolism as it relates to acetic acid production. "Over the past eight years, we have started to unravel the yeast metabolic pathway used to produce acetic acid during icewine fermentation and defined ways to reduce its production," says Inglis. "We are also in the process of screening different yeast strains at the genetic level to identify which ones are best suited for icewine fermentations."

The study and a related one by Inglis appear in the latest issue of the *Journal of Applied Microbiology.* Both studies were funded by the Natural Sciences and Engineering Research Council of Canada.

Two professors awarded \$81,500 from the Canada Foundation for Innovation

The Canada Foundation for Innovation (CFI) announced today that it has awarded \$81,514 to Brock University to support two projects in the Faculty of Humanities led by Professor Elizabeth Greene, Department of Classics, and Professor Kevin Kee, Department of History.

Professor Greene's project will excavate, record and conserve cultural artifacts from a ship that sank off the coast of Turkey during the Iron Age. This is the first ancient shipwreck in the Mediterranean to be excavated by a Canadian university.

Professor Kee focuses on the creation of simulations and "serious games" to teach Canadian students about Canada's past. His project will bring together history and education researchers, computer scientists, software developers and graphic designers to develop and evaluate new digital media to support best practices

in history education.

"We can say with conviction that Canada has become a place where world-class researchers want to be," says Dr. Eliot Phillipson, President and CEO of the CFI. "This CFI investment will further develop Brock University's global reputation as a place where outstanding research and training is being conducted."

"Two worlds" highlighted in innovative teaching partnership

A ribbon was cut in Sioux Lookout, Ont., on Friday, Nov. 9, to open the Bachelor of Education Program office, marking a significant milestone for First Nations education in the region.

Assisted by representatives from the Northern Nishnawbe Education Council (NNEC), Brock University Vice-President, Academic and Provost Terry Boak, and other partners, two elementary students from Mishkeegogamang First Nation cut the ribbon – opening the program office and officially launching this groundbreaking initiative in educational self-determination.

The official opening, emphasizing the "two-worlds" approach of this innovative program, began with a traditional ceremony and prayers offered by two Elders. The program, which places a strong emphasis on the linguistic and other cultural gifts of the Anishnawbek, is a partnership between the NNEC and Brock University's Faculty of Education and endeavours to reflect both Anishnawbek and mainstream ways of knowing.

Twenty-three new teacher candidates from 24 communities in the Sioux Lookout District began classes on Oct. 22, 2007. Over five years, these students will earn 22 credits, graduating with a Bachelor of Education (BEd) degree from Brock University. The program has been accredited by the Ontario College of Teachers.

The NNEC is incorporated pursuant to the federal laws of Canada and is an Aboriginal secondary and post-secondary education, training and research institution and operates to increase the overall skill levels of students in the Sioux Lookout District. The goal is to provide youth with a successful future including a viable and meaningful role and rightful place in society.

The Tecumseh Centre for Aboriginal Research and Education, located in the Faculty of Education at Brock, was established to encourage a research focus at the University that connects Aboriginal and mainstream scholars, researchers, post-doctoral, graduate and undergraduate students to Aboriginal peoples and communities in a culturally appropriate manner. The centre's vision is to further the understanding of the complex educational, health, socio-economic and socio-cultural realities of Aboriginal peoples, and to create new and innovative educational programming that promotes and encourages the transformation of those same realities.

The program, which places a strong emphasis on the linguistic and cultural gifts of the Anishnawbek, is a partnership between the Northern Nishnawbe Education Council and Brock University's Faculty of Education.

John Hodson, Research Officer with the Tecumseh Centre for Aboriginal Education and Research, Faculty of Education, was also interviewed by the St. Cotharines Standard for a Nov. 8 article about the program, "Brock aims to educate First Nations students."

Alun Hughes, Associate Professor of Geography, was interviewed by the St. Catharines Standard for its Nov. 10 "Search Engine" column for the question: "Why is there an "s" at the end of St. Catharines? Is St. Catharines a plural? Was the city named after more that one St. Catharine? Or is it possessive and should there be an apostrophe before the final "s," as in St. Catharine's?"

knowledge," says St. Catharines MP Rick Dykstra.

The CFI announced a total of \$28 million in new funds to support 149 projects at 35 institutions across Canada. The investment was approved by the CFI's Board of Directors following a rigorous merit review process.

