Brock professor researches anticancer drug design

Jim McNulty is a chemist who takes a very humble approach to his work. As a matter of fact, the Brock University chemistry professor is quick to credit others for providing a lead in his anticancer drug design research.

He credits one individual in particular, a well recognized name in medical circles—Hippocrates.

The famous Greek physician, Hippocrates of Cos (4th century BC) wrote of an extract prepared from the daffodil bulb (Narcissus sp.) which was said to be effective in shrinking tumors. It is substances from this and taxonomically related amaryllis extracts that McNulty is investigating as potential cancer-fighting drugs.

"Knowing that toxic or bioactive substances exist in a natural product extract is always an important lead for modern medicinal chemists," says McNulty. Hippocrates wrote about the properties of the amaryllis extract over two thousand years ago, and there are a lot of other examples. Ancient folk medicine has recorded the use of plant extracts for the treatment of a variety of diseases including cancer and malaria as well as for pain relief and other pharmacological effects

"A major goal of the isolation chemist is to purify and identify the natural drugs present in these extracts and subsequently confirm that the pure compound is responsible for any pharmacological effects." says McNulty. "Such natural products are

Project helps students butt out

Brock University's Department of Community Health Sciences and Health Services are part of a collaborative effort to help university students butt out.

Brock and the Regional Niagara Public Health Department received \$250,000 from the Ministry of Health and Long-term Care, as part of the Ontario Tobacco Strategy, to reduce tobacco use in communities across Ontario.

The funding will support a smoking cessation initiative involving students, health professionals, researchers, and administrators from five universities, two colleges (representing a total of 10 campuses) across southern and central Ontario.

The focus of the project is to educate university and college students across Ontario about the addictive properties of nicotine and to recruit smokers into smoking cessation programs. The project expects to reach 50,000 post-secondary students in an effort to achieve smoke-free campuses.

"One of the first steps will be a media campaign to reach as many students as possible and to encourage students to take part in smoking cessation programs," says Professor John Cairney, of Brock's Department of Community Health Sciences, speaking on behalf of the project team.

Cairney, who graduated from Brock in Sociology in 1993, is working with project leaders Kelli-an Lawrance, Melodie Shick-Porter, both of Brock, and Sharon Lawler, of the Regional Niagara Public Health Department.

First choice applications to Brock rise 10 times the provincial average

pplication figures, released in February, show a 24 per cent increase in students making Brock University their first choice. This is 10 times higher than the system average for universities in Ontario and the second highest increase in the province. Overall, 2,390 secondary school students made Brock their first choice, while 8,769 students applied to Brock, for a total increase of 19.7 per cent over last year.


"This is a significant increase in students making Brock their first choice and shows that the University's increasing reputation is being recognized by both students and parents," said Bonnie Neuman, Associate Vice-President, Student Services. "Students realize the quality of a Brock degree, and that we are meeting their career expectations."

"Our transformation into a comprehensive university with new and innovative programs at all levels is creating extraordinary interest," said Brock University President David Atkinson. "Our commitment to the individual student and to the highest standards of teaching and research excellence are reflected in the growing numbers applying for a Brock experience."

At this time last year, 1,912 students had made Brock their first choice, and total applications were at 7,326.

Brock signs agreement for Chinese nationals to study Master of Accountancy

Brock University and the Shanghai Foreign Service Corporation Ltd. (SFSC) recently signed an agreement allowing qualified Chinese nationals to pursue graduate studies in the Master of Accountancy (MAcc) program. The corporation is designated by the municipal government of Shanghai to provide staff recruitment to foreign resident organizations and to provide overseas educational consulting to Chinese nationals.

To ensure the smooth launch of this important initiative, the Faculty of Business recently hosted a visit to the Brock campus by a delegation of seven senior officers of SFSC.

Led by Mr. Jiadong Gu, the General Manager of SFSC, the senior executives met with Brock President David Atkinson, members of the Board of Trustees, senior administrators, and graduate studies faculty.

In January, Dr. Martin Kusy, Dean of Brock's Faculty of Business, visited Shanghai to finalize the contract with the SFSC.

"This agreement is a very exciting opportunity for the University as it develops an international presence in its graduate studies in accounting," said Kusy. "The initial recruiting process has produced a great many applications for the program and we look forward to welcoming our first group

of Chinese graduate students in September."

The first cohort of graduate students is expected to arrive on the Brock campus this fall. Each group of students will attend Brock for approximately 12 months, undertaking graduate study in a program designed to meet their specific needs. In addition to the MAcc program, the Faculty of Business is working with SFSC to provide executive training through workshops for executives in Shanghai.

