Applications skyrocket – double cohort is on its way

Brock University is already experiencing the impact of the double cohort with its highest enrolment ever this year and an unprecedented number of applications for September.

With preparations in place to accommodate 4,100 first-year students in September, Brock experienced the second highest percentage increase among all Ontario universities in applications from secondary school students for the 2003-04 academic year.

Application figures show a 138.8 per cent increase in high school students applying to Brock for full-time studies beginning in September 2003, compared to an overall system average increase of 84.3 per cent. Brock has received a total of 27,557 applications for September 2003, compared to last year's 11,540.

"These figures demonstrate Brock's growing reputation as an institution that is committed to student success and to the highest standards of academic excellence," said University President David Atkinson.

"On a percentage basis, Brock is increasing its intake of secondary school students more than any other university in Ontario," Atkinson said. "We will continue to work with the provincial Ministry of Training, Colleges and Universities to ensure a place in an Ontario university for every qualified student."

Brock has been one of the leaders in the growth of applications for the past decade.

First-choice applications to Brock totalled 5,310, an increase of 86 per cent from the previous year's 2,854. The overall average increase of first-choice applications to all Ontario universities

for the upcoming academic year totalled 46.7 per cent.

Since 1998, Brock has planned for the double cohort — the final year of the five-year high school program and the first class of the new four-year curriculum. The University is recruiting new faculty members and has also expanded its academic and physical facilities. Brock has invested about \$100 million in new academic and classroom space, new technology, a food court, student residences and recreational facilities for students and the community.

Among the immediate plans for campus growth is a new 310-bed Arnie Lowenberger student residence that is currently under construction and is scheduled to open at the southwest corner of the campus for the 2003-04 academic year.

The University also has signed a 10-year lease agreement with Lupine Properties Limited, of London, to manage Quarry View Residence, a townhouse-style complex for 290 students, located across the street from the Brock campus. Quarry View Residence is scheduled to open for fall 2003. The University will manage the 80-unit complex of two-, three- and four-bedroom furnished units as part of its award-winning residence program.

Additional office and seminar space is being provided as part of a leasing agreement to utilize new buildings across from the Brock campus on Glenridge Avenue.

Brock has also submitted a project proposal for the new SuperBuild competition. The project involves the construction of a new bookstore, classrooms and office space.

Over the past several years, I've had the opportunity to volunteer at the University.

The time that I have committed to Brock, since graduating in 1977, has been personally rewarding, particularly my most recent involvement as the Chair of the planning committee for the annual Brock Days Celebration.

My life as a student at Brock was not



My typical school day began on campus with a lecture at 9 a.m., and often I'd have another three-hour lecture scheduled from 7 a.m. to 10 p.m. I managed to fill in the time by scheduling seminars, studying in the library, working out in the gym, and, there was always time for a social call to Alphie's. Even though I lived in St. Catharines, I would stay at the University most days because the campus was a comfortable place for me to be.

After graduating with my BA, I had the opportunity to work full-time and take classes at Brock in the evening with the goal of becoming a chartered accountant. During the five years that I studied part time, I gained a much greater appreciation for Brock and the vision and determination of the founders of the University. Niagara is fortunate to have Brock as part of its community.

A few years ago I met Tom Arkell, Brock's Director of Community, Extension and Conference Services. We would often discuss ideas that would encourage the local community and graduates to interact more with the University.

Before long, the concept of Brock Days emerged — a bigger and better Brock Homecoming, with faculty, staff, students, graduates and the larger community participating in the celebration to be held

U.S.-based professor to pursue research in youth and wellness at Brock

An Ohio-based health research professor will be relocating to Brock University to pursue research in youth and wellness as the University's third recipient of a Canada Research Chair.

The University will receive \$500,000 over five years in support of the Canada Research Chairs Program as well as an infrastructure grant worth \$54,000 from the Canada Foundation for Innovation (CFI) and a matching \$54,000 grant from the Ontario Innovation Trust. The University and private sector partners will also fund the research.

