

Voice of alumni holds great value: new president

It gives me great pleasure to take this opportunity to introduce myself and to share with you my enthusiasm for being part of this outstanding institution.

I have spent the past 30 years at Concordia University in Montreal as a Professor of Religion and as a senior administrator, including nine years as the Provost and Vice-Rector (Vice-President).

My wife, Dorothy, and I are excited about becoming part of the Brock community, and we look forward to making Niagara our new home.

My arrival at Brock comes at a significant time in the University's history. The institution, with a firmly established reputation for being studentcentred and being committed to offering a high-quality and "engaged" education, has set as its goal a significant, all-encompassing transformation. It is in the process of becoming a "comprehensive" university. This implies becoming significantly more competitive on a broad front of disciplines as a centre of undergraduate and graduate teaching and learning, and as a centre of research at national and international levels.

Brock has made remarkable progress, thanks to a dedicated team administrators, Trustees, faculty, staff and students, as well as alumni who continue to participate on many levels in the affairs of the institution.

I am learning more about Brock weekly and I have a fair distance to go in this regard.

As I have said on many occasions, I have a lot of listening to do in these early stages as President. In recent months, I have had several opportunities to speak with current students. Consistently, they share with me their regard for Brock's student-focused character in which they feel a closeness with faculty and staff and

Namibian school children benefit from graduate's skills

When the organization fighting for the liberation of Namibia offered Alfred Ilukena a scholarship to study Education at Brock University, the international student took his first steps on a path that has led him to a powerful career in his country of birth.

The South West African People's Organization offered the scholarship to Ilukena (BA, 2Lan/soci, '88 and BEdTSL, '89) through the Commonwealth Secretariat, and today the Brock graduate is the third-highest ranking officer in Namibia's Ministry of Education, holding the position of

Undersecretary for Formal Education. He is responsible for the African nation's school programs from early childhood to senior secondary education.

"I knew I had a mission to complete even as I was studying in Canada."

"It was my plan to return to Africa, specifically Namibia, after my studies," he said. "At the time, Namibia was still illegally occupied by South Africa and thousands of Namibians had gone into exile to fight for the liberation of the motherland. I knew that I had a mission to complete even as I was studying in Canada.'

He returned to Namibia, which borders the South Atlantic Ocean in the west, Angola in the north, South Africa in the south, Botswana in the east and Zambia in the northeast, after he graduated from Brock in June 1989, ending 15 years in exile. He participated in the UN-organized elections in which

a sense of community. The voice of alumni holds great value. I will look forward to meeting with graduates — to listen and to learn — throughout the year, beginning with the upcoming Brock Days homecoming on September 29, 30 and October 1. I will join the Office of Alumni Relations at alumni network events planned for Ottawa (my hometown), Toronto and our newest networks in London, Hamilton and Waterloo. As well, plans are underway for a Western tour to visit graduates in Edmonton, Calgary, Vancouver and Victoria.

My message to graduates and other stakeholders is one of opportunity. The strategic goals that Brock has set for itself present the institution with the opportunity to take a lead role among Canadian universities to collectively address the emerging challenges facing our society.

Given the complexity of the world in which we Canadians must operate, society requires a much higher proportion of its citizenry than ever before to have a university-level education, with an increasing need for post-graduate level degrees, including many PhDs in a broad spectrum of areas.

Our universities must increasingly internationalize their curriculum, exchange programs, their student recruitment, research endeavors, and many of their core activities. Canada's universities must become the test-bed and practice-field for Canada and Canadian students who will live and work in a highly socially and culturally diverse, and internationalized, environment.

strengthen their ties on many fronts with the concentric circles of communities of which they are a part, beginning with, but not limited to, their regional communities. They should act as windows for their regions and encompassing communities into the emerging world beyond the immediate environs — provincially, nationally, internationally — a world in which these local regions must place themselves (again, with the universities' active participation) strategically, economically, socially and culturally.

Institutions of higher learning must be proactive in exploring the potential of new technologies in education, research, knowledge dissemination, social and cultural formation, commerce, and many other spheres.

It is apparent to me that Brock has /

already chosen to become a university that will play an important role on many of the aforementioned fronts. Indeed, Brock has the opportunity to become a model in many respects of a new type of university engagement in society as it continues to redefine and strengthen its roles in undergraduate and graduate education and in research.


I am confident that Brock will realize its full potential and fulfil its mandate to better the lives of our students and graduates, and to better society.

Namibia won its independence in March 1990.