Earlier this year, the Council of State Education in Beijing instituted a licensing process for organizations offering overseas educational consulting. SFSC was granted one of 68 such licences in all of China. Any educational institution wishing to offer programs to Chinese nationals must work with a licensed organization. The SFSC co-operates with well-known universities in Europe and North America to provide training in a wide range of professional skills.

Graduates support new library technology

he James A. Gibson Library is growing and changing in ways that only a few short years ago would have been difficult to imagine. The power of the World Wide Web, combined with a renewed spirit of cooperation among university libraries, have led to developments which are transforming the Library and the manner in which it offers information to students, faculty and staff.

One of the most dramatic examples of this transformation is evident in the

Library's joint agreement with Elsevier Science and the University of Toronto, concluded in late 1999. The agreement was made possible in large measure through generous donations from Brock alumni to the TeleGrad program. As a result, the James A. Gibson Library is able to offer online access to the entire suite of Elsevier journals, nearly 1,100 titles in all. Coverage extends from 1995 to the present and includes the full text of roughly 750,000 journal articles and over 1.8 million abstracts. The database which houses this vast resource is known as ScienceDirect, and has the distinction of

being the world's most comprehensive full text scientific resource of its kind. Through the Library's partnership with the University of Toronto, Brock students, faculty and staff are able to access the database on a server located at that institution.

Magnitude aside, power, convenience, and ease of use are the main features of this new service. Information is just a few keystrokes away and is delivered to the desktops of students, faculty and staff in their residence rooms, offices, computer labs, at home or wherever they happen to be, seven days a week, 24 hours a day. The service allows for subject searching across the contents of the entire database; browsing through online tables of contents and navigating through different journals, issues and articles; bookmarking of URLs or links to individual articles for future reference or for e-mailing to a colleague; saving searches to re-execute them at a later time and as often as required; running automatic searches each time new information is added and having the results delivered by e-mail.

The Library's ability to offer access to the full text of journals from Elsevier Science is remarkable and noteworthy for a number of reasons:

• The quality of the resource is outstanding. Elsevier Science is the world's largest publisher of scholarly scientific, technical and medical journals, including a large number of titles devoted to business and the social sciences. Elsevier

journals are among the most authoritative and prestigious in their subject areas, with an international authorship and readership. Through the introduction of this particular service, the Library has strengthened its support to research and teaching in a very substantial way;

• Brock is one of the first libraries in Ontario and only the fourth in the entire country to offer this service to its students, staff and faculty;

• The Elsevier journals represent an enormous value in financial terms. The equivalent collection of journals in print format is worth roughly \$1.3 million, but is available to Brock in digital format at a small fraction of this cost as a result of the Library's partnership with the University of Toronto.

The Elsevier Science service forms the cornerstone of Brock's evolving digital library. There will undoubtedly be other such partnerships in the future, resulting in more information at lower cost and better service to students and faculty.

Helping our neighbours in East Timor

ast summer, I was one of 28 Canadians who worked on a United Nations Project called the East Timor Popular Consultation, specifically the External Voting Operation. I was a District Electoral Officer and Project Team Leader. Prior to this experience, I had no idea where East Timor was located in the world.

My duty posting was in Lisbon, Portugal. Other Canadians were posted in Macau, Mozambique and Indonesia.

For the most part, the process leading up to the referendum was similar to any other election—the registration of voters, writing of procedures, training of staff for voting day, voting day itself, counting of votes and final reports. However, as much as we thought of this as any other organized, democratic vote, it was not.

We were the only Registration Centre for all of Europe. I worked with a wonderful international staff that included one other Canadian. We were focused on seeing the referendum through. Many of the registrants were ex-patriots from East Timor, along with refugees and qualifying family members, who were living in Portugal. We also had East

Timorese come from as far away as Russia, France, England, Spain, Italy and Belgium to exercise their right to register and vote.

Those who came to register were required to return, two weeks later, to cast their vote. Ninety-eight per cent of the registrants returned to vote. I can't recall a Canadian vote, on any issue, having this high of a voter turnout. It seems that we, as Canadians, sometimes take democracy for granted.

The East Timorese people were voting about democracy. Their choice: autonomy within the mother state of Indonesia or independence to rule themselves.

The Registration Period of the Popular Consultation brought many people with stories about the beauty of East Timor, and their pride of being East Timorese. They also shared stories of violence, torture and murder. One man described how he was rounded up with 10,000 others at the beginning of the Indonesian coup d'etat. He was one of 42 people who survived. Another young man told us of how the army made him watch as his family was murdered and his village burned to the ground. He was then told to go and

fight for the very army that had done all of these things. He escaped to Portugal with nothing material, but with many memories. This young man had hope and he was in Lisbon to become a registered voter.