As Canada Research Chair in Youth and Wellness, Professor Terrance Wade, who is originally from Calgary, Alta., will examine whether risks experienced by children cascade to create youths who are less resilient or more

susceptible to a broad array

of adverse outcomes related to health, delinquency, substance use scholastic performance. Wade's "Professor background, skills and

ability will fit in nicely with the exceptional team of faculty Brock's who make up members Department of Community Health Sciences," said John Corlett, Dean of the Faculty of Applied Health Sciences. "We are extremely pleased that Professor Wade is joining Brock and returning to Canada. His arrival will provide exciting opportunities for the University to further strengthen its

position as a major research centre." Wade, who comes to Brock from the

University of Cincinnati, will employ a multi-disciplinary perspective to investigate the social and structural determinants in the development of resiliency among children and the trajectories that lead to a variety of childhood and adolescent outcomes. He will examine children from infancy to adolescence with the intention of tracing the pathways on which children are placed at an early age, and identifying the contextual factors that alter these trajectories, resulting in either positive or negative outcomes. These factors may include the family, school, neighbourhood and peer networks.

Wade foresees that his research program will have both academic and social policy relevance. In addition to advancing the understanding of the complex relationships between various social, structural and developmental processes, his research will assist policy makers in allocating financial resources to programs with demonstrable results.

Wade's work is widely published in leading health research journals. He has made more than 50 presentations at national and international scientific conferences, has reviewed numerous journals and was the recipient of the 1998 American Sociological Association, Section on the Sociology of Mental Health Award for Best Dissertation. He has been the principal or co-investigator on several research grants on child health and behaviour.

Brock creates institute for youth research

Almost three dozen professors at Brock University have joined together to create a new research institute with a focus on youth studies that will serve the needs of Niagara and Canada.

The Brock Research Institute for Youth Studies (BRIYS), the only one of its kind in Ontario, brings together a combined total of more than \$4 million in research funding. The BRIYS involves multidisciplinary alliances among 34 professors from five academic faculties at Brock, including social sciences, business, humanities, applied health sciences and education. Niagara community members are also involved in the BRIYS.

The research targets youth from birth to late 20s and focuses on areas such as resilience, lifestyle choices, media, aggression, gambling, smoking and literacy. This research involves extensive partnerships with Niagara school boards, recreation associations, youth agencies, public health and the police service.

"The Brock Research Institute for Youth Studies provides faculty with an opportunity multidisciplinary collaboration on issues related to youth while advancing scientific knowledge in this important field," said Dr. Jack Miller, Associate Vice-President of Research, and Dean of Graduate Studies, at Brock. "This initiative will serve as a vital link between the University and the community and will have a direct impact on shaping policy and program development for youth across the country."

The creation of the BRIYS follows several years of extensive research by Brock faculty on youth-related issues. Two research groups at the University were recently awarded additional provincial and national grants to continue research in resilience and youth lifestyle choices as well as in youth gambling.

The Youth-Lifestyle Choices -Community University Research Alliance (YLC-CURA), a strategic partnership between 15 faculty at Brock and 34 youth-serving Niagara agencies that focus on better understanding resilience and youth lifestyle choices, was awarded an additional \$400,000 from the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council of Canada (SSHRC). In total, YLC-CURA has received \$1.4 million in grant funding since it was formed only three years ago.

The Youth Gambling Research Group (YGRG) at Brock was awarded more than \$350,000 from the Ontario Problem Gambling Research Centre for two new projects examining factors that predict youth gambling problems. This research group is a joint initiative of the Brock University Wellness Institute and

the Niagara Alcohol and Drug Assessment Service's Problem Gambling Program.

The BRIYS is located on Glenridge Avenue in St. Catharines, next to the Shaver Hospital and across the street from the Brock campus.

Internship in Ukraine was rewarding experience

I completed my MA in Political Science (International Relations) in

August 2002, and a month afterwards I left for Kyiv, the capital of Ukraine, for a six-and-a-half month internship at the Ukrainian Centre for Economic and Political Studies. The internship is organized by the

Canadian Bureau for International Education and is sponsored by the Canadian Department of Foreign Affairs and International Trade.