Ilukena maintains a link with Brock. He was recently visited in Namibia by John Kaethler (BA, poli, '74), Director, Office of International Services.

Since 1990, Ilukena has held various positions, from curriculum development to Chief Inspector of Schools to currently chairing a task force examining the role that information technology will play in the transformation of Namibia's education system in a global competitive environment.

"The IT task force I am heading is being heralded as one of the best examples of private-public partnerships and is to be used by the UN as a model for developing countries," he said.

Ilukena credits his years at Brock as "my cradle for civilization. The professors, the administration, the students and the community of St. Catharines all helped to inspire and

shape me to be who I am today. Compassion and accommodation were the trademarks with which I remember Brock."

As an international student, Ilukena was happy "to find such understanding and patient professionals who were selfless in their dedication to their students. They pushed me to my limit, gave me credit when I deserved it, and taught me that hard work is its final reward."

He also remembers his classmates with fondness "and the love, laughter and support they gave me will always influence my dealing with others."

Organizational skills, public speaking skills and thinking on his feet were all talents he learned at Brock.

"It does not matter how hard you studied, the question is whether you understand the material and can apply the principles to any situation. That has been the strength and secret of my success story."

Brock scholarship named for public relations pioneer

Dr. Lou Cahill, the recipient of an honorary degree from Brock University and a pioneer in public relations development and practice in Canada, has been recognized through the establishment of the Lou Cahill Scholarship in Communications.

The scholarship will be awarded to a graduating-year student from the Brock Communications program. The recipient must demonstrate a commitment to academic excellence, community involvement and/or participation in charitable activities.

Dr. Cahill, founder of OEB International, Canada's longestoperating public relations firm and a subsidiary of The Enterprise Canada Group. received an honorary doctorate from the University in 1991.

The scholarship has been jointly established by The Enterprise Canada group and the Communications and Public Relations Foundation, a not-for-profit charitable organization committed to increasing public knowledge and awareness of the role of communications and public relations through support to educational initiatives.

The award, to be given annually, is valued at \$1,250. The Enterprise Group

has agreed to donate \$6,250 to the Foundation over five years to fund the scholarship, and both organizations will build a capital fund to ensure the scholarship is awarded in perpetuity.

Dr. Cahill received the Canadian Public Relations Society's (CPRS) Philip A. Novikoff Award for advancing the public relations profession in 1989 and became a member of the CPRS College of Fellows in 2000. His career achievements were recently recognized by CPRS at its national conference in Niagara Falls, Ont., in June 2006.

In Memoriam

Brock University recently lost two members of its community.

Gabriel Temkin, a retired Professor in the Economics Department, died at the age of 85 in Sarasota, Fla., on July 15.

Temkin was a specialist in economic theory and the history of economic thought. He was widely published in Poland before he came to Brock, and he continued to publish after his retirement. Among other retirement projects, he wrote My Just War: The Memoir of a Jewish Red Army Soldier in World War II. It was published in 1998, and recounts harrowing personal tales of wartime battles, captures and escapes. He received three medals of valour for his wartime service.

Temkin came to Brock in 1970 from Poland, where he was Professor of Economics at the University of Warsaw. He taught at Brock until his retirement in 1986. Gabriel is survived by his wife, Hanna, whom he married in 1946 while they were students at the University of Leningrad, his daughter, Helena, his son, Henryk, and four grandchildren.

Paulette Hallich, former instructor in the Department of Dramatic Arts, died of lung cancer in Victoria, B.C. at the end of June. Hallich made an indelible impression on audiences when she created the role of Nancy Potato in "The Potato People" for Brock's resident theatre company, Theatre Beyond Words, and toured around the world with the company.

In later years, she taught and directed at a number of colleges and universities, including Sheridan College and Brock.

She is survived by her husband, Michael (M. J.) Turner, who is a former Graphic Designer in Brock's Office of University Communications.


Little cancer survivor completes victory lap at Relay for Life

Brock Taraba walked his first Survivor Lap at the Canadian Cancer Society's 12-hour 2006 Relay for Life that took place at Brock University, from 7 p.m, June 23 until 7 a.m., June 24.

Brock Taraba, who was given only 20 days to live when he was first diagnosed with cancer (high-risk acute lymphoblastic leukemia) at 10 months of age, is now eight years old. He completed two and a half years of chemotherapy that included head radiation. He will mark the completion his first Survivor Lap with the support of his twin brother Conner; his five-year-old sister Taya; his father Steve Taraba (BA, admi/soci, '96) and his mother Lori Synes-Taraba, a mature student at the University who also recently made the Dean's List in the Faculty of Social Sciences.