A total of \$23.3 was awarded under the Leaders Opportunity Fund, a program designed to provide infrastructure to attract researchers to Canadian institutions at a time of intense international competition for knowledge workers, as well as to retain the very best of today and tomorrow's leading researchers for Canada. The remaining \$4.6 million was awarded under the Infrastructure Operating Fund, an accompanying program, which assists universities with the incremental operating and maintenance costs associated with new infrastructure projects.



Nursing students participate in Emergency Trauma Training Day

On Nov. 30, students from the Department of Nursing at Brock participated in a unique training initiative involving the Niagara Health System's (NHS) Emergency Department (ED) nursing staff at its St. Catharines General location. ED nurses delivered hands-on training on how to handle emergency trauma situations to more than 20 third- and fourth-year Brock nursing students.

The daylong initiative began with classroom presentations in the morning by ED nurses. In the afternoon, students were divided into three groups and presented with three simulated emergency patients. The 30minute scenarios included an elderly pedestrian who suffered internal injuries after being hit by a vehicle, a construction worker who had fallen four storeys and a young stabbing victim with multiple wounds. ED Registered Nurses played the role of the patient in each case, while their colleagues guided students through the full gamut of clinical emergency triage, assessment, diagnostic/lab tests and treatment interventions.

The ED Trauma Training Day was a first for Brock and the NHS and was a rare offering for students who do not usually experience the hospital nursing environment until their formal clinical placement. The training day was part of the NHS's ongoing nurse recruitment strategy. Brock, which was recently awarded seven-year accreditation from the Canadian Association of Schools of Nursing, is a natural catchment area for NHS nurse recruitment efforts. Initiatives such as this benefit students as well as both organizations, which are working together to address the nursing shortage in Niagara.

Help Brock Spread the Net!

A group of Brock students, faculty, staff and alumni are hoping to be the campus to raise the most money for UNICEF's Spread the Net campaign to combat malaria in Africa. The campaign, chaired by CBC comedy show host Rick Mercer and outgoing Liberal MP Belinda Stronach, buys insecticide-treated bed nets that protect sleeping African children from nighttime mosquito bites. Mosquitoes are the primary way malaria is spread.

Brock has one month to out-fundraise 72 other schools across Canada. Mercer will visit the campus that raises the most money to tape a three-minute segment for his CBC program, The Mercer Report.



Microfilm goes digital in the Library

The ability to digitize microfilm and microfiche is now available in the James A. Gibson Library. The Library has recently purchased and installed two microform readers with all of the traditional capabilities of a reader/printer, plus the hardware and software to scan the images on the screen. Now information on film or fiche can be easily examined, cleaned up and placed into presentations from the comforts of your home or office.

The Canon Microfilm/Scanner 350 greatly increases the output options for researchers. Using Capture Perfect 1.0 software, images can be saved to a USB memory stick, a network drive or e-mailed to your Brock account. Scans can be done individually or in batches and saved in JPEG, TIFF, bitmap or PDF formats. The PDF images include an OCR (Optical Character Recognition) option that allows you to search the PDF images. If you prefer hard copies, you are still able to pick up a print at one of the nearby printing stations in the Library. The price to print is 10 cents per page. There is no charge for scanning and saving to a memory stick or attaching to an e-mail.

The microform readers are located on the fifth floor of the Library among the microform collection near the Copying and Printing Services office. The Library's microfilm collections include those on the fifth floor, as well as those in the Special Collections and Archives on the tenth floor



Environmental ergonomics the focus of Brock's newest Canada Research Chair

Brock University Professor Stephen Cheung, who joined the Department of Physical Education and Kinesiology earlier this summer, has been appointed a Canada Research Chair for his innovative research on the effects of extreme temperatures on human physiology and performance.

His research looks at the interactions between protective clothing, heat stress and exercise performance, and it has the potential to impact the design and development of enhanced technology, training and occupational safety for those who risk their lives to protect the rest of us.

"The appointment of Professor Cheung to a Canada Research Chair contributes to Brock's development as a research intensive institution," says Ian Brindle, Associate Vice-President, Research. "His work is vital for many reasons. Whether for clothing Canadian peacekeepers in conditions of severe cold and heat, or keeping arctic workers safe in harsh climates, this research will provide crucial insights into protecting people and making them more effective in extreme environments."