Although we were far removed geographically from East Timor, we too were threatened with violence. Our United Nations office received threats and appropriate safeguard measures were taken. It was very difficult to accept that violence was so nearby.

Polling day was August 30, 1999. For us, it went very well. We felt that we had made a small contribution toward this historic event.

However, it was devastating to see how things fell apart in East Timor. Democracy came with a high price for the people themselves.

When I arrived home, I was grateful to be reunited with my family, and to be Canadian. I realized that, while I live in a small town with my husband Eric and two children, we are part of the global village. We must do our part and take on the responsibility to make the world a safer place.

I now know where East Timor is located in the world. They are our neighbours.

Unique partnership: Brock's new PhD program in Educational Studies, a partnership with Lakehead University, University of Windsor and the University of Western Ontario, was launched in January. The program will start July 1, 2000, and will mark the first time in Ontario that a consortium of this kind has been developed for doctoral study.

"This is an exciting partnership that will provide students, locally and from a wide geographic range, additional opportunities to pursue their PhD in Educational Studies," says Dr. Michael Manley-Casimir, Brock University's Dean of Education. "As the province faces an upcoming period of heavy retirement in the universities and school systems, our PhD graduates will go on to provide renewed leadership to the educational system."

Brock has a large Master of Education program with the second highest enrolment in Ontario. This PhD program will serve those students as well as others.

National award: Brock University Professor of Mathematics Dr. Eric Muller was presented with the 1999 Adrien Pouliot Award by the Canadian Mathematical Society. This national award recognizes his significant and sustained contribution to mathematics education in Canada. The citation for the award praises Dr. Muller for his vision and focus on the needs of the community he serves and also for his "ability to bring people together on behalf of a stronger mathematics education community."

Bronze medal: Competing against the best in Canada, two Brock University students placed third at the 12th annual Queen's Entrepreneurs Competition, held March 16 to 18, in Kingston, Ont.

Warren Sheridan, Business Communications, and Mark Ysseldyk, Business Administration, won the Deloitte and Touche Bronze Medal for Entrepreneurial Excellence and received \$1,000 for their business plan for the product Sanigard. They were selected among nine other finalists who presented business plans to a panel of executives from Canada's most elite corporations.

The business plan for the Sanigard venture involved the research, development and marketing of a product which would enhance hygiene when using public washrooms.

This is the fourth year running that Brock's Faculty of Business was represented at the finals. Brock was also represented at this year's competition by Erin Hickey and Nicole Howes, both Business Administration students, who presented their business plan for Home Grown Cuisine.

Italian conference: The Italian Ministry of Foreign Affairs gave the University \$16,500 to fund a one-day conference on the teaching of Italian language and culture at the high school level. Dr. Francesco Scarlata, the Consul General of Italy (Toronto), presented the cheque to Brock President David Atkinson during a December luncheon. The focus on the spring conference will be on the teaching of Italian at the secondary school level. Members of university departments across the province will be invited to attend as well as teachers involved in the instruction of Italian as an international language at the elementary level.

Program agreements: Niagara College and Brock University signed two articulation agreements that will allow students to study at both institutions creating greater educational opportunities. The agreements include the Geographic Information Science (GIS) and Tourism programs.

United Way tops goal: The University's 1999 United Way campaign exceeded its \$60,000 goal. The University community raised \$60,270 during the campaign which ran through October and November.

Brindle reagent: Professor Ian Brindle, of Brock's Department of Chemistry, has had a reagent named for him. Occasionally, in the world of chemistry, some specific compounds or particular reactions are used that carry the name of the chemist who is responsible for significant research in that area. In Brindle's case, the reagent, L-cysteine, is a sulfur-containing amino acid that Brindle and his research group use for the analysis of samples containing arsenic, antimony, and tin. Prestigious award

r. Chris Le who completed his MSc at Brock, recently won an NSERC Steacie Fellowship, one of the country's most prestigious and valuable research prizes.

Le has been a faculty member at the University of Alberta since 1995.

Le is an analytical chemist known internationally for his work investigating chemical contaminants in drinking water and food. The analysis techniques that he has developed to detect and characterize arsenic compounds have been enthusiastically welcomed by health researchers worldwide. Another remarkable new technique developed by

his team can detect one impaired DNA base among a sample of one billion healthy ones. It promises, amongst other things, better measurement of the impact of radiation doses in cancer therapy.