The couple named their son Brock because they met in a first-year Sociology class at the University 20 years ago.

Lori Synes-Taraba, who took time off from completing her Brock degree to help her son through his cancer treatment, was also a member of the

2006 Relay for Life organizing committee and emceed the event from 10 p.m. until 2 a.m.

"It is the monies raised from this event that go toward patient services and research money - it paid for gas money to take Brock to the hospital for seven years," said Lori Synes-Taraba. "If it wasn't for the community providing support for cancer research, many families would be without their loved ones. After volunteering for the past four

years, I agreed to be on this year's organizing committee because I needed to give back to those who were so generous to my son."

During the relay, teams took turns walking or running around Isaac Brock Circle in support of the Cancer Society. There were volleyball tournaments, cooking demonstrations and live entertainment throughout the evening to keep everyone motivated.

Institute for International Issues in Accounting is created

Brock University and the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Ontario are pleased to announce the creation of the Institute for International Issues in Accounting. The Institute fosters continuous improvement in education, financial reporting, assurance and worldwide accounting standards through grants and collaborative activities with a view towards raising the profile of the accounting profession internationally.

Following the accreditation of the accounting program at Brock University in September 2005, annual funding to the Institute will be provided by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Ontario on the basis of \$1,000 for each first-time Uniform Final Evaluation (UFE) writer who graduates from the program, up to a ceiling of \$100,000.

The Institute hopes to improve the practice of accounting through teaching, learning and research by stimulating, encouraging and supporting the creation and dissemination of knowledge in the accounting field as it relates to international issues. It also seeks to provide for the interchange of professional ideas, research and other

information relating to international issues in accounting, especially between practitioners and academics by supporting and sponsoring lectures, workshops, business meetings and social gatherings.

Pascale Lapointe-Antunes, PhD, CA, Assistant Professor of Accounting in the Faculty of Business, is the co-ordinator of the Institute.

An Advisory Board has been formed and includes Brian Leader, Vice-President of Learning, Institute of Chartered Accountants of Ontario; Susan Maynard (BAdmin, '86), Partner, Smith-Nixon LLP; Debbie Sevenpifer (BAdmin, '87), President and CEO, Niagara Health System; Professor Ian Adamson, Professor Darlene Bay and Professor Raafat Roubi. A first round of research proposals will be solicited shortly.

The Institute also hopes to launch a biannual speaker series, organized with the Niagara District CA Association, which would qualify as a structured professional development activity. 

Digital technology, diverse disciplines unite to form unique program


These knights wield digital technology, not lances, and their trusty steeds are computer chips. Their quest: to create new scholastic paradigms at Brock University.

Silicon Knights, the darling of the video gaming industry, and Brock are about to marry the traditional arm's-length elements of gaming and academics, technology and humanities.

In September, the University will introduce an interdisciplinary Interactive Arts and Science (IASC) program. It will be launched as a minor this September and possibly as a major next year. Brock, the first university in Canada to offer a degree in Film Studies, will be the first to offer a degree in Interactive Arts and Science.

In an examination of how text, image and media are transformed by interactivity, the courses will be crosslisted with departments as diverse as English, Classics, Computer Science, History, Geography, Music, Visual Arts and Communications, and Popular Culture and Film.

Brock graduate Denis Dyack (BPhEd/BSc, cosd, '90), president of the hugely successful St. Catharines video gaming company, has been in close collaboration with, among others, professors John Mitterer (Psychology, Computer Science), Barry Grant (Communications, Popular Culture and Film), Barry Joe (Centre for Digital Humanities) and Jean Bridge (Department of Visual Arts and the Centre for Digital Humanities). Professors John Bonnet and Kevin Kee, (Faculty of Humanities), both Canada Research Chairs, have also been extremely influential as part of a new

collaboration of researchers in digital humanities.

"It was the perfect storm," said Bridge. "Once we began our discussions, we discovered in setting up the minor that there were a lot of existing resources for a major."

Dyack, who made his first video game as a Brock undergrad, said the Silicon Knights "are the Camelot knights of the video gaming industry. We are trying to set new standards of quality and

intelligence in our games that simply have not been seen in the past."

Silicon Knights is currently partnered with Microsoft for an Xbox 360 trilogy called Too Human. The project has generated a loud buzz in the entertainment industry.