My experience on the internship in Ukraine has been both challenging and rewarding. By working at the Centre, which is Ukraine's leading non-governmental organization (NGO) think tank, I have gained primary knowledge about contemporary political, social and

economic issues in the country, and have had the opportunity to see and understand first hand how and why Ukraine has had difficulty in entrenching the values and principles of democracy within its state structure.

My experience in Ukraine has given me the opportunity to follow up on my MA research, which focused on the process of democratization in Ukraine. I have seen with my own eyes what once I only read about on paper — a new country, plagued with many remnants of the Soviet Union, struggling to establish sovereignty for the first time in centuries. Sadly, I have realized that the process is very slow and the country is in a dangerous state of stagnation, especially in terms of protecting basic human rights. However, experience has also given me guidance in my future career plans, which will most likely include pursuing a PhD in International Relations focusing on the promotion of global human rights.

Director, Admissions and Recruitment. Both Kiss and Lea are Brock graduates.



The conference will focus on issues and questions of philosophy as they have been perceived and reflected upon over the years by Goicoechea. Former students and friends have been invited to participate in this conference from across Canada, the United States and Europe.

"I think the conference will be a he has taught 10,000 students, and has

taught about 300 great texts. He has given about 100 papers and written three books. He describes his teaching career as being given "the gift and the task to work with students in terms of helping them to get further into the love of wisdom and the wisdom of love."

He leaves Brock to pursue a major writing project — Millennial Meditations — a series of 15 books that will focus on 2,000 years of Christian love. It will include such themes as personhood, the law, and science, and work comparatively with other forms of love such as eros, amour, Karuna, Bhakti and Jen.

I see my whole career as getting me ready

for this big project," he says.

ACE Brock students teach business skills to impoverished Argentines

Four members of ACE Brock, a student-run entrepreneurship organization at Brock University, recently travelled to Rosario, Argentina, where they taught the community's impoverished residents how to combine their farming skills with business skills to become self-sufficient.

In February, the ACE (Advancing Canadian Entrepreneurship) Brock students spent two weeks in Empalme Graneros, a community of 12,500 in Rosario. Using an educational program developed by ACE Brock, the students taught community members how to create a communal business by developing such essential skills as pricing, budgeting and marketing of their product.

"This initiative will enable the residents of Empalme Graneros to improve their economic situation by becoming self-sufficient and creating marketing opportunities with neighbouring communities," said Danyell Boyd, Vice-President Awareness for ACE Brock. "It's also an incredible opportunity for ACE Brock students to gain practical experience which they will be able to share with their peers back in Canada."

The group of students who participated

in the trip were Boyd, a third-year Business Communications students from Cleveland, Ohio; Matt Petre, a second-year Business Administration student from Whitby; Miranda Kus, a second-year Child and Youth Studies student from Etobicoke; and Israel Rodriguez, a second-year Business Communications student from Brampton.

The visit was also an opportunity for the students to assess the Argentines' current level of productivity as well as introduce the concepts of the free market system through the use of interactive lessons and activities. The students will gather resources and information to create an online interactive centre for the community members to use for further business ventures.

Through testing, the ACE Brock team can effectively evaluate the implementation of the educational program. The students will continue to maintain frequent communication with community members of Empalme Graneros and work towards further developing the business. They have also been asked to expand the program to 90 other villages.

Brock researchers develop revolutionary device that measures toxic trace elements

Two Brock University professors have developed a revolutionary device that will help scientists to more accurately measure minute traces of arsenic and other toxic metals in drinking water, environmental samples and ores. For example, with the device, researchers could measure the concentration of arsenic if a quarter teaspoon of the toxic element was dissolved in a body of water about the size of 100 Olympic-size swimming pools.

After four years of research and development, Chemistry Professors Ian Brindle and Roger McLaughlin are awaiting final patent approval for the Multimode Sample Introduction System (MSIS), a glass device about the size of a tennis ball which contains several components precisely engineered to deliver improved performance over existing technologies. The device was designed by Brindle and McLaughlin and built by Brock's glassblower, John Vandenhoff.