NSERC Steacie Fellowships are awarded to outstanding Canadian university scientists or engineers who have earned their doctorate within the last 12 years. Only four awards are made annually.

Each award includes a \$180,000 payment over two years to the university towards the professor's salary, so that he can pursue his advanced research fulltime and obtain increased research funding from NSERC.

valuable lead compounds for development of new pharmaceuticals which are based on the natural structure but perhaps derivatized or simplified in some way. Examples of drugs which have been discovered in this way range from the simple analgesic drug aspirin (ASA) to the complex anticancer agent Taxol."

Research conducted in the United States in the mid 1980s confirmed that natural substances present in amaryllis extracts possessed potent anticancer properties against many human tumors. These were particularly active against melanoma and certain types of lung and colon cancers. The most active substance is a complex alkaloid named pancratistatin which can be obtained from certain plant bulbs of the amaryllis family in very small quantities. The National Cancer Institute in the United States placed pancratistatin in pre-clinical development several years ago, however progress is hampered by the low natural availability of the drug. In addition, the natural drug contains structural complexities which are known to be unnecessary for the anticancer activity.

Over the next eight to 10 years, McNulty's research could advance pancratistatin from the Petri dish to clinical studies and further progress in the chemotherapeutic treatment of certain

types of cancer.

McNulty recently received a \$53,000 grant from the Cottrell College Science Awards programs to support this research. This was a renewal of a grant that McNulty first received in 1997 from the Tucson-based Research Corporation which funds the Cottrell College Science Awards program. Some of the new funding has been used for a much-awaited purchase of a circulation cryostat that is used in temperature controlled procedures.

This piece of equipment is integral to

the final stages of McNulty's research.

About 20 per cent of McNulty's work relates to isolating natural products in the search for new active substances from amaryllis and other sources. The low natural abundance of pancratistatin necessitated extraction from over 1,000 kilograms of amaryllis bulbs to supply enough drug for pre-clinical trials. That makes extracting pancratistatin naturally for wide-scale drug development a daunting process.

For that reason, McNulty and his team of researchers focus 80 per cent of their research into the discovery of a simplified synthetic analog which retains the anticancer activity. It's like finding the needle in the haystack but at the molecular level.

McNulty has successfully synthesized several of the key complimentary analogs.

"The natural product may be too complicated and we may be able to synthetically simplify it," explains McNulty. "The overall goal is to obtain the simplest chemical structure that exhibits the full spectrum of anticancer activity."

Wrestlers repeat as Canadian champions




Above, CIAU Coaches of the Year, Brock's Marty Calder, left, and Richard DesChatelets.

The Brock men's wrestling team recently claimed its second consecutive CIAU championship after winning seven individual medals.

"It was an outstanding performance," says coach Richard DesChatelets who along with assistant coach Marty Calder were named CIAU Coaches of the Year, also for the second straight year. "To be the CIAU champions for two years in a row is a great accomplishment. It's not something we talked about during the year. We don't do that. But now, we can reflect on it and realize what it means.

"For the Brock wrestling program, winning a second consecutive CIAU title really solidifies our position as being the top

school in the country for the past decade."

Brock won golds from Jamie Porteous (65kg), Mike Francis (68kg) and Dante Berlingeri (90kg).

The women's team also had a successful championship as Brock finished second, behind powerhouse, University of Calgary. Tonya Verbeek won gold in the

57 kg class. Silvers were won by Laura Jones (70kg), and Kelly Green (77Kg).

Now that the university wrestling season is over, DesChatelets will concentrate on his role as coach of Canada's Olympic freestyle wrestling team. In the next six months leading up to the 2000 Summer Olympics in Sydney, Australia, DesChatelets and the Canadian team will compete in meets in Mexico, Columbia, Germany, and Calgary.

Calder retires from competitive wrestling


Marty Calder, a Brock University graduate and a member of Canada's National Wrestling Team program for over 10 years, announced his retirement as a competitive wrestler earlier this year.

Calder, 33, will continue to be active in the sport as a coach with Brock's wrestling team and the Brock Wrestling Club.

Many in wrestling view Calder as one of Canada's best performers within the last century. He holds the Canadian record of winning 18 national championships. His illustrious accomplishments include a Commonwealth Games Gold medal, a Pan-American Championship Gold medal, a fifth-place finish at the 1993 World Championship, an eighth place at the 1996 Olympic Games, and a member of the 1992 Olympic team.

Mike Payette, Director of Canada's national program, described Calder as the "heart and soul" of the national wrestling team.

"Marty has been a wrestling institution for more than a decade with Canadian wrestling," said Payette. "His dedication, commitment and positive attitude are a template for all up and coming wrestlers."