There is a natural link between humanities and technology, said Dyack, whose varsity wrestling career provided a good life lesson. ("It's a tough sport. I learned that when you lose, you get beat up.") Technologically savvy employees, while important, only play one part in producing a thoughtful, compelling video game. Just as important, he said, are people with knowledge in storytelling, mythology, philosophy, film making and other artistic traditions.

Grant said of the IASC program: "This is clearly an area of media, communications and entertainment that is of particular interest to students now, and there is no doubt that interactive computer environments will supplant other media forms such as cinema in the future."

Added Mitterer: "Denis has created a knowledge-age company where lifelong learning is paramount. Brock is also knowledge-driven. While technology is important, the humanities play a key role in game design."

The curriculum addresses five conceptual areas in the domain of computer-based interactivity: storytelling, digital culture, media production, digital methods for the analysis of information, and computing.

The success of Silicon Knights has had a secondary impact on Brock — some of the University's graduates have been hired by the company. Dyack estimates 95 per cent of his employees, whose average age is about 25, are from Ontario. In keeping with the medieval theme, employees consider themselves to be members of a guild, not employees of a company.

"I'm always looking for people who have a long-term interest in staying in the Niagara area," said the St. Catharines native. "I plan to remain here because of all it has to offer."

Brock grads veer left and right into politics

It's world of public service, election campaigns, back-room handlers, and endless meetings. The Brock graduates who inhabit this environment are career politicians and they often reside at opposite ends of the political spectrum.

Earlier this year, Rick Dykstra (BA, poli, '97) was elected to the House of Commons. The Conservative MP, who represents the riding of St. Catharines, defeated 13-year Liberal incumbent Walt Lastewka in a nail-biting vote count on election night.

Dykstra, who describes himself as a 'small c' Conservative, is no stranger to politics. He was a St. Catharines councillor from 1991 to 1997 and chaired the city's budget committee and library board. From 1997 to 2002, he spent one year as Management Board Secretariat, two years as Chief of Staff to the Minister of Community and Social Services, and two years as Director of Caucus and Public Relations for Ontario premiers Mike Harris and Ernie Eves.

Dykstra, who also holds a master's certificate in project management from the Schulich School of Business at York University, built Dysktra Owen Public Affairs from 2000 to 2004, a company focused on communications, strategic planning and public affairs.

He lists as his political achievements the successful shutting down of a strip bar in a residential neighbourhood and helping to implement the Ontario Works Community Placement Program across the province.

Dykstra says the seminar system at Brock prepared him to defend his position on issues publicly and taught him how to listen to stronger and better arguments than he presented.

"Brock also gave me the research ability I have today and the confirmation that hard work will be rewarded," he adds.

Dykstra says many people had an influential impact on his life, including fellow student Paul Hamilton (BA, poli, 90', now a Political Science professor at Brock) and professors William Mathie, Bill Matheson, Leah Bradshaw and Dusan Kolundzic (BA, poli, '86; MA, poli, '89).

To the left of centre sits Kyle Rae (BA, hist, '76), first elected in 1991 as a Toronto city councillor. He has been elected or acclaimed in each subsequent election.

Rae entered Brock in July 1972 as part of the Grade 12 program. His political sense was honed at Brock when, in 1973, students occupied the President's Office over governance issues and tuition fees.

He has worked with many groups to maintain and enhance downtown Toronto communities and he is a staunch defender of established neighbourhoods. He has also helped to establish Business Improvement Areas and Heritage Conservation Districts.

Rae, who also holds master's degrees in history from the University of Birmingham and library sciences from the University of Toronto, is openly gay, and prior to his involvement in municipal politics, he advocated on behalf of the gay and lesbian community and helped to found the annual Toronto Pride festival, one of the largest in the world. He also worked to have Toronto host the 16th World AIDS Conference in August this year.


The political advocate credits the small classes at Brock as offering a great opportunity for discourse and the exchange of opinion.

"Faculty conducted lectures and seminars, which gave us a greater degree of access to learned opinion," Rae says. "Challenging debate in class has served me well - 30 years after leaving Brock."

Two years working as a reference assistant in the James A. Gibson Library "was a great learning experience" and he says librarians Sylvia Osterbind and Janette Auer (BA, Fren/Span, '72; BA, clas, '99) and professors Bill Matheson, Carl Wolff and Alan Arthur, and Arthur's wife Virginia, were influential in his life.

One of his fondest memories of Brock has nothing to do with classes or politics but was an illuminating experience nonetheless.

"I'll never forget the fireflies that swarmed about the wooded pathway between the DeCew Residence and the lower campus on Glenridge Avenue."