Brindle and McLaughlin are negotiating with PerkinElmer, a global technology leader which develops equipment for use in such fields as health sciences, semiconductor and aerospace, to sell the MSIS as a component of its analytical instrument, known as an inductivelycoupled plasma atomic spectrometer. Brindle and McLaughlin predict that there are 10,000 instruments around the world that could potentially use the MSIS. The MSIS makes possible the measurement of very low trace concentrations of several elements, including arsenic, lead and mercury. What makes the MSIS revolutionary is that it combines vapour generation and nebulization into a single process.

Traditional instruments nebulize solutions into a high temperature plasma, a process which is very inefficient, since 98 per cent of the sample goes to waste. For some elements, this remains the only way to get the samples into the instrument. Brindle and McLaughlin combined their knowledge of transforming elements into volatile forms, where up to 100 per cent of the sample can be delivered to the instrument. With the MSIS, the testing requires only one machine, delivers faster

and more accurate results, and detects trace elements at levels as low as forty parts per trillion.

"What makes the MSIS so revolutionary is its ability to enable accurate, rapid and simultaneous determinations of extremely low concentrations of elements of concern," said Professor Ian Brindle, who is also Dean of the Faculty of Mathematics and Sciences at Brock. "That means the MSIS can provide researchers with far more solid results. The MSIS will also provide significant economic benefits to the laboratories which monitor our drinking water, industries that use water in manufacturing, or laboratories that serve the mining and metal industries."

Brindle and McLaughlin report that the MSIS could facilitate the development of a portable water-testing device that could be taken into the field.

"Because communities do not have the tools to do water testing themselves, unsafe water often goes unchecked," said McLaughlin. "Our hope is that the MSIS will help make field testing more accessible and frequent. This improvement could then provide people with the information that would enable them to improve the quality of drinking water in countries with contaminated water."

The MSIS project was developed with funding support from the Natural Sciences and Engineering Research Council of Canada (NSERC), a key federal agency innovation. The Council supports both basic university research through research grants, and project research through partnerships among universities, governments and the private sector, as well as the advanced training of highly qualified people. In addition, PerkinElmer in Canada and the United States has supported the research of Brindle and McLaughlin by providing them with state-of-the-art equipment with which to pursue their research that has led to this important development.

Badgers end banner year with eight championships

The Brock University Department of Athletics ended a banner year in 2002-03 as they captured eight championships including three national championships and five Ontario championships.

To end the banner year in front of a crowd of over 1,000 fans at the Bob Davis Gymnasium, it was the men's wrestling team capturing the Canadian Interuniversity Sport (CIS) national championship for their fifth straight year. In one of the most exciting men's finishes in CIS history, it came down to the final match of the day. The No. 1 seed Evan Macdonald (68kg) from Brock defeated Calgary's Damon Booth 10-0 in just over one minute into the first round to capture gold, edging out Calgary by one point and SFU by two. The top three men's standings were Brock (61), Calgary (60) and SFU (59).

Seven of the nine Brock wrestlers medalled including golds from Jamie Macari, Ryan Weicker and MacDonald.

At the Ontario University Athletics (OUA) wrestling championships, the Brock men's and women's teams captured gold.

Also celebrating championship


seasons were:

 Men's soccer captured their first ever CIS championship as the Badgers became the first ever No. 6 seed to capture gold. This game was broadcast live across the country on Sportsnet as rookie Andrew Norton scored the game winner in the 113th minute versus the host Carleton, defeating them 1-0.

• Men's rowing captured both the Ontario (OUA) and national (CURC) championships. This was their second national title in school history.

• Men's lacrosse went a perfect 11-0 in 2002 to capture the OUFLA championship, their 12th in school history. They defeated Bishops Gaiters in triple overtime in the championship game by the score of 9-8 with rookie Matt Marchildon adding the game winner.

· Men's baseball won their first OUA championship to add to their two national crowns (1998, 1999). They swept OUA rival McMaster in the best two-out-of-three series.