The Canadian Foundation for Innovation also awarded Cheung \$82,541 from its Leaders Opportunity Fund to establish a Thermal Physiology Research Facility at the University.

As a Tier 2 Research Chair, Brock will receive funding of \$500,000 over the next five years. Tier 2 positions are awarded to researchers who are acknowledged by their peers as having the potential to lead in their field.

"As demonstrated in Mobilizing Science and Technology to Canada's Advantage, the Government of Canada is committed to improving Canada's international reputation for research excellence," says Jim Prentice, Minister of Industry and Minister responsible for the Canada Research Chairs Program. "By investing in the Canada Research Chairs Program, we are helping universities recruit and retain the most brilliant and promising researchers, and contributing to enable these institutions to become leaders in the fields of advanced science and technology."

Brock's graduate students to benefit from \$1-million matched gift

Dr. Raymond Moriyama, an internationally acclaimed architect who designed many of the buildings on Brock University's campus, continues to build on his own legacy.

Moriyama, who received an honorary degree from Brock and is the University's former Chancellor, donated a gift of \$500,000 on Dec. 14 that will be matched with another \$500,000 by the Ontario Graduate Fellowship Program (OGFP). The award, to be known as the Dr. Raymond and Mrs. Sachi Moriyama Graduate Fellowships Award, will be presented to exemplary students entering graduate programs at Brock.

"I am honoured to support graduate students and graduate students at Brock, an institution with which I've enjoyed a warm relationship of more than 30 years," said Moriyama. "I'm confident that the diverse and important research that Brock's graduate students are undertaking will benefit the world in many ways."

The revenue from the fellowship will be shared by the University's six academic Faculties — Applied Health

Sciences, Business, Education, Humanities, Mathematics and Science, and Social Sciences — to recruit the best and brightest graduate candidates.

"Attracting outstanding graduate students is a top priority," said Brock President Jack Lightstone. "Dr. Moriyama's thoughtful and generous support of our graduate programs is key to enhancing the social, economic and cultural lives of communities around us in the Niagara region, Ontario, Canada and beyond."

Marilyn Rose, Dean, Faculty of Graduate Studies, said Moriyama's gift represents an acknowledgement of the growing reputation and value of Brock's graduate programs and "will provide an opportunity for graduate students to undertake new and enhanced research in areas of great social significance."

In attendance at the cheque presentation were representatives from Brock University and the Graduate Students Association. The event also featured poster presentations of graduate students who were on hand to discuss their respective fields of research.

New Inclement Weather Policy in place

A new Inclement Weather Policy has been developed to guide Brock's communications to faculty, staff, students and the broader community when severe weather threatens to interrupt normal university operations. (The new policy replaces the former Interruption of Normal Operations Policy.)

Using suggestions brought forward by faculty, staff and students following last February's severe winter storm, the new policy defines "essential services" and what it means for the university to be "closed", Closing the University is defined as:

- · Classes are not held;
- Meetings and other scheduled community events are cancelled.
 Any exceptions will be communicated via the Brock website and/or local radio stations;
- All areas and operations not defined as "essential" are closed;
- Examinations scheduled on the day or evening of a closing are cancelled, and rescheduled;
- Deadlines for assignments and other submissions are postponed until the same hour of the next academic day on which the University is not "closed."

As the home of 2,400 students living in campus residences, the University is responsible for maintaining essential services throughout emergency closing. The "essential services" to be kept in operation during weather-related closings include:

- Food service in the residences
- Campus security services
 Facilities management
- Facilities managem
 Animal care
- Residence and conference services
- Emergency repair and maintenance
 Tolorommunications
- TelecommunicationsCommunications

Staff providing accor

Staff providing essential services are designated by the department heads responsible for those services.

Individual faculty, staff, and students are responsible for checking the Brock website, portal, and/or telephone switchboard, and to listen for local radio station announcements of closures at the University.

In the absence of a communicated decision to close, the University remains open and all activities continue as planned. At all times, individuals should assess their personal safety in deciding whether to come to work or class.

It is the responsibility of faculty to inform their students of class cancellations in the event they are unable to attend and the University is open.

The new Inclement Weather Policy will be available on the front page of the Brock website at www.brocku.ca

All faculty, staff and students are encouraged to familiarize themselves with the policy as the season of winter hazards is now upon us.
